The Hebron Senior Legion Baseball Team hosted a wood bat tournament June 15-16 raising money for Relay for Life. Local businesses could sponsor a bat with the proceeds going to the cancer event scheduled for the end of July. "Each player signed his name to the bat they used," said tourney co-organizer, Loren Goedecken, "and the sponsor of the bat got to keep it after the tournament."

Even though rain threatened, the tournament played out as planned Saturday and Sunday. Five teams participated including the Hebron American Legion team. The team is coached by Don Wegener and Brandon Fangmeyer with assistants Sam Wiedel and Nick Burkhardt. This was the team's first time participating in a wood bat tournament. The team is made up of athletes 19 and under.

"These guys on the team have never even held a wooden bat, let alone played a game with one," said Goedecken.

Because wood bats generally don't hit as far as metal bats, most hits were only single or double hits.

Whether you are a regular antique collector or just enjoy browsing through an antique store every now and then, you don't have to travel far to do either.

Thayer County has its own unique stores just a short drive down the road.

#### Joane's Antiques

Joane's Antiques is located on Lincoln Avenue in Hebron. Joane Thompson is the owner of the store and has many years of experience.

"I've been in the business for thirty years," she said. "I started out doing antique shows."

When she was tired of traveling, she decided to look into vacant buildings to continue her antique business. Lincoln Avenue is where she found a building with the history she wanted. Since January of 2011, she has been running her antique store there.

The short distance from Highway 81 is what appealed to her most about starting her business here.

Her store offers a variety of different antiques including furniture and decoration items. The decoration items also include many pieces of original art. The prices of her items

start at 50 cents.

"I have many people come in and say they are so happy because they can afford stuff in my store," she said.

#### Old Tavern Antique Company

In Bruning, the Old Tavern Antique Company can be found on Main Street. The reasons that the owners, Nancy Baden and Jay and Barbara Schoenholz, decided to open an antique store were numerous. But the biggest reason came down to the fact that the historic bar in Bruning was being sold and they wanted to save it.

"I remember thinking this is one of the last bits of history our town has," Barbara said.

Once the building was purchased, the antiques began to fill it and the doors opened in 2008.

Since then, the number of antiques available to buy has grown to around 15,000 items. Most of the antiques date back to 100 years old, but there is a "retro section" with items from the 1950s.

Both Barbara and Nancy, agree that their favorite part of the business is meeting people that come into their store. But if you can't make it to Bruning, some items are shown online and can be purchased and

Songwriters contest.

The congregation of St. Peter Lutheran Church of Deshler is observing the 75th anniversary of its founding.



- **Take vacations.** Not only are vacations fun – they're good for your health. Failure to use accrued vacation time has been associated with early death. One study looked at 12,000 men over nine years and found that those who failed to take annual vacations had a 21 percent higher risk of death and they were 32 percent more likely to die of a heart attack.

- **Express your creativity.** Creative expression is not just a "hobby." Expressing yourself creatively is a key tool for preventative health – or treatment of existing disease. Health benefits of creative expression include improved sleep, better overall health, fewer doctors' visits, diminished use of medication, and fewer vision problems.

Community. Individuals who attend religious services live up to 14 years longer than those who don't. One study found that religious involvement lead to lower rates of circulatory diseases, digestive diseases, respiratory diseases, and just about every other disease studied. This is only the case if going to church, temple or the mosque relaxes your nervous system; if it stresses you out, you're better off staying home.

- **Be optimistic.** Seeing the glass half full doesn't just make you more pleasant to be around, it also makes you healthier. Optimists fare better when suffering from cancer, recover better from coronary bypass surgery, enjoy healthier immune systems, and live longer than pessimists. People with a positive outlook are 45 percent less likely to die from elements than negative thinkers.

- **Get happy.** Happy people live up to ten years longer than those unhappy, depressed, or anxious. Depression increases your cancer risk, is a major risk factor for heart disease, and is linked to a variety of pain disorders.

- **Meditate.** Toxic relationships, work stress, pessimism, loneliness, and depression all trigger the stress response and turns off the body's natural self-healing mechanisms. Meditation can reverse this process and can be instrumental in the treatment of conditions such as cardiac arrhythmias, asthma, allergies, diabetes, ulcers, hypertension, infertility, PMS, AIDS, and chronic pain.

Warm Weather Attire for the Groom & Attendants

Weddings are a time to get dolled up. Though some gentlemen may be tempted to wear the suit they wear to work, a formal event necessitates something a bit more remarkable. When the weather is warm, some men may scoff at the idea of wearing a full suit or even a tuxedo. But just because a person is wearing pants and a jacket doesn't mean the suit must be dark and heavy.

Although dark colors are traditional for weddings, dark, heavy fabrics will absorb the sun's rays, making the groom and his groomsmen uncomfortable. Even when a warm-weather wedding takes place largely indoors where it is climate controlled, many couples choose to have the ceremony outdoors, where they pose for photographs as well. The groom and his groomsmen will want to be comfortable during these times, and the right suit and fabric can make all the difference.

Linen and cotton are all-natural fabrics that are made from plant fibers. They are much lighter weight than wool, and linen and cotton suits may be more comfortable. But linen and cotton are highly prone to wrinkling, and a wrinkled suit will not present well in a formal setting. Cotton and linen may be best reserved for informal weddings or those that will be taking place outdoors or beachside. Seersucker suits are made from cotton in a unique weaving pattern that lets air ventilate through the material. Seersucker suits may be most popular in the southeastern United States, but they can be worn anywhere the weather is warm. Many of these suits are manufactured in a gray, blue and brown striped pattern. Again, due to the lightweight fabric, you will feel cool. For less formal weddings, a seersucker suit may fit.

A khaki suit or a tan one may work better if the wedding is more formal. Ensure the accessories are in place to make this look work. The suit should fit well and be tailored appropriately. Sharp creases in the pants and a crisp shirt and tie can complete the look. If the groomsmen are in coordinating suits, a tan or khaki color will not look out of place. If a full suit still feels too stiff, a nice blazer paired with a complementary colored trouser may be appropriate for a less formal affair.

Some grooms want to err on the side of caution and stick with a classic suit or tuxedo. In such instances, grooms may want to investigate lighter weight wools. Such suits won't be as confining as a heavier suit. Grooms wearing a tuxedo may want to choose a white tuxedo. A white tuxedo will look pristine and fit with a formal theme. And the white will reflect the sun and be cooler without looking casual.

A groom who does not mind a midday wardrobe change can opt to wear a standard suit or tuxedo and plan to change later on for the reception. He can coordinate with his new bride and step into something more comfortable for dancing and enjoying the ensuing party. This allows for formality when the moments call for it and comfort later on in the day.

Dressing for a warm weather wedding may require a bit of ingenuity on the part of the groom. There are different fabrics and styles of suit available to present plenty of wardrobe options.

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

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

The source of water used by the City of Hebron is groundwater.

### Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

\* Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

\* Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

\* Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

\* Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

\* Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

### Drinking Water Health

### Notes:

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. ## Local Teacher Peterson Attends UNL Summer Institute

Bruning-Davenport High School's Aaron Peterson recently spent two weeks supplementing his teaching skills at a summer institute offered through the National Center for Research on Rural Education (R\_Ed) at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

From June 3-13, Peterson learned the principles and strategies of guided scientific inquiry, a classroom approach designed to help students master the methods that scientists use to study the natural world.

After witnessing veteran science teachers model effective inquiry practices, Peterson developed and presented lesson plans that he will implement during the upcoming school year. Participating teachers will also receive follow-up coaching via distance technology to support their implementation of inquiry

strategies in the classroom.

Peterson joined 34 fellow science teachers from rural Nebraska and Iowa communities in attending the institute, which is part of an ongoing R\_Ed research project titled CSI: Coaching Science Inquiry in Rural Schools.

The project aims to gauge the impact of coaching on teachers' inquiry knowledge, skills and practice. It will also assess how the resulting classroom lessons influence students' knowledge of scientific concepts and inquiry principles.

## WIC Has New Income Guidelines

Effective May 20, 2013, the income guidelines to qualify for the WIC program have expanded allowing more families eligibility to be on the program. What is WIC? WIC is a federally funded program that provides women, infants and children healthy food at no cost, as well as breastfeeding and nutrition information to help keep pregnant women, infants and children under five healthy and strong.

In October of 2009, the Nebraska Women, Infants, and Children Nutrition Program (WIC) expanded its food packages to include more healthful foods. The revised food packages boost WIC's effort to promote optimal nutrition and breastfeeding, and better accommodate participants with cultural preferences.

WIC food checks include fresh fruit and vegetable vouchers, 100 percent whole grain bread, brown rice or tortillas, dried or canned beans, milk and dairy alternative soy products, tuna and salmon, cereal, 100 percent fruit juice, cheese, peanut butter, eggs, baby food fruits and vegetables, iron fortified baby cereal and infant formula.

Breast milk is best for baby. Breastfeeding women who exclusively breastfeed and do not supplement with formula will receive enhanced food packages and more food for their infants over six months of age.

You are eligible for WIC if you live in Nebraska, are pregnant, and recently had a

baby or you are a breastfeeding woman, or you have an infant or a child less than five years of age. Fathers, guardians or foster parents may apply for WIC for their children. You may qualify if your gross household income is less than or equal to the income guidelines listed. You automatically qualify for WIC if you currently receive ADC, SNAP (Food Stamps), Kids Connection or Medicaid.

Total income guidelines include: one person \$21,257 annual, \$1,772 monthly, and \$409 weekly; two persons, \$28,694 annual; \$2,392 monthly and \$522 weekly; three persons, \$36,131 annual; \$3,011 monthly and \$695 weekly; four persons, \$43,568 annual, \$3,631 monthly, and \$838 weekly; five persons, \$51,005 annual, \$4,251 monthly, and \$981 weekly; six persons, \$58,442 annual, \$4,871 monthly, and \$1,124 weekly; seven persons, \$65,879 annual, \$5,490 monthly, and \$1,267 weekly; and eight persons, \$73,316 annual \$6,110 monthly, and \$1,410 weekly; each additional family member add \$7,437 annual, \$620 monthly and \$144 weekly.

I'm hearing conversations about high school graduates now visiting their schools of higher education. They are excited to see the new dorm room and meet the new roommate. They are ready to start that next stage in life.

I believe it is good to have our young people gain new experiences through higher education, the military or workforce. But as we wave goodbye in mid-August, do we have a picture in our heads that these talented young people, full of life and optimism, will build their futures in a big city far from the rural communities and the farmland of south central Nebraska?

Are we telling these young adults that we would like them to return to our area after they receive that two or four year degree, or their stint in the military? Are we sharing that we would like to have them move back home to live and work?

I recently read an article in the "Center for Rural Entrepreneurship" newsletter, that in Brookfield, Mo., when high school graduates are handed their graduation certificate—they are also given a mailbox. For the past six years, Brookfield leaders have made a name for themselves as the com-

munity that gives mailboxes to their high school graduates. This mailbox that includes a simple letter inviting them back home again is making a profound difference.

In the newsletter article, Craig Schroeder tells about a college medical student who wrote a letter back to his community after receiving a mailbox, stating that it had caused him to think about what his hometown had invested in him. He had a desire to return to Brookfield and open his practice. He plans to put his mailbox in front of his house when he returns.

Just picture the image of dozens of these mailboxes popping up all over Brookfield as young adults and families make the journey back home in the coming years.

What are we doing to invite and welcome back young people as they move into our communities? We need to be careful that we don't send a negative message by asking them "What are you doing back here? Couldn't you make it in the 'real world'?"

Let's send a positive message by welcoming young families into our communities and help them get established.

### Mold and Mildew Prevention

With recent heavy rains and some flooding, you will want to watch for molds growing in your home.

In homes that are not air-conditioned, open as many windows when the outside humidity levels are lower than the inside levels. Use fans and dehumidifiers to circulate air. Run bathroom and kitchen vent fans if they are vented to the outside – and not vented into the attic.

If an air conditioner is available, use it to remove moisture. In small rooms and closets, turn on electric lights and leave doors open for ventilation and to assist drying. Let lights stay on as long as dampness or high humidity is present to help dry and prevent mildew growth.

Remember that some molds can begin to grow in about 48 hours. Preventing the start of mold growth is essential and monitoring for possible growth or regrowth over the next months to a year. Dormant spores can start to grow if they have sufficient moisture, usually more than 50 percent to 60 percent relative humidity levels, and a source of food such as organic matter and cellulose (dirt, paper, wood, etc.).

University of Nebraska Extension publications say to be sure to follow recommended procedures for mold prevention and cleanup. All molds should be treated with respect. If you must clean up items with mold yourself, use a quality HEPA filter mask (N - 95 or better), gloves, goggles, and protective clothing. (Particle filters however, do not protect against vapors and endotoxins

given off by some molds.)

Seal off the area from the remainder of the home if possible and close off vents that might circulate the mold spores to other areas of the home. Create a negative pressure in the room so that spores do not spread to other rooms. Open a window and use a fan to exhaust air to the outside through the room window if possible.

Items to be removed and destroyed should be covered or wrapped with heavy plastic and sealed with duct tape or placed in plastic bags and removed through the closest window or entrance to avoid scattering spores. Contact adhesive paper can also be used over an area to help contain the spores.

Use a quality vacuum cleaner with an HEPA filter to draw out more of the mold. Discard vacuum bags immediately and thoroughly clean vacuum after completing the task.

Sponge the area with detergent and water. Rinse well. Wipe with a clean, barely damp cloth. Wipe dry if possible.

If you decide a disinfectant is needed, spray with fungicide or other commercial disinfectant made for the purpose and the material. Remember that fungicides or disinfectants are classified as pesticides when they are used to kill fungus and should be used with care.

Dry the article thoroughly and monitor the item for the next few months for signs of reappearing mold or mildew. Even dead spores and dormant spores can be problems for some people.


