County appeals to FEMA

Three bridges swept under flood waters in 2015 are awaiting reimbursement from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The bridges are on Road K between 5800 and 5900; Road R between 6800 and 6900; and Road 5100 and Highway 136.

Thayer County Road Superintendent George Gerdes said the difference between what FEMA is wanting to pay and what the county planned on being reimbursed is about \$1,005,000.

That's because FEMA regulations require the county to rebuild the bridges back to their original state, but Nebraska's regulations won't allow it.

"We can't rebuild a timber bridge," Gerdes said. "We have to rebuild according to state regulations."

The federal agency signed an agreement to reimburse the county \$1,005,000. After the county took bids out on the bridges and construction contracts were signed, FEMA stated it would only pay for the bridges if they were rebuilt to pre-flood conditions. An agreement with the Thayer County Commissioners in a January 2016 meeting shows FEMA agreed to reimburse the county 75 percent of the cost with Nebraska Emergency Management Agency and the county paying 12.5 percent each.

"They decided they were going to repair, not replace," Gerdes said. "NEMA doesn't pay anything until FEMA pays. We had to pay 100 percent."

The county penned a letter to Congressman Adrian Smith last fall, in which Smith told the county he had contacted FEMA.

In February, the county appealed FEMA's decision. It is also keeping Smith updated on the process.

Gerdes said Molly Bargmann of NEMA told him he will have to appeal twice.

"If we don't appeal, we won't get the agreed amount," Gerdes said.

Bargmann could not be reached for comment.

Hospital scratches billing system

Thayer County Health Services isn't just going to revamp its billing system — the hospital is scrapping it all together.

Fixing the billing system is not only a priority for the hospital, it is included in the strategic plan for 2019 to 2021.

But the new system should actually be ready to rollout Aug. 1 as the current system is phased out in three steps.

"We have listened to concerns and have taken them seriously," hospital chief executive officer, David Burd said.

He and the hospital's chief financial officer, Doug Wismer, told the Thayer County Commissioners about the strategic plan, which has five points — Customer Service, Organizational loyalty, Organizational Strengths, Billing Processes and Services Available.

The hospital has a new revenue cycle director, Hayley Ridder and along with Wismer, they examined the billing system. Together, Ridder and Wismer concluded billing should be brought under hospital control.

Local Region V pioneers program

The Fairbury/Hebron division of Region V Services was highlighted for "raising the bar" in the Region V 2017 annual report and those responsible received kudos at the Thayer County Commissioners meeting March 14 from the executive director.

"Special education folks are who we serve," Region V Executive Director from Lincoln, Dave Merrill, said. "One of our best job placement people is right here — she has better success than the Lincoln people."

In Hebron and Fairbury, Region V Employment Consultant Lori Swanda reported 21 people are competitively employed and the centers have a 91 percent rate for the Career Academy.

"It's a big part of my job," Swanda said.

About two years ago, Darla Wilkerson from Kansas City, Mo., taught how the Career Academy works to Region V.

"That's what we started doing," Swanda said.

The Career Academy is a six to

eight week program with a graduation party at the end.

Swanda said some people at Region V secure jobs before graduation. In Career Academy, they learn how to craft a resume and do mock interviews with potential employers. For those who can't decide on a career, they shadow people at their jobs.

"We also provide job coaching," Swanda said. Once a person is offered a job, Region V will help the person learn the job, taking the responsibility off the employer.

"We back out as soon as we can. We also have employers who take on the support at the job sites sooner," she said.

Thirteen people in Fairbury are competitively employed and there are eight in Hebron. Two people are currently looking for work with one of them experienced in office tasks. The other person is undecided on a career.

"We are job shadowing with that person," Swanda said.

Region V works with Nebraska VR (vocational rehabilitation) in the effort to employ people.

Swanda has worked for Region V for 21 years. She began as a sub-

stitute, but after Hebron's Region V opened in 1998, Swanda started working in vocational.

"We really stepped our employment program up in the recent years," Swanda said. "I attribute that success to being involved with the community and networking. The community is more supportive when you're involved."

"We're really proud of the program and the job people are doing there," Merrill said.

He said the Region V crew in Hebron and Fairbury are "pioneers" of the Career Academy.

In fact, Merrill said a group from Syracuse University has used the success stories from the area because visitors from other countries were interested in how people with developmental disabilities were doing in their communities.

A think tank was developed to gather information and address challenges people with developmental disabilities face as they integrate into communities.

"If we don't have people who are willing to give people with disabilities a chance, we can't make the job connections," Merrill said.

School remembers Florida victims

Last week, the Thayer Central Student Council held an activity to protest school violence in lieu of the social media effort that encouraged students to attend the National School Walk-Out March 14 to protest gun violence in schools after 17 students were killed at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla., on Valentine's Day.

"We did not want Thayer Central students unsupervised outside of the building and to avoid this, we visited with the student council on ways our students could express concern over school violence without making this an issue of gun control or other political measures," Thayer Central posted on its Facebook page.

Superintendent Drew Harris said

the school board was informed of the activity at the March 12 meeting. Parents were informed via social media and the school's website, and students received emails they could share with their parents.

"We're not calling it a walkout," Harris said prior to the event. "It is in no way required. We can certainly create our own deal about school violence."

Harris said they had heard students were talking about walking out of school and felt a controlled activity raising awareness would help keep students safe.

"Our effort here is to be against school violence. Every school should want that," Harris said.

The Student Council held the activity for students in grades 7-12

in the gymnasium. A video with photos of the students killed was shown. The Thayer Central Facebook posting explained the video will humanize those who died.

"The sole purpose of the activity is to diminish school violence and help kids recognize that we do not want it to happen here," the school posting stated.

Harris said the walkout on social media was an unguided one and by holding an organized event at Thayer Central, students had a safe place to express themselves for a worthy cause.

In addition, Harris said in nearly all school shooting incidents, at least one other student knew about the incidents before they

As the system is phased out, the hospital will hire and train new employees to establish billing.

"I want people to be excited and recognize we are still a ways out," Burd said. "Healthcare billing is very complex and the process is time consuming."

He told the commissioners billing has been a roadblock for the hospital.

Commissioner Dean Krueger said hospital services are economically important in a community.

"If you want something, you have to support it," he said, although he acknowledged the billing has contributed to the hospital's struggles for the last several

years. Supporting the hospital complements Wismer's perspective on patients who want to travel to Lincoln for services.

"Some people think our charges are too high, but taking time off work and driving isn't saving. We provide everything those hospitals do," Wismer said.

Burd said with construction coming to a close, the hospital has seen more positives than negatives.

An open house is scheduled for April 29 with Lt. Gov. Mike Foley, Laura Redouty, president of the Nebraska Hospital Association and Sen. Laura Ebke invited.

"We are trying to encourage kids if they know something, they have to communicate with adults. That is the best prevention to any school violence situation," he said.

Deshler and Bruning-Davenport superintendents, Al Meier and Trudy Clark said they weren't approached by students on the walkout.

"We didn't have any kids inquire about it," Meier said. "We were ready to embrace it. We heard what other schools were doing and we were ready to listen to ideas, but we didn't have any kids come forward and that is where we left it."

In Fairbury March 14, about 60 students walked out. High school principal Nick Kroon said the students were directed to walk out the front door only and teachers took attendance before and after the walkout. The school prepped before the walkout to ensure student safety.

"We knew it was a national day, so we prepared and contacted law enforcement," Kroon said.

Students came out of the building and sat down at the end of a walkway, Kroon said. He encouraged them to ask questions.

"I was very impressed with their questions," he said.

Students asked about all kinds of issues, from arming teachers to safety protocols. Fairbury Police Chief Chad Sprunk answered questions as well.

"It gave them a chance to voice their opinions and the kids got a lot out of it," Kroon said. "Other schools did some pretty neat things."

Kroon said, in his opinion, he doesn't agree with arming teachers.

"There's a reason teachers

teach and cops are cops," he said.

Kroon did say they have discussed armed guards and the local police department, along with the Jefferson County Commissioners, are interested.

Fairbury has held a Standard Response Protocol drill.

"The biggest thing is we want them behind a locked door," he said.

Students shouldn't be "frozen in fear," in a school shooting, he said.

He said the drill, held in coordination with the district's other two buildings and local law enforcement, went well.

"The teachers and students did outstanding," he said.

The district will probably hold another drill before the end of the school year to keep students aware and thinking. Acrisis team is also in place.

The National School Walkout was organized by the Women's March Youth Empower. The website acts as a guide for students who want to organize walkouts.

March 14 was a day to protest gun violence and as the website states, "We DON'T need adults speaking on our behalf."

One of the organization's members, Linda Sasour, a Palestinian-American, is a professional speaker and activist. In her speeches that criticize Zionism, she says anti-semitism is one branch of racism. The former executive director for Arab American Association of New York, Sasour said the existential threat resides in the White House.

She is also a supporter of Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions, a movement on college campuses, protesting Israel.

Diabetes education program merits ADA recognition

The Thayer County Health Services diabetes self-management education program has been awarded continued Recognition from the American Diabetes Association. The TCHS program was originally recognized in February of 2006.

This program offers high-quality education services to the patients it serves. Education Recognition status is verified by an official certificate from ADA and awarded for four years.

The ADA Education Recognition effort, begun in the fall of 1986, is a voluntary process which assures that approved education programs have met the National Standards for Diabetes Self-Management Education Programs.

Programs that achieve Recognition status have a staff of knowledgeable health professionals who can provide state-of-the-art information about diabetes management for participants.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) 2017 National Diabetes Statistic Report there are 30.3 million people or 9.4 percent of the population in the United States who have diabetes. While an estimated 23.1 million have been diagnosed, unfortunately, 7.2 million people are not aware that they have this disease.

Each day more than 3,900 people are diagnosed with diabetes. Many will first learn that they have diabetes when they are treated for one of its life-threatening complications – heart disease and stroke, kidney disease, blindness, and nerve disease and amputation. About 1.5 million new cases of diabetes were diagnosed in people aged 18 years or older in 2015.

Diabetes continues to be the seventh leading cause of death in the U.S. in 2015 as it contributed to 252,806 deaths.

Self-management education is an essential component of diabetes treatment.

One consequence of compliance with the National Standards is the greater consistency in the quality and quantity of education offered to people with diabetes.

The participant in an ADA Recognized program will be taught, as needed, self-care skills that will promote better management of his or her diabetes treatment regimen. All approved education programs cover the following topics as needed: diabetes disease process; nutritional management; physical activity; medications; monitoring; preventing, detecting, and treating acute complications; preventing, detecting, and treating chronic complications through risk reduction; goal setting and problem solving; psychological adjustment; and preconception care, management during pregnancy, and gestational management.

Assuring high-quality education for patient self-care is one of the primary goals of the Education Recognition program. Through the support of the health care team and increased knowledge and awareness of diabetes, the patient can assume a major part of the responsibility for his/her diabetes management. Unnecessary hospital admissions and some of the acute and chronic complications of diabetes may be prevented through self-management education.

"The process gives professionals a national standard by which to measure the quality of the services they provide", commented, TCHS Registered Dietitian Nutritionist, Kathryn Retzlaff. "And, of course, it helps consumers to identify these quality programs."

Man charged with child abuse

In Thayer County Court March 16, Todd Nelson, 49, of Hebron, attended his bond hearing with public defender Ben Murray based on a felony charge of child abuse from March 14 that carries a prison term of up to three years.

Judge Linda Bauer presided via video from the bench in Saline County and advised Nelson of his rights. A preliminary hearing was set for April 9 at 2:30 p.m.

Nelson is in Thayer County jail on 10 percent of a \$50,000 bond. The review was for a reduction in bond.

Murray said Nelson is the sole supporter of his family. He is employed full time and could lose his job if he stays in jail.

Thayer County Attorney Dan Werner asked the bond be increased to 10 percent of \$100,000 because Nelson has a pending case for

a misdemeanor charge of child abuse from Feb. 2.

That preliminary hearing is set for April 23 at 11:15 a.m. Nelson pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Werner said both incidents involved the same 6-year-old victim and the child and the public should be protected. He asked bond conditions include separating Nelson from the family. The victim has a younger sibling. Both children are under the care of the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

In the most recent incident, the 6-year-old was sent to school and then seen by a doctor, who reported the boy had a fractured clavicle, which was not displaced.

Bauer instructed Nelson there will be no contact with the children. He may only contact their mother through counsel.
