State Games slated in July

Local athletes to represent community

The Nebraska Sports Council will host the 29th annual Cornhusker State Games July 19-28 in Lincoln, Omaha, and the surrounding communities. Opening ceremonies are set for July 19.

Every year before the Games, there is a torch run across the state. The Torch Run this year is June 20-28. Usually the torch run comes through Fairbury, but this year the route was changed so it could be held in conjunction with the 2013 LiveWellNebraska.com Community Tour.

The Games began in 1985. During that first year, 19 sports were offered and 4,000 participants signed up to play in the games.

It has since grown into the state's largest amateur sporting event of the summer. According to the Cornhusker State Games website, there were 11,643 participants from 79 counties last year. The oldest athlete competing was 86 years old and the youngest was 14 months. There were more than 60 sports available for the athletes.

Thayer County was represented by 16 athletes competing last year. The heat caused an extra challenge to participants. Despite this, area athletes brought home five gold medals in bowling and track. In addition to that, the local athletes earned three silver medals and four bronze medals.

Events include many team sports along with individual events. The number of sports available to compete in grows every year. Figure skating and ice hockey have been added to the list of events.

Early registration for the CSG continues through July 1. Town Dads

The Hebron Town Board held a meeting recently in the back yard of the calaboose. Chairman Werner announced the object of the meeting to be the passage of an ordinance for the removal of that useful and honorable building to Omaha. The city marshal said he had been intending to use it for a hog pen, but had not found a hog he could persuade to go in. Church addressed the chair on the subject of arrests. The record showed 127 for beer and 74 for whiskey straight. The gentleman thought the marshal was too rigorous. Gentlemen should not be arrested for winking, as he was sure had often been the case. He was however glad to observe that the present official wasn't afraid of a drink man and wouldn't stand any back sass, for he despised a town marshal who would let a lot of drunk and disorderly men defy him. He said he liked the way our marshal handled them. A few slaps on his billy was a very soothing effect on loud mouthed vulgar guzzlers. Bethscheider praised the town marshal for his excellent method of enticing the disorderly to the lock-up, and said it wasn't every man who could run a town marshal, and it wasn't every town that could have fights, quarrels and boisterous language quiet down inside of two hours every time without an arrest. And that the calaboose would never be removed by his vote; no, sir. It was the feat of that which made order possible and that its usefulness as a landmark could not be over estimated. 1893

120 Years Ago

The Hebron creamery made a shipment of 5,160 pounds of butter to Chicago.

Bicycles will have to be taxed the same as sewing machines, carriages and musical instruments.

Hebron has a baseball club. John T. Arnold of Belvidere died.

Dan Carey has the banner field of wheat. It is 45 acres in extent and will average about three feet in height. W.E. Rhinehart, having bought Morrill Bennett's dray line, is ready for business

Several Hebron bicyclists went to Superior to attend the bicycle race in that city. Louis Hughes of this city was fourth in the races, there being about eight competitors.

Ezra Scoville, one of the pioneer settlers of this county, died at his home on Dry Creek and was buried in the new cemetery. The esteem in which he was held was evidenced by the large concourse of neighbors and friends attending his funeral.

John Pugh has the most extensive private fish ponds in Thayer County. His first pond is devoted to rainbow trout. He has only four, but they are beauties. His second pond is stocked with black bass, one, two and three years old. He has a large number of these and they are thrifty and rapidly increasing. His third pond is devoted to carp, of which he has a large number, some quite large. Pugh does not recommend carp as a food fish and says the meat is coarse and not very palatable. His fourth pond contains a general assortment, principally native catfish, which do well in ponds. He has practically and successfully demonstrated that fish raising is both pleasant and profitable.

Hubbell

Street Commissioner Brashear laid about 100 feet of new sidewalk on Johnson Avenue in the north part of town.

The managers of the Hubbell Driving Park is having 13 new horse stalls put on the grounds. These with the stalls already there, will accommodate a large number of horses.

The town board at a meeting authorized the president, W.J. Kissick, to employ four police — two for day and two for night service during the three days of races.

A gun club with a membership of 14 has been organized in Hubbell. The boys have purchased traps, clay pigeons and all the paraphernalia to make the thing go, and are putting in good time practicing.

H.C. Pershing and family arrived here from Hebron. Their goods came Saturday and they are now snugly ensconced in their home on Jersey Street in the northwest part of town. Pershing will engage in the real estate business.

110 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) Adjutant General Hall designated the Bruning band of 40 pieces as the Fifth Regiment Band of the National Guard in place of the Central City band which had mustered out.

The English Lutheran congregation started erecting a tower for the new bell, enlarging the vestibule and building an infant and ladies' room for Sunday School purposes. The cornerstone was found to be crumbling away so a new one was laid. A neat stone was prepared and a copper box placed within containing a bible, Sunday School journal, brief history of the congregation, names of present officers of organizations, the Bruning Booster, an envelope containing a dollar and a Lord's Prayer medal with the request that it be presented to the first baby born in Bruning immediately

after opening of the box.

1923

90 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) The Belvidere and Bruning Commercial Clubs are not satisfied with the condition of the Meridian Highway leading into these two villages and will make an effort to improve this condition. Here's hopin'.

At a recent census taken of the Belvidere Consolidated district the fact was presented that we have 195 pupils of school age in the district, 10 more than last year.

1933

80 Years Ago

(The Alexandria Argus) The first annual commencement of the Alexandria high school took place at the Proctor's Opera House on June 7, 1894. One of the four who graduated, Jessie Duncan, has remained in Alexandria, and married Edwin Woltemath, who was graduated in 1898. They have raised a family of four, all of whom have graduated from the Alexandria High School — Charles D. and Howard graduating in 1928, Edgar in 1921, and Mary Lena in 1933.

Another family whose entire family has graduated from Alexandria High School includes Melvin Brinegar who graduated under Superintendent Warren Cook; Mrs. Melvin Brinegar under Superintendent Geo. Oberlander and their only son, Thomas, under Superintendent John Speedle in 1933.

John Remer of Ewing, who came here for treatment of heart disease, went quietly to sleep at his cabin at the park.

Contracts were signed recently in which Fred Casper of Bruning leases the Alexandria Filling Station, which has been leased by John Klossner for the past 13 months.

For the first time in this section of the country, a loud speaker system was used for the benefit of those unable to get into the church. The speaker system was used for the funeral of Miner Dill at Belvidere.

William Hawks was the first to start combining in the community. His sample tested 55. He estimated the field would yield from 7 to 12 bushels per acre. No. 2 wheat was being quoted at 72 cents per bushel.

Over 2,100 gallons of free gasoline became available to motorists, tourists and farmers south of Strang where a large gas truck overturned on Highway 81. Everyone was invited to help themselves to the gasoline as it was pouring from the tank onto the ground.

1943

70 Years Ago

Jack Houts of Hebron wrote describing life in India.

Eldon Hawkins of Deshler, who was in the fight at Guadalcanal, two years before, helping to down 35 planes, when a torpedo man on a destroyer, came home from the government hospital at Oakland, on a furlough. He lost his left eye and his left leg, but took it all philosophically.

Mrs. Wilbert Jensen of Carleton received word that her husband, serving in the U.S. Army in Africa, had been taken prisoner by the Germans. He had been reported missing since January.

Understanding Heat Illnesses

During the summer months, many of us may be required to work outdoors in the heat for long periods. When the human body is unable to maintain a normal temperature, heat-related illnesses can occur and may become life threatening.

Being exposed to hot and humid conditions puts you at risk for heat illnesses, especially if you are doing heavy tasks or using bulky protective clothing and equipment. Some people are at greater risk than others because they have not built up a tolerance to hot conditions.

Your body normally cools itself by sweating. During hot weather, especially with high humidity, sweating isn't enough. Body temperature can rise to dangerous levels if precautions are not taken. Heat illnesses range from heat rash and heat cramps to heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

Heat stroke is the most severe of all heat-related injuries. It happens when the body temperature is elevated dramatically and the body has lost its ability to sweat and cool down. Heat stroke is a medical emergency and can be fatal if not promptly and properly treated.

Symptoms of heat stroke vary, but may include confusion, rapid pulse, feeling faint or dizzy, vomiting, difficulty breathing, and the absence of sweating. The skin may become hot red or flushed dry skin.

Most people that develop heat stroke have no idea they're in danger because they are not thinking clearly. If you suspect someone is experiencing heat stroke, call 911 immediately. You should also move the person inside or into the shade and try to cool them off as quickly as possible.

You should remove extra clothing, applying cool compresses and fan them. If available, apply ice packs to the neck, groin and armpits to speed cooling. If the person is able to drink, offer them fluids every 15 minutes. However, do not offer fluids if they are vomiting. Heat exhaustion is the next most serious heat-related health problem.

The signs and symptoms of heat exhaustion are headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness, irritability, confusion, thirst, heavy sweating and a body temperature greater than 100.4° F. Workers with heat exhaustion should be removed from the hot area and given liquids to drink. Remove unnecessary clothing including shoes and socks. Cool the person with cold compresses

to the head, neck, and face or have the worker wash his or her head, face and neck with cold water. Encourage frequent sips of cool water.

Heat cramps are muscle pains usually caused by physical labor in a hot work environment. Heat cramps are caused by the loss of body salts and fluid during sweating. Workers with heat cramps should replace fluid loss by drinking water and/or carbohydrate-electrolyte replacement liquids (e.g., sports drinks) every 15 to 20 minutes.

Heat Rash is the most common problem in hot environments. Heat rash is caused by sweating and looks like a red cluster of pimples or small blisters. Heat rash usually appears on the neck, upper chest, in the groin, under the breasts and in elbow creases. The best treatment for heat rash is to provide a cooler, less humid work environment. The rash area should be kept dry. Powder may be applied to increase comfort. Ointments and creams should not be used on a heat rash. Anything that makes the skin warm or moist may make the rash worse.

How can heat illness be prevented? Remember three simple words: water, rest, shade. Drink water often, taking breaks, and limit your time in the heat to prevent heat illness. When working outdoors in the heat, plan for an emergency and know what to do - acting quickly can save lives.

FSA County Committee Nomination Period Has Begun

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced recently that the nomination period for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees began on Monday, June 17.

"I encourage all eligible farmers and ranchers to participate in this year's county committee elections by nominating candidates by the August 1 deadline," said Vilsack. "County committees are a vital link between the farm community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture and provide an opportunity to farmers and ranchers for their opinions and ideas to be heard. We have been seeing an increase in the number of nominations of women and

minority candidates and I hope that trend continues."

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others, and organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign the nomination form, FSA-669A. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available online at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections>. Nomination forms for the 2013 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1, 2013. Elections will take place this fall.

While FSA county committees do not approve or deny farm ownership or operating loans, they make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other agricultural issues.

Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to 11 members that are elected by eligible producers.

FSA will mail ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 4. The voted ballots are due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by Dec. 2. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office on Jan. 1, 2014.


Rauner Attends State Workshop

Harry Stradley was Lucky Stradley's father-in-law. Raku pottery is pottery that has been bisque fired and then glazed, then placed into a Raku kiln and left for approximately an hour. Then the pottery is placed in a reduction chamber. This can be a metal trash can containing combustible material such as wood, leaves, etc., and left for 15-90 minutes. The smoke contributes to changing the colors and patterns of the Raku pottery. The interesting thing of the Raku style is the random effects one can obtain.
