Deshler to hold library dedication

The new Jennifer Reinke Public Library will be dedicated June 17 at 3 p.m.

The library will also hold open houses from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., on June 18 and on June 19, from 1 to 5 p.m.

The event was made possible by a \$750,000 challenge grant from Reinke, the 1967 National Spelling Champion. Her gift through the Nebraska Community Foundation, a Nebraska Economic Development grant and generous gifts from the Deshler community made it possible to build the library.

The new library features a children's reading area, genealogy area, casual reading corner and community meeting room.

The dedication will coincide with Deshler Days annual celebration. Residents and visitors will enjoy the high school alumni banquet, children's fishing contest, chicken barbecue, cardboard boat competition, a 5K/10K race, model train open house, petting zoo, chess tournament and a Father's Day dinner.

Fire department street dance July 3

Hebron Volunteer Fire Department will hold its annual street dance with the Caleb Bradley Band July 3 from 8 p.m. to 12 a.m.

The street dance and beer garden kicks off Hebron's Fourth of July activities.

Proceeds are used to purchase new equipment for the department, and this year, air packs are needed.

Algae alert issued for Swan Lake

The state has issued a health alert for toxic blue-green algae at Swan Creek Lake, also known as Willard Meyer Recreational Area in Saline County.

An alert continues to be in effect at Pawnee Lake in Lancaster County.

Samples taken earlier this week at Swan Creek Lake were above the state's health alert threshold of 20 parts per billion of total microcystin, a toxin released by certain strains of blue-green algae.

Although readings at Pawnee Lake were low this week, the alert continues to be in effect, because lakes that are on health alert must have two consecutive weeks of readings below the threshold before the alert is discontinued.

Recreational boating and fishing are permitted, but the public is advised to avoid activities that could involve accidental ingestion of water and to avoid full immersion in water.

People can still use the public areas for camping, picnics and other outdoor activities.

Survivors commemorate another year

More than \$30,000 was raised at this year's Thayer County Relay For Life Golf tournament and cancer survivor's celebration event at the Hebron Country Club June 10.

In her 10th year of helping to organize the annual gathering for survivors, caregivers, family and friends, Virginia Brase looks back even further as a survivor of the dreaded disease that kills over 1,500 people per day.

Fourteen years ago, Brase attended her first Relay ceremony.

"I just believe in Relay For Life and finding a cure," Brase said. "Cancer has affected my family many times. I've lost many friends to cancer."

Brase soldiered on and four years later, discovered she had her own battle to fight against ovarian cancer.

She is a 10-year survivor.

"Each year is a miracle and a gift from God. I just feel very blessed to still be fighting because so many people aren't," Brase said.

At the country club following the national anthem sung by Maggie Harris, Brase stood with the Relay For Life Event Leadership and proudly announced the names, including her co-chair, Sheena Moeller:

Andi Domeier, Molly Trausch, Kris Miesner, Naomi Grupe, Becky Cahill, Connie Eitzmann and Jamie Koch.

The event also had DJ Dustin Dana providing music, Pastor Mark Baldwin for the opening prayer and Dave Rinehart as the emcee. All volunteered.



Thayer County's 14th Relay For Life and Golf Tournament were held at Hebron Country Club June 10. The Survivor and Caregivers' Lap was led by Lyle Johnson, Sandy Mertens, Jennifer Reinke, Cassie Wilbek and Linda Johnson.

Among the survivors, purple was the dominate color in honor of the theme this year, "Paint Your World Purple."

Eight teams were recognized - The Believers from Bruning; Double D's, Deshler; Hope Rockers, Deshler; God Squad, Bryon; Happy Feet, Davenport; TCHS Warriors, Hebron; Cancer Kickers, Davenport; and Cargill, Hebron. The Hope Rockers won the frozen T-shirt contest.

Prior to the opening ceremonies, Thayer County Health Services donated hamburger and hot dog meals.

The Hebron Rotary Club grilled about 250 hamburgers and 100 hot dogs and then served the meal.

It was the first year Relay For Life took to putting its way to a cure on the golf course. Brase thanked everyone for playing.

"We had a good response," she said.

The championship flight went to Nate Casey, Thad Mumm, Andrew Wiedel and Brain Wiedel.

Bob and Beth Zeleny and Curt and Kelly Mumm picked up the first flight and Jay Moeller, Tegan Moeller, Eric

Moeller and Jeff Utecht were in the second flight.

As an additional fundraiser, Relay For Life moved a pink potty to "Flush Out Cancer" around Hebron, as residents paid to have the potty removed from their yards.

Over a three-day period, the potty was moved through 12 yards, earning \$400.

Brase said the proceeds from this year's event will contribute to education, prevention and ground-breaking cancer research in the quest to find a cure.

Officials look to flood study

Finding the cause and reducing the severity of flooding in Deshler is at the top of the list for local officials.

Thayer County Emergency Manager Bill McPherson said the Deshler City Council and Thayer County are working together to resolve the flooding that has rushed through Deshler and caused nursing home and assisted living residents to seek shelter at Deshler High School for two years in a row.

McPherson said JEO Consulting will assist in writing a grant for a study that will cost government entities \$49,650.

The grant would kick in Federal Emergency Management Agency Flood Mitigation Assistance in the amount of \$25,000, with \$12,150 coming from hazard mitigation funds and \$12,500 from the Deshler.

The City of Deshler will contribute \$8,333 and to make up the difference, \$4,167 will come from the county and Little Blue Natural Resource District.

Chester Fire raises new barn

In early July, the Chester Volunteer Fire Department will take over its new 40 by 40-square foot ambulance barn to continue serving its three rural districts in Nebraska and Kansas.

Secretary-Treasurer Ray Wit said newer fire trucks are larger than their predecessors and more space was needed.

"The fire hall is full," he said.

Davenport foundation eager to start phase two of improvements

After more than a year of working on a \$50,000 grant from the United States Department of Agriculture, President Jerry Brase of the Davenport Community Foundation sees the fruit.

The grant was awarded in May and will go toward the foundation's second phase of raising a new medical clinic in a 30 by 48-square foot Morton building.

"Our foundation is extremely appreciative of being awarded this \$50,000 grant for the clinic and are excited to begin construction on this project," Brase said in a USDA news release. "The present building has been a vital part of Davenport for 40 years."

Rural Development Community Program Specialist for USDA, Janice Stopak, said it is rewarding to help rural communities with healthcare needs.

"Funds will assist in the construction of a new clinic in downtown Davenport that will be leased to Thayer County Hospital," Stopak said.

Brase said the community has also been generous in supporting the new facility.

"We received lots of personal donations and the USDA grant. It will help put us where we can go ahead and get started," foundation board member, Loma Grone, said.

The foundation itself has kicked in \$152,200, a \$25,000 donation came from Cornerstone Bank, along with the donations from the community.

"That's a lot of money for this small community," Grone said.

A ground-breaking has been planned for the new clinic June 20 at 9 a.m. in Davenport.

Brase said the clinic will feature four exam rooms, an office and reception area, and a U-shaped drive for access to the front enclosure.

Parking will be off street and on the north side of the building.

The present clinic building, which is right next door, will be gutted and converted into a wellness center, the foundation's third phase. The first was the playground, dedicated in June of 2015.

Brase said the Village of Daven-

port contributed to the playground project.

The wellness center became a reality as the foundation held a town meeting in March of 2014. Upgrades were needed on the present clinic.

"We determined that this (the center) is what the community wanted," Grone said.

The grant was funded through the USDA Rural Development Community Facility Direct Loan and Grant Program. Funding was also utilized from the USDA Rural Development Economic Impact Initiative Grant program.

The programs can be found at usda.gov.

The USDA stated under President Barack Obama's leadership, investments have been made in rural America's housing, community facilities, businesses and infrastructure, which has empowered rural areas to strengthen the economies of small towns and rural communities, and the economy at large.

The investments in rural areas support the rural way of life that stands as the backbone of American values, stated the USDA.

Carleton: Leslie Smith and Elmer Thompson were of the same mind last Sunday, June 7, and at the same time and place were married respectively to Grace and Edith Bradley, daughters of W. F. Bradley, at the home of the brides.

Chester: Grace M. Garvin and M. L. Lasby were united in marriage by Dr. F. S. Stein, of Lincoln, on June 13. Mr. Cleaveland and his sister, Mrs. Mary Thompson, started Wednesday morning for an extended visit to a brother residing in Bozeman, Mont. This will be their first meeting in over 30 years. J. M. Howard and Arthur Lasby came in Friday from Colo. The former has been working the past six months in Cripple Creek and Colorado Springs. Mr. Lasby has been living near Falcon, Colo., for the last three years, but intends remaining in this vicinity, where he is one of the heirs to an estate soon to be divided.

The mistake of an undertaker at Red Lodge, Mont., in mixing the shipping tags on the coffins of the deceased miners who had died the death of heroes in trying to rescue their comrades, caused an unfortunate mix-up in sending the corpses to the wrong destinations. Joe Bracy resided in this county, northwest of Belvidere, about five years ago, but moved with his family to Red. Lodge, Mont., where he had employment as a miner. During the recent mine disaster, Mr. Bracy with other went to the relief of their dead comrades, and was himself overcome with the fire damp. The funeral was to have been held at Belvidere on the arrival of the train Tuesday, but on opening the coffin the corpse was discovered to be that of another man, although it was labeled Joe Bracy. Friends immediately telegraphed to the Union Depot at St. Joe and intercepted the other corpse, supposed to have been Roy Carey of Bloomfield, Iowa, who was being accompanied home for burial by John Andrews. Mr. Andrews at once came to Belvidere on the Grand Island with Mr. Bracy's funeral was held at the Christian Church at Belvidere, Wednesday morning. Mrs. Bracy, who was formerly Miss Arnold, will remain with her two children in Belvidere. Another baby who died about a month ago, was also brought back here for burial.

Men's Health Month

June is National Men's Health Month. This is a time to raise awareness about preventable health problems facing men. Health professionals know that early detection and treatment is critical when dealing with any preventable health issue. The challenge with most men is getting them to see a doctor at all, let alone on a regular basis.

Overall, men tend to be less healthy and die younger than women. The "Wear BLUE" campaign was created by Men's Health Network to raise awareness and to encourage men to take better care of themselves. Whether it is your friend, brother, dad, boyfriend, spouse, or boss; show them you care about them and their health by wearing blue on June 17.

All ten of the leading causes of death as defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) affect men at a higher rate than they affect women. The National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) reviewed the leading causes of death among men and found the majority of causes had links to preventable, lifestyle-related behaviors such as poor nutrition and smoking.

According to the CDC, women are 100 percent more likely to schedule an appointment for their annual examinations and preventive services than men. Men need to be encouraged to have the preventive test necessary to help find diseases early; when they're easiest to treat. Men should talk to their healthcare provider about which preventive medical tests they should have.

The following are a few steps men can do to help prevent disease and stay healthy:

- Body Mass Index - or BMI, is a measure of your body fat based on your height and weight. Your doctor can help you determine your BMI or there are many charts available.

- Cholesterol - Men over 35 (or earlier if at risk or with a BMI of 30 or over), should have their cholesterol checked regularly. High cholesterol is a key risk factor for heart

disease.

- Blood Pressure - Men should have their blood pressure checked every two years. High blood pressure increases the chance of getting heart or kidney disease and for having a stroke.

- Cardiovascular Disease - At age 45 and through age 79, men should talk with their doctor about if an aspirin a day could help lower their risk for heart attack.

- Colorectal Cancer - Beginning at age 50 (earlier with family history) and through 75, men should get tested for colorectal cancer. Talk to your doctor to decide which test is best.

- Other Cancers - Men should discuss with their healthcare provider about if they should be tested for prostate, lung, oral, skin, or other cancers.

- Depression - Men, who have feelings of hopelessness or little or no interest in doing things they enjoy, should talk to their doctor. Depression is a treatable illness.

- Diabetes - Men with a blood pressure higher than 135/80, should ask their doctor to test them for diabetes. Diabetes, or high blood sugar, can cause problems with your heart, eyes, feet, kidneys, nerves, and other body parts.

- Tobacco Use - Men who smoke or use tobacco, should talk to their doctor about quitting. There are also test smokers can have done to help diagnose lung cancer.

Recognizing and preventing men's health problems is not just a man's issue. It also affects the women in their lives. It's a known fact that women have a strong influence on their family's health and lifestyle choices. To schedule an appointment to discuss what preventive tests are right for yourself or the man in your life, call your healthcare provider.

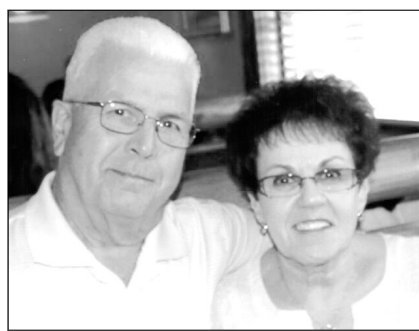

BVCA partnership building campaign nears 75 percent

The effort to privately fund the rebuilding of BVCA's York Family and Community Service Center, which was destroyed by fire in 2015, is nearing the final stages. More than 75 percent of the \$880,000 project has already been obtained from private donors, foundations, church groups and area businesses with the last 25 percent amount still being sought.

The Peter Kiewit Foundation grant, one of several contributing thus far, was a challenge grant to reach the full goal by a September 30 deadline. BVCA is making a last ditch effort to reach that goal by the end of the summer. All friends of the organization are encouraged to pitch-in where they can.

The center, once rebuilt, will offer the food pantry, all BVCA services from homeless assistance, housing loan assistance, home rehabilitation, food for the elderly, weatherization of homes, down payment assistance, Individual Development Accounts, scholarship applications, Zero to Five Head Start referrals, referrals to the Women, Infant and Children Health Services (WIC), minority health services, volunteer services and Foster Grandparent enrollments, youth services and opportunities, and of course the thrift store to name a few of the

many programs to be offered from the new center.

The Donor Honor Roll will be placed near the entrance to the new center when completed. It will offer several categories for various donors (\$1,000 to \$5000; \$5,000 to \$10,000; \$10,000 to \$25,000; those of \$25,000 or more; and Sustaining Builders for those donating over \$10,000 each year).

"York has already been very generous," said Richard Nation, the Chief Executive at BVCA, who went on to say, "and we still have other foundations to contact, but we are also hoping the whole community gets involved to help us reach that goal. So far it has been all done privately with no government assistance, which we would like to show can be done without taxpayer assistance."

Lisa Epp the local Family and Community Service Partner, who manages the York site, also commented that "support has come from other areas as well as York," noting that some bargain hunters also shopped at the former York thrift store site.

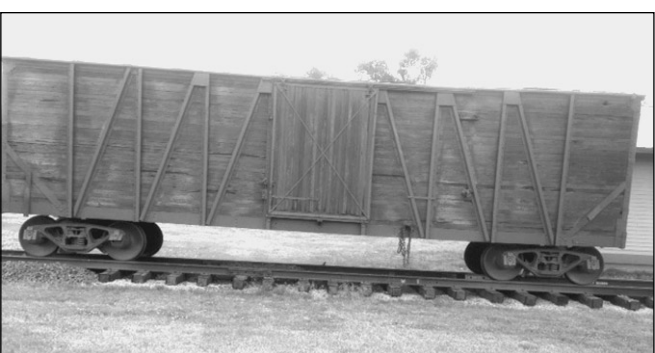

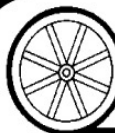

Scouts tests skills at day camp

Little Blue NRD receives grant from NE Environmental Trust

The Little Blue Natural Resources District will receive \$208,865 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust to help integrate restored wetlands into irrigated agriculture operations. Restored wetlands can provide farm income through grazing and haying, while also providing wildlife habitat.

The "Puddles under the Pivots" grant will complement major funding provided by a Wetlands Reserve Easement Partnership grant from the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

Eligible landowners will enroll lands in a Wetlands Reserve Easement option under the Agriculture Conservation Easement Program. As part of this program, the landowner retains the right to pass a center pivot over the restored wetland.

Fencing and livestock watering equipment, funded by the grant, will allow for grazing in the wetland.

Three of Nebraska's largest pivot manufacturers, Lindsay Corporation, Reinke Manufacturing Corporation, and Valley Irrigation, are also participating in the project through cost-share assistance for center-pivot modifications and through their publicity.

This is the first year of a grant that has potential for second year funding of \$208,865 and third-year funding of \$208,870.

The Little Blue NRD is a core member of the Rainwater Basin Joint Venture, a public-private partnership working to improve and protect wetlands in the Rainwater Basin and habitat in Nebraska's mixed-grass prairies.

The Nebraska Environmental Trust, using revenue from the Nebraska Lottery, has provided more than \$250 million in grants to over 1,900 projects across the state since 1992, and has awarded \$18,799,900 to 118 projects this year.

According to a United States Department of Agriculture news release, the Village of Chester is on tap to receive a \$116,000 grant from USDA Rural Development for the ambulance barn and \$2,200 for the village's auditorium sign, which was leveraged with \$12,525 from outside contributions.

"I would like to thank all the people involved in making these projects possible. It was

a long process made easier by the people at the USDA and other government groups," Joe Carbonneau, chairperson of the village board.

The ambulance barn will feature one overhead door and may feature a second door in the future. A meeting room will also be added.

"The large overhead door will make easy access to park the ambulance and space to store equipment, USDA Rural Development Community Program Specialist, Luann Brown. "The barn will strengthen the response

to emergency situations with the easy access in and out of the barn."

On the electric sign, USDA said Chester residents and visitors to the village will be informed of upcoming events.

"Chester is a very supportive community and the leveraged funds for this project speaks well to that," USDA Specialist Mary Sneckenberg said.

Chester Fire has 21 fire fighters and two emergency medical services technicians on staff. Two more EMS technicians volunteer for the department.
