The Thayer County Board of Commissioners met in open and public session in the commissioner's room of the courthouse at 9:00 a.m. on February 15, 2017. Present were Commissioners Dave Bruning, Dean Krueger, Rick Dageforde and County Clerk, Marie Rauner.

Dave Bruning, chairman of the board, called the meeting to order.

Public meeting laws are posted and available on the north wall of the meeting room in compliance with Nebraska statutes.

The minutes from the previous meeting were mailed to the commissioners for review. Rick Dageforde moved and Dave Bruning seconded to approve the minutes from the February 6, 2017 meeting. Result of vote: Dageforde-yes, Bruning-yes, and Krueger-yes. Motion carried.

George Gerdes, Thayer County Road Superintendent, met with the commissioners to discuss ongoing road projects and give a department update.

Resolution #1809 was presented to amend the language per the Nebraska Department of Road in Resolution #1807.

WHEREAS: Thayer County understands that it must strictly follow all State and local laws, rules, regulations, policies and guidelines applicable to the funding of the project; and

WHEREAS: Thayer County and Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) wish to enter into a new Project Program Agreement setting out the various duties and funding responsibilities for the project.

Nebraska Timeline

Well into the nineteenth century butter was made chiefly by hand using butter churns, which came in many sizes and styles. Butter, the fat found in cream, is made by churning the cream, which causes the fat globules in it to combine into lumps of butter. The remaining liquid is buttermilk.

Once the butter has formed, it is removed from the butter-milk, washed in cold water, and gently kneaded to incorporate salt for flavor and to make the butter smooth. Catherine Arndt of York recalled in 1981 the churns and methods used to make butter during her Nebraska childhood in the early 1900s:

"The first churn I remember was a large round wooden 'Contraption' that was fastened to a metal stand. It had a wooden lid and on the inside it had wooden paddles or dashers fastened to a metal frame that connected to the handle or crank on the outside. When you turned the handle this cause[d] the paddles to splash through the cream in a circular motion. The constant motion through the cream caused the butter fat to separate from the buttermilk and eventually you had a nice large batch of butter. . . .

"The liquid or buttermilk was drained from the churn by removing a small wooden pin from the hole in it. The paddles were then removed and the butter was lifted out and put into a large wooden bowl. This bowl and the wooden paddle used to 'work' the butter were never used for anything else.

Butter was 'worked' or

kneaded to get as much moisture out of it as possible. Cold water was put on it several times until it was clear. Then it was worked some more until all of the milk & water were removed. Salt was then added, usually to taste. Then it was either shaped into molds by hand using the wooden paddle or put into wooden molds. . . .

"Then came the dasher churn. It was a tall round 'Crock.' It had a lid with a hole in the center that fit over the handle of the dasher. The dasher was a round wooden pole about three foot tall fastened to a wooden paddle in the shape of a plus sign. These took a long time to make butter, but were simple to clean. You got butter by 'dashing' the paddles up and down in the cream. Sometimes a tired cranky child could really make it dash.

"Then Happy Day, somebody invented the 'Daisy Churn.' These were gallon size glass jars. The paddles were fastened to a metal frame, which in turn had a metal rod that came through a hole in the screw on lid. This fastened to the metal frame on the lid and to the crank and glass. So that when the lid was in place you turned the handle and the paddles stirred through the cream at a great rate.

You got butter much faster with these churns. They also had an opening in the top covered by a removable screen. So the butter milk could be easily removed. Then cold water could be poured into the churn onto the butter. And the working process was shortened. Then the butter was molded as always."

Also included in this year's experience were briefing and factory tours of the John Deere operations in Moline, Ill.

A major objective of the study/travel seminar is to provide participants with the opportunity to meet leaders who help shape local, state, and national policy in agriculture and related areas and to create first-hand exposure to varied social and economic conditions/issues that exist in the United States. The mission of

the Nebraska LEAD program is "to prepare and motivate men and women in agriculture for more effective leadership" and is designed to speed up the leadership process.

Four different sessions were held with bowling pins given out for the highest game, best effort, and best style in each session.

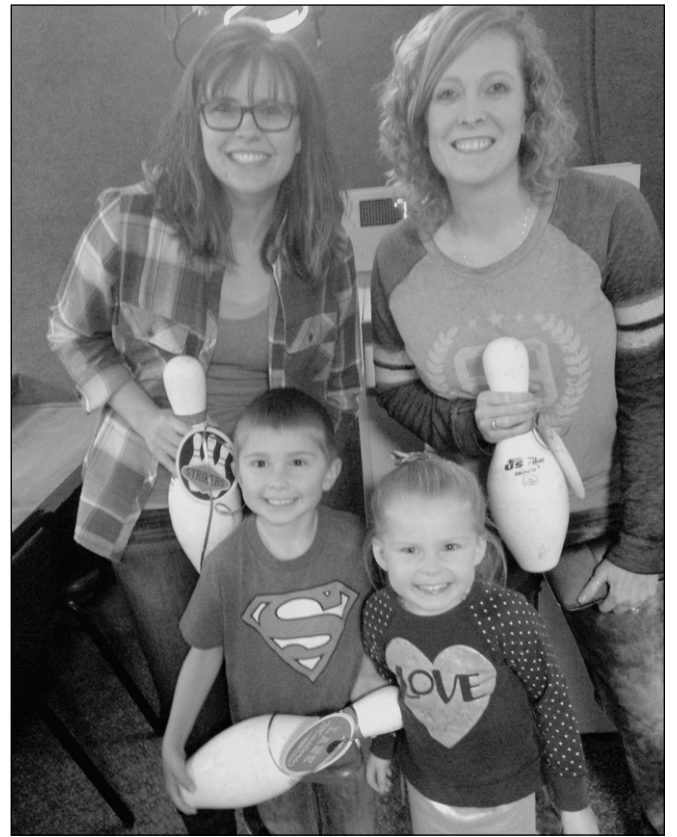
Family bowling is just one of the six family nights that are held each school year in the elementary.

The next event will be the annual Thayer Central Elementary School Carnival to be held in the high school gym on Friday, March 24.



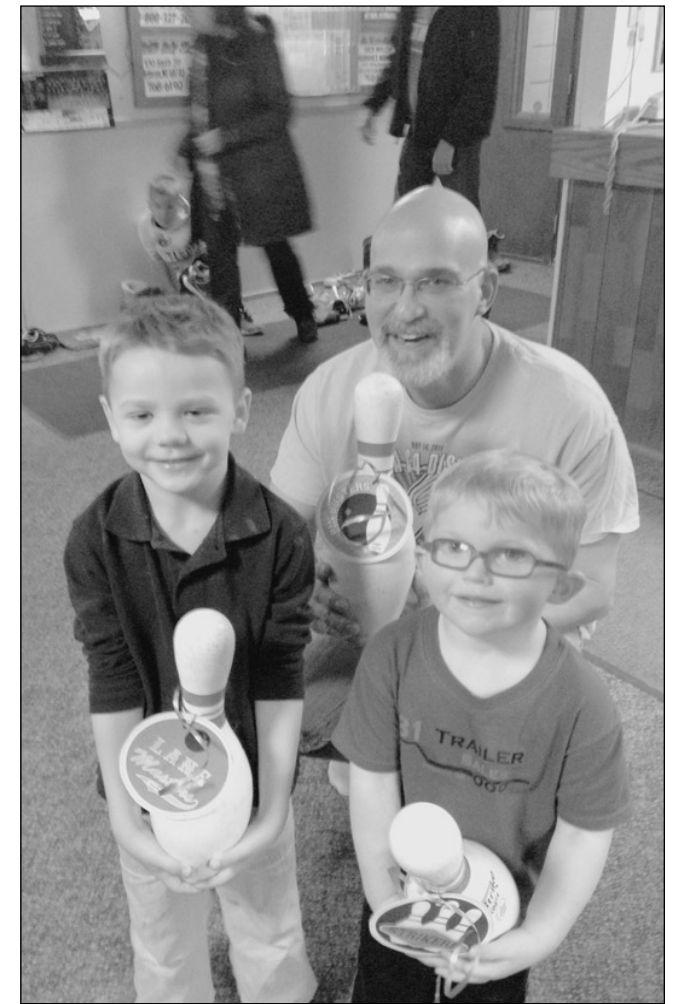

Beef profits tips workshop to be held

University of Nebraska Extension in Saline County is hosting a Beef Profits Tips Workshop with emphasis on enhanced utilization of cover crops on March 7, 1:00 to 4:30 p.m., at the First Evangelical Lutheran Church Fellowship Hall in Wilber.

The workshop will assist area beef producers in modern temporary fencing strategies, handling livestock mortality carcasses by composting, cover crop research update, utilization of perennial and annual forages to increase carrying capacity and a local beef producer information panel.

A Nebraska Extension Beef team of experts will be at the meeting including Steve Niemeyer, Larry Howard, Dennis Bauer and Mary Drewnoski.

Dennis Bauer, Extension Educator, said "Producers will have the opportunity to learn how to manage annual and perennial forages to meet the protein requirements of their cow herd. Tips on establishing these forages will also be presented along with the estimated cost associated with raising these forages. Mineral content of these forages will also be discussed and how a producer can incorporate mineral test results into a balanced mineral program."

Randy Pryor, Extension Educator, was enthused about

the four farmers involved in a panel discussion on new techniques they are using to further integrate cattle in their operations. Attending the workshop will be Tyler Burkey, Milford, who is using hoop structures and cover crops; Steve Wiese, Wilber, is double cropping cereal rye grass with corn under a pivot with a beef barn on a pivot corner; Rodney Wiese, DeWitt, has learned how to manage and graze cereal rye grass in the spring before planting corn; and Blake Frazee, Summerfield, Kan., grows cover crops on 1,400 acres including double cropping with field peas and utilizing modern beef grazing techniques.

Nebraska is nationally known as the "Beef State." The Nebraska Extension Beef team provides research-based information and resources to beef producers to help them provide an economical, safe, quality product to consumers while protecting and preserving Nebraska's vast natural resources.

Hunting accident reports at all-time low in 2016

The three hunting accidents reported to the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission in 2016 were the fewest recorded in a year since the state began keeping track in 1958. None of the 2016 hunting incidents was fatal.

The 2016 incidents mark a decrease compared to the ten incidents - none fatal - recorded in 2015.

"Hunting in Nebraska continues to be a very safe outdoor recreational activity in which many families participate," Nebraska Hunter Education Coordinator Wendy Horine said.

The record-low number of hunting incidents in 2016 coincided with a year in which a record 10,111 hunter education certificates were issued.

Hunter education in Nebraska dates to the 1970s, but the program was revamped in 2015 to allow students the option of taking the course online, with the youngest group

of students required to attend a two-hour Hunt Safe Session. The online option made certification more readily available to all Nebraskans.

"The average number of hunters in the state has remained stable for the past 17 years, while incident numbers have steadily declined during the same period and have dramatically declined since the inception of hunter education in Nebraska," Horine said.

"It goes without saying that if we didn't have the dedication and commitment of our nearly 1,000 volunteer instructors, the hunter education program wouldn't be possible," Horine added.

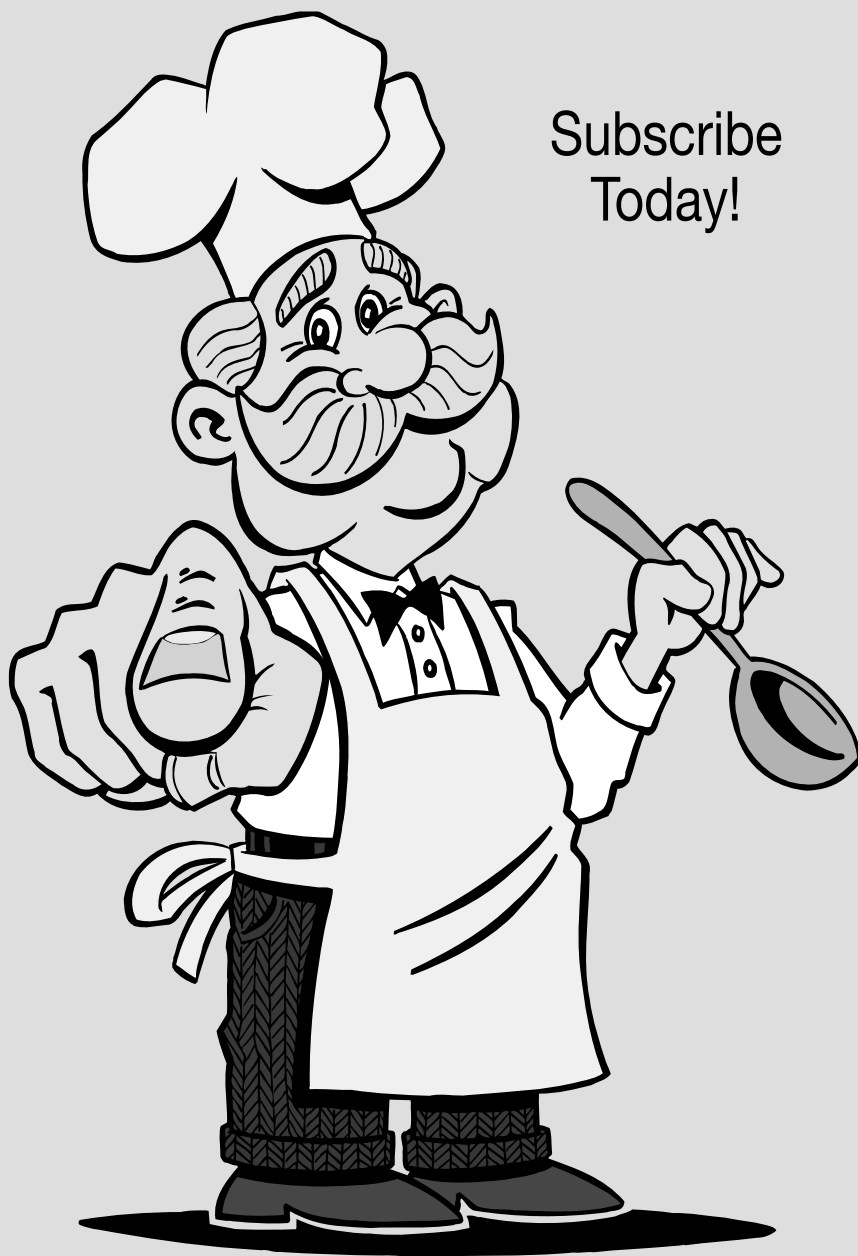

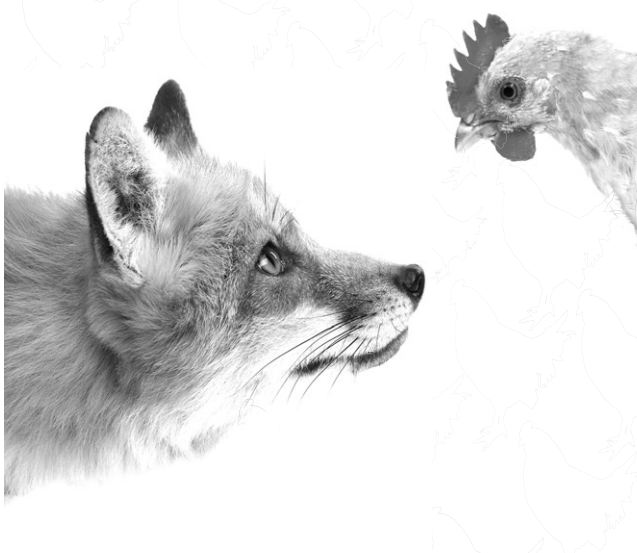

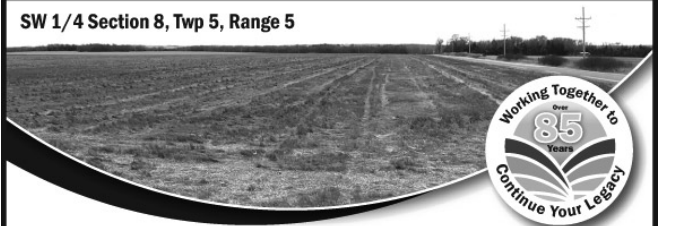

Chemigation certification classes to be held in Bruning

University of Nebraska Extension will be hosting twenty-four chemigation certification classes across Nebraska in March for applicators applying fertilizer or any pesticide product through an irrigation system.

The Nebraska Chemical Act requires anyone that applies chemicals through an irrigation system, to attend a meeting and become certified. Certifications are good for four years. Applicants have an option to complete an online course and take the exam at a testing location or simply attend a training, and pass the written exam.

The training is for initial or recertification and there is no charge. Especially for new applicants, it is recommended to contact the host Extension Office to receive chemigation materials prior to coming to the class.

If you need certification for the 2017 crop year, pre-

register with the extension educator hosting the session you plan to attend by phone or using the following registration link: <http://go.unl.edu/chemreg> To pre-register for the Wilber, Bruning and Tecumseh locations, contact the University of Nebraska Extension office in Saline County at 402-821-2151 or <http://go.unl.edu/chemreg>.
