2018 Cattlemen's Ball hosts roll out theme

By the time it's all said and done, 90 percent of the proceeds from the 2018 Cattlemen's Ball will be used for cancer research and 10 percent will come back to the communities in Thayer County.

The goal for hosts and co-hosts, Randy and Becky Hergott and Rob and Natalie Marsh is to generate \$1.5 million net.

"Our goal is to sell out, which would be about 5,000 people," Rob Marsh said.

"This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for our communities," Randy Hergott said. "It's for a good cause. We all have people affected by cancer and we want to raise as much money as possible for cancer research," Hergott said.

The "Whip Cancer" Down the Oregon Trail is June 1-2 at 6235 Road P on the Hergott farm ground.

Several methods to raise funds are in the works. Calf for a Cure ensures anyone can own a calf for \$1,000. Upkeep will be provided at little or no cost and calves will eventually produce more than their original purchase price. The Cattlemen's Ball committee is hoping to sell 300 calves.

There will be three live auctions, a farm and ranch auction and a silent auction to raise more

funds. The committee is currently deciding on an Oregon Trail run or marathon.

Approximately 500 volunteers will be needed for the event and there are 55 committees total.

"By fall, we're going to let everyone know where we need help," Marsh said.

The Cattlemen's Ball website at www.cattlemensball.com will soon switch from the 2017 event to 2018 activities and updates. Volunteers will be able to register online.

Tickets are not yet on sale, but will be available for one or two nights and the VIP experience.

There are, however, many opportunities for sponsorship, Marsh said.

For lodging, Hergott is offering an area for 100 to 150 campers and residents around the county are encouraged to offer any space they may have, whether it be for camping or lodging.

Even unused recreational vehicles could provide lodging.

The committee is discussing shuttle transportation from hotels in York and Beatrice as well.

Hergott and Marsh said the Cattlemen's Ball isn't just about Hebron or Thayer County — it's

Hospital statements explained in forum

Thayer County Health Services held its second community forum to explain the billing process at the Wheelhouse in Deshler June 7 with Chief Executive and Chief Financial Officers respectively, David Burd and Doug Wismer.

"We're here to listen to your concerns, make improvements and ask for your patience," Wismer said.

Not many people attended, but those who did were given a look into the hospital's new method of billing, following a period of smoothing out software glitches to develop a workable system.

Two statements will be issued to patients — the first is a detailed billing with a summary of charges and informs patients no payment is due while the insurance adjustment is processing.

Separate billings will most likely be received by patients for separate services by specialists, such as anesthesia.

"When you get a bill from us, you think that is the only bill you're going to get, but that isn't true," Wismer said.

On the back of the detailed

statements are frequently asked questions and a box to correct any inaccurate information or add insurance companies.

After the hospital sends the detailed statements out, insurance companies should then send out how much of the hospital bill was applied and the leftover amount patients will owe.

The hospital then sends a second statement with the total charges of hospital services, the total payments made thus far and the total insurance adjustments with a balance due amount.

The second statement also offers payment solutions, the hospital's payment policy and frequently asked questions are on the back.

"If you have questions, if you're not satisfied, we'd like you to call the hospital and talk to someone about your bill," Wismer said. "We're committed to getting you an answer."

Questions about billing are now answered locally with patient financial advocates at TCHS.

Billing and collection is outsourced by the hospital.

Miss Heartland Allison Tietjen of Chester and the daughter of Cary and Amy Tietjen was crowned Miss Nebraska in North Platte June 10.

The crowning topped several days of successes for Tietjen — she won the Preliminary Evening Wear Award, the Preliminary and Overall Talent Awards, the Overall Interview Award (tie), the Miss Nebraska Community Service Award, the Miss America Community Service Award and third place in the Children's Miracle Maker Award.

She was interviewed the morning of June 9 and felt confident the judges had enjoyed her.

Amy Tietjen said the judges chatted with her and Cary, and said they were hooked on Tietjen the first day they saw her.

"Every time she came out, she wasn't cocky or overconfident.

"She looked at us like, 'Can you believe this?'" Amy Tietjen said after Tietjen was crowned and her parents went backstage.

Tietjen said leading up to the crowning, she was in the top eight and then, top five.

As the runners-up were announced out of the top five, Tietjen said she kept saying to herself, "Please don't call my name."

She and Miss Omaha Wellesley Michael were the final two.

"We just kept telling each other no matter what, Nebraska is going to have a great representative and we were very happy for each other," Tietjen said about that final moment.

She was crowned and took her ceremonial walk, waving to the crowd.

"Everyone was cheering for me. That is what made me cry," she said.

Tietjen said she had about 30 to 40 people in the audience cheering her on, even an aunt and uncle from Phoenix, Ariz. Two of her closest friends from Lincoln came to support her.

"It was a long week and we thought, she is going to be OK if she doesn't get this," Amy said. "We were so excited when she won the evening gown and then talent, we thought, maybe she could do this."

Tietjen's voice was somewhat hoarse Monday because she hasn't slowed down since being crowned.

After the stage curtain closed, she immediately posed for photographs and then attended the after party at the Quality Inn, where she gave several interviews for television.

The night didn't end until 4:30 a.m., but Tietjen was back at it Sunday morning. She had to be measured for her Miss America gown and work out flight times. The Miss America pageant is in Atlantic City, N.J., Sept. 10. Tietjen will also take a trip to New York City to choose a wardrobe and Kansas City to practice with her piano teacher, Bill Wolfe.

1887

130 Years Ago

Our boom fails to materialize, but there is a steady and healthy growth of the town of Hebron.

Wetherald Brothers are buying and shipping in about two carloads of wheat a week for milling purposes.

Football has become one of the pleasant evening pastimes and receives general attention.

Attention is called to the card of N. D. Bristol relative to photographic views. Mr. Bristol has been taking some very fine views and those who desire pictures of their homes to send east should see him.

A young man by the name of Johnson was arrested by Sheriff Green for fast riding inside the corporate limits. Justice Hendershot thought a fine would be a fine thing and finding him guilty ordered him confined until his fine was paid and his conduct became more refined. Upon finding it had to be paid the y.c.m. paid the fine and costs to the amount of \$13.45.

Last Thursday evening the opera house was densely crowded by an appreciative audience to witness the graduating exercises of the Hebron High School of the Class of 1887.

Memorial Day was more generally observed in Hebron this year than ever before, an indication that there was here (as there should be everywhere) a growing instead of decreasing, reverence and gratitude towards the noble defenders of our Republic in its hours of greatest danger.

Prof. W. A. Rowlan will start next Saturday for Cheyenne County, where he will engage in the law and real estate business.

Henry Ebling has returned from a western tour selling the cyclone churn.

Bruning: The city of Bruning is booming. A new blacksmith shop and hardware store are being built; also a new grocery store and post office combined is being erected, and the building now used for a post office will be occupied as a drug store by O. J. Beardslee.

In six weeks about 30 houses have been built in Deshler.

Samuel Howell, a resident of Hebron precinct, is the only soldier of the Mexican war, upon the assessor's returns in the County Clerk's office. He was also in the Civil War.

The County Commissioners incorporated Davenport Tuesday as a village.

F. J. Hendershot was in Belvidere Monday assisting in surveying a new addition to that town.

Failing health resulting from too close application to newspaper work, having convinced the editor of the Journal that some relaxation was necessary, he last Monday, June 6, launched a small stern wheel steamer. So far as we know it is the first steamboat ever put on the Little Blue river, a stream somewhat difficult to navigate, but the beauty and variety of which well compensates for the trouble encountered. The hull of the boat is 23 feet in length and with the wheel is about 30 feet long. The greatest width is 7 feet 8 inches. It has an upper deck and a pilot house. The power is furnished by a two-horse power Acme engine. At 10 o'clock Monday night, the boat was lunched, and at half past one Tuesday morning as the full moon silvered the river, she took her trial trip. The trial trip was not a success, the connecting machinery between the engine and paddle wheel not working well. Changes were made and after several efforts, the boat moved off with 17 people, about 1,000 pounds of coal and 200 pounds of luggage aboard for the Chautauqua picnic.

120 Years Ago

Hubbell Times: Joe Benjamin has just received notice that a patent has been issued to his brother in Jackson, Minnesota, on a nut lock for bolts. It is a very simple and effective affair, and one much needed in railroad and other work, where the ordi-

nary nut is continually jolting loose. Joe has a half interest in this patent and will most likely make good money out of it, as we judge there will be a big demand for a bolt with a nut of this kind.

Belvidere: Meerton McDonald killed a rattlesnake down at the bridge just south of town last Saturday. It had five rattlers and a button. This is the first rattlesnake that has been killed in these parts for a number of years... The incorporation business was knocked higher than Gillroy's kite last night. There were about twenty-five men present, and out of that number, nine-tenths were opposed to incorporation. G. R. Dill was elected chairman and J. W. Crawford, secretary. The people who were in favor of incorporation were everywhere but being present at this meeting.

Grover Newman came home from Kansas City where he graduated from the dental college. He is now working with Dr. Hensel at Deshler.

The barn of Albert Hellmer who resides about three miles northeast of Byron, was struck by lightning yesterday morning and burned to the ground, with seven head of horses, all of the harness, a large lot of farm machinery, and five or six tons of hay. The total loss amounted to about \$2,500, with insurance of \$800.

Louis Schieferdecker went to Lincoln Friday where he will attend University during the summer and return


to Chester as Principal and athletic coach this coming school year.

1937

80 Years Ago

Seventy years ago, on June 7, 1867, Thomas Haney was killed by Indians, a short distance southeast of the Fulton bridge. Journal readers will recall that several years ago a surviving son came to Hebron and, with local help, located the remains of the pioneer, moving same to Sunny Slope, Hebron cemetery at the north edge of town. A granite marker bears this inscription: Thomas Haney, Killed by Indians, June 7, 1867. On Tuesday of this week, relatives from Kearney stopped here to inspect the grave, viz: Mrs. Alice Haney, widow of James Haney, who was one of the sons of Thomas Haney; also Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Staley, the latter being a granddaughter, and their son, Robert Staley, a great-grandson of the martyr pioneer. The above parties are en route on a trip to Oklahoma, Texas and Utah. They called at the Journal office and secured help in locating the Haney grave. Mrs. Alice Haney makes some corrections in the historical records of the early day tragedy. Instead of being shot with his own gun, which the Indians were alleged to have seized, as it stood behind his door, Mrs. Haney claims that the Indians shot an arrow into the back of his head, in the presence of his three daughters. A Redskin seized a seven-year-old daughter, who bit his hand, and managed to escape with her two sisters into the timber. The Indians scattered the feathers from the pillows and mattresses and filled the ticks with the clothing and home-spun bedding which had been made by the girls and their deceased mother in their eastern home. Stamping Haney's dapple grey team, which they drove ahead of them, the Indians rode away--their loaded bulky ticks resembling a mover's wagon. The Haney girls then dragged their father to the river's edge and bathed his wounds. He soon expired, and they found refuge at a settler's place about three miles away. The river reached flood stage and the girls were compelled to travel about 10 miles to find a crossing. The next night they returned and rescued the body of their father which had been surrounded by water and would have soon floated away. Meanwhile, their three brothers returned from three miles down the river. The youngest son had been cook for the elder brothers who were putting in a field of corn with spades and shovel. The six bereaved children drove a team consisting of a crippled mule and a heifer and managed to reach Beatrice where the land office was located. Later, they located in Saline county and put in a crop. The three sons and three daughters are now dead. The closest surviving relative is the elderly daughter-in-law of Thomas Haney, Mrs. Alice Haney, who deploras the injustice of official red-tape in Washington. Many years ago the government awarded damages for loss of their father and his homestead claim--but the money was never paid. Whether the files

Protecting yourself against tick bites



As cold days turn warm and sunny, many Nebraskans head outside which puts them at greater risk for tick bites. During the warmer months, it is important to know the risks and take preventive steps to prevent Lyme and other tick borne diseases.

Each year, more than 30,000 cases of Lyme disease are reported nationwide, while studies suggest the actual number of people diagnosed with Lyme disease is more likely about 300,000.

Despite these numbers, many people don't seem to know they are at risk. A recent national survey reported that nearly 20 percent of people surveyed in areas where Lyme disease is common were unaware of the risk. Additionally, half of people interviewed in another study reported that they did not routinely take steps to protect themselves against tick bites.

While not all ticks carry the same diseases, ticks can be found in every state. Tick borne diseases are on the rise and prevention should be on everyone's mind, particularly during the spring, summer, and early-fall when ticks are most active.

From May through July, people will get more tick bites and tick borne diseases than any other time of year in the United States. It is important everyone keeps this in mind when outdoors and they take the steps to help protect themselves and their loved ones, including their pets from tick bites.

Tick preventive steps include:

- Use a repellent with at least 20 percent DEET, picaridin or IR3535 or permethrin-treated clothing.
- Dress in long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks when you're outside.

- Do frequent tick checks after being outdoors and remove attached ticks promptly with fine-tipped tweezers.

- Shower as soon as possible after being outdoors.

Ticks are generally found near the ground, in brushy or wooded areas. They can't jump or fly. Instead, they climb tall grasses or shrubs and wait for you to brush against them. When this happens, they climb on and seek a site for attachment. Ticks can cause a number of diseases and some can be life-threatening.

What to do if you find an attached tick:

- Remove the attached tick as soon as you notice it by grasping with tweezers, as close to the skin as possible, and pulling it straight out. Early removal can minimize and often eliminate the chance of an infection.

- Watch for signs of illness such as rash or fever in the days and weeks following the bite, and see a health care provider if these develop.

Predicting the number of Lyme disease or other tick borne infections, and how an upcoming season will compare to previous years, is complicated. There are many factors that can affect their numbers, including temperature, weather and the availability of hosts for ticks to feed on.

Thayer County Health Services wants you and your family to stay safe this summer. Often the best approach is just being aware of the risk and making sure you take the steps necessary to reduce your risk.

Pony Express trots through 157th year, locals ride

Although the 157th, 1,966-mile commemorative Re-Ride began June 5 at the former headquarters for the pony express in St. Joseph, Mo., and is now bound for Sacramento, Calif., the Nebraska Division of the National Pony Express Association began its ride March 1 at the State Capitol in Lincoln.

Twenty-four Pony Express riders, including Trail Captains Richard and Alice Heinrichs, Wade Heinrichs, Todd Heinrichs and Nebraska President Lyle Gronewald of Gothenburg, celebrated Nebraska's 150th year of statehood by delivering a copy of the statehood's original proclamation to Gov. Pete Ricketts and First Lady Susanne Shore.

Also presented was a

framed 2017 Commemorative Pony Express Re-Ride letter to the People of Nebraska.

Over 1,000 of the letters were sold and were on their way through eight states to Old Sacramento Calif. They were scheduled to reach their destination June 15.

The 24 riders of the Nebraska Division took a trip around the State Capitol on horseback, despite March's cold wind.

"How many times do you get to ride a horse around the Capitol?" Alice Heinrichs said about the event.

The longest equestrian event by distance, the pony express, takes 10 days, 24 hours per day with over 700 riders who have taken the Pony Express oath and received a Bible in step with


tradition.

In Nebraska, the ride began near Steele City June 6. The pony continued through Rock Creek and Alexandria, and at the Pony Express monument next to Highway 81 June 6, the local pony express riders gathered, along with Gronewald and National Pony Express President Dean Atkin from Tootie, Utah, who said he had been following since the Patee House in St. Joe.

By June 8 at 3:15 p.m. (MDT), the pony was passing Chimmney Rock National Monument and reached Lingle, Wyo., at 10:57 p.m. (MDT).
