# **Breaking ground** signals construction

Thayer Central primary and preschool students took one step closer toward their future March 10 as they watched and participated in the groundbreaking to transform the district's main campus because by fall, all Thayer Central students will attend classes on the campus.

The groundbreaking is the first of three phases identified by the district to continuously improve the school community.

The district's administration, board of education, facilities committee, developers for the project, Ayars and Ayars, and performance criteria developer Clark Enersen Partners were represented at the ceremony behind a lengthy row of shovels topped with hardhats.

The line of planners behind the shovels showed smile after smile as Superintendent Drew Harris, Ayars and Ayars and Curt Mumm of the school board addressed the crowd of mostly primary and preschool students, and transitioned into Words to Build On, a program developed by Principal Kurk Wiedel to reinforce the school community's positive strengths.

"It's more than buildings," Wiedel said of the upcoming construction that will include eight new classrooms. "It's what you do inside. I've spent 50 years in this community. The intermediate was built when I was in eighth grade. Here, we're investing in our kids and their future. It was a community effort."

All together, approximately 120 students will join the campus in the fall. Sixty alone are eligible for preschool.

Wiedel's program was words of encouragement written on slips of white paper and carried one at a time by students, who buried them in the center of the groundbreaking hub with everyone watching.

"You don't know if this day will ever come," he said.

At the end of the program, Wiedel was publicly recognized by the

Harris said he brought Wiedel's name to the podium because he had planned the groundbreaking ceremony, a tradition of his to make events memorable for kids.

Harris said bringing students together on one campus has been on the district's radar for eight years. It's hard for him to believe the plan has come to fruition.

"It's exciting. This morning, the kids were walking the loop. That's the last time they're going to do that," he said. Same with the flag raising.

The facilities sub-committee of the Thayer Central Board of Education spent months in meetings and hearings weeding through a process on how to improve the learning environment without facing opposition from a majority of voters who had earlier nixed a bond.

The board and its sub-committee worked on an intense selection process to mold a design-build team that would meet the district's improvement criteria for the project's cap of \$3.5 million.

Three phases were born from the process with the first that includes adding a storm shelter, restroom and classroom updates, infrastructure, lighting and a slew of other improvements to bring the campus into the present.

The parking lot between the Intermediate and high school buildings will be affected, Harris said.

"There will be no parking on the east half of the lot, and we're having to adjust the bus loading zones," he explained.

It will be two months of inconvenience for school patrons under the aggressive construction schedule, but in September, students will walk into a brand new building, Harris said.

'Today is a great day in the history of Thayer Central Schools,' Rick Hintz, who sits on the board of education, said. "This project has taken many turns and affected many people in the process. It is nice to see that we, as a community, can have differing viewpoints, but still come together and agree that the education of our students is a very high priority. This building project is a necessary step for Thayer Central to adapt the ever-changing dynamics of educa-

tion today. Hintz also thanked everyone who was involved with the planning, and implored the community to stay focused on the "betterment of our children and our community."

From the facilities sub-committee, Scott Harms said they are looking forward to seeing the plan come together.

"It was great teamwork," he added.

## **Runner makes Boston** qualifying time

Ann Hubl holds a Boston Marathon qualifying time, but she must wait until September to find out if she has been accepted into one of the largest marathons in the world watched every year by at least one million people.

Hubl ran her qualifying marathon in Phoenix at the BMO Harris Bank event in 3:27. She finished eighth out of 198 women in the 35 to 39 age category. Overall, she placed 269th out of 2,111 male and female runners.

It was first time she ran that particular race, but it wasn't her first marathon. Hubl ran last year in Abilene, Kan., at the Eisenhower Marathon. She finished the race in 3:38, just two minutes ahead of Boston's 3:40 qualifying time, and settled in to wait for September. The Boston event sets aside dates in September for letting runners know if they're accepted. Hubl will be emailed a registration form in September and then wait five to 10 days to hear back.

She went through the same process last year on the Eisenhower Marathon. Because there are more than 20,000 runners in the Boston challenge, the fastest runners in their respective age categories are chosen.

Hubl's time didn't make it, and she heard from her fellow runners in Women Run Nebraska it's more competitive than before because the race is so popular.

She has ran competitively since college and 15 to 17 half-marathons. After realizing she was running better, she wanted to try a full marathon, but not just any marathon. Hubl wanted to run on a Boston qualifying course.

After hearing she wouldn't be running in Boston this year, Hubl went back to researching courses and found the Phoenix race.

"I did some research online and tried to find a cool marathon in the beginning of the year," she said. She settled on Phoenix because of its warm climate. Hubl wasn't disappointed.

She started running at 6:30 a.m., when the termpature was in the 50s, and by the time she was finished. the temperature was a comfortable 70 degrees.

Her support for the race was her mother, who was due to board the plane with Hubl, however, her mother missed the check-in time and the flight was declared overbooked.

She said she was in Phoenix alone, but felt the presence of her faith. Hubl received a medal for finishing and a runner's packet packed full of treasures.

Meanwhile, her support was back home with her twin sister, Amy Barry, who is also in Women Run Nebraska. Barry will run the Lincoln Marathon May 1 to try and qualify for Boston.

"Hopefully, we can go to Boston together," Hubl said.

She said preparing for a marathon requires endurance.

'When I started training, I built up my running mileage to 20 miles on a long run, so 45 to 55 miles a week. You have to eat a lot of carbs, your intake definitely goes up, and you need a lot more sleep and hydration. You've got to have a pretty healthy diet," she said.

More support comes from the women's running group. Started by Addie Hohman of Seward, the club has 20 members from all over the state. They are defined by their hot pink running shirts, Hubl said.

Hubl has been with the club since the beginning because Hohman is a good friend of hers.

"We started a semi-competitive running group. We have kids and still like to run competitively," Hubl said.

## City waits on new truck

At its March 7 meeting, the city council formally rescinded a motion that earlier declared 234 S. 5th St., as a nuisance. The council rescinded at the request of the home's owner, Dennis Phelps.

The council was slower to move on a new fire truck after looking over the specifications provided by Hebron Volunteer Fire Department Chief BJ Linton. Linton said the department's current truck that will eventually need replacing is 17 years old.

"We haven't spent money on it," Linton said albeit \$2,000 for pump issues. "It may or may not last another 10 years."

The truck is due to last at least another three years, according to a 20-year cap on department trucks.

Linton said it would take at least a year before the fire department would receive the truck and the sooner the old truck is unloaded, the more money it will be worth.

"I'm not opposed to the idea, but I'm looking at it from a monetary standpoint and a budget standpoint,'

Councilman Robert Dodes said. "I want to see where the money is going to come from," Councilman

new truck will change in the next three to four months.

Hebron Fire received its first ever ladder truck in January through a program created by the federal forestry service. The truck is a 1987 model that was refurbished once before. The truck, known as a Telesquirt, cost the department only the freight at \$5,000.

"It will help us move one class lower in risk," Linton said just after they received the truck. "It helps if you have better equipment."

Dodes commended the fire department for the Aiden Mostek fundraiser March 6.

"It was a great use of the community center," Fangmeier said.



## **National Nutrition Month**

March is National Nutrition Month. Thayer County Health Services wants to remind everyone to return to the basics of healthy eating. Your health and your weight are connected.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, if your body mass index falls into the range of overweight or obese, you are at a higher risk for the following diseases and conditions:

- Coronary heart disease
- Stroke - Type 2 diabetes
- Cancers (endometrial, breast and colon)
- Hypertension or high blood pressure - Dyslipidemia (high blood
- cholesterol, high blood triglycerides) Liver and gallbladder
- disease Sleep apnea and respira-
- tory problems Osteoarthritis (degenera-

tion of cartilage and its underlying bone within a joint) - Gynecological problems for women (abnormal men-

strual periods and infertil-What Does "At Risk"

Mean? Being "at risk" means you are more likely to have a specific disease or condition than someone who has a body mass index (BMI) in the normal weight range. It does not mean you will get the disease. BMI is one screening tool.

Your BMI is calculated from your height and weight. It is a fairly reliable indicator of body fat for most adults, with athletes and the elderly being two exceptions. BMI is an inexpensive tool, but is only one of many factors that you and your health-care provider should use in evaluating your overall health status

To assess your actual health risk, your health-care provider will look at many factors.

For example, if your doctor is concerned you might have a heart attack, he or she will want to know several things in addition to your BMI:

- Do you have a family history of heart disease? Do you smoke ciga-

- How much physical activ-

ity do you get every day? - How much fat, saturated

fat, fiber and sodium do you consume? Your doctor also will likely

run other tests, such as a blood pressure check and lab tests. Collecting all of this information is the only way to make an accurate assessment of your health risk and to diagnose a condition such as coronary artery disease. Lifestyle changes can make

a big difference in your health. If your doctor says your BMI is in the overweight range and you have high blood pressure, the doctor may prescribe medication and suggest you make changes in your lifestyle. You may be told to lose weight, change your diet and get more exercise.

Here's some really good news: Those lifestyle changes eating smarter and moving more – will help lower your blood pressure no matter what happens with your weight. Since losing and then keeping weight off can be a challenge, it is reassuring to know lifestyle changes by themselves can reduce your risk; they can help you feel better too.

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### Assistance for Qualifying Low-Income Customers:

The Nebraska Telecommunications Assistance Program (NTAP) can provide reduced rates on monthly charges for basic telephone service to qualified low-income subscribers. To be eligible, you must participate in one of the following: Medicaid, Food Stamps, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Federal Housing Assistance, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, or the Kids Connection (SAM, MAC or EMAC).

### Assistance for Qualifying Customers on Tribal Land:






