Historical Society presents weddings past and present

Thayer County Historical Society members Carol Wassenaar and Annette Laber are busy putting the finishing touches on the "Local Weddings" display.

Featuring wedding gowns from historical to present day, the display seeks to showcase the clothing used during weddings in Nebraska. Gowns worn by brides with ties to Thayer County will be displayed.

Wassenaar and Laber worked together three years ago when they brought to the museum a display featuring wedding gowns through the decades. The present display will focus more on gowns worn in the local area. As always, historical dresses owned by the museum will also be on display bringing the total to 79 dresses. Each dress is displayed in its own area.

"We also have four displays featuring three generations of dresses," Wassenaar said, "while the featured dress for the entire show is our newest entry from 2011." The most historical dress dates 132 years ago, from 1879.

The gowns will be on display every Sunday and Wednesday from 2-4 p.m. through the month July beginning Wednesday, July 6. All museum buildings will be open for viewing during the display dates. For private showings, appointments can be made by calling the museum at 402-768-2147.

Let the sweltering begin

The National Weather Service says Hebron will see temperatures reach the upper 90s, even crossing the century mark through July 4. With the upcoming holiday weekend, lots of outdoor activities are planned in the local area. For Hebron's 'Fourth of July' celebration, see the schedule at left.

According to NWS heat is the number one weather-related killer in the United States. Statistical data shows that heat causes more fatalities per year than floods, lightning, tornadoes and hurricanes combined. Based on the 10-year average from 2000 to 2009, excessive heat claims an average of 162 lives a year. By contrast, hurricanes killed 117; floods 65; tornadoes, 62;

and lightning, 48.

NWS issues heat alerts based on heat index values, or how hot it really feels. That figure is determined by factoring in the relative humidity with the actual air temperature. NWS initiates alerts when the heat index is expected to exceed 105-110 degrees for at least two consecutive days.

Heat alerts are issued as a warning that conditions are favorable for possible heat disorders such as cramps, exhaustion and stroke. Drinking plenty of fluids, resting in the shade, swimming, or seeking out an air-conditioned building are the best solutions for combating heat disorders which can affect anyone at any age.

Davenport correspondent sets aside typewriter

If you reside in Davenport, chances are you've received a call from Carol Lowery, longtime correspondent for the Hebron Journal-Register. She no doubt wanted to know if you had any news to report, if you'd been doing or had seen anything of interest, or if you were planning an activity and wanted to get the word out.

Lowery, who has been calling the folks of Davenport to find out the latest news since November of 1997, is calling it quits: "Because I have a lot to do," she said in a recent interview. "I'm 82 years old and who knows how much longer I'll be here, and I have a few things I want to get done."

Like teach her granddaughter how to make an apple pie or simply sit a spell on a Saturday morning without making telephone calls.

"That's when I collected my news," she said. "I made my calls every Saturday morning. I think people were getting tired of me calling - there are lots of people who don't put news in, but there are still many who do."

Lowery, who still uses an electric typewriter, said she used two principles when relating news in her column. "I never put in anything where I haven't called the person who the story was about and I never put in anything discussed during coffee conversations or about doctor appointments."

She started writing for the *Hebron Journal-Register* in November of 1997, when the correspondent at that time, Leona Meers, became ill. "Shirley Keim and I took over the column," Lowery said, "and we used our first check to buy something nice for Leona to wear in her casket." Meers died in April 1998.

Lowery said she and Keim worked together for about three months before Lowery went on her own. "Shirley didn't care for calling people all the time," she said, "so I continued

on my own."

A farm wife and mother of two sons, Lowery spent all of her years in the Davenport area and she said she and her husband, Wendell, rarely leave h o m e .

"We never go anywhere," she said, which is why she could make calls Saturday mornings without fail.

She was a school teacher right out of high school, then married Wendell in 1950 before he was sent to Korea. The couple have six grandchildren and one great-grandchild with another great-grandchild on the way.

During the time when she was raising her own two sons, she joined with Nana Ficken in a catering business at Davenport. "We ran a licensed kitchen for 25 years," she said.

Carol said she really hated to quit not because of the locals, but because of those who live away from the area. "The locals gave me the stories to write, but it was those who live outside the county and out of state, who did most of the reading. They are the reason I didn't want to stop."

"I am going to miss it, the phone calls, the talks with people, the news they have to share, but I need to take some time for myself right now."



Alexandria State Recreation Area, located three miles east and one mile south of Alexandria, is abuzz with activity.


There are six pairs of Canadian geese, three have goslings and it is fun to watch little balls of fluff grow into feathered adults.

My Thoughts Exactly

You just can't live here without paying attention to the weather – it's wicked changeability is a constant when it comes to making summer plans, especially if your activities are outdoors.

Monday, the day before the beginning of summer, marked not only one of those really hot days – at 2 p.m., the temperature was 93 degrees, but factor in the 73-degree dew point and it felt like 102 degrees – but also one of those changeable days. It was one of those days best spent indoors closely tending the current weather reports since the changes were predicted to be especially severe.

Turned out to be true as reports on Tuesday indicated a host of tornados all over the state. We came away unscathed around here, but there were some mighty powerful storms hitting all around us. The border between Nebraska and Iowa got hit with a deluge of water; a commodity not really needed right now as the Missouri River continues to cut a new, wider swath through the landscape.

Sometimes it's difficult to imagine how vast weather-related emergencies can be until you're given a familiar reference point to make it logical in your own mind. Mine came three weeks ago when I saw news reports of the "Labor" statue along the Omaha river walk chest deep in water. The salute to labor artwork consisting of five individual eight-foot tall statues sits atop a 10-12-foot high wall normally at the water's edge. Now it sits in the water meaning the Missouri has risen 16-18 feet in that area alone.

This week while communities along the river contend with the overabundance of water, we'll be contending with dangerous heat indexes. Be careful out there during this holiday weekend and Happy Fourth of July.

Firework Safety With Our Children

The Fourth of July is a great American holiday. Fireworks have become part of the annual celebrations shared with family and friends. When used in accordance with their instructions, fireworks can be a safe part of any celebration.

While Americans usage of fireworks has shown a dramatic increase nationwide in the past 20 years, fireworks related injuries have actually decreased during this same period. This decrease is attributed to programs designed to educate the public on firework safety.

Still even with this decrease, even one injury is one too many. Sadly it is often the small children who suffer the most. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, approximately 16 percent of all consumer fireworks injuries are caused by sparklers burning young hands and legs. This is not surprising when you learn that a simple sparkler can reach a temperature of up to 2,000°. That's over 15 times the boiling point of water and yet we give them to small children to handle.

In fact, sparkler injuries account for a third of all firework injuries to children five years old or younger. This number may actually be much higher because this figure only reflects those injuries that are reported. Sparkler injuries are accidents that should not have occurred if close adult supervision and some basic safety steps were followed. Here are a few basic safety tips to make sparklers safe and help prevent

needless injuries:

- Always use sparklers under close adult supervision
 - Children should not light sparklers
 - Always keep a bucket of water nearby in case of emergencies.
 - Only use sparklers outdoors
 - Always remain standing while using sparklers
 - Never hold a child in your arms while using sparklers
 - Never hold, or light more than one sparkler at a time.
 - Sparklers and bare feet can be a painful combination.
 - Sparkler wires remain hot long after the flame goes out
 - Never hand a lighted sparkler to another person.
 - Always stand at least 6 feet from another person
 - Never throw a sparkler
 - Show children how to keep a sparkler at arms length
 - Teach children not to run while holding sparklers
- Prevention is the key to eliminating sparkler injuries. When planning your Fourth of July celebration, please think safety and always read and follow the instructions printed on any fireworks you plan to use. Thayer County Health Services wants everyone to have a safe and happy Fourth of July.



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
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Your Guide To A Perfect Wedding

10 Trends for 'Green' Weddings

Environmentally friendly ideals are now permeating all aspects of daily living. Many people want to take the concept further and ensure their nuptials -- and subsequent reception -- are good for the planet as well.

Although there are no firm statistics on the number of green weddings being held each year, emerging trends point to the growing interest in eco-conscious weddings. Individuals who already do their best to recycle, reuse and reduce want to employ those same values on their wedding day.

3. Shop for floral alternatives. Flowers would seem "green" in themselves. However, many blooms available at florist shops are grown in hothouses with the use of pesticides and chemical fertilizers, something that is not very good for the environment at all. Brides opting for something more eco-conscious could consider alternative options, such as bouquets made of sustainable succulent plants and centerpieces full of organic fruits and wildflowers.
4. Choose an open registry. Instead of fine china that may never be used, many couples are opting for open registries that enable guests to gift everything from eco-friendly housewares to charitable donations to cash for down payments on a home.
5. Opt for mixed seating arrangements: Instead of formal escort cards indicating firm seating arrangements, couples are saving paper by allowing guests to choose their own seats from mix-matched options, such as long, communal benches and comfy sofas.
6. Go with something old. Recycled gowns and gently used items are good alternatives for eco-conscious brides. Many Web sites will match up brides with others looking to swap items at low or no cost.
7. Skip the paper. Though etiquette experts frown on abandoning paper invitations for electronic ones, many couples are doing just that. For those who still prefer paper, print invitations on recycled paper. Reduce other wedding stationery needs by posting information on a wedding Web site shared with family and friends.
8. Go small scale. Instead of inviting every last cousin and distant uncle, couples are opting for more intimate affairs, including only the people they are closest to, which saves on cost and helps the environment.
9. Trim some of the wedding day fat. Some couples opt for an all-you-can-eat buffet and then a subsequent dessert bar later on in the evening. Stuffed guests may end up wasting more food than eating it. Instead of all-you-can, go for a more traditional meal.
10. Choose a charitable party favor. Instead of a party favor that collects dust on a shelf, couples are choosing to gift with organic products or a donation to a charitable organization in the guests' names.

Fairness



If a king judges the poor with equity his throne will be established forever.

R.S.V. Proverbs 29:14

The American Heritage dictionary defines the word "fair" as "having or exhibiting a disposition that is free of favoritism or bias; impartial." Jews living in Palestine at the time of Jesus thought very poorly of Samaritans, who were considered "half-breeds" (i.e., Jews who had married with the non-Jewish natives of Samaria), and so when Jesus tells the parable of the good Samaritan he is trying to tell his disciples that even these people who were habitually thought of as contemptible might behave better than the so-called paragons of virtue within their own culture. On another occasion, Jesus' willingness to speak to the Samaritan woman at the well is a further lesson in giving up one's cultural bias in favor of fairness or impartiality, since not only is she a Samaritan, but even worse, she was a woman at a time when women were thought unworthy of a man's conversation. So, we should take a lesson from Jesus and treat everyone with fairness and impartiality.

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Annual Checkup Saves Buresh's Life — Twice

Ellen Buresh is amazing. She can do it all – from baking cookies to hauling grain. She and her husband of 50 years, Mike, have been farming south of Davenport on the Little Blue River since they were married. The old, two-story farmhouse that they have remodeled over the last five decades sits on a sizeable acreage where Ellen takes great pride in doing the mowing and gardening. She is a mother to four, a grandmother to ten and a breast cancer survivor. In her words, “We’re busy and we like it that way.”

Dr. Hubl told Ellen that she needed to see Dr. Keith Miller, a cardiologist from BryanLGH Heart Institute, right away. Four days later, she was at the Thayer County Clinic, waiting to see Dr. Miller on one of his regular trips to Hebron.

Ellen says she will always remember her first meeting with Dr. Miller. “He came through the door and the first thing out of his mouth was, ‘This is exactly what killed John Ritter, and I’m not going to let it happen to you.’”

She traveled to Lincoln for tests and a heart cath. Next was a meeting with Dr. Ed Raines, cardiothoracic surgeon, BryanLGH Heart Institute. “Dr. Raines just puts you so at ease”, says Ellen of the man who would replace her aorta and aortic valve.

Three weeks after Dr. Hubl had found the heart murmur, Ellen was at BryanLGH

recovering from open-heart surgery. She spent one week in the hospital to stabilize her oxygen and blood pressure. “When it was time to go home, I felt so good, I thought I had gotten the blood of a ten year-old” says Ellen.

On her most recent appointment with Dr. Miller, Ellen had one burning question. “Can I drive a truck yet?” The answer was yes. And yes, she can mow and till her garden.

Two days after that appointment, Ellen’s elderly mother passed away. She was in her 90’s and living in a nursing home. Ellen says, “It’s been hard – since I saw her through lots of ups and downs. She would sometimes joke and say ‘put me in a box’. I think if Dr. Hubl hadn’t said, ‘let’s do an echocardiogram’, I may have beaten my mother to the box.”

On Oct. 27, 2010, Ellen reported to her doctor’s office for her annual, routine checkup. “I have a physical every year,” says Ellen. “I am faithful about it. I really believe it is important.” Case in point – at her annual physical two years ago, breast cancer was detected in the early, most treatable stage.

Unbeknownst to her, on this fall day in 2010, her annual physical would once again be the first step in saving her life. Dr. Bryan Hubl, family practice, Thayer County Health Services, detected a heart murmur in Ellen that hadn’t been there before. He immediately ordered an echocardiogram. The results showed that Ellen had an aortic aneurysm five centimeters dilated. She was surprised. She felt fine. No chest pain. No shortness of breath. “My husband says he thought I spent a little more time in my recliner than usual, but I didn’t notice it.”





Drink Plenty of Water in Summertime Heat

It's summertime and the weather is heating up. When the temperature rises outside, the body tries to cool itself by sweating. The concern is that if you don't drink enough fluids, dehydration can occur.

Babies and small children feel the effects of heat faster and more seriously than adults, so keeping them hydrated is essential.

Nearly 60 percent of the human body is made of water according to Elena Serrano at Virginia Tech Cooperative Extension. Dehydration is a result of loss of water and salts from the body.

The early stages of dehydration are hard to detect because they have no signs or symptoms. But watch for two key signs - dryness of the mouth and thirst. As dehydration increases the following signs may become noticeable:

- increased thirst

- a flushed face
- reduced amounts of urine production
- dark, yellow urine
- irritability
- irrational behavior
- dizziness
- cramping in the arms and legs

Though dehydration can be a serious threat in hot weather, it's easily avoidable if enough water is consumed. A common rule is to drink water before you get thirsty.

Set a goal to pick a few times throughout the day to drink a glass of water. Don't wait until you are thirsty because by that point you've already let your body become dehydrated.

It's also important to realize that caffeine and alcohol dehydrate your body. So if you are drinking coffee, tea, sodas, or alcohol you need to drink more water to help keep your body properly hydrated.
