## Mother of 16 draped in honor

The Hergott sisters had a secret, but someone was planning a surprise for them.

"Everyone had secrets going on," Janelle Coady said.

Indeed, mom Patricia Hergott thought she was going to Sacred Heart Church Sunday morning to see six of her sons, Jeff, Brian, Steven, Michael, Herbert, Richard and Robert, receive Quilts of Valor for their service to the U.S. Army.

But that morning, not only did the brothers receive quilts, but also sisters, Barbara, Margaret, Cheryl, Rita, Jan and Janelle. Thirteen of the 16 Paul and Patricia Hergott children received Quilts of Valor, presented by Phyllis Schoenholz, the southeast Nebraska coordinator for the national project, founded in 2003 by Catherine Roberts.

And then, someone else was surprised. Patricia.

She was awarded with a Quilt of Honor, patched with service photographs of each of her children. Paul, who passed in 2006, was on the quilt, too — at the top in his black and white service photo. He served in the Navy during World War II and the seal is in the middle of the quilt.

"My mom was really shocked," Janelle said.

"Although you never served in the military, your love of service and country helped encourage your children to devote a combined 137 years to the United States Army," read the script as Patricia's quilt was given to her. The quilt was described:

"Your 13 children who served in the Army are in order of age with the eldest Barb to the right of Paul and run clockwise to the youngest, Janelle, to the left of Paul."

Patricia had visited her children all over the world from Hawaii to Panama to Germany over the years.

The youngest still doesn't know why they all gravitated toward the army.

"I saw all my siblings join the military for various reasons. I kept telling my mom I didn't want to do that," she said.

The army needed to know by Janelle's junior year if she was going to enlist. She knew she wanted to go to college. Her parents knew that, too.

"I came home one day and a recruiter was there and the paperwork," Janelle said. She signed and then celebrated with an ice cream treat.

"It didn't really sink right away," she said. "The army found a gold mine with this family."

It all comes back to Patricia's instinct.

She encouraged them — set them up for success, Janelle said.

And now, the quilts. "It's a comforting thing to know you're appreciated. It's like a purple heart from the community."

And her family. Each one of the quilts has the handiwork of a family member in the piecing or colors or another component, adding even more comfort.

All 16 of Patricia's children were there Sunday. They traveled from North Carolina, Colorado

and Papillion and Lincoln.

Janelle said it's been close to a decade since they've all been together.

The patchwork didn't stop with the 13 Hergott children. It stretched to the Doug Hergott Memorial Scholarship Golf Tournament at the Hebron Country Club June 16. There, Paul's brother, Joe Hergott, was awarded a quilt.

Hergott enlisted in the U.S. Air Force Feb. 29, 1952. He trained to be an aircraft mechanic in Amarillo, Texas. After training, he was assigned to the 3520th Flight Squadron in McConnell, Kan. He served for four years and honorably discharged in February of 1956.

Quilts of Valor was developed from a dream Roberts had about a soldier in despair while her own son was serving in Iraq. She saw the soldier wrapped in a quilt and to date, almost 190,000 quilts have been draped across the shoulders of veterans.

Patricia's children who received quilts are:

Barbara Arner — enlisted shortly after her high school graduation in 1969. She completed her basic training at Fort McClellan, Ala., and AIT at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. Barb served as a medical aid at Fort Belvoir, Va., and was honorably discharged in July of 1972.

Robert Hergott — enlisted in June of 1972. After basic training, Robert went to school to become a mechanic at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. He served in Germany and was honorably discharged in June of 1975.

Richard Hergott — enlisted in

## Funds available through Alliance

Two funds managed by Thayer County Economic Development Alliance are designed to help new homeowners and entrepreneurs.

The alliance works with the Southeast Nebraska Development District on the Nebraska Affordable Housing Program and currently has \$42,000 available for assistance.

"If you know someone looking to buy a home, it doesn't hurt to try a short application," alliance executive director, Diane Wettstein said.

Wettstein said she can usually determine eligibility almost immediately after applications are completed.

The alliance has assisted new homeowners with downpayment assistance through 33 families, 22 of which are still active. Applicants can qualify homes up to \$135,000. The scale of qualifying incomes ranges from \$43,875 for one person to \$82,687 for eight people.

The second program is a revolving loan program through the United States Department of Agriculture that was capped at \$90,000. The alliance has approximately \$67,000 left to use. Funds may be used to assist new businesses in Thayer County, or existing businesses.

The funds must be used by September of 2019 or the county will lose them.

"If we lose it, we're not eligible for more because we didn't use ours," Wettstein said.

When Wettstein looked into how to use the funds, USDA advised the alliance disperse them in smaller amounts to several qualified applicants, which is common for less populated counties.

Both programs are determined by TCEDA committees — one for homeownership opportunities and the other for revolving loans. The committees make recommendations to the board.

"It's a good program. The word is not out on it, but all individuals and businesses who benefit must be in Thayer County," Wettstein said about the USDA program.

While Wettstein makes her rounds to village board and city council meetings, she also reaches out to the public to help keep her informed.

"The biggest thing is to refine communication among communities and work together to draw people," she said. "That way, we're bound for more success. To take that a step further, is to have more housing and the child care we need."

Child care centers are always an important issue, she added. Wettstein attended a workshop in Kearney and spoke with Brice Jorgenson of Shickley about its facility for early childhood development and preschool children.

She encourages support of TCEDA and its programs in the way of leadership and communication with adults and youth.

Wettstein is also on a manufacturing committee that involves Southeast Community College, and manufacturing employers. It is estimated the 10 manufacturing employers will need at least 93 entry-level technicians in the next two years. The employers have identified common competency skills that if met, would guarantee an interview with participating employers. The group is working with SCC on a curriculum that would most likely place students in manufacturing positions. MetalQuest Vice President Scott Volk is the representative for Thayer County.

"Working with that committee has been really good," Wettstein said.

Memorial Services: Morton Post, No. 127, G.A.R., Uniform Rank of K.P., and a vast throng of the citizens of Hebron and vicinity, assembled to pay fitting tribute to the memory of those valiant patriots who sacrificed the richest gifts known to men on the shrine of liberty, home, loved ones, and all the endearments and ties which so sacredly bind men to earth--to suffer hunger, to endure toil and pain, to languish in prisons, the horrors of which no tongue, however eloquent, or no pen however powerful has or ever can faithfully portray, and lastly, to lay down life itself that the Union might be preserved. The following are the names of the soldiers whose graves were decorated: J. B. Smith, E. Raymond, Andy Lawson, R. C. Johnson, Fergus Cannon, J. Orr, Reuben Palmer, Samuel Johnson, James Bishop, Samuel Danner, J. D. Austin, J. G. Rice, J. Lex Peltier (Confederate).

The knot was tied good and strong, and the happy couple went away feeling jubilant and gay...Henry Finke, from near Staplehurst, Nebraska, came in Saturday with a car of emigrant goods, and will locate on Rose Creek, one mile west and four miles south of Chester...H. Woodford, manager of the Rose Creek farm, received the other day by express, a mammoth Newfoundland dog, which in the future, will run the churn on the farm. He is trained for that purpose and it is quite a novelty to see him work... Luther Faith took his lady, Miss Ollie Clark of Stoddard, to Belleville, Kans., Wed., and proceeded to the county judge's office, where Judge Jacobs announced them man and wife.

## 50 Years Ago

A crater located two and one-fourth miles east and one mile north of the Oregon Trail monument on U.S. 81 was found by Jim Buckles who farms nearby. The crater was 5 feet in diameter. Buckles notified Sheriff Jim Johnson. Gordon Wilson, local weather reporter, was called for an expert opinion and stated that the crater was apparently formed by a highly explosive force of some kind, possibly a bolt of lightning. The sod was turned under around three holes. Small channels radiated from the center of the hole in all directions. A bluish color which appeared in and around the holes was apparently caused by extreme heat.

## American Red Cross

The American Red Cross recently recognized Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) as one of its Premier Blood Partners for 2018. This is a prestigious honor given to the hospital for their blood drives to help replenish the local community and national blood supply.

"TCHS is proud to be a part of the Red Cross mission that helps ensure lifesaving blood is available for hospital patients in need", said Ranae Vorderstrasse, RN. "TCHS has the same values of helping neighbors and we are grateful for this opportunity to host blood drives that will do just that - help our community."

In 2017, the blood drives held at the hospital in Hebron resulted in 155 units of blood donated. This means they had the potential to save 465 lives!

Right now, the American Red Cross is facing a critical blood shortage and is asking for all eligible blood and platelet donors of all blood types to give now and help save lives. Blood donations have fallen short of expectations which have resulted in about 61,000 fewer donations than needed. This shortfall is the equivalent of the Red Cross not collecting any blood donations for more than four days.

Every two seconds in the United States, blood and platelets are needed to respond to patient emergencies, including accident and burn victims, heart surgery and organ transplant procedures, and patients receiving treatment for leukemia, cancer or sickle cell disease. The Red Cross must collect nearly 14,000 blood donations every day for patients at approximately 2,600 hospitals across the country.

Blood shortages often worsen around Independence Day due to fewer volunteer-hosted blood drives at places of work, worship or community gathering and this year is no exception. Nearly 700 fewer blood drives are scheduled during the Independence Day week than in the weeks before and after the holiday.

Overall, the summer months are among the most

challenging times of the year for blood and platelet donations. Regular donors delay giving while they vacation and participate in summer activities. In a recent survey of Red Cross blood donors, more than 73 percent indicated vacation plans this summer, many of them occurring the weeks before and after Independence Day.

New donors and those who haven't given in a while are especially encouraged to roll up a sleeve and help save lives. Nearly one-third fewer new blood donors came out to give last summer than during the rest of the year. This is due in part to schools - where blood drives are held and where new donors give - being out of session during the summer months.

To sign up for an appointment to donate visit redcrossblood.org or call 1-800-REDCROSS (1-800-733-2767). The Red Cross has added more than 25,000 additional appointment slots at donation centers and community blood drives across the country over the next few weeks to accommodate more donors. Donation appointments and completion of a RapidPass online health history questionnaire are encouraged to help reduce the time it takes to donate.

To help locally, Thayer County Health Services will be hosting another blood drive on July 20, from 10:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., in the hospital cafeteria conference room. All eligible and/or first time blood donors are strongly encouraged to make an appointment and donate blood. To sign up for an appointment, please contact Ranae Vorderstrasse at 402-768-4615.

# FSA committee nomination period launched June 15

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) encourages America's farmers and ranchers to consider running for their local county committee or nominate candidates for committee. According to CED Jay VanWesten, USDA Farm Service Agency Thayer County Executive Director, FSA will accept nominations for the Thayer County Committee beginning Friday, June 15, 2018.

Producers across the country are already serving on committees where they play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA, making important decisions on programs dealing with disaster and conservation, emergencies, commodity loan price support, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

"County committees are unique to FSA and allow producers to have a voice on federal farm program imple-

mentation at the local level," said CED VanWesten. "It is also important that committees are comprised of members who fairly represent the diverse demographics of production agriculture for their community. I encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers, to participate in the nomination and election process."

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated farmers and ranchers serve on FSA county committees, which consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month, or as needed. Members serve three-year terms.

Producers can nominate themselves or others. Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, may also nominate candidates to better serve their communities. To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, producers must

participate or cooperate in an FSA program and reside in the area where the election is being held.

This year, nominations and elections for Thayer County will be held in local administrative area #2, which includes the townships of Belvidere, Bruning, Friedensau, Hebron and Stoddard.

To be considered, a producer must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at [www.fsa.usda.gov/elections](http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections), or from the Thayer County FSA office. All nomination forms for the 2018 election must be post-marked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 1, 2018. Visit [farmers.gov](http://farmers.gov) for more information.

Election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters beginning Nov. 5, 2018. Read more to learn about important election dates.


### Arlo Doehring

So we will give it a try. You may want to hurry over to see the new ones as they might be marred forever before the real ones discover they are fake. After all, we are talking about rubber turkeys here, but in the eyes of old Tom they are competition. Not even saying the little white church goers might be greeted by a heck of a flock of feathered friends as they open the church doors some Sunday morning.

This coming Saturday and Sunday, June 21-22, the Prairie Blacksmithing Association will be performing their work at the Thayer County Museum from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Come visit with them, practice with them and try your hand at this fascinating form of art.
