Reward offered for equipment theft

A \$2,500 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest, recovery of property and conviction of a person or persons responsible for a theft from a farm south of Hebron June 12.

Taken was a 2015, 30-foot black Titan flatbed gooseneck trailer with side rails and Nebraska license plates; 2010 Green Polaris Ranger 800 XP with a 2017 Superior mounted sprayer; 2015 Red Arctic Cat 4-wheeler; and a 2015 John Deere Gator XUV.

The items were taken in the early morning hours and the offender may have headed west on Road J.

Thayer County Sheriff David Lee said there are similarities to two trailer thefts in the southern portion of Thayer County March 22 and 29. The pickup pulling one of the trailers was caught on camera and is posted on the sheriff's Facebook page.

Thefts in neighboring counties and northern Kansas have also been reported.

Tractors roll across Nebraska to Capitol

This year's tractor relay for the Nebraska Antique Farming Association had a dual purpose — for 150 tractors to circle the State Capitol in honor of Nebraska's 150th birthday and to raise funds for the American Legion Operation Comfort Warriors program, a cause the Association took on in 2014.

"We have a lot of veterans that are doing the drive and if it wasn't for them, we wouldn't have the freedom to drive across Nebraska," relay coordinator, Donelle Moormeier said.

Those exercising their freedom also came from Thayer County. Wayne, Brad and Todd Krehnke, who traveled from Oklahoma to make the relay. They took turns driving a 1955 Massey Harris 44 Special.

Mike Hoops drove Glenn Kirchoff's 770 Oliver; Roger Bohling was atop an H International; Orlyn Renz, a 730 John Deere; Kevin and Dan Hoops, a 44 Massey Harris; Blake Mumm and Eldon Kirchoff, an 856 International; and Ben Hoops, a 656 International.

They picked up the trail in Sutton. The relay began in Holyoke, Colo. Brad Krehnke said they drove Highway 6 and were greeted by people on the sides of the road.

"It was a good drive and good weather," Krehnke said.

They made stops in Fairmont, Exeter and Friend, Moormeier said.

"We tour along the way. We try to organize stops with the American Legion to bring awareness of Operation Comfort Warriors,"

Moormeier said.

Through the program, the Legion contacts officials at military hospitals to see what recovering military personnel might need, whether it be loose-fitting sweatshirts cover healing wounds, gift cards or electronic devices.

Moormeier said the program isn't advertised and has no overhead, giving veterans 100 percent of donations. Operation Comfort Warrior also supplies grants and makes up for the slack of government programs.

"We advertise by word of mouth," Moormeier said. "We're really thankful we can help spread the word about it."

She said \$3,600 has been raised by the Association this year. People may still donate. The Nebraska Antique Farming Association is based out of Curtis.

After Friend, the relay went to Crete. From there, the tractors were on the road to Denton and then, Lincoln.

Instead of 150 tractors, there were 151 tractors.

Krehnke said they used parking space near the Pinnacle arena and drove around the capitol about 2 p.m.

"We enjoyed it a lot," Krehnke said.

A senator proclaimed June 9, the day the tractors circled the Capitol, Nebraska Antique Farming Day.

"So it was really history-making," Moormeier said.

The relay ended in Plattsmouth. Moormeier said 21 tractors made the entire route.

Bartling earns a place in Hall of Fame

Randy Bartling of Gilead will be inducted into the Nebraska Trapshooting Association Hall of Fame as the state shoot gets underway in Doniphan this week.

He is also a member of the 2017 All State Team, based on his 2015-2016 averages.

To qualify for the Hall of Fame, the NTA requires a minimum of 10 years ATA registered trapshooting in Nebraska; at least 25,000 singles targets; state championship wins; major ATA wins (national); and significant accomplishments in international trapshooting.

Bartling's singles count is 51,500; 36,300 handicap; and 27,300 doubles. He began shooting in 1994, but in 2002, decided to get serious. Bartling started with a club in Alliance where he worked for the railroad.

"I do a lot of hunting and wanted to be a better shot," he said.

He retired in 2010 and built a house near Gilead. He belongs to the Fairbury Trap Team and Jefferson County Sportsman's Club, and competes at trap shoots as an individual.

It's the competition and cam-

"I'm excited about it," he said about the Hall of Fame induction. "It's quite an honor to be included with some of those people — a humbling experience."

Bartling has won state titles via overall wins and several in his age

1887

130 Years Ago

The Hebron Chautauqua Circle had an open air session Monday night studying the constellations. Two spy-glasses, a field glass and two opera glasses were brought into service and the roof of one of J. M. Bennett's buildings was used as an observatory.

Sarah Bernhardt was in Omaha recently. Did our good looking opera house manager try to get her here for one night? She probably would have come with her troupe for a \$5,000 guaranty.

Miss Christana Reichert, a German girl, residing about seven miles north of Belvidere, met with an accident about two weeks ago that terminated fatally last Monday. While plowing with a sulky plow, the horses became frightened at the falling of the doubletree against their feet, ran away and threw her out of the seat of the plow against a tree, fracturing her skull. She remained unconscious until her death. The funeral on Tuesday last, was largely attended, Rev. Buechler, of Carleton, preaching the sermon. The unfortunate young lady recently worked for J. E. Thomas of this place.

J. C. Gray has purchased the interest of his brother, Henry, in the barber business and soon expects an assistant from the east.

Frank Town and Thomas Paden, formerly merchants at Belvidere, started for Norton, Kan., with seven horses and mules, going across country. The former will engage in business with his father-in-law, John Hole, at that place. Mr. Paden will take a look at the country and return to his family at Belvidere.

A. J. Sheldon is closing out his harness shop and business at Alexandria.

H. J. Struve is moving his store building and stock from Friedensau to Deshler.

At a recent meeting of the citizens of Davenport, they decided almost unanimously in favor of adopting village incorporation.

W. R. Livesay has bought the butcher tools and ice of the stand known as the Morgan butcher shop at Belvidere, and will start up this week.

The hotel stock of Mrs. Samuels of Chester, was sold at auction at that place by H. H. Johnson last Saturday. Mrs. S. intends to retire from the hotel business.

At the last session of the county commissioners, Charles Lewis was allowed \$84 as bounty on 42 wolf scalps. This is the largest number ever brought in at any one time by one person in this county.

We are pleased to make the acquaintance of Mr. Young, the resident member of the livery firm of Young & Pool, Deshler. In the absence of other accommodations they are furnishing meals to local men in a small building east of their livery barn.

J. P. Whittaker is moving the building next north of Masonic building site to a lot east of the courthouse. It is said the old Metropolitan Hotel will also be moved. Mr. M. A. Jones, of Emogine, Iowa, the owner of the property, will soon commence a fine two-story brick.

Mr. E. Rieke from Illinois has recently moved with his family to his farm one mile west of Chester and is erecting a fine residence and barn. His house will cost about \$2,000. We are pleased to note such permanent improvements.

E. E. Teter, of the north part of the county, is among the fortunate having recently been granted a pension.

The lectures of Phrenologist Pickett are largely attended, and very amusing to all of his audience except those whom heads are examined. He delineates some of them so accurately especially the strong points of their weak traits, as to convulse his hearers with merriment.

Farmers of this locality are busy this week cutting one of the best wheat crops that this country has had for years.

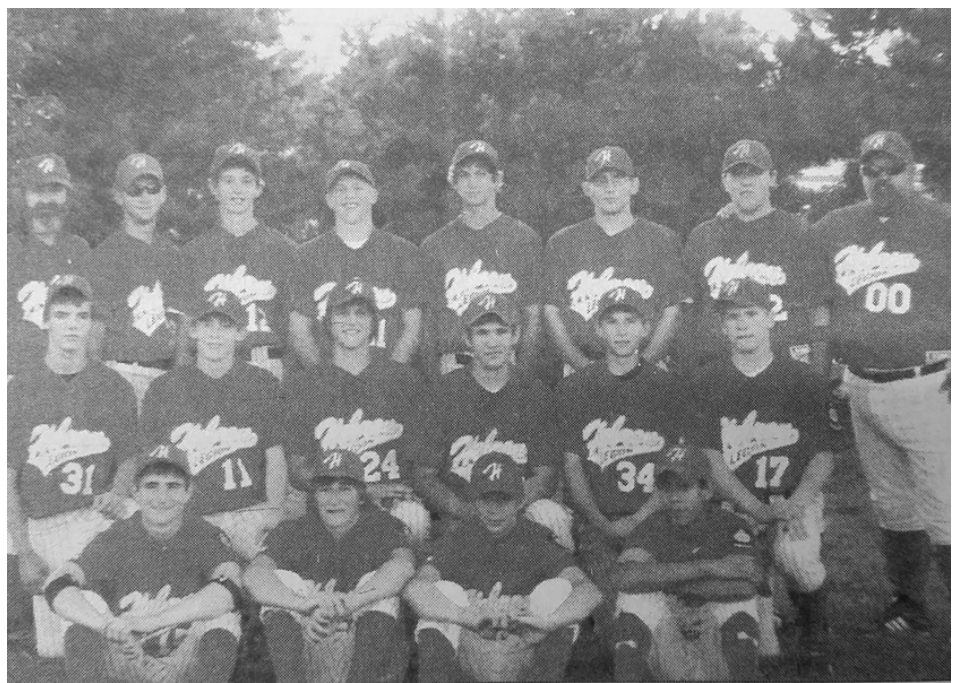
(The Bruning Banner) Curtiss McGaffin left last Saturday afternoon for Lincoln where he has secured employment in a job printing office.

(The Bruning Banner) The Thayer County Committee for School Re-organization has formulated a comprehensive county-wide school re-districting plan. The proposal, the result of three years work, complies with a 1955 legislative requirement that the committee either present such a plan by Sept. 1, 1957, or dissolve. The committee's proposal would consolidate Thayer County's present 45 districts, 29 of them now active, into four districts. Probable centers would be at Hebron, Deshler, Davenport and Bruning.

Nancy Willkening of Bruning placed in the blue award group at the District 4-H Timely Topics Public Speaking Contest in Hastings, May 25. Her topic was entitled, "World in Peace or World in Pieces."

At least 20 tornado funnel clouds followed their north-eastward courses through the

southern half of Nebraska Monday. Some of them dipped to earth and damaged more than 20 farmsteads. Three farmsteads were completely destroyed and buildings on an least six others were damaged in Thayer County.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

“Oooh, baby, baby; Baby, baby; Oooh, baby, baby; Baby, baby” insert a little rhythm section, keyboard and two awesome 90’s era rappers and you’ve got yourself a hit. Or, you might just be looking down your church pew, around the TCHS Clinic waiting room, at the grocery store, or any community event in the county. Babies are EVERYWHERE!! Speaking for myself, we just added a new family member on the 30th of May, and there were three other babies born within that same week in Hebron...that I know of anyways. Just in my circle of friends I can count eight babies in the last two to three months, plus three to come in the next couple months. I mean, what is in the water around here?

All this baby booming in a small county is absolutely fantastic, and really shows you how much the younger generation has come back to the area to raise their families and take advantage of our small-town lifestyle and family friendly atmosphere. Some of these new Thayer county additions have family ties to the county, others are brand spanking new residents, but all of them are making an impact on daycare and education needs in the county.

Bruning specifically has been quietly trying to assess child numbers and trends in regard to a daycare center for the last couple months. In fact, analyzing the population and demographics in Thayer County was pretty much my “spare time” mission for the entire month of April. I think you might be pleasantly surprised by what I found:

From 2005-2015: 5.6 percent of the county population was under the age of five.

That equals out to average around 293 children a year under the age of five in Thayer County.

From 2010 - 2015: 11.56 percent of the county population was between the ages of 20 to 34 years old - prime child bearing ages, with a steady increase in the 20 to 24-year-old category over that time period.

Almost 300 kids under the age of five in Thayer county. In Bruning specifically, we have about 70 kids that fit within the School District’s

footprint that fall under the age of 5, maybe that doesn’t sound like a lot to you, but we really only have three people providing a limited number in in-home daycare in the Bruning community. This leaves a pretty wide gap between daycare needs and daycare availability. Take myself for example, I live and work in Bruning, my husband works in Carleton, my almost four-year-old has daycare in Bruning and will attend pre-school in Bruning in the fall, but I will be driving our newborn to Geneva every day for daycare. Don’t get me wrong, I love the center in Geneva and everything Miss Whitney has worked so hard to put together up there, but it would be nice to have a similar option closer to home.

And that my friends is how we started this whole process. There is a group of us in and around Bruning that needed daycare for not just one kid, but multiple kids in the family. We wanted something that offered some flexibility in hours and programs, as well as a way for the daycare provider to have a little more flexibility too. Let’s face it, being an in-home provider is hard and doesn’t leave much time for you to get a potty break for yourself, let alone schedule a doctor’s appointment without trying to coordinate all your daycare parent’s schedules too.

In April, I started working with Diane Wettstein, Director of Thayer County Economic Development Alliance, to put together numbers, budgets, plans, etc... After a series of discussions with several existing locations, we’ve come to the conclusion that to make this happen we’re going to have to start from the ground up. Unfortunately, there just isn’t the perfect building laying around empty, believe me, we’ve looked in Carleton, Davenport, and Bruning trying to see if something would work. So, with the help from some Bruning leadership, TCEDA, and our small “think tank” we’ve begun the process of building a plan to get this center going from the ground up.

I’m optimistic that we can work something out with the Village of Bruning to help fill a vacant lot in town with a productive daycare center. I’m also optimistic that we will be able to raise enough funds from private investors for the business startup. The biggest challenge we face going forward is the cost of a facility. We are still working on the details, but if we can raise the funds from the communities this center will support and be able to have a facility to house the daycare and other kid friendly activities and events we will all win in the long-run.

We are in the process of organizing public meetings in Davenport, Carleton, and Bruning to discuss daycare structure, building needs, and other pertinent information to this project. The more ideas and suggestions we can get from the 20 to 34 year old age group, the better, so please keep an eye out for these events. If you have any questions, comments, interest in working at a facility like this or in being a silent investor, feel free to contact Diane Wettstein with TCEDA or myself. This is probably a “slow and steady wins the race” type of situation, but when it comes to our children I’d rather be “slow and steady” and win for them any day of the week.

Men’s Health Month

June is a time to raise awareness about preventable health problems facing men. Health professionals know that early detection and treatment is critical when dealing with any preventable health issue. The challenge with most men is getting them to see a doctor at all, let alone on a regular basis.

Overall, men tend to be less healthy and die younger than women. Whether it is your friend, brother, dad, boyfriend, spouse, or boss, show them you care about them and their health by encouraging them to get their annual check-ups.

All ten of the leading causes of death as defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) affect men at a higher rate than they affect women. The National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) reviewed the leading causes of death among men and found the majority of causes had links to preventable, lifestyle-related behaviors such as poor nutrition and smoking.

According to the CDC, women are 100 percent more likely to schedule an appointment for their annual examinations and preventive services than men. Men need to be encouraged to have the preventive test necessary to help find diseases early; when they’re easiest to treat. Men should talk to their healthcare provider about which preventive medical tests they should have.

The following are a few steps men can do to help prevent disease and stay healthy:

• **Body Mass Index** - or BMI, is a measure of your body fat based on your height and weight. Your doctor can help you determine your BMI or there are many charts available.

• **Cholesterol** - Men over 35 (or earlier if at risk or with a BMI of 30 or over), should have their cholesterol checked regularly. High cholesterol is a key risk factor for heart disease.

• **Blood Pressure** - Men should have their blood pressure checked every two

years. High blood pressure increases the chance of getting heart or kidney disease and for having a stroke.

• **Cardiovascular Disease** - At age 45 and through age 79, men should talk with their doctor about if an aspirin a day could help lower their risk for heart attack.

• **Colorectal Cancer** - Beginning at age 50 (earlier with family history) and through 75, men should get tested for colorectal cancer. Talk to your doctor to decide which test is best.

• **Other Cancers** - Men should discuss with their healthcare provider about if they should be tested for prostate, lung, oral, skin, or other cancers.

• **Depression** - Men, who have feelings of hopelessness or little or no interest in doing things they enjoy, should talk to their doctor. Depression is a treatable illness.

• **Diabetes** - Men with a blood pressure higher than 135/80, should ask their doctor to test them for diabetes. Diabetes, or high blood sugar, can cause problems with your heart, eyes, feet, kidneys, nerves, and other body parts.

• **Tobacco Use** - Men who smoke or use tobacco, should talk to their doctor about quitting. There are also tests smokers can have done to help diagnose lung cancer.

Recognizing and preventing men’s health problems is not just a man’s issue. It also affects the women in their lives. It’s a known fact that women have a strong influence on their family’s health and lifestyle choices. To schedule an appointment to discuss what preventive tests are right for you or for the men in your life, call your healthcare provider.

Farm Service Agency County Committee nomination period open

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Executive Director Jay A. VanWesten in Thayer County today announced the nomination period for local FSA county committee candidates began on June 15. Nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the Thayer County FSA office by close of business on Aug. 1, 2017.

"County committees are unique to FSA and allow producers to have a voice on federal farm program implementation at the local level," said VanWesten. "It is also important that committees are comprised of members who fairly represent the diverse demographics of production agriculture for their community. I encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers, to participate in the nomination and election process."

To be eligible to serve on the FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency-administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area where they are nominated.

This year, nominations and elections will be held in Local Administrative Area #1, which includes the Townships of Byron, Carleton, Deshler, Kiowa and Davenport.

The Thayer County FSA Office will host informational meetings on the COC election process. These

informal meetings are scheduled for 8:30 am on June 27 and July 11, 2017 at the local office.

Producers may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Organizations representing minority and women farmers and ranchers may also nominate candidates. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and more information about FSA county committee elections are available online at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections.


Elected county committee members serve a three-year term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues. County committees consist of three to 11 members.

FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters this fall.

"Nominating potential county committee members, voting for candidates and serving on the committees are truly services to your community and the agriculture industry," said Mr. VanWesten. "County committee members make important decisions on how federal farm programs are administered locally to best serve local needs and interests."

If a student repeatedly lacks funds to purchase a meal, and is not enrolled in a free meal program, the district will use its resources and contacts to protect the health and safety of the student. Failure or refusal of parents or guardians to provide meals for students may require mandatory reporting to child protection agencies as required by law."

Wednesday we will be experiencing the Summer Solstice, which is the longest day of the year. We have been gaining minutes of daylight each day. Then directly after the solstice, we begin losing seconds and minutes.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEBRON, NEBRASKA TO VACATE PORTIONS OF THIRD STREET AND KAREN AVENUE IN AND ADJACENT TO VIESELMAYER ADDITION TO HEBRON, THAYER COUNTY, NEBRASKA; TO PROVIDE AMANNER OF ASCERTAINING ALL DAMAGES SUSTAINED BY THE CITIZENS OF THE CITY OF HEBRON OR THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY THEREIN BY REASON OF SAID VACATION; TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF SAID ORDINANCE AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION AS REQUIRED BY LAW.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEBRON, THAYER COUNTY, NEBRASKA:

WHEREAS, the following described streets in the City of Hebron, Thayer County, Nebraska, to-wit:

That portion of Third Street adjacent to Lots One through Seven (1-7), inclusive, of Vieselmeyer Addition to Hebron, Thayer County, Nebraska, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point 10' south of the SW corner of Lot 1, Vieselmeyer Addition to Hebron; thence West 60'; thence North, 677.94' to a point 33' South of the North line of the NW corner of Section 6, Township 2 North, Range 2 West of the 6th P.M., Thayer County, Nebraska; thence East 60' to the NW corner of Lot 7 of said Vieselmeyer Addition; thence South on the West line of Lots 1 thru 7 of said Vieselmeyer Addition, 677.94' to the Point of Beginning; and

That portion of Karen Avenue, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point 10' South of the SE corner of Lot 1, Vieselmeyer Addition to Hebron; thence West 144.06'; thence North 10' to the SW corner of said Lot 1; thence East on the South line of said Lot 1, 144.06'; thence South 10' to the Point of Beginning.

Should be vacated and such vacation is expedient and for

the public good and safety, therefore:

Section 1. The above described streets located in the City of Hebron, Thayer County, Nebraska, are wholly and entirely vacated and shall no longer be and constitute streets of the City of Hebron, Thayer County, Nebraska, and the same shall revert to the owner or owners of the abutting real estate, adjacent thereto, one-half on each side thereof, and shall become part of such property, all in accordance with Section 17-558(2) of the Revised Statutes of the State of Nebraska.

Section 2. The Mayor of the City of Hebron, Nebraska is authorized and instructed to appoint a board of appraisers, consisting of three (3) citizens of the City of Hebron, Nebraska, to ascertain all damages, if any, sustained by the citizens of said City, or by the owners of the property therein by the reason of said vacation.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Sources of Drinking Water:

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and

groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

The source of drinking water used by the City of Hebron is groundwater.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

* Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

* Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

* Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

* Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

* Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking Water Health Notes:

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. 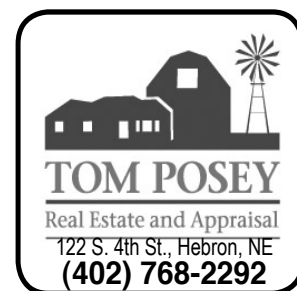
