Davenport farm-to-table...

Two historic storefronts on main street Davenport are slated to become the hub of a local food movement. Harold and Barbara Stone, of Stones Thoreau Farm to Market, Inc., recently purchased the buildings from B.J. Culbertson, a long time business owner and resident of Davenport.

The two buildings were built in 1916 and housed a drugstore, bank and post office. They will be renovated in keeping with the historical architectural details. Plans for the buildings include a commercial kitchen, space for special events and eventually a retail storefront with the farm to table theme. An onsite garden adjacent to the site will feature informal learning, hands on classes for aspiring gardeners and cooks, and a place to relax.

Stones Thoreau, Inc is a food-based enterprise that promotes community and economic development in rural Nebraska. As director of the nonprofit, Harold Stone is passionate about the role that food can play in tackling economic and social challenges facing rural communities. "We have received great support of the community," said Stone. "The best part of my day is when others share their ideas for how we can promote the town through locally grown and produced food."

Stone has a farm-to-table philosophy and hopes to capitalize on the agricultural legacy of rural Nebraska by focusing on the growing interest in fresh, locally grown food, and agri-tourism. The opportunity to revitalize two store fronts is all part of the plan to raise the sustainability and spirit of rural communities. "The renewed vigor this project can bring to our community is a spark that we have needed for quite some time" says Jake Voss, President of Frontier Bank, in Davenport and chair of the Davenport Community Foundation, Inc.



Aether LLC to install met tower

Planned location near Byron on Hwy 8

Aether LLC, headed up by Thayer County native Gary Aksamit, announced today that it will soon begin construction of a meteorological tower for a second Thayer County wind project.

Met towers measure the amount of wind present in an area and provide an indication of how much electricity may be generated by a wind project. The tower should be installed and operational no later than the second week of July.

"We as a county are trying very hard to keep our financial future in our hands with respect to possible wind farms in our area," Aksamit said. "Our area was targeted by a wind developer with a high-pressure sales pitch over the winter pushing landowners to sign leases. This group of landowners made the decision to put up our own met tower and do this ourselves.

"By using the Thayer County wind business model we created with the Monument Road project - owning our own met tower and committing the acres to our own organization - we can go find a buyer for our power ourselves and maintain control over this project ourselves," Aksamit said.

"This natural resource belongs to the landowners of the county and we want them to receive as much benefit as possible."

This second met tower will provide another basic benchmark on the available wind in Thayer County. Construction will begin the second

week of July and will take a few days to build. The 196-foot tower will be located near Byron along Hwy. 8 and is being built by GPCo. Aether LLC will own the tower. The "footprint" of a met tower is less than an acre and the inconvenience to the landowner is very small, Aksamit added. As soon as the tower is up it will begin tracking wind data immediately.

"It will take at least one year's worth of wind data to validate the value of the wind resource for the landowners," he said. "Once we have that information, we can give the landowners an idea of what they can expect to financially gain from a wind turbine on their land."

Owning the met tower is the equivalent of having an irrigation test hole on the farm. "Landowners are in a much stronger position to negotiate when they own their own met tower and they know how much electricity their project can realistically produce," Aksamit said.

"Sadly enough I think many of the early wind projects launched in Nebraska took landowners by surprise and land leases were signed without any idea of what landowners were committing to or the value of their wind asset.

"I think there is a strong desire from some of those early landowners to have a 'do-over' on those negotiations. This is their land, it's their wind, these wind farms will be on their land for decades and landowners should become aware of what they are signing," Aksamit said.

(Aeolis Energy LLC, a group of local land owners organized by Gary Aksamit, installed a \$40,000 196-foot met tower on Road Q in Thayer County last August. The tower sits on "Monument Road" four miles east of Highway 81.)

Davenport man pleads guilty to possessing child porn

Christian E. Hansen, 33, Davenport, pleaded guilty to three counts of possession of a depiction of sexually explicit activity involving a child last week in Thayer County district court. One count of distribution of the stated material was dropped after Hansen reached a plea agreement with Thayer County prosecutor Dan Werner.

Each of the three counts are considered class III felonies and carry sentences of a minimum of one year to a maximum of 25 years in prison, and a maximum fine of \$25,000 with no minimum. Hansen will also be required to register as a Nebraska sex offender for 25 years.

Hansen was arrested May 2, after an investigation using a Globally Unique Identifier (GUI) discovered the pornographic activity on his computer.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered by Judge Vicky Johnson and a sentencing date was set for Aug. 2 in Nuckolls County district court in Nelson at 10:45 a.m., due to an appearance conflict with his attorney Wayne L. Garrison.

Judge Johnson denied a bond modification request after Hansen said his inability to have contact with anyone under the age of 19 years interfered with his lifestyle in that he is the stepfather to his wife's five-year-old son, and he works in a place where employees are under the age restriction. Judge Johnson stayed firm on the current \$100,000/10 percent bond after noting his recent conviction. "I understand your argument, but according to the factual basis in this case and the fact that you stand convicted of them," she said, "I can't put any child at risk."

Hansen is also not allowed to have access to the internet, according to bond.

North all-stars win Trib VB Classic

Wesleyan recruit Cody Long leads south

Grand Island Northwest middle Karyn Kuehl helped lead the North All-Stars to a victory over the South All-Stars 25-18, 25-21, 24-26, 25-18 Thursday night in the third annual Hastings Tribune Volleyball Classic at Hastings College's Lynn Farrell Arena.

The Nebraska Wesleyan-bound Kuehl tallied a match-high 13 kills while also adding three ace blocks and an assist to help lead her team of all-stars to the win.

Grand Island Senior High's Allison Arnold posted 11 kills and four blocks as the two middles helped control the net for the North All-Stars.

Kearney Catholic's Kayla James finished with 26 assists while Heartland setter Miranda Driewer posted 19 assists.

The South All-Star team was led by Thayer Central's Cody Long, also a Nebraska Wesleyan recruit, who finished with 12 kills, two ace serves, an ace block and an assist. Keri Shaw of Sandy Creek tallied seven kills while Sutton's Claire Bergen and St. Cecilia's Brooke Busboom had six kills each.

Syracuse setter Megan Farley finished with 23 assists for the South team.

The North team pulled away for victories in each of the first two sets — breaking open a 17-all tie in the first set to score eight of the final nine points en route to the win; and opening a 19-12 bulge in the second set to cruise to the win.

But the South team rallied in the third set after trailing 22-20 late, as Bergen and Long recorded two kills each down the stretch and Busboom added another kill to help lift the team to the win.

Kuehl took over in the fourth set, however, tallying four kills and an ace block to help lift the North All-Stars to the four-set victory.

West Nile Protection Needed Now

With the large amount of rain and flooding along rivers and creeks in the eastern end of the state, the mosquitoes trapped in our area accounted for about one-half of what was trapped in the state as a whole.

Mosquitoes only travel a few hundred yards (the size of a couple of football fields) from where they hatch. That is why it is important for us to drain water sources close to our own homes to stop the reproduction cycle and reduce the chances of spreading West Nile Virus.

It is also important to get rid of standing water which is needed for mosquito reproduction. Empty out buckets, tires, toys, flower pots, gutters and other containers in your yard. Drain troughs and drainage ditches.

Put mosquito eating fish into stock tanks and ponds. Use "mosquito dunks" in ponds or other water that can't be drained. Dunks contain bacteria toxic only to mosquito larva and remain potent enough to kill larva for 30 days.

It is also important to use insect repellent that contains DEET to help prevent the mosquitoes from landing on your body.

It is the female mosquito that bites you. All male and female mosquitoes need a continual supply of food to live from the juices of fruits, flower nectar and injured plants. They have a mouth that is shaped like a straw. Only the female has a powerful enough mouth (proboscis) that can pierce our skin.

She needs the blood of any type of animal to nourish each batch of eggs that she is about to lay. From the blood nourishment, she can lay from 100 to 300 eggs.

The female can smell the carbon dioxide that you exhale. She follows that smell, and as she gets closer she is attracted to the heat and moisture your body gives off. When she finally sees you, she will look for a place to "bite."

When the female pierces your skin with her straw-like mouth, she uses two pumps in her head. One sucks your blood which goes into her stomach and the other one inserts saliva which contains an anesthetic so you don't feel the bite. She will feed only one to three minutes to fill her stomach.

When bitten, your immune system immediately sends cells to the bite to get rid of the saliva. This chemical reac-

tion by your immune system causes a small puffed spot that itches. It is your immune system at work.

The female only needs one tablespoon of water to lay her 200 eggs and if the conditions are right, they will hatch in one to five days. After hatching, the eggs become larvae which live in the water. Like all insects, the larvae turn into pupa. The pupa then turns into mature mosquitoes in one to three days. A mature mosquito's job is to continue the reproduction cycle.

The mosquito can spread West Nile Virus because she has become infected by sucking blood from a wild bird that has the virus. Then when she pierces your skin or other animals she can spread that virus through her saliva. Many people are infected with the virus and may not notice the symptoms. However, in other people the virus can cause serious illness and even death.



Bagworm Control

It's that time of year again, which you have been nervously anticipating — dealing with that insect pest called the bagworm. Bagworms are hatching, so now is the time to monitor for their presence on different evergreen trees and shrubs.

So, what can you use to minimize the damage caused by bagworm caterpillars? If present, apply insecticides. At this time of year, young bagworms will be approximately 1/4" to 1/2" long.

A number of insecticides labeled for control or suppression of bagworms include acephate (Orthene), Bacillus thuringiensis subsp. Kurstaki (Dipel, Thuricide), cyfluthrin (Tempo), trichlorfon (Dylox), indoxacarb (Provaunt), chlorantraniliprole (Acelepryn), and spinosad (Conserve).

Some of these active ingredients are often available and sold under different trade names. Furthermore, several of these materials may not be available to homeowners.

Insecticide applications are most effective on the young caterpillars. Older caterpillars in the bags may be 3/4 inch

long and are more difficult to control or obtain sufficient mortality. Furthermore, females tend to feed less as they prepare for reproduction, which reduces their susceptibility to insecticide sprays and any residues.

The bacterium Bacillus thuringiensis is highly active on young caterpillars; however, the material must be ingested to be effective, so thorough coverage of all plant parts is essential. Spinosad (Conserve) works by contact and ingestion, and is extremely effective in suppressing bagworm populations. Cyfluthrin (Tempo), trichlorfon (Dylox), and indoxacarb (Provaunt) are typically used against the larger caterpillars. Again, thorough coverage of all plant parts is essential, especially the tops of trees and shrubs, where bagworms commonly initiate feeding.

TCHS Upgrading Electronic Health Information System

If you have been to the hospital recently or have read my articles, you know Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) will be upgrading to a new software vendor for its electronic health information (EHR) system on July 1. This new system will meet the eligibility requirements set forth in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 which outline the Medicare and Medicaid Incentive Programs for Critical Access Hospitals (CAH).

Starting in 2011, healthcare professionals, eligible hospitals and CAH's must be using certified EHR technology to qualify for incentive payments from Medicare and Medicaid. Using a certified EHR system means providers and patients can be confident the system is secure, confidential and will work with other systems to share health information.

It is also an assurance that the necessary technological capability, functionality, and security are in place to meet the "meaningful use" criteria requirements.

What is "meaningful use?" Meaningful use is the term used to describe the level in which a healthcare provider is electronic with its EHR. In the future, healthcare providers who are able to demonstrate "meaningful use" will receive incentive payments from Medicare and Medicaid to help cover the cost of delivering care. Besides just being a financial benefit, "meaningful use" will have a big impact on improving overall patient safety.

EHR systems do not achieve these benefits merely by transferring information from paper format into digital format. An EHR system can only deliver its benefits when the information it contains are standardized and structured in a uniformed way. Just as ATM's depend on uniformly structured data formats, the "meaningful use" approach will also require a standardization of EHR systems.

Similarly, an EHR system cannot achieve its full potential if providers don't use the functions designed to deliver the most benefit—for example, exchanging information, and

entering orders through the computer so that the "decision support" functions and other automated processes are activated. Therefore, the "meaningful use" approach requires healthcare providers to meet specified objectives in the use of their EHR system to qualify for the incentive payments.

For example: basic information needs to be entered into the qualified EHR so that it exists in the "structured" format; information exchange needs to begin; security checks need to be routinely made; and medical orders need to be made using Computerized Provider Order Entry (CPOE).

These requirements begin at lower levels in the first stage of meaningful use, and are expected to be completely phased in over the next five years. Some of these requirements are "core" needs, but healthcare providers are also given some choice in meeting additional criteria from a "menu set."

Once the upgrade to the new certified EHR software is complete, TCHS will be able to achieve "meaningful use." However, the most important outcome from this upgrade will be a safer environment for our patients to receive their healthcare.

It will also mean TCHS will qualify for reimbursements payments from Medicare and Medicaid beginning as early as 2011. These incentive payments will help the bottom line at TCHS and allow us to continue to make improvements to our facilities, services and purchase new medical equipment.

The staff at TCHS has been working hard preparing for this transition. As we enter this final week before the conversion, we ask that you have patience when you come in for your next appointment as we make these necessary changes to better serve you.

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FSA Reminds Producers To File Annual Report

Dan Steinkruger, state executive director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Nebraska recently reminded producers to submit their annual report of acreage to their local FSA county office to meet FSA program eligibility requirements.

"Producers must file their reports accurately and timely for all crops and land uses, including prevented and failed acreage, to ensure they receive the maximum FSA program benefits possible," said Steinkruger.

Accurate acreage reports are necessary to determine and maintain eligibility for various programs, such as the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and newer programs authorized in the 2008 Farm Bill. Programs include the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE), Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE), Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Tree Assistance Program (TAP) and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-raised Fish Program (ELAP).

All acreage must be reported for a farm, including crops planted on non-cropland such as hayed or grazed grassland. It is also important to accu-

ately report crops intended use. Intended use is used to determine eligibility in many FSA programs and cannot be revised once reported.

Acreage reports are considered timely filed when completed by the applicable final crop reporting deadlines. In Nebraska deadlines include: June 30 for small grains.; July 15 for all other crops including CRP; NAP acreage must be reported by the earlier of the final reporting date or 15 days prior to harvest or disposition of the crop; prevented acreage must be reported within 15 calendar days after the final planting date; failed acreage must be reported before the disposition of the crop.

Producers should contact their county FSA office if they are uncertain about reporting deadlines. Late-filed provisions may be available to producers who are unable to meet the reporting deadline as required. Reports filed after the established deadline must meet certain requirements to be accepted and may be charged late fees.

Producers should visit their county FSA office to complete acreage reporting. For questions on this or any FSA program, including specific crop reporting deadlines and planting dates, producers should contact their county FSA office.

WIC Expanded Food Packages

Oct. 1, 2009, the Nebraska Women, Infants and Children Nutrition Program (WIC) expanded its food packages to include more healthful foods. The revised food packages boost WIC's effort to promote optimal nutrition and breastfeeding and better accommodate participants with cultural preferences.

The new expanded food package includes fresh fruit and vegetable vouchers, 100 percent whole grain bread brown rice, canned beans, dairy alternative soy products, tuna and salmon and jarred baby food.

Additionally, breastfeeding women will receive enhanced food packages and more food for their infants over six months of age. They will continue to receive breastfeeding support and counseling, healthcare referrals and access to breast pumps. In addition, we now offer the support of a PEER Counselor, a WIC participant who has been successful with breastfeeding, has received additional education

related to successful breastfeeding and will be available one to one to help pregnant women and new moms be successful with breastfeeding their new baby.

WIC provides health food at no cost and nutrition information to help keep pregnant women, infants and children under five healthy and strong.

You are eligible if you live in Nebraska, are pregnant, postpartum or breastfeeding woman, an infant or child under five years of age. Fathers, guardians or foster parents may apply for WIC for their children.

You may qualify if you are within income guidelines; however, you automatically qualify for WIC if you currently receive ADC, Food Stamps, Kids Connection or Medicaid.

Nebraska Timeline

Subject: Picnic Mishaps

Picnicking is one of the most enjoyable summer pastimes, and Nebraskans more than one hundred years ago enjoyed it as much as we do today. Occasionally, however, these outings were marred by mishaps more serious than the presence of ants. The Omaha Daily Bee of August 17, 1885, reported several unusual occurrences at the recent Union Pacific band picnic at North Bend. The Bee said:

"The train of fourteen well-filled coaches left the Union Pacific depot [in Omaha] at 8:30 a. m. . . . The members of the band had considerable trouble when the train started, as it was discovered that suspicious persons were on board and that between thirty and forty boys were trying to beat their way and were concealed under the seats. The train was therefore stopped and the gang removed from the train. At Valley a little fellow was discovered riding on the trucks under the car. He was pulled out with his hat all in shreds and clothes badly torn."

When the UP picnickers reached North Bend, they enjoyed a basket lunch and an afternoon of games, one of which caused injury to a bystander. "Mrs. Lewis Stemm had a very narrow escape from what might have been a fatal accident. She was passing by the heavyweight striking machine, while the mallet was raised, and was struck on the side of the head. She was unconscious for a moment but was soon revived. A hammock was put up by the members of the band and the suffering woman was made as comfortable as could be done. The members of the band said after this they will never allow any more striking machines at their picnic."

Another unusual accident befell a party of Albion picnickers in 1907. The Norfolk Weekly News-Journal of June 14, 1907, under the headline "Buggy Burns, Lunch Too," reported: "The most peculiar conflagration ever heard of happened in this vicinity. A fishing party given by Dr. and Mrs. L. E. Scouten, in honor of Miss Vera Allen of Omaha, were enjoying the enticing pastime of landing

the elusive trout and sunfish and were so engrossed in the pleasant pursuit that they were utterly unaware of the fact that the carriage in which they came to the brook was burning while standing with the horses hitched to it.

"After awhile the pangs of hunger drove the party to their base of supplies and when they arrived at where they hoped to partake of an elaborate out-of-door dinner they found the feast in ashes as were also their carriage, wraps and bonnets. The faithful horses still stood hitched to the buggy tongue with their tails slightly scorched, but otherwise no worse for the fate that had overtaken the feast, the wraps and the carriage."

To end the evening the students broke up into two sections and watched the videos, "Are Your Kids Drinking?" and "Binge" which were produced by NET television.

On Monday the Save a Life Tour gave a presentation for all the students, staff and sponsors. The Save a Life Tour is a division of Kramer International and was developed due to America's staggering problem with alcohol-related crashes. They are committed to educating people about the dangers of getting behind the wheel after consuming alcohol through the use of cutting-edge technology.

After watching a commanding video the students were given the opportunity to practice driving in a state-of-the-art drinking and driving simulator. The goal of the Save a Life Tour is to grasp the attention of America's young drivers

Following the morning session the youth divided into four groups and attended breakout sessions until late afternoon. The sessions included law enforcement, YAB Leadership, Save a Life simulation, and Heroes and Heroic Acts.

students in a fun and drug free atmosphere.

Tuesday morning YADA (Youth Against Drugs and Alcohol) and Officer Bob from Polk County gave a presentation on mock crashes. They explained the details and planning that would need to be done to have one in our community and the problems that may arise. Officer Bob also visited with the students about some of the most difficult duties he has as an officer and encouraged the youth to never ride in a vehicle with a person who has been drinking or drive a vehicle after drinking.

He explained the heartache that is involved with telling a parent that their child has died in an alcohol related crash and how most of these accidents could be avoided by youth taking a stand against drugs and alcohol. He stressed the importance of making good decisions and helping others in their community to do the same.

In the afternoon the Thayer County youth met to discuss the topics that were covered during June Jam. The students were excited to form a better relationship with our local law enforcement and composed a list of questions they would ask them after the conference. They also discussed the local conditions of Thayer County and ways they could improve them as a coalition.

On Tuesday evening the youth returned to Thayer County. The youth that participated are eager to put their leadership skills they developed during the conference to work by visiting with local law enforcement, presenting educational programs for youth and adults, and striving to encourage others to take a stand against drugs and alcohol.
