Nebraska under water — record flooding in 17 locations

Thayer County Emergency Manager, Colt Farringer was watching the river March 15. It had closed the southbound lane on Highway 5 overnight for a little over an inch of water, and the Thayer County Courthouse was posting updates on closed roads.

The river had crested in Hebron, but showed no increase, Farringer said.

And while the river gauge at DeWeese spiked six inches, Farringer was optimistic.

Up north, however, the Missouri River was 12 feet above flood stage Monday evening while 17 locations in the state saw record flooding and devastation. Two-thirds of Nebraska's counties have declared an emergency.

Nebraska Emergency Management Agency issued a press release that the river was expected to crest at 41 feet in Plattsmouth Sunday, which would break the 2011 record. Major flooding was predicted for Louisville due to the Platte River cresting 14.3 feet and at the Elkhorn River that crested 24.6 feet Sunday.

Floodwaters stopped trains from running,

trapped animals, closed off travel routes to places like Fremont and Wahoo, totally isolated communities near the Niobrara River, destroyed bridges and three people were reported deceased as of Monday.

Gov. Pete Ricketts called the flooding the largest disaster Nebraska has ever experienced. Vice President Mike Pence was scheduled to visit Nebraska and Iowa, along with senators and representatives.

The Chester Facebook page listed collection points for flood relief on its Facebook page with donations due by 12 p.m., March 21. Ongoing are the donations to the Niobrara Relief Fund, C/O F & M State Bank, P.O. Box 229, Niobrara, NE 68760.

Daniel and Andi Domeier's in Bruning; Wenske Automotive in Byron; Reuben and Anna Elting's in Davenport; Parkview Haven Nursing Home in Deshler; and Amanda's Cottage in Hebron were collection points for bottled water and gallons of water, dog and cat food, cleaning supplies and trash bags, paper items for eating and drinking, and hygiene products.

Harris's spark cultivated to deliver

Thayer Central Senior Maggie Harris, with the assistance of English teacher and coach, Anne Heitmann, recited her way to first place in the Poetry Out Loud state competition at the Sheldon Art Gallery in Lincoln March 10.

Harris competed alongside 15 other students from across Nebraska, and received \$200 with an all-expense paid trip to Washington

D.C., April 30 to May 1. Thayer Central also receives a \$500 stipend for the school library as part of the winning package.

She recited, "Bleeding Heart" by Carmen Giménez Smith; "Adam's Curse" by William Butler Yeats and "On the Death of Anne Brontë" by Charlotte Brontë.

Competitors selected poems to recite from an anthology of over 900 classic and contemporary pieces.

Harris will travel to Washington

D.C. — not a first for Harris as winner of the 2016 competition — escorted by an adult chaperone.

Naturally, she has invited the teacher who saw a spark in her as a freshman.

"There was a genuineness, a life she brought to delivery," Heitmann said.

Heitmann is a veteran to Poetry Out Loud and mom to her own state champion, Russell Heitmann.

Bulldogger wrestles on, and teaches

Dru Melvin still holds the arena record in steer wrestling in Salinas, California — 4.9 seconds from 2011.

Melvin recently returned home from the rodeo circuit, and although he has slowed down since his 14-year stretch of being on the circuit full time, the bulldogger rides on and will soon instruct youngsters at the 30th Annual Spring Vacation Steer Wrestling School in Ogallala at the end of the month.

The two-time National Finals Rodeo qualifier in 2006 and 2014 won his first buckle at age six and continued to compete in steer wrestling and team roping all through high school. He earned a rodeo scholarship to college.

Rodeos are the closest thing to the old west Melvin, who grew up in Tyrone, has seen.

"The events have been modified, but they used to calf rope, doctor cattle, ride broncos and I feel like it's the closest thing to a western way of life," he said.

Being on the road is lot like driving a truck with the horses in tow, Melvin said, with expenses split among the team and spending time away from family.

Steer wrestling is the quickest event in a rodeo that demands speed and strength to succeed.

The Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association notes the world record is 2.4 seconds and describes the "catch" in the event is the steer's weight at more than twice of the cowboy and when the two meet in the arena, they are both going about 30 miles per hour.

The wrestler starts on horseback while the steer gets a head start, which is tailored to the arena's size. The wrestler pursues the steer once the animal reaches the advantage point. From there, the cowboy rides to a point he can slide off part way and wrap his right arm around the steer's right horn and grab the left one.

The cowboy's hazer is mounted on the other side to keep the steer within the bulldogger's grasp.

Melvin bought his rodeo permit in 2002, then had to win for the PRCA card he bought in 2003. He joined PRCA full time in 2005. In 2006, he made his first NFR in Las Vegas, Nev.

"I've been in the best parts of the country at the best times," he said. "In the fall, we go to Washington and Oregon. Denver rolls around in January. The American semifinals are in Fort Worth."

The rodeo season runs all year, beginning Oct. 1.

The cowboy tradition runs in the family.

Melvin met his wife, Brittany at a college rodeo in Hays, Kan. His father, Wayne, was a PRCA permit holder for the amateur circuit in Nebraska, and every year in North Platte, the Melvin-Swanston-Halligan Memorial Rodeo is held. He and Brittany have been in Spain for the Pamplona Running of the Bulls.

His tour has stretched to Canada, mainly in Alberta and British Columbia, although Melvin has competed in Saskatchewan as well.

A shoulder injury in 2006 sidelined the bulldogger for part of 2007, but he placed in three of 10 rounds wearing a shoulder brace. Melvin displaced his right shoulder nine times during the season, according to his online record at prorodeo.com.

"You start in the saddle and bend your right leg," he said about the bulldogging form. "Lots of times, your shirt gets ripped off."

S. E. Firestone traded for the A. B. Gregory house on Second street and is moving it to a location three blocks north of the courthouse, where he will fix it up for his residence. This house has a moving history. The writer built it in 1873 for a tenant house. Since then it has had many owners and has been moved to several locations.

On Monday night, Mr. Evans of the place, suffered a heavy loss in the sudden death from colic of his Clydesdale stallion. He had recently purchased the animal in Ohio, the consideration being \$1,600.

Among the inventions originated by Hebron people, none we have seen appear to have a more perfect adaptation to the end for which they are designed than the Adjustable Book Holder, recently perfected by F. A. Powell.

J. W. Hoskins is building a livery stable 32x48 feet in size on the corner of Fourth street and Jefferson avenue.

Necessary sanitary precautions of this season of the year required the cleaning of back alleys.

110 Years Ago

How would you like to be the ice-man? It is interesting to note the magnitude of the ice packing business during the time of ice harvest. Ed Shearer has had a gang of 40 men putting up 1500 tons filling his two houses besides shipping 20 cars to Geneva, Belvidere, Shickley, Byron, Stoddard, Ruskin and Gilead. The system with which the men work can be seen in the fact that they ran 22 tons into a car and pushed it out of the way in 28 minutes. Each man has his station and they work like a well drilled military squad. A plowman with a horse blocks out the ice on the river with an ice-plow. This has large graduated teeth which cuts two inches deep and the plowman retraced each line twice, making a cut six inches deep, after which the cake of ice 10 inches thick is easily broken off. The "key" cake is worked out, the field man cutting the ice with a hand ice saw. Then the floaters guide the floating rain of cakes consisting of 60 blocks, two wide and 30 long. This is floated to the "crib," into which it is run, ready to hoist out of the water with a single horse. Seven cakes are hoisted at a time and with two loads another horse takes the 14 cakes, weighing 250 pounds each, onto the track, which is about 500 feet long. Then the hoisting team pulls it up an incline about 12 feet high and into the ice house,

where the house men place it in positions where it is leveled off ready for the next layer. The 40 men put up about 400 tons a day, or 40 tons an hour. Mr. Shearer owns the land on both sides of the river from the foot of Union Avenue to the mill.

There are 396 soldiers buried in twenty-one cemeteries in Thayer County. Two Civil War veterans and one Indian fighter are buried on farms. One veteran of the War of 1812 is buried at Alexandria, and one veteran of the Mexican War is buried at Chester. Fifteen veterans of Indian Wars lie in cemeteries at Hebron, Alexandria, Belvidere and Rose Creek. The Civil War veterans buried in the various parts of the county number 327. Especially strong gales kept county volunteer firefighters battling a field blaze for over six hours Monday. All 11 county departments and Fairbury assisted in the effort. Several farmers and businesses provided assistance as well. No one was hurt in the fire, but extensive

damage was reported at the Cecil Hayes farm. Damage was also reported at the Stuart Sutton farm and to a county bridge.

Bonnie Bueller will head home from work for good next week after serving as Thayer County's chief dispatcher for 31 years. "I was hired by Sheriff Jim Johnson," she says. "I was working for the roads department at the time and he asked me if I wanted to be a dispatcher. Considering there was no dispatcher prior to Mueller, she said yes to a job she didn't know much about. Bonnie has watched countless deputies and dispatchers pass through the local law enforcement center and has worked for four sheriffs.

The old bank building in Belvidere was demolished last week. The landmark, thought to have been established in the late 1800s, underwent a couple of transitions in its existence. The bank, known as the Co-operative Credit Association, closed in the 1950s, and was used for many years as the local post office. The postal service closed the

doors because it no longer met safety standards and the town of Belvidere purchased the building a few months ago but found that renovation and upkeep expense would be prohibitive. "The antique safe from inside the bank will be preserved at the Thayer County Museum," said Belvidere correspondent LaDonna Avers. "The stones from the facade that identified the building as the State Bank of Belvidere are being kept to eventually make a memorial on the site of the building."

National Doctors' Day -- A time to celebrate our local healthcare providers

National Doctors' Day is held every year on March 30 in the United States and has become a day for us to say thanks to the nation's 972,000 physicians. Here at Thayer County Health Services, we are especially thankful for our Rural Healthcare Providers. Our medical staff is committed to providing exceptional healthcare to their patients. Doctors' Day is a good reminder for us to let all of our providers know we appreciate them choosing to practice in a rural setting.

For years, we have heard about the shortage of physicians in rural communities. Sadly because of this, many residents in rural communities have limited access to healthcare services. According to Census.gov, 19.3 percent of Americans live in rural areas, but the ratio of physicians to patients is 1 to 2,500, which means that 60 million people are dealing with the impact of this shortage. In fact, of the 93 counties in Nebraska, many of the counties have three or less primary care physicians, and in 2018 thirteen of these counties have no primary care physician at all.

Part of the reason for the doctor shortage is the challenge of recruiting physicians to rural areas. Many times, rural health care facilities simply do not have the resources to pay doctor salaries that are comparable to those at larger hospitals or more populated areas. While physician assistants, nurse practitioners, and other providers can provide some of the same services as doctors, many of the challenges of drawing physicians to rural areas apply to these professionals as well.

However, the University of Nebraska Medical Center's most recent workforce report on Nebraska contained findings that showed growth from 2007 to 2017, such as the number of physicians increasing by 20 percent, physician assistants were up 52 percent, and nurse practitioners increased 50 percent. Practicing medicine in a rural area can be very challenging and demanding but can also be very rewarding. Research has shown that physicians most likely to choose to practice in a rural community are those who grew up in a rural area. Programs that encourage students in rural areas to consider medical careers have been shown to be the most effective.

In rural communities, access to high-quality health care services depends on the availability of good rural

TCHS held Teddy Bear Clinic

On March 13, Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) held its annual Teddy Bear Clinic, sponsored this year by a generous Thrivent grant on behalf of TCHS employee Jolene Beckmann.

"The purpose of this event is to help children understand what a doctor's visit will entail by walking through the process with their stuffed animal. It is meant to be fun but also helps to remove the sense of fear that is often associated with going to the hospital," said Kassi Hartley, Marketing Director at TCHS.

The Teddy Bear Clinic invited children to schedule an appointment for their favorite stuffed animal. Each child experienced the check in process first hand as they told the volunteer how their stuffed animal was feeling and why it needed an appointment. The answers

ranged from broken legs to being tired from too much candy.

Up first was a trip to the lab where they learned about good and bad bacteria, watched their animal receive a blood draw and were able to see how an infrared vein finder is used. Unfortunately, the device only detected stuffing, but some brave volunteers offered up their arms to see their own veins and the reactions were priceless.

The next stop took them to a handwashing station where they had "germs" in the form of lotion that shows up under a blacklight placed on their hands. Each child washed their hands and then returned to the blacklight to see all the spots they had missed. A resounding "ew" had many returning for a second trip to the sink to re-wash their hands. After that enlightening experience, the group traveled down the

hall to visit radiology where they saw just how easy it is to receive an x-ray and even took a copy of their stuffed animal's x-ray home.

A trip across the corridor to the clinic led them to immunizations where their stuffed animal was administered a shot and received a cool band-aid in return. After receiving a sticker for being so brave, they met Jarie Sones, APRN, Family Nurse Practitioner, to examine the eyes and ears of their animals.

Once the stuffed animals were patched up and given a clean bill of health by Jarie, the stuffed animals and their owners said goodbye knowing that the hospital isn't a scary place to go, but will keep them healthy and they'll walk away with a cool sticker.



my work and an important mentor, coach and teacher,” Harris, who is also a member of the Thayer Central speech team and has performed in several school musicals.

Harris has risen to new levels in the poetry program, where the set standard of excellence pushes students to develop their talents far and above the normal perspective of speaking events, which aren’t typically seen as exciting.

“We’re that good. We set the bar high,” Heitmann said. “Several kids have that strong talent, so they have to work to set themselves apart.”

Harris’s spark has turned into a refined delivery of sophistication because as Heitmann put it, her audience doesn’t get to read the poem. Instead, they are depending on competitors like Harris to relay the poem’s meaning and emotions associated with it.

“That’s a big challenge,” Heitmann said. “The student is tasked with bringing the poem to life by their voice and physical presence.”

“A writer can condense an emotion, thought or life into a poem,” Harris said.

Above all, she trusts Heitmann’s vision for her, which doesn’t encroach on Harris’s own intuitiveness to tweak the end delivery.

“I don’t want to coach that out of her,” she said about Harris and other students who trust her, but are willing to toil. “I do my happy dance and it’s worth it.”

Her coaching isn’t comfortable for students at times and just like other contests, it’s a matter of trial and error.

Students must feel a connection to their selected poems, like Harris’s performance in her freshman and junior years of “Quite Frankly,” by Mark Halliday. It’s one of her parents’ favorites.

After she sees the connection between students and their poems, Heitmann lets them take the reins to fine tune the process of delivery, — the subtle movements — perhaps a tilt of the head or small gestures that must have some degree of incognito spontaneity without forethought.

“The performance should look like it is happening,” Heitmann said. “Any speaking event is the same way.”

Heitmann laid the schedule for nationals out — Washington D.C., will be mostly work. Out of 52 states (U.S. Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico included), only a few make it to the finals.

“What a neat experience to be among such diversity and common interests and passions,” she said.

Harris agrees. She surprised herself as a freshman by qualifying for the national contest in 2016, and after the finals competition, the competitors held a get together with an open mic session.

“That was the coolest thing, seeing those perspectives. No one in that room came from the same place. After the party, 15 of us sat in the basement of the hotel and just talked all night,” she said.

She is hoping to see a fellow reciter there who recognized her at a scholarship competition in Kansas from watching Harris on poetry videos.

Harris won the school competition in front of outside judges to advance to the statewide stage.

She is the daughter of Drew and Amy Harris, and planning to attend Nebraska Wesleyan University to major in communication and political science, and is interested in the university’s theater program.

In fact, every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood and less than 38 percent of the population is eligible to give blood or platelets. A single whole

blood donation can help more than one person, in fact one donation can potentially save up to three lives.

Blood and platelet donations help cancer patients because certain cancers and cancer treatments prevent patients from producing their own platelets. Trauma patients benefit from Power Red donations, because red cells carry oxygen throughout the body and are frequently given to trauma and surgery patients. Sick cell patients need whole blood, especially from African-American donors, because sickle cell patients require multiple transfusions and must be very closely matched to the donor’s blood type, usually from the same racial and ethnic group.

Each year, an estimated 6.8 million people in the U.S. donate blood and TCHS is doing their part every 8 weeks. As the American Red Cross says, “Every drop counts.”
