### Dial ten digits...

Old habits die hard and if you've tried making local calls this week without using the area code, you've been reminded by a recording the number you dialed requires ten digits.

Beginning five days ago, Feb. 26, the Nebraska Public Service Commission added the 531 area code to the 402 range in our state. In what is called an "overlay," the 402 range in Nebraska will include both 531 and 402 area codes throughout the entire range, which is why those of us living in the 402 area code range need to dial the area code first on all calls.

As always, when dialing long-distance, a "1" must be dialed prior to the ten-digit number.

### Gasoline on the rise...

Gas keeps going up; in fact, here in Hebron, prices for regular gas have risen an average 12-25 cents per gallon depending on grade; diesel went up about 20-22 cents per gallon.

As of Tuesday, March 1, Hebron prices at three stations include:

## TCEDA holds annual event

Third annual outreach draws decent crowd

TCEDA held its annual outreach last Saturday in Deshler featuring an auction of Thayer County goods, ESI student products and businesses, entertainment and good food.

According to literature available at the outreach, established in 2001, the Thayer County Economic Development Alliance is a nonprofit corporation supporting economic development within the county and local communities. TCEDA represents public and private business, individuals, county and local government with an emphasis on housing, youth and retirees attraction, leadership education, entrepreneur education, tourism, transfer of wealth and business retention.

TCEDA dedicates itself to building communities where young people will choose to live, work and raise their families; in fact, board members say adults are often surprised to hear the majority of local youth would actually prefer to stay here.

For the last two years, TCEDA and UNL Extension have worked together to bring an ESI (Entrepreneur-Ship Investigates) class to the area. Available to all county junior high and high school students, the class teaches development of products, services, marketing plans, and financing for businesses that will work in their hometowns.

The board states in its literature, "We want the young people to go get an education, come back to live, raise a family, and understand the earning potential here in Thayer County. These students have great ideas and want to be able to further the opportunities in a hometown that

believes in them."

TCEDA says growing small businesses will play a key role in fueling Nebraska's economic engine and agree that information technology, youth optimism and enthusiasm, and transfer of wealth will attract folks back to the area and allow people to

live and work wherever they want.

Currently TCEDA is concentrating on generating an entrepreneur fund and according to its literature said last year they successfully obtained a \$25,000 grant from the FHL Bank of Topeka which has been set aside for gap funding for small businesses

and entrepreneurs.

## Ag land values go up

Ag Society tells commissioners 'we're keeping free shows'

Thayer County Assessor Karla Joe told county leaders Wednesday the county has seen a \$5 million growth in the last year. "The growth is in new construction," she said, "which I think is really good for us during these economic times." Joe spent a few minutes updating Dave Bruning and Dean Krueger during the Feb. 24 commissioners meeting. Chris Frye was absent.

Joe also presented preliminary information indicating a raise in agricultural land valuations, a fact she says most landowners are already aware of. "These figures are estimates right now," she said after the meeting, noting nothing would be "chiseled-in-stone" until next month. "I just wanted the commissioners to know ahead of time what they're facing."

The assessor's office collects data from aerial views and by physically reviewing the county, Joe said. "If we know a building has gone up or see something new from the aerials we go to the new construction site to get measurements, see what type of building it is and find out what it is used for."

She said workers spend most fair-weather months making their way around the county. "People have been very nice and very cooperative with us," she said.

In other business, the Ag Society met with and updated the commissioners on the 2011 County Fair slated for Thursday through Saturday, Aug. 4-5-6. Wednesday, Aug. 3, will be entry day and Sunday, Aug. 7, is tear down and cleanup. "We're going to have the trailer

pull race again," said Society president Dean Meyer. "It was a huge hit last year; I don't think we've seen the grandstands that full since horse racing back in the old days."

Meyer said all the grandstand shows would be free again this year which the Society feels accounts for the large crowd. "We charge for the shows and we get the same 300 people, but when we open it up we fill the place."

Society member Randy Weideman said they did so well with the "free show" concept they had other fair board members from other counties asking them at the annual meeting how they did it. "Not very many county fairs offer free grandstand shows," he said, "but we found everyone benefitted from the idea. Food vendors, the carnival, the beer garden all had better nights."

Wiedeman added that families returned to the fair more often since they could see all three shows instead of just one, and that helped everyone out. "It took a little work to make the shows free, but it's really worked well for us," he said.

This year the Society will offer the races, a vocalist, and a hypnotist/comedian over the three nights of grandstand shows. "The log carvers are also coming back and we've talked to Josh Mosier of Deshler about demonstrating knife making," Meyer said.

The Society meets the first Thursday of every month and board members include Meyer and Weideman as well as Bill Easton, Curtis Elting and Eric Nutsch.

Meyer said anyone is invited to attend the meetings.

## My Thoughts Exactly

Lincoln Journal Star reporters visited our area last month to follow up on a couple of news items; the first an article by Joe Duggan regarding the fish poisoning in the Little Blue River two summers ago, and the second, an article by Art Hovey concerning the Base Hit restaurant fire in Davenport last month.

Nothing has come of the fish incident yet as far as legal charges or citations, but Norder Supply, Inc., owner Tim Norder told Duggan the company has complied with all of the regulations and changes sought by the DEQ (Department of Environmental Quality). The DEQ, following its investigation of the company's dumping of nitrogen fertilizer into the Little Blue River, sent a written notice in Sept. 2009, listing five violations; 1-the containment pit was not certified by a registered professional engineer, 2-the company failed to properly manage material or storm water contaminated by fertilizer, 3-tears were present in the containment pit's synthetic liner, 4-the company failed to keep adequate records, 5-the failed to report the release of contaminated water. Norder says the five violations have been addressed.

DEQ officials documented an estimated 23,500 dead fish along a 12-mile stretch of the river between Hebron and Highway 53. The notice indicated a potential fine of \$10,000 per day for the five violations and a public valuation of approximately \$14,000 for the dead fish.

Really there wasn't any new information except maybe details of the violations and how the DEQ handles such cases. According to Duggan, environmental case resolutions tend to move "slower than the current in the Little Blue."

In the second article, Hovey reported how several folks in the town of Davenport were affected when the Base Hit bar and restaurant burned down. Townspeople are a little lost now that there's nowhere to find a cup of coffee. For now the Frontier Bank has taken on that role, offering a place to sit and talk over a steaming cup of coffee, but they can't offer the "Sunday buffet or the Tuesday special" which had become more habit than anything.

Last week, several Davenport regulars helped owner Lucille Henry and her sons clean up the corner where the restaurant sat - only a handful of items could be salvaged.

Of interest to us here at the *Hebron Journal-Register* is the fact that we posted the story online with a photo the next morning following the fire, and of all our stories we've posted since we've gone online, the Base Hit fire has received by far the most hits, nearly twice as many as any other article. That in itself shows us how important the restaurant was to the surrounding communities and how much it will be missed.



## Capital View

LINCOLN - It wasn't a bombshell but it certainly was a loud noise.

Gov. Dave Heineman said voters could be asked to eliminate the panel that settles labor disputes between state and local governments if the Legislature doesn't pass a suitable bill changing the way it operates.

Heineman said he reserved the right to decide what "suitable" means.

The state faces a revenue gap of up to \$1 billion over two fiscal years. Stuff runs downhill, so local governments are up against it, too.

The state and local governments agree the Commission's dispute-settling formula - created by the Legislature decades ago - is weighted in favor of public workers.

They want it changed so CIR decisions don't cost government so much. They want it to favor government.

What public employees and their supporters rightly suspect is that, if voters get the chance to do away with the CIR, the odds are it would happen.

The situation doesn't match the high drama and political fireworks of the situation in Wisconsin. Not one bit.

Government employees have merely benefited from the law that crated the CIR, and rules under which the commission operates. Unions in Nebraska would likely get as much sympathy as a Big 12 football official if they struck against the state, a city or county.

### Lincoln Mayor's Plea Unheeded

Mayor Chris Beutler combined politics and an appeal to the collective conscience of lawmakers (I know, some think that's oxymoronic) when he spoke in defense of \$44 million in direct state aid to cities, counties and natural resources districts.

Make that soon-to-be-lost state aid. "The Legislature has a real choice to make," the Lincoln mayor said. "Does it force its budget problems onto the backs of property tax payers or does it give us some options to deal with the cuts?"

As an attorney might say in a courtroom, objecting to the inquiry: "That question has been asked and answered!"

This column has covered the issue several times because it's a thing informed citizens need to know of; it might soon hit them in the wallet via higher local taxes, or in programs that might be important to them.

Cities and counties have pleaded their case to the Unicameral and the governor. They've been told to forget about it. The reality of that potential \$1 billion gap in state government revenues trumps their concerns.

The locals repeatedly noted the aid was to compensate them for the state stripping them of much of their local tax base.

The consistent response from the Tower on the Plains: You don't have to get over it. But you have to get used to it.

# McGinley Attends Youth Leadership Forum In D.C.

Outstanding high school students from across the United States took part in a unique career development program in our nation's capital. During the six-day program, the National Youth Leadership Forum on National Security (NYLF/NS): Exploring American Diplomacy, Intelligence and Defense introduced students to the challenging careers in national security, intelligence, the diplomatic corps and more.

Jacob McGinley, a junior at Bruning-Davenport USD attended the National Forum Feb. 22-27. Jacob is a member of the B-D Letter Club, drama team, speech team, Quiz Bowl and high school choir. He also is a member of Trinity Lutheran Church, Trinity Lutheran League and the Youth Gathering Group. Jacob is the son of Robert and Denise McGinley of Bruning.

Through specialized simulations, the National Youth Leadership Forum on National Security strives to put students in the driver's seat of building a strategy that will uphold our national security," said Marguerite Regan, dean of academic affairs for NYLF. "The combination of interacting with professionals and with other students in this setting ensures that leaders are being developed so the future of our country will remain very bright."

The curriculum for the Forum on National Security is based on actual world events. Throughout the program, students use critical thinking, leadership and public speaking skills to tackle the complexity of national decision-making as they examine how the U.S. plans for peace and prepares for crisis. They employ a cri-

sis decision-making process similar to that employed by the nation's top policy makers. As a Forum participant, Jacob took part in a national security strategy exercise, which will focus on hypothetical events taking place in the Northeast Asian Community. This exercise was developed to illustrate the process that high-level officials use to address international security issues.

Students also participate in thought-provoking question and answer sessions with highly respected, internationally recognized civilian policy makers and senior military. In addition, leading institutions open their doors to NYLF/NS students, where they are educated in diplomacy, international affairs and military strategy. Jacob also visited the US Capitol, US Supreme Court, Library of Congress, The Smithsonian, the Embassy of Japan, the International Spy Museum, The nation's memorials, Washington's memorials, and the national Museum of Natural History.

## Electronic Records Improve Safety

Next week is National Patient Safety week. During this time, Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) wants to highlight the important patient safety improvements associated with the Electronic Health Record (EHR) system implemented in our facilities; the hospital and clinic in Hebron and the five satellite medical clinics in Bruning, Chester, Davenport, Deshler and Milligan.

Each year, up to 98,000 deaths are attributed to medical errors, many of which are linked to mistakes resulting from paper prescriptions. With EHR, Thayer County Health Services is working hard to diminish medication errors.

Having an EHR allows TCHS to put patient safety first while still improving our overall operational efficiency. It also ultimately gives TCHS a competitive edge with other hospitals because it makes receiving treatment safer in our facilities.

In the U.S., most hospitals still store their medical records on paper, which means they cannot be used easily to coordinate care, routinely measure quality, or reduce medical errors. These three important features are all part of the EHR system used by TCHS.

Studies have shown patient safety increases when an EHR system is in place. This is primarily due to the use of alerts, reminders and other components associated with Computerized Physician Order Entry (CPOE).

When providers use CPOE, it makes important patient information available to them at the time they are entering an order. For example, a physician may receive a warning about a potential interaction between a drug being prescribed and one the patient is currently taking.

Also once an order has been entered, the system allows them to track the steps involved in executing the order. This capability provides an additional mechanism for identifying and eliminating errors. CPOE provides information needed so errors become very hard to make.

Beyond just medication safety, there are two kinds of

interventions an EHR system can help with — the prevention of disease and the management of chronic disease. These intervention tools are the key to unlocking the true potential for EHR.

Through important EHR features: communication, coordination, measurement, and decision support, a provider is able to make a more informed diagnosis. In addition, EHR systems can integrate evidence-based recommendations for preventive services (such as screening exams) with patient data (such as age, sex, and family history) to identify patients meeting certain criteria who may need specific care.

The system can remind providers to recommend certain services during a routine visit and remind patients to schedule care if needed. Reminders generated by EHR systems have shown an increase in patients' compliance with preventive care.

The disease management offered with EHR systems identifies people with a potential or active chronic disease. Care is then tailored based on their level of risk. This may include monitoring their condition; attempt to modify their behavior; and adjust their therapy to prolong life, minimize complications, and reduce the need for costly acute care interventions.

The EHR system used by TCHS has already shown in its improving the quality of care given and overall patient safety. In the future, the National Health Information Exchange (NHIE) which TCHS is linked with will allow us to securely share patient health information with other healthcare providers involved in a patient's care, regardless of where they may be located.

This capability will reduce duplicate tests and make sure the most current health information is available when needed.


being seriously ill a couple of years ago.

## Small Business Development Center Serves Large Rural Territory

If you find yourself on the highways of North Central Kansas, you are bound to pass a silver Cadillac deVille somewhere on the stretch of road that connects Jewell County (population 3,000) to Saline (population 50,000.)

That car belongs to Linda Sutton, the director and sole employee of the North Central Kansas Small Business Development Center. The center was set up in 2003 to serve the 11 counties of North Central Kansas that were too far—a three hour's drive—from the nearest SBDC housed at Wichita State University. In the seven years since then, Sutton's little car has logged "too many miles to count" as she crisscrosses the region providing business owners with one-on-one support.

As you would expect, Sutton's clients include many local farmers. Her work often centers on helping these businesses diversify their streams of revenue. Tourism turns out to be one of the fastest-growing opportunities; more families are heading to the region to go on trail rides and visit pumpkin patches.

To help farms offer these kinds of attractions, or related services such as catering or bed-and-breakfast accommodations, Sutton last year put together a course called

"Agritourism: Your Next Cash Crop?" The course was designed to help farmers "put packages together so someone can spend an entire weekend and have different activities," Sutton says. It was also designed to recruit businesses to take part in the state's Simply Kansas program, an initiative that promotes food and agricultural products grown, raised, produced or processed in Kansas.

Loren Swenson, who runs a small fresh produce market called Prairie Produce, was one of Sutton's 18 students. After taking the class, he signed on to Simply Kansas. Swenson is now working to launch a website, PrairieProduce.com, and is taking additional classes with Sutton. "Linda has done an excellent job," says Swenson. "She works hard and is very enthusiastic."

Sutton has also created a program called Project Open to provide education, mentoring, and especially gap financing for local businesses, particularly in larger Saline County. ("The area didn't have a revolving loan fund to help business or programs to help entrepreneurs," Sutton says.)

Participants must either attend a series of three seminars that NCK SBDC offers or go

through Kauffman's Fastrac Program. Entrepreneurs who have completed the course-work are then eligible to apply for grants of up to \$5,000.

When she's not coaching farmers or helping businesses obtain working capital, Sutton devotes special attention to the area's women business owners. Early on, Sutton noticed that the male entrepreneurs in the area seemed to enjoy more and different networking opportunities than their female counterparts. "Men tend to talk about what's going on in their business," says Sutton. "Women focus on family and friends and weren't getting the experience of business networking."

In 2006, Sutton began to host a quarterly networking night for women entrepreneurs in the area. The sessions allowed local entrepreneurs to network and brainstorm, and share their stories about the daily challenges of running a business. Before each event, Sutton supplied attendees with a list of women-owned businesses in the area so they could shop or dine before or after a meeting, to support their fellow women-owned businesses.

Like many of her clients, Sutton does a lot with a little; hers is a classic one-person operation. Fortunately, her work hasn't gone unnoticed. For her efforts, she was named the SBA Women in Business Champion in 2007. And she was recognized again in 2009 when she was named the Kansas State Star and ASBDC Star Performer.




mate Derek Swartzendruber collected 11 rebounds and provided nine points.

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

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
