## Hebron Bear memorial reconstructed...

Ron Williams, owner of Williams Drilling, has been working for the past six weeks with community and family members to work on the pit surrounding the Hebron Bear at Roosevelt Park. Workers took down the "old fish pond," put up new block, filled it with sand, covered it with rocks and remounted the statue. The project was finished the Friday before Memorial Day. "I've had lots of compliments on it," said Williams. Williams took on the renovations because it was a passionate subject of his late wife, Marcia, who wanted to see it fixed. The bronze bear was purchased by and dedicated to the alumni of Hebron High School; the bear was the mascot for the school. In 1932, Coach Ed Pallett gave the Hebron High sports teams the title of the Bears. Then, while attending the Chicago World's Fair in 1933, Pallett spoke to members of the Wisconsin Game Commission asking for a bear to be part of the Hebron scene. A short time later, Jimmy arrived by Railway Express. Pallett took Jimmy to most of the football games to draw a crowd. Opposing teams often advertised as well to have a good turnout. ## Small Business Administration offers disaster assistance

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) will be stationed at the Thayer County Courthouse until Thursday, June 11, for any individuals or businesses looking for disaster assistance.

SBA has low-interest federal loans available to businesses and residents who were affected by early May's severe storm and flooding. "We're here to help," said Kevin

Wynne, SBA public information officer. "Even if you don't think you have damage, let us see what we can do for you."

Loans up to \$200,000 are available to homeowners to repair damaged real estate with 1.688 percent interest.

Homeowners and renters can get up to \$40,000 to repair or replace

## Bruning community members develop strategic plan for Leadership Certification

Members of the Bruning community met last Wednesday evening at the Bruning Opera House to create a strategic plan for the next five to ten years in the future.

Bruning, along with Hebron, Chester and Deshler, is applying for County Wide Leadership Certification with the help of Jeremy Voss, Thayer County Economic Development Alliance director, who facilitated the meeting.

By obtaining Leadership Certification, the town will be eligible for financial assistance in order to further the long term betterment of the community.

In order to become certified, the community must provide a comprehensive plan which Bruning already has, a strategic plan, a community assessment which was done last year through a county wide survey, a write up of the services the community provides "and you need the will to go forward and do these things," said Voss.

After discussing the needs of the village, the group decided that the top three priorities were housing, civil infrastructure and social infrastructure.

Under these three broad sections, more specific improvements were

pointed out such as increase of day care capabilities, quality rental and housing properties, recreation opportunities such as a trail, water and sewage infrastructure, street improvement, better internet and cellular services, and business retention and attraction.

In order to get a different perspective of the community, an outside consultant created a SWOT analysis for Bruning.

"[SWOT stands for] strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats to your community," said Voss. "It's coming from the outside [but] from someone who is familiar with the area."

Bruning's strengths, according to the analysis, includes quality of life, low cost of living and excellent community leadership; weaknesses include lack of population, housing, and lack of younger leadership; opportunities include location near major highways, access to land and need for a workforce; threats include lack of business retention, inactivity instead of productivity toward change, and lack of capital.

The Bruning community members and TCEDA plan to utilize those strengths and opportunities and work through the weaknesses and threats in order to move forward in becoming certified.

## Thayer County residents arrested for kidnapping

Three men from Thayer County were arrested for suspected child abduction in Macon County, Mo., after a report of parental child abduction was made in Quincy, Mo.

Police were called to the mother's residence Friday, May 22, at 10:25 p.m. She informed police her children, ages one and two, were taken by their father, Christopher Loupin, 24, of Deshler. She believed they were heading to Nebraska.

Around midnight that night, the Highway Patrol stopped a vehicle matching the description given to them by Quincy police.

The Highway Patrol reported that both children were safe and the other occupants of the car were in custody.

Loupin was arrested on suspicion of child abduction. The grandfather of the two children, Eddy Loupin, 52, of Deshler, and Lee Fowler, 33, also of Deshler, were taken into custody. They are accused of aiding and abetting a child abduction.

All three are being held at the Macon County Sheriff's Department on a \$500,000 bond.

# Pages of the Past...

## 1885

### 130 Years Ago

An immense amount of prairie is being broken in this county this year, and thousands of acres are being fenced.

W. A. Williams has the basement walls of his new hotel in Belvidere built. The hotel is to be 28x40 feet in size, with a basement and will be two stories high.

The cloud heretofore existing on lands in this county formerly included in the grant to the Midland Pacific, has been removed and the chain of title perfected by the recent recording of several lengthy deeds.

F. H. Rudd is making improvements in the machinery of his steam stone-sawing works and will soon be ready to furnish, in quantities, beautiful magnesia building rock, cut to dimensions. We believe there is a fortune in this enterprise if rightly conducted.

On Wednesday morning at 6 o'clock, the stable of ex-sheriff M. S. Ferguson, on Dry Creek, was struck by lightning and burned. The electric bolt killed his two horses. This is a heavy blow for Mr. Ferguson as the team was a valuable one and will be hard to replace.

Malowney & Wilson are completing their system of water works, projected some time since. Upon an addition to their warehouse is a tank of 300 barrels capacity. The top of the tank is considerably higher than their main building. The tower supporting the windmill stands still high, the windmill being at a height of 45 feet above the ground. When completed a system of pipes will be laid through the building and grounds, affording plenty of water under pressure for all purposes, especially for protection against fire.

We understand some parties are catching fish in the Little Blue River with seines and nets. Don't do so, boys. You not only violate a wise and beneficial law of the state, but you thereby injure, to a greater or less extent, the rights of every citizen to catch fish with a hook or line, selfishly taking more than your share and engaging in an unportsmanlike method of fishing that, if generally engaged in, would soon exterminate the fish. Remember that fish constitute one of the natural food supplies to which all citizens are alike entitled.

The new schoolhouse at Alexandria is a fine building, and would have an imposing effect, if it had been built on high ground or even had a higher foundation.

The stone walls of the Hebron Packing House are completed and ready for the brick superstructure. The contract for the excavating of the basement and the building of the smokehouse has been let.

While putting a large piece of ice in the refrigerator at the butcher shop a few days ago, John McManus had the misfortune to slip and fall directly on the sausage cutter, making one of the longest cuts known to surgery in his back. As he slipped downward, the cut extended from the hips to above the shoulder blades and in depth to the ribs to the side of the spinal column. Considerable excitement was caused from the loss of blood, but after his wounds were closed, he became quite comfortable.

## 1895

### 120 Years Ago

About 30 Hebron young men wheeled it to Nelson last Saturday.

Hulda Rosenberger, a woman 85 years of age, died at the poor farm last Saturday. The funeral services were held Sunday, with interment in the poor farm cemetery.

Died, May 29th, Mrs. Clara Mitchell, of consumption, at the home of her sister, Mrs. R. R. Sanford. Mrs. Mitchell leaves a son, 11 years, and a daughter, 6 years of age.

Died, at her home in Hebron, May 30, Mrs. E. A. Chilson, of apoplexy.

The row in Alexandria last week, in which knives, fence posts, and oaths were promiscuously used, terminated this week by being brought into court. The participants vented their feelings by having one another arrested.

The home of C. Dumdi

on Dry Creek is filled with mourning over the sudden and fatal accident to their son, Louie Dumdi, a fine young man, about 22 years of age, was severely shot in the shoulder last fall, was yesterday morning at about 10 o'clock, kicked in the stomach by both hind feet of a horse. He survived the accident but a few hours. Funeral services will be conducted this morning by Rev. S. Cooke.

The Little Blue River has been on a toot this week. On Wednesday it became full and soon overflowed its banks. Only once has the Little Blue been higher than this week. The overflow is said to be due to heavy rains in the vicinity of Blue Hill, where seven inches of rainfall is reported. Much damage was done to gardens in the low land along the river banks. A few days ago it was feared the garden vegetables would be killed as a result of the drouth. Now many gardens will be ruined from an over-supply of moisture. Among the heaviest losers are Cash Gates and Boyes Brothers, whose gardens are completely submerged by the water. The mill stopped running and travel to and from the mill was made by boats. The city pump house was surrounded by water. Owing to the fact that the pumps could not work, and the danger of a water famine in case of fire, the mayor and chief of the fire department had a consultation, and ordered the water to be shut off and retained in the standpipe until the pumps can furnish the needed supply.

## 1905

### 110 Years Ago

Sheriff Hensel quarantined some smallpox cases southwest of Stoddard yesterday.

Win Wood went to Lincoln a week ago, and in competition with others, had his plans accepted for an exposition building for poultry at the state fair grounds.

Frank Zong of Belvidere precinct called for his coupon the first of the week. About three years ago Mr. Zong sold his farm near Daykin and purchased the Brinegar farm two miles east and one mile south of Belvidere and says he is well pleased with his neighborhood. Wm. R. Miller, who moved from Gardner, Ill., to the colony on Dry Creek with the Easton's Scovilles, and other good Illinois families, called for his coupon Wednesday. He has lived on this farm about 21 years, so is well able to vote.

Miss Gertrude Luxton of Kansas City is the new night girl at the central telephone office.

Ed Armstrong of Spring Creek has bought the old Kitt Farm of Dr. Newman.

The river was out of the banks again the first of the week.

A small jimmycane about 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon did some damage, besides striking terror to the hearts of those who saw the funnel-shaped cloud. It started on the M. G. Corliss farm, where it blew down the barn. Going north to the Ellison farm, it blew down another vacant barn. Crossing the river it struck the Fuller place and scooped the shingles from off the comb of the roof and tipped over some outbuildings. Here the tornado went to pieces, having traveled about two miles. It is also reported that at the Hammond farm, three quarters of a mile north of Belvidere, about 6 o'clock Sunday evening, a shed was upset, a corn-crib destroyed, a telephone pole blown out of the ground, and about 70 feet of wire fence torn down. A peculiar freak of the wind's force was seen a mile east of there, where a cedar tree was blown out of the ground, but nothing else destroyed.

Carter, H. E. Bozarth departed this week with his wife for an extended trip to Idaho, Wash., Calif., and on to Missouri, where they may locate.

## 1925

### 90 Years Ago

The referee sale of the L. Albert farm, north of Bruning, and the store building in town was held. John Hasch of Bruning purchased the quarter section for \$12,200. Fred Hinkle was high bidder of the Bruning business property for \$925. The sales were expected to be confirmed by District Judge Proudfit at the present term of court in session in Hebron.

Members and friends of the Baptist church have been busy this week unloading cars of tile and brick for their new church. The basement walls are practically finished and the work proper will soon begin on the new church structure.

Fred Komorek and Gus Shenansgruber autoed up near Julesburg, Colo., where Gus traded his farm near Davenport for Colorado land. The Colorado land was the property of Mr. Jennings of Davenport. They report crop prospects excellent in that part of Colorado and encountered rain and mud on most of their journey.

The four children of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Higel hitched their pony to a buggy and drove to the Trinity church to practice for the Children's Day program. On the return home, the pony became frightened at a tin box laying beside the road and ran away. He left the road and ran the buggy into an embankment, throwing Melvin over the fence and he alighted considerable distance from the buggy. Adeline fell into the shafts and Edward under the pony. Laverne, the youngest, alone remained in the buggy. Adeline had her wrist sprained, which was the more serious injury to the children, while the vehicle was slightly damaged.

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## National Men's Health Month

June is National Men's Health Month; a month to raise awareness about preventable health problems facing men. Health professionals know that early detection and treatment is critical when dealing with any preventable health issue. The challenge with most men is getting them to see a doctor at all, let alone on a regular basis.

All ten of the ten leading causes of death as defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) affect men more than they affect women. The National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) reviewed the leading causes of death among men and found the majority of causes had links to preventable, lifestyle-related behaviors, such as poor nutrition and smoking.

According to the CDC, women are 100 percent more likely to schedule an appointment for their annual examinations and preventive services than men. Men need to be encouraged to have the preventive test necessary to help find diseases early, when they're easiest to treat.

Men should talk to their healthcare provider about which preventive medical tests they should have to stay healthy. The following are a few steps men can do to help prevent disease and stay healthy:

- **Body Mass Index - or BMI,** is a measure of your body fat based on your height and weight. Your doctor can help you determine your BMI or there are many charts available.

- **Cholesterol:** Men over 35 (or at age 20 if you have risk factors like diabetes, history of heart disease, tobacco use, high blood pressure, or BMI of 30 or over), should have their cholesterol checked regularly. High blood cholesterol is one of the major risk factors for heart disease.

- **Blood Pressure:** Men should have their blood pressure checked at least every two years. High blood pressure increases the chance of getting heart or kidney disease and for having a stroke. Men with



high blood pressure, may need medication to control it.

- **Cardiovascular Disease:** Beginning at age 45 and through age 79, men should talk with their doctor about taking an aspirin every day to help lower their risk of a heart attack. How much aspirin depends on the person's age, health, and lifestyle.

- **Colorectal Cancer:** Beginning at age 50 and through 75, men should get tested for colorectal cancer. Talk to your doctor to decide which test is best. Men with a family history of colorectal cancer need to be tested before they turn 50.

- **Other Cancers:** Men should discuss with their healthcare provider on whether they should be tested for prostate, lung, oral, skin, or other cancers.

- **Depression:** Men, who have experience a feeling of hopelessness or have little or no interest in doing things they usually enjoy, should talk to their doctor about depression. Depression is a treatable illness.

- **Diabetes:** Men who have a blood pressure higher than 135/80, should ask their doctor to test them for diabetes. Diabetes, or high blood sugar, can cause problems with your heart, eyes, feet, kidneys, nerves, and other body parts.

- **Tobacco Use:** Men who smoke or use tobacco, should talk to their doctor about quitting. There are also test smokers can have done to help diagnose lung cancer.

Recognizing and preventing men's health problems is not just a man's issue. It also affects the women in their lives. It's a known fact that women have a strong influence on their family's health and lifestyle choices. Call your health provider to schedule an appointment to discuss what preventive tests are right for you.

## Emergency Conservation Program signup

The May 6-7 flooding has caused severe damage in Thayer County. Farms and ranches suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) administered by the Thayer County Farm Service Agency if the damage:

- Will be so costly to rehabilitate that Federal assistance is or will be needed to return the land to productive agricultural use;
- Is unusual and is not the type that would recur frequently in the same area;
- Affect the productive capacity of the farmland;
- Will impair or endanger the land.

A producer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels not to exceed 75 percent of the eligible cost of restoration measures. No producer is eligible for more than \$200,000 cost sharing per natural disaster occurrence. The following types of measures may be eligible:

- EC1 – removing debris from farmland;
- EC2 – grading, shaping, leveling or similar measures;
- EC3 – restoring permanent

fences;

- EC4 – restoring conservation structures and other installations.

Producers who have suffered a loss from the flooding may contact the Thayer County FSA Office and request assistance from May 26, 2015 to July 24, 2015.

To be eligible for assistance, practices must not be started until all of the following are met:

- An application for cost-share has been filed;
- The Thayer County FSA County Committee or its representative has conducted an on site inspection of the damaged area;
- The Agency responsible for technical assistance, such as the Natural Resource Conservation Service, has made a needs determination, which may include cubic yards of earth moving, etc., required for rehabilitation.

## Thayer County Emergency Alerting and Notification

Thayer County is in the process of implementing a new notification system that will enable us to issue emergency alerts to warn citizens of severe weather, fire, hazardous materials, need for immediate evacuation, civil danger or local area emergency.

These emergency alerts can be broadcast on your television or radios through the Emergency Alert System (EAS), delivered as a Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) text message to your cell phone, or as a voice call to your land line.

Thayer County residents and businesses can also register to receive community notifications, such as school or road closures, through other communication modes such as email or standard text message

to their cellphones.

While the system was still being configured and in training mode, some residents received a community notification for a road closure as a voice call to their land line. (In the future, voice alerts to your home land line phones will be delivered in the event of an emergency.)
