Hebron Scouts share the meaning of century-old organization

Being a Girl Scout might best be expressed in the words of Thayer Central second-grader and Hebron Girl Scout Abigail Boatright. "It is nice to give to people and do things for others." Or maybe classmate Takaylynn Hergott knows what being a Girl Scout means. "We all get to be 'sisters'." Perhaps Kinsley Kugel can add to the definition, "We get to go on adventures," or maybe Jayme Huhman's perspective sums it all up when she says, "Girl Scouts is lots of fun."

However it's described, Girl Scouts is an organization where young girls have learned how to give to others and their communities, made lifelong friendships, participated in adventur-

ous experiences, and just plain had a good time for 100 years.

On March 12, 1912, Juliette Gordon Low held her first Girl Scout meeting at her home in Savannah, Ga. Little did she know her organization was on the verge of creating a new definition for what it was to be a woman in the 20th century. At the time of the first meeting, most women were stay-at-home mothers who cooked, cleaned and raised their children. Low, also a part of the stay-at-home generation, focused her earliest meetings on learning domestic skills; however, as time passed, Girl Scouts moved into teaching young girls new skills and talents outside of the home.

Today, at 100 years old, the organization boasts a record of

progressiveness built on combining lessons in domestic know-how with outdoor adventures and technical skills aimed at teaching girls they can do anything.

"I learned from Girl Scouts that volunteering and community service are very important in many ways, especially in building character," says former Hebron Girl Scout Jessica (Wiedel) Knobbe. "I was a Girl Scout from the moment I could be through my senior year of high school and earned both the silver and gold awards. I learned to prepare for the worst and hope for the best and that women can do anything."

Jessica's aunt, Carlece (Wiedel) Kenner has been involved in the

Council looks at chore list of items

The Hebron City Council tackled a list of chores and updates last week during the regular Monday night meeting.

Electric increase

Chris Fangmeier said the wholesale electric increase, which is already in effect, is proving costly. Norris Public Power recently raised the City's bill by \$1,200 per month. "They base the increase off of our highest usage which has not changed in quite awhile," Fangmeier said. "We're really kind of cheap though; I think Deshler pays 15 cents per kilowatt while we pay 11 cents."

City clerk Jean Nagey said she had never seen it go up so much at one shot. "I've seen it go up by a couple of hundred dollars or so, but never this much."

The council is going to look at ways to pay for the increase since attempting to withstand the hike is already causing a burden. It will most likely be forced to pass the additional cost on to customers.

Road fixes

The blacktop overlay on the approaches to the First Street bridge are in need of replacing again. City worker Karl Wiedel said he thinks there is something wrong with the base because the approaches were overlaid just last year. "I think truck traffic is ten times worse on that street than it used to be," he said, "but it's also wearing away awfully fast." Wiedel said he'd like to have County Road Superintendent Richard Heinrichs take a core sample of the base to see if it is holding up.

The new overlay will cost \$75,000 per approach, a cost the council feels is cheap compared to a possible accident due to a damaged road. The council agreed to incorporate a base test through Heinrichs.

The City also hired Topkote Inc., to fill the cracks in city roads. Work should begin soon.

Pioneer Center

Council member Beth Goldhammer said the Pioneer Center will be completely stripped Saturday, March 24. "We're going to clean it out," she said Monday night. "The project is really coming together well." A host of volunteers are expected to help with the cleanup and once the facility is gutted, restoration work can begin. "We can always use more volunteers," Goldhammer added, "and the City is providing breakfast

and lunch that day. We'd like to finish cleaning it out in one day."

In the meantime, Chuck Fink, the unofficial manager of the project, said he received bids on the electric and heating work. The City chose Hebron Electric with a bid of \$15,000.

Fireworks

HVFD Chief B.J. Linton said the department is considering moving the fireworks display to the airport. "We are sitting borderline on crowd distance as far as safety is concerned at our present location," he said, "and

Tax-cut compromise to likely toss elimination of inheritance tax

A compromise plan is underway in the state Legislature to alter Gov. Dave Heineman's proposed tax-cut plan which included the elimination of inheritance tax. The "death tax" is collected in 93 counties, including Thayer, and represents an approximate \$48 million income for those counties.

The compromise seeks to toss out the proposed elimination. "If the Legislature did away with the inheritance tax," said Thayer County commissioner Chris Frye, "all it would do is raise the dreaded property tax."

Thayer County, like most other counties collecting the tax, uses its inheritance tax for budget transfers and as an emergency fund. "Eliminating the tax does not mean we lose the money in the account," Frye said, "but we'd also not be adding to the fund anymore." And, essentially, the commissioners would have to find

another means of collecting money to maintain an emergency fund.

Commissioner Dave Bruning said the county has not had to use its inheritance tax for budget transfers or emergencies for quite some time, but that doesn't mean it can't happen.

Published in the annual statement at the end of the year, the Thayer County fund held a balance of \$2,312,661.56. From June through December last year \$75,373.56 was collected, while no funds were disbursed or transferred.

County officials sounded an alarm when the tax cut was first introduced attacking the plan by simply stating property taxes would go up if the inheritance tax was repealed. Legislators listened, although Gov. Heineman is not happy stating the counties "cried wolf" and the Legislature is "buying into that."

Heineman's original plan sought to provide nearly \$327 million in income tax relief over the next three years.

Norder Inc fined for Little Blue fish kill

Over two and one half years after the incident, Norder Supply Inc., is ending its involvement in an environmental calamity that occurred on the Little Blue River. The company will pay over \$30,000 in fines in an attempt to rectify the loss of thousands of fish in the local waterway.

Investigators with the Department of Environmental Quality determined that in July 2009, an employee of the company dumped liquid nitrogen fertilizer into the river that traveled for nearly 12 miles and killed approximately 23,500 fish. Norder Supply Inc., was named the administrator of the dumping after the DEQ discovered ammonia from fertilizer was pumped from Norder's secondary containment structure to a drainage ditch which flows into the river.

The case was referred to Nebraska Attorney General Jon Bruning's office for enforcement and last month, on Feb. 16, the State of Nebraska assessed fines against the company. According to court documents, Norder Supply is to pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$8,000; however, half of the amount may be waived if the company "maintains compliance with and does not violate the Nebraska Environmental Protection Act, or any rules and regulations promulgated under that act."

It was further ordered that Norder Supply should also pay, "as supplemental environmental projects, the sum of \$8,300" to be divided among the Hebron Fire Department (\$1,300) for the purchase of spill containment equipment and Thayer Central Community Schools (\$7,000) for trees, landscaping and motion sensory lighting controls.

Also, the company must pay \$13,816.94 to the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission to stock waters of the state with fish.

Wind exceeds expectations

The Thayer County wind project is proceeding as planned and received some good news from the Met Tower data collected so far, said Gary Aksamit, the project coordinator. In addition, other wind projects around the state are viewing the Thayer County Model of land owner participation as a favorable way to develop a wind project.

"The met tower has demonstrated what I always expected to see from the wind data. Thayer County has a valuable wind asset," Aksamit said. "Our 18 months of Met Tower data came in and it was above the estimates we thought we would have. That means the efficiencies of wind turbines in our area is even better than we had hoped, and it means more electricity can be generated from the turbines we would have," Aksamit said.

The Met Tower, located four miles east of Highway 81 on the south side of Road Q, or more familiarly Monument Road, has been collecting wind data since it was constructed in August of 2010. The data is collected constantly and provides information on wind speeds at all hours of the day and night. Wind developers use this information to determine how much

Ordering Garden Seeds From Seed Catalogs

Nothing says spring like those annual seed catalogs that come in the mail. Remember, though, to use a little caution before placing that order.

Seed catalogs are a great way to get a jump on the spring gardening season. You can look to see what is available and see what is new on the market.

Purchasing seeds and plants from our local businesses helps to keep those businesses open. The owners can answer your questions and help make decisions regarding your lawn and garden.

However, sometimes you would like to plant something that is not available locally because the nursery doesn't have the room to stock all the varieties that a seed catalog will offer.

One of the most important things to remember when using a seed catalog is to buy from a reputable company. That's the best way to ensure the seeds you buy will be the freshest and of the best quality. Ask your gardening friends to determine the best seed companies and find out what companies have the best products. Or check out "General and Specialty Mail-Order Seed Sources," <http://www.ianrpubs.unl.edu/sendIt/g1895.pdf>, for a list of mail-order sources of flower, herb and vegetable seeds, transplants and more.

When selecting seeds, it is important to select those that

will grow in your area. Seeds and plants are designated by hardiness zones, indicating in which area of the country and climates they will grow best. Nebraska is zoned four and five, with four being more in the northern part of the state and five being farther south.

It is important, especially with perennials, to choose those that grow in your zone. The need to pay attention to zones is less important when choosing annual plants, because they only grow in the summer anyway.

When you have purchased your seeds, you are ready to get a jumpstart on the planting season. Planting the seeds inside under good fluorescent lighting will allow the plants to complete 6-8 weeks of growth before they are planted outside in May when the threat of frost is gone.

I know a person who also uses an oscillating fan to blow in the room where the seeds are planted to strengthen plant stems as if they were growing outside in the wind.

Seeds can also be planted directly in the ground, particularly for fast growing plants like lettuce or those that don't respond well to transplanting, such as sweet corn.


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LOCATE IN 48 UPDATE

Driver rams pivot...

Kelly D. Oliver, of Byron, drove his 2002 Ford F15 pickup through the pivot pictured above Tuesday night, March 6. Oliver was southbound on Road 5400 at midnight when he entered the east ditch, drove through a fence and struck a center pivot tower. The pickup truck, which sustained approximately \$2,500 in damage, continued under the pivot and along the fence line where it became entangled in the fence. A spark from the truck started a grass fire which burned the edge of the field and about one quarter of a mile of the grader ditch. According to the accident report on file at the local law enforcement center, Oliver was located walking down the road north of the scene. He was later transported to Thayer County Health Services by Deshler Rescue for possible, but not visible, injuries to his back. Alcohol was suspected in the incident. The pivot, belonging to Dennis Schmidt of Deshler, sustained approximately \$11,016 in damage.

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Green Light Laser Surgery for the Prostrate is now available

As men age, it's common for the prostate gland to enlarge. This condition is known as benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH). Symptoms associated with an enlarged prostate are frequent urination, getting up at night to urinate, weak stream, urgent urination, incomplete bladder emptying, and difficulty controlling urination. Current treatments available for BPH are:

- Monitoring of the prostate
- Medication
- Microwave and heat therapies
- Conventional surgery - TURP or Transurethral Resection of the Prostate

If medications aren't effective or you have severe symptoms, your doctor may recommend prostate surgery. There are several types of surgery to treat an enlarged prostate. The conventional prostate surgery is transurethral resection of the prostate or TURP for short.

This involves a thin, tube-like telescope being passed through the urethra. An attachment at the end is used to cut away part of the prostate using electrical energy. Afterwards, a catheter is inserted to allow urine to flow freely in place until the urine is free of significant bleeding and blood clots. TURP surgery may also involve a stay in the hospital for several days.

Another treatment for BPH is Green Light Laser surgery. This new procedure is a minimally invasive procedure that evaporates the prostate tissue blocking the flow of urine from the bladder. After anesthesia is administered, the urologist inserts a scope and laser fiber into the urethra. This allows a unique high power laser to vaporize tissue and open

the channel for urine to pass through. At the same time, the laser seals blood vessels so there is substantially less bleeding involved.

The advantages of Green Light Laser surgery is that patients often go home the same day, a catheter may not be necessary, patient has immediate relief of symptoms and recovery is quicker.

Starting this month, Green Light Laser prostate surgery is a new treatment option available to patients at Thayer County Health Services. Dr. David Halsted, a urologist at Nebraska Urology Clinic in Hastings, will be performing this outpatient procedure at the hospital in Hebron.

The two most widely reported benefits of laser surgery over TURP surgery is the reduced risk of bleeding and a shorter hospital stay.

Most patients also report a rapid improvement in their urinary flow rate, and a quick return to normal activities following the procedure. Laser surgery is also associated with lower risks of sexual and other side-effects more common with TURP surgery.

Thayer County Health Services is currently the only rural hospital in south central Nebraska performing Green Light Laser surgery on the prostate. This new treatment option is one more way we provide high quality healthcare to our patients close to home.

the trees keep encroaching on our area making it smaller yet."

The airport would give them more working room at a safer distance and increase the viewing area for patrons.

The council also approved adding to the fireworks fund increasing from \$2,700 to \$3,000.

Complaints

Finally, the council heard two complaints Monday night including roaming dogs and utility deposits.

In the first, a citizen asked the council the proper protocol for reporting loose dogs on her property. She said when she called the local law enforcement center, she was referred to Stephanie Willhite at Muddy Paws; however, often there was no one to answer the phone.

The city is aware that Willhite has another job, but said she is still collecting stray animals. They also learned that Willhite has approached the lawn enforcement center wondering if she could begin patrolling, since it is difficult to catch animals when she has to wait for someone to call. The animal could have easily moved on by the time she can answer the call.

Council members were informed they needed to make a provision for such an action in the existing ordinance. The matter was extended to next month's agenda in order to

legally make the provision. The council will also discuss how to pay Willhite should they allow her to patrol.

In the second complaint, the same citizen wondered why utility deposits were not returned after a certain time period, especially when the person responsibly paid their bill on time.

Also, if a person owns two structures on separate property and wants electricity in them, they must pay \$250 per structure, which they do not get back until they sell the property or structure. Councilman Robert Dodes said he agreed with the complaint. "I've paid \$250 on two properties and am thinking of installing power in a third place," he said, "but I already have \$500 of my money sitting with the City. So, needless to say, I don't have power on my third property yet."

Council member Goldhammer said the ordinance was made to form a safety net; it was made to stop the city from being stiffed by people who don't pay their last power bill after leaving town. "I think we can set a time limit," she said, "maybe after 18 months or so we can give back the deposits. And if someone is late with a payment or defaults on a bill, then their time starts over."

The council discussed adding a time limit to the ordinance and will talk about it further next month.

electricity can be produced by a wind turbine, and the wind speed also affects the cost of generating electricity. The higher the wind speed and the more constant the wind, the more reliable of a source of generation the turbines will be and that lowers the cost of generation making a project more attractive to developers and power purchasers.

"The other information we've received from several sources around the state is that more and more wind developers are looking at our Thayer County Model of land owner participation in wind projects as the right way to do business," Aksamit said. "This is great news for rural Nebraska and all land owners who may sign their land up for participation in a wind project. It validates what we're doing in Thayer County."

The normal structure of wind projects has been where the developer picks "winners" - the landowners who get a turbine on their land and receive an annual payment, and "losers" - land owners who do not get a turbine and receive no payments at all. In the Thayer County Model, every land owner who signs their land up to be considered for the project receives an annual payment whether they have a turbine on their land or not. Land owners may also forego an annual payment for ownership in the wind project if they choose to do so.

"We have about 50 percent of the landowners in the project footprint signed up. The only people that said they weren't interested were landowners with no ties to the area. Local support and sign up is very strong," Aksamit said.



"Guys and Dolls" is a fable about what happens to gambling men and the women who long to tame them. Set in the colorful world of New



1882

130 Years Ago

All the farmers would say a gentle drizzle drozzle of a spring rain.

Reed Ferguson's baby boy is very sick — so low indeed, that fears are entertained for his recovery.

Mrs. McKinzie has been very ill, the physician at one time fearing she could not recover.

A disease called "pink eye" which seems to be that equine disorder adapted to humanity, is breaking out in several parts of the county.

For a long time Henry Ebling, of the Sherman House, has been gradually losing his eyesight and this great affliction has increased until he cannot recognize persons on the street.

Stewart Orr, who lives north of Carleton, has received from the government \$1,200 back pension, Uncle Samuel never goes back on the boys who fought for him during war times.

Dr. Bristol, since his return from St. Joe where he graduated with honors, is receiving a good share of the patronage in his line. No young man in this county has advanced more rapidly in his profession and at the same time in the hearts of the people, than T.D. Bristol, M.D.

Understand Nutrient Needs of Two-Year-Old Cows

The most pivotal time for a beef cow to maintain a position in the beef herd usually is the first three months after her first calf is born.

"As a two-year-old, she is not a mature cow," says Karla Jenkins, University of Nebraska-Lincoln cow-calf specialist in Scottsbluff. "She still has nutrient requirements for growth. Nutrient needs have been increasing steadily during her last trimester of pregnancy for the fetus; now she has a calf and her nutrient requirements are increasing even more for lactation."

Peak lactation will not occur until about eight to nine weeks after the calf is born. If she is to remain on a 365-day calving interval, she must rebreed by 80 to 85 days after calving, which is shortly after peak lactation. "It is important to remember that if a cow cannot meet all these demands, resumption of the estrous cycle will be the first to be compromised."

Rick Rasby, UNL beef specialist in Lincoln, summarized research that determined thin young cows (body condition score less than 5) had a 36 percent to 66 percent pregnancy rate, while young cows maintained in good body condition had a 91 percent pregnancy rate. (See summary at beef.unl.edu/web/cattleproduction/nutrient2007.)

Many producers in the Eastern part of the state have integrated crops and livestock operations, and by the time the intense activity of calving is over, they are busy preparing

for spring planting. "It is easy to overlook the body condition of the young cow. By the time her drop in condition is noticed, it may not be possible for her to gain enough condition to rebreed in a timely manner."

It is important for producers to monitor body condition and body condition score changes in the young cow before calving through breeding. A guide to understanding body condition scoring and how to use it to manage the nutritional needs of the cow can be found in an Extension circular titled "Body Condition Scoring Beef Cows: A Tool for Managing the Nutrition Program for Beef Herds." It can be found at www.ianrpubs.unl.edu/sen-dlt/ec281.pdf.

The 1996 Nutrient Requirements for Beef Cows (from the National Research Council) estimates the young cow needs a diet high in total digestible nutrients (around 68 percent) and crude protein content (around 12.5 percent) to be in a positive energy and metabolizable protein balance when her needs are greatest. Feeding 20 pounds of hay that contains 60 percent TDN and 3 pounds of dried distillers grains on a dry matter basis to a 1,000-pound cow could meet this demand.




