Stolen vehicle recovered in Fairbury

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Department apprehended a suspected car thief June 1 after an off-duty police officer noticed the stolen vehicle in Fairbury. The car, a 2008 Pontiac Grand Prix, had been stolen the night before by Gary Aldrich, II, 26, of Wichita, from the Subway parking lot in Hebron.

On May 31, the Thayer County LEC received a report of a vehicle being stolen from the restaurant parking lot at approximately 11:50 p.m. Sheriff's deputies immediately

responded and after meeting with the victim, discovered a stolen 2001 Oldsmobile Alero parked in the parking lot. It was later determined that Aldrich had abandoned the Alero and taken the Grand Prix.

Jefferson County Sheriff Nels Sorenson said Aldrich was arrested and charged with possession of stolen property, a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia. Thayer County Sheriff David Lee said Aldrich will most likely face additional charges here and in Kansas.

Commissioners receive Livestock Friendly appeal

Thayer County Farm Bureau members Andy Schmidt and Gregg Wiedel visited with county leaders last week seeking support for making the county livestock friendly. Accompanied by Nebraska Department of Agriculture's Ag Promotion Coordinator Steve Martin and a few other members from both groups, Schmidt and Wiedel shared benefits to the county should it be designated livestock friendly.

"The point of this program is economic development," Martin said. "Livestock friendly means something; people are asking is this an ag friendly area. We have 26 designated counties in Nebraska now, and another five applying."

Commission president Dave Bruning said the board had looked into this issue a few years ago, even to the point of having a hearing, and it never happened. "I'm not against this, but back then you had 13 counties signed up, if I can remember correctly, and now you're saying you have 26. That's only 13 new counties in the last seven years or so. If this is so beneficial you'd think everyone would be jumping on the bandwagon."

Commissioner Chris Frye point blank asked Schmidt if he thought Thayer County was unfriendly right now.

"No," Schmidt said. "I just think this program is a good way to get our name out there. I do not consider us, Thayer County, an unfriendly county."

Turning back to economic development, Martin said the program is proving its worth as new ag businesses start up. "They are asking us where the ag friendly counties are," he said. An LFC designation tells livestock producers and related businesses that the county wants economic growth and will support their industry for years to come. This type of confidence helps businesses make long-term decisions about investing in and possibly expanding their operation, he said.

According to Nebraska DoA literature, the Livestock Friendly County program is a voluntary program that recognizes counties that actively support the livestock industry.

Frye expressed concern about zoning laws and possible changes to meet requested criteria for the program. "You guys have the last say-so of what happens in this county," Wiedel said. "You control your zoning. You still have control."

"The only thing we control is the program," Martin added.

The Department of Ag coordinator then quickly took the leaders through the 17-page application process.

The commissioners will look over the information and make a decision soon. The next step will be a public hearing.

The Livestock Friendly County program is a joint venture between the Nebraska Department of Agriculture, Nebraska Farm Bureau, and AFAN (Alliance for the Future of Agriculture in Nebraska).

Property valuation notices sent out

The Thayer County Assessor's office has completed the assessment rolls of agricultural land, residential, commercial, and industrial properties. Valuation notices have been sent to all property owners that had either an increase or decrease in valuation for 2014.

If a landowner has any questions in regard to their valuation, they are encouraged to visit the assessor's office. "Our staff will assist you with your concerns," said County Assessor Karla Joe and added that if a property owner disagrees with the assessed value, a protest may be filed with the County Board of Equalization. Protest instructions are contained on the notice of valuation change and are to be filed with the county clerk.





1884

130 Years Ago

A large acreage of prairie land in this county is being broken.

It is said C.F. Moore will soon build an elevator in Belvidere.

F.S. Baker has moved his office to his new lumber yard near the railroad.

R.A. McKenzie has purchased a lot opposite the Sherman house and built a new blacksmith shop.

The store of H.W. Cornell, Belvidere, was burglarized and \$25 in money and \$5 in goods taken.

County Treasurer H.C. Bigelow has commenced building an elegant residence on Fifth Street between Olive and Union avenues.

Livesay & Skipper has a large refrigerator made by J.R. Jones. It is well arranged for keeping meats and fruits fresh.

The Alexandria Herald makes several allusions to losses of parties to showgamblers and says: "A coterie of gamblers infested our town on the day of the show. As is usual they made it profitable to themselves and grievous to the 'smart' unsuspecting."

S.H. Coon is now duly installed in his elegant new drug store. In the ornamentation and furnishing of the inside neither expense nor attention has been spared. The ceiling is corrugated, running diagonally from side to center and has a novel and happy effect. The walls are richly covered with paper having a good background. Shelves and drawers are numerous and conveniently arranged. The counters are models of convenience, having glass panels and answering the purpose of unique and additional showcases. Gorgeous ornamentation, elegant showcases, a superb marble soda fountain and handsome goods make a brilliant appearance, and reflect much credit on Mr. Coon's taste and enterprise. The woodwork was done by Hughes & Phebus, and the handsome decorating was the work of Wm. VanWinkle and assistants.

Geo. M. Church, Charles Slade, and W.H. Barger have associated themselves together under the firm name of "The Skating Rink Company" and are building a rink south of the First National Bank. They expect to have it in running order in ten days.

The petition for a saloon in Davenport contained 37 names. It was opposed by one petition signed by 61 men remonstrants and another signed by 75 women remonstrants. The applicant concluded to withdraw his petition.

Hebron is to have a Fourth of July celebration on a large scale this year. About \$400 has been subscribed by the citizens.

We had expected to give our readers a full account of the memorial services here on Decoration Day, but the gentleman who was to have written it, has failed, on account of ill health, to bring it in. We have only space at this time to say the exercises were beautiful and impressive and the monument dedicated an imposing structure.

Born to Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Geisler of Friedensau, a son. Owing to puerperal convulsions and other complications, the young mother's life was almost despaired of, but at this writing she bids fairly to recover. Reported by Dr. C.M. Easton.

Geo. W. Loeber and family, recently of Chester, have become residents of Hebron. Mr. Loeber has entered into partnership with J.A. Bowdle in the real estate and loan business.

Married at Hastings, William T.S. Phebus and Miss Rachel Beauvie, both of Hebron.

F. Kingsley and family are attending the Seventh Day Adventists' camp meeting at Beatrice.

Belvidere

The stock of goods recently purchased by Dr. Piggott has changed hands again. The doctor concluded that he was too bashful to stand behind the counter, and have the young ladies gazing at him, so he considered it best to dispose of the entire stock at one fell swoop, and soon, in consideration of a good and sufficient warranty deed, for 100 acres of land, the doctor gave the whole business

into the hands of one W.W. Owen, who opened the store and is now selling goods cheap for cash, and doctor, the farmer boy of Town Four, rejoices in the possession of another farm, making 15 farms of a quarter section each.

The baseball club known as the "Harmony Shin Peelers," from Fillmore County, (having been challenged by the "Belvidere Blues") came down and took a whirl at the town boys, probably thinking they had a walk away. The B.B.'s got down to business and the score ended, B.B.'s score 34, H.S.P.'s score 25.

1894

120 Years Ago

Kockentiet shipped 500 loaves of bread from his bakery this week.

J.A. Willy, our music dealer, has been getting and disposing of quite a good number of Lakeside organs of late.

There are many censures being made on the playing of baseball games on Memorial Day. The day has become one of the most sacred annually celebrated, and all patriotic citizens should join in the memorial services held on that day in honor of the dead soldiers who rallied to the defense of the nation when its existence was imperilled by rebellion.

W.H. Kimber of Blue Springs is visiting in Hebron. He says that the King's Press Drill company is doing a big business, employing 25 men. And Hebron let that institution get away without an effort to retain it!

Quite a number went out to the Jackson schoolhouse to see Benjamin Young's industrial army. We are informed that the meeting was postponed to another time and place.

The fourth annual meeting of the Hebron High School Alumni Association was held.

Macaulay's assertion that "republics are ungrateful," and the statement so frequently heard that "patriotism is dying out in this nation," were met by refutation in the splendid celebration given in this city in honor of the dead soldiers of the war of the rebellion. Never before had the citizens of this city and vicinity turned out in such large numbers or took greater interest in the solemn and impressive ceremonies of the day. The mayor of the city had issued a proclamation requesting all business houses closed in the afternoon. The request was generally complied with and the national colors were profusely displayed.

The retirement of Mrs. L.C. Jones from the editorship of the Deshler Herald will be unwelcome news to her many friends.

W.W. Lichti is putting up an Aermotor windmill and elevated tank on his residence lots. We are informed he intends to lay pipes below ground to terminate in front of his drug store, where a hydrant will be put in for fire protection, also that the Citizens Bank, H.J. Miller and J.A. Bihler, will have the use of the water. A hydrant will also be placed on the line of the two last-named gentlemen, at the front of their stores.

Deshler

S.O. Burgess has abandoned his meat market at this place, and will move back to Hebron.

Master Rau, Mrs. Chris Barlett's brother, a lad of 12 years, arrived here. He made the trip from Germany alone, arriving safely and in excellent spirits.

Davenport

Mrs. Bonien died at her home near Kiowa from black measles.

Mr. and Mrs. Schroeder, living southeast of Davenport, were called upon to suffer a trial that few experience. The first of the week they buried an infant child, and on Friday a little girl five years old was called to rest. On Saturday, a third child, ages

two years, was taken away, thus robbing them entirely of the little sunbeams that brightened their pathway.

Wm. Render will open a saloon on the west side of Johnson Avenue.

The horse race between H.P. Owen's "Crescent" and Wm. Ward's "Sam Jones" resulted in a victory for the latter.

1904

110 Years Ago

Pawnee County contemplates building a new courthouse, and the Pawnee Republican comes out with a three column cut of our Thayer County Courthouse, which they are planning to use as a model.

The city dads have been making another superhuman effort to control, or at least subdue, Canal Street's ragings. A dam built of timbers and rock was completed just in time to be tested by a downpour. The dam promoters have been holding their breath to see if it held. It is believed this latest scheme will do the work in case the water does not wash out underneath.

At Chester, Mrs. Case, state organizer, organized a live suffrage organization with the following officers: President W.W. Cameron, Vice President G.G. Hulbert, Secretary L.M. Dick, Treasurer Mrs. E.A. Drullinger, Press Chairman Mrs. Annie F. Cameron, Petition Chairman Mrs. Marion Lasby, and Financial Chairman Mrs. Jan Wilson Lasby.

The Little Blue River has claimed another toll of life — Willard Swaney, aged ten years, having been drowned at the curve above the dam. Prescription Drug Abuse Effects Safety

The risks for addiction to prescription drugs increase when they are used in ways other than as prescribed (e.g., at higher doses, by different routes of administration, or combined with alcohol or other drugs). Physicians, their patients, and pharmacists all can play a role in identifying and preventing prescription drug abuse.

Doctors are in a unique position, not only to prescribe medications, but also to identify abuse of prescription drugs and prevent the escalation to addiction.

By asking their patients about "all" their drugs, physicians can help their patients recognize if a problem exists, set recovery goals, and seek appropriate treatment.

Screening for prescription drug abuse can be incorporated into routine medical visits. Doctors should also take note of rapid increases in the amount of medication needed or frequent, unscheduled refill requests.

Doctors should be alert to the fact that those addicted to prescription drugs may engage in "doctor shopping"—moving from provider to provider in an effort to obtain multiple prescriptions for the drug(s) they abuse. Preventing or stopping prescription drug abuse is an important part of patient care.

Prescription painkiller abuse is a rising epidemic and can greatly impact the workplace. Employees may now be struggling with a problem they never intended to have.

If you suspect a co-worker or employee is under the influence of prescription painkillers, common on-the-job behaviors that may indicate a problem include: lack of attention or focus, poor decision-making, decreasing work quality, poor judgment, unusual carelessness and frequently misses work. Many of these signs and symptoms may come on gradually and can be difficult to spot. None of them is a definitive indicator that the person has a problem, but if there is suspicion, contact your Human Resources office.

Because so many addictions stem from a serious medical problem, prevention



is important. Back injuries, for example, are some of the most common work-related injuries. Though most back injuries are treated successfully with anti-inflammatory medications, exercises, physical therapy and other methods, sometimes opioid painkillers are prescribed. They should usually only be used for less than seven days, as longer use increases your risk of long-term complications.

Being proactive in your daily routine can help sideline these injuries before they become serious and prevent the need for painkillers.

Patients need to take steps to ensure they use prescription medications appropriately, always follow the prescribed directions, be aware of potential interactions with other drugs, never stop or change a dosing regimen without first discussing it with a healthcare provider, and never use another person's prescription.

In addition to describing their medical problem, patients should always inform their healthcare professionals about all the prescriptions, OTC medicines, and dietary and herbal supplements they are taking, before they obtain any other medications. Additionally, unused or expired medications should be properly discarded.

Pharmacists dispense medications and can help patients understand the instructions for taking them. By being watchful for prescription falsifications or alterations, pharmacists can serve as the first line of defense in recognizing prescription drug abuse. Some pharmacies have developed hotlines to alert other pharmacies in the region when a fraudulent prescription is detected.

Obituaries

Marian Uldrich

Marian Eunice DeLong Uldrich was born on April 21, 1936, to Christina Marianna Bruning DeLong and Ralph Carpenter DeLong. The oldest of eight children, Marian was raised in the Alexandria area on several different farms.



From memories of Marian's youth included working with teams of horses, swimming in Sandy Creek, the occasional Saturday night picture show, and visiting with family and friends.

While in high school, she lived with her grandparents in town, working at cafes and cleaning homes to earn her keep and to buy school clothes. High school activities included reading every book in the school library, cheerleading, playing volleyball, and in 1953, graduating from Alexandria High.

In 1952, Marian met Myron Dean Uldrich and they were married in 1953. They spent their honeymoon fixing a combine before Myron's Army basic training in Missouri. Marian then lived with Frank, Hazel, and Marlene Uldrich while Myron was in Korea. Myron and Marian would celebrate 50 years of marriage, before his passing in 2003.

In 1941, Marian began her Christian walk at the Presbyterian Church in Alexandria, where she was baptized and confirmed. In 1962, Marian joined the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Geneva, where she served on committees, councils, boards, and circles including president of Women's Fellowship.

Home and heart were always open in Marian's life. She loved to "break bread with others," introducing her children's friends to "farm life."

In addition to being a work partner with Myron, Marian also worked at Geneva Transfer Local, sold Northrup King Seed, and from 1979 to 2001, she worked at YRTC in Geneva.



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



Police Regulations

Any junked motor vehicle parked, left, permitted, or stored on private property in excess of ten (10) days and not enclosed in a building or screened as described in subsection (2) hereof, is hereby declared to be a nuisance. If the owner fails to remove such junked motor vehicle, after five (5) days notice, the Municipality through its employees or officers, shall remove the junked motor vehicle or cause it to be removed, and shall assess the cost thereof against the property so benefited. The Municipality, by and through its employees or officers shall have the right to enter upon said premises and remove the junked motor vehicle therefrom, and assess the cost of such removal thereof against the property from which the same is removed, which assessment of cost shall be certified by the Municipal Clerk to the County Treasurer of Thayer County, Nebraska, and the same shall become a lien against the property the same as any special assessment which may be assessed against said property. In the event the owner of said property does not reclaim said property within ten (10) days after the same has been removed by the Municipality, the Municipality shall have the right to sell, destroy, or otherwise dispose of said property. To reclaim said property, the owner must reimburse the Municipality for all costs incurred in the removal thereof.

Nothing in this section shall prevent a lawful business enterprise, operating in an appropriate commercial manner, to apply to the Governing Body of the Municipality for a variance from this section to use a junked motor vehicle, as defined herein, for a lawful and commercial purpose.

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Pastor delivers Memorial Day speech

"A house divided against itself cannot stand." Abraham Lincoln said these words as he stood in the statehouse in Springfield, Ill., on June 16, 1858. "I believe this government cannot endure permanently half slave and half free," Lincoln said. "I do not expect the Union to be dissolved, I do not expect this house to fall, but I do expect it will cease to be divided. It will become all one thing or all the other," Lincoln said.

And Lincoln was right. Lincoln was a prophet. The United States did not endure permanently half slave and half free. The Civil War settled that.

But Lincoln was not the first person to say these words. Jesus did. In the gospel of Mark, Jesus said, "If a house is divided against itself, that house cannot stand" (Mk. 3:25). And this is a warning to all of us.

What was true in the first century and in the 19th century is also true in the 21st century. Any nation divided against itself cannot stand. And America is a divided nation today. And our nation will not endure if it continues to be so divided. It must either become united or it will fall. It must either become united or it will perish from the face of the earth.

Now back when I went to school as a little boy, every morning we said the Pledge of Allegiance. Maybe you did too. And I'm very pleased that Mr. Wiedel, our principal, has all the elementary students say the Pledge of Allegiance every day when they begin class. The Pledge of Allegiance is still very important.

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands. One nation, under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all."

Now I don't know about you, but when I was a little boy growing up in Iowa, I didn't go to school with Native Americans or Afro-Americans or Jewish Americans or Italian Americans or Hispanic Americans or German Americans or Swedish Americans or Asian-Americans.

When I was a little boy going to school, we were all Americans. And we didn't speak Italian and French and Spanish and German and

Tagalog and Arabic. We all spoke English.

And when I went to school as a little boy in Iowa, we weren't one nation under Allah or Buddha or Hari Krishna. We were one nation under God. And we didn't have to explain it. And we didn't have to apologize for it.

But today is different. Today we live in a period of "Globalization." Today we are supposed to be "citizens of the world." Today we are "multi-cultural." Now we're no longer just Americans. Now we're "Afro-Americans," "Native Americans," "Hispanic Americans" and "Jewish Americans" and "Italian Americans." And look at what it's done. Look what it's done to our great country. It's divided us. It's divided us in almost every way possible.

Today America is no longer one. We are a house divided against itself. And not since the Civil War has America been so divided.

Take any issue today. Take any issue and Americans are divided over it. We're divided over abortion. We're divided over gay rights and gay marriage. We're divided over big government and small government. We're divided over women's rights. We're divided over health care. We're divided over immigration, the Keystone pipeline, voter identification and registration, budget deficits, States rights, freedom of religion, freedom of speech, the Second Amendment and the right to own and bear firearms and the cutting of the military and our national defense. And the list goes on and on. Take almost any issue

and it will be hard to find any two people who agree on most anything anymore.

We just went through a controversial school bond election. Look what it did to our community! It divided us. It pitted neighbor against neighbor. Life-long friends separated over it. Some people couldn't even talk about it without getting into a heated conversation over it.

This is scary, folks. Why? Because Jesus is right. A nation divided against itself cannot stand.

I hope as we all stand here today that we're all Americans. And I hope as we honor all those who have given the ultimate sacrifice for our country that we recognize that the freedoms we have today didn't come cheap. They cost somebody something. They cost many men and women in uniform the ultimate sacrifice.

And we are here today because of these heroes. They loved this country. They loved this country so much they were willing to die for her. And now it's our turn to preserve the freedoms they fought so hard to defend.

America is still the greatest nation on God's great earth. There is no place like America! But it will not continue to be great until we return to the principles that made our country great. And what made this country great is that we are all bonded together by a common purpose and a common flag and a common love for God and country and one another.

This is still the United States of America. This is not Saudia

Arabia. This is not Russia or Europe or Libya or Egypt or Iran or India or China or Japan. And we say the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands.

We are one nation - not many nations. And we are one nation under God - and not under Allah or Buddha or any other god. As President Ronald Reagan said, "If we ever forget that we are a nation under God, then we will be a nation gone under."

And we are indivisible. We are one people. We are all Americans - no matter what race or creed or nationality or sex or religion. And we want liberty - and we want justice - not just for Americans - not just for all the people who live in this great land. No, we want liberty - and we want justice - for all people - all over the world. We want the people in every country all over the world to enjoy the same freedoms that we enjoy. And we will not rest until they do.

Lincoln also said, "America will never be destroyed from the outside. If we falter and lose our freedoms," Lincoln said, "it will be because we destroyed ourselves."

I pray this morning that this is a prophecy that does not come true. I pray for the sake of our children and grandchildren and future posterity that we will never falter or allow our freedoms to be taken away from us. I pray that we will never destroy ourselves. I pray that we will not stay divided. I pray that we will all come together and be what God created us to be - Americans.

McArdle has been very active in the Nebraska County Judges' Association throughout his years as a judge and has served in all offices including association president in 1994. He has spent a good portion of his career promoting the use of mediation within the court system and supporting the just treatment of the elderly and vulnerable in Nebraska guardianship and conservatorship cases.

He currently serves on the Probate, Civil Procedure, Court Rules & By-Laws Committee of the Nebraska County Judges' Association.

He is vice-chair of the County Judges' Education Committee where he participates in design and development of continuing education for county judges statewide. McArdle has served several terms as presiding judge beginning in 1997.
