## Hohensee prefers rural facility

Kent Hohensee became the chief executive officer of Blue Valley Lutheran Homes a little over a year ago and is shaping a team by bringing people like administrator Doug Chos for the Care Home and Lynne Gibson's return to Courtyard Terrace.

"Doug came from the Stromsberg area. He's done well. Lynne is a great fit," Hohensee said. In January, he brought in Amanda Beam for director of nursing, and Melissa Brown is training for social services.

"It's hard to make changes in your first year. You have necessary changes, but not major changes. I'm still getting acclimated," he said.

He identified a leadership base with existing employees because long term care is a customer service industry.

"The work that is done in long term care settings — it is hard work," he said. "Residents are like family. We're all here to work in their home. That mentality has to be there."

Blue Valley's philosophy has always been to treat everyone with a Christian value approach.

"We work for them," Hohensee added.

Hohensee deliberately went into long term care after researching the field — he first interviewed a Good Samaritan board member and after researching, started classes. His degree was broad, and Hohensee narrowed his focus.

"The networking with other administrators in the industry is what I really enjoyed," he said.

In an industry that's tied to more regulations than nuclear power plants, Hohensee's goal remains: to give residents personable care. Remodeled rooms include simulated wood floors and furniture from residents' homes to give them a boost to enjoy life. A new era in long term care will issue in private rooms with their own bathrooms.

Some residents at Blue Valley have been there for years while others stay for rehabilitation and leave. The facility offers physical and occupational therapies.

Activities are also important.

"All three buildings do a wonderful job of planning activities," Hohensee said. He is currently in

a Wii bowling tournament at Courtyard Terrace as he described a resident who defeated him.

"She beat be bad and then I found out her and her husband used to bowl three times a week," he said. "I'm getting challenges after that match. It does feel like home."

It always comes back to the higher standards care facilities are held to.

"Not everything is going to go as planned, but we try to do the best we can for each person every day," he said. "Even if they feel like they're confined, they can still do things."

To understand resident concerns better, Blue Valley uses the Abacus customer service model, and interviews the resident if possible and families, and contributes staff observations for data analyses to identify possible flaws.

It's a proactive rather than reactive model with data to make proper changes.

"We look for trends. The program is actually through a company that helped create the state surveys. We have a state surveyor doing training on the program," Hohensee said.

Blue Valley works closely with Thayer County Health Services as well. Hohensee meets regularly with hospital CEO David Burd. Electronic records further the relationship between the two facilities.

Although Hohensee works on statewide health-care issues — he sits on the Nebraska Hospital Association's government relations committee and the reimbursement committee for the Nebraska Health Care Association — he prefers facilities in small towns.

"I feel like in larger communities, I would struggle to get to know families and residents. That's just not me. I am more personable, he said.

Hohensee commutes from Beatrice and will be moving to Plymouth area. He attended the Southeast Community College program for nursing home administrators and also had training at the Wilber facility. Hohensee has a background in nursing home and skilled nursing facilities in Pawnee City and Rockport, Mo. At one point, he was licensed in three states.

## Smith attends luncheon in Hebron

Congressman Adrian Smith (R) representing Nebraska's third district, was in Hebron at Southeast Community College Learning Center Feb. 20 for an informal luncheon with select guests.

The public and media weren't notified. Smith's aide, Matthew Goulding, said the congressman's office doesn't inform the public of meetings arranged by someone outside the office.

Jason Weigle of University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension in Thayer, Nuckolls and eight other counties, said he was contacted by the congressman's office to schedule and facilitate the meeting. Weigle was asked to draw 20 to 25 people from Thayer and surrounding counties for a small, informal session.

"A lot of sectors weren't invited," Weigle said. "I thought of people who wouldn't normally be able to talk to the congressman. That was how I sorted people out."

As it turned out, some fell off the guest list because the original meeting date was during the government shutdown. Smith had to cancel due to an impending vote in Washington.

"We ended up losing many people, but it ended up being a Thayer show," Weigle said.

The meeting was just short of an hour and attended by two Thayer County Commissioners, David Bruning and Dean Krueger, hospital CEO David Burd, Pat Kenner of Thayer County Bank and others.

Bruning and Krueger took advantage of Smith's visit and handed one of his assistants a packet of documents regarding the 2015 flood the county has not received reimbursement for from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

"We had appealed a second time and hadn't received anything back. We thought since he was going to be here, we will see what he can do," Bruning said during the Feb. 27 commissioner's meeting.

Smith's office couldn't comment on the matter because in order for Smith to talk about whatever assistance he can provide to the county, Bruning would need to complete a privacy release.

Bruning had to complete a privacy release just so Smith's office could work on the FEMA case, according to the Privacy Act of 1974, Smith's office said.

Kenner said his concerns center on Medicaid/Medicare reimbursements for hospitals and nursing homes.

"I know it's been a big issue with nursing homes," Kenner said.

Kent Hohensee of Blue Valley Lutheran Homes, wasn't invited to the luncheon, but sits on two committees for the Nebraska Hospital Association and Nebraska Health Care Association. He said 33 nursing homes went into receivership because they couldn't make payroll. Medicaid reimbursements are \$30 below per day of what it costs to take care of one resident.

"We're concerned the elderly should be the first priority," Hohensee said about the Medicaid expansion, which opens up ages 19 to 64. "It's all one big pot now."

Hohensee acknowledged Medicaid/Medicare fraud played a part — the U.S. Department of Justice has recovered millions in fraud arrests and convictions in the past two years.

As for the industry he is in, Kenner said small, independent banks are headed in the right direction.

## Merchant offers city \$1 for lot

Doug Modlin, owner of The Bottle Shop in downtown Hebron offered the city \$1 for the vacant lot next door to this shop at Monday evening's city council meeting.

The lot at 119 N. 4th St., was recently cleared of a dilapidated building and sold to the city as was 117 N. 4th St.

Prior to Modlin's offer, the council was mulling city attorney, Joe Murray's suggestion of a two-part bidding process that would let potential buyers know the city wants timely improvements on the properties.

"We could develop our own bid forms," Murray said.

Modlin said he would give the city the dollar and he would invest thousands to expand his shop with a new roof system for his existing building and the new one.

"I don't want to get into a bidding war with someone who wants to buy it and do nothing with it," Modlin said.

Modlin said should the lot at 117 be improved, there would be a green space between the two buildings.

The building next door to

Modlin that came down shared a wall with his shop.

"It was a common wall. If that wall fell over, our shop would still stand," he said. "There is nothing feasible about repairing the wall or saving it. There is a crack that goes from the top to the bottom."

He added it is in his best interests to own the lot.

The city is dealing with the two properties on 4th Street and two others, 740 Lincoln Ave. and 140 S. 8th St.

"We want to keep this on track," Murray said. He will format a custom-made bid form for the properties and present it at the April meeting.

In another property matter, Randy Smith would like his property near the hospital to be unlocked. As it stands, Smith said he is hauling hay and other loads through the hospital parking lot that didn't used to be there.

"We just want it un-landlocked," Smith said.

The issue dates back to 2000 when the city had the land for sale and it was sold to the Smiths for \$1,000, but the legal description

wasn't accurate. The sale was rescinded a month after it was sold.

Huber said the situation needs correcting.

"If we had re-advertised it years ago, we could have taken care of this," Murray said.

Randy Hergott, who attended the meeting, told the city they shouldn't sell it because Smith had ulterior motives.

"There was something wrong with the description. That's the reason this was stopped," Murray said.

"Thankfully," Hergott answered.

In other business, the LB840 application process was addressed with a flow chart.

Applications for Hebron sales tax money will be presented to the Citizen Advisory Committee. Financials will be sent to a third party financial advisor for review.

According to the chart, applications that are denied may go through a public meeting and advisory committee process.

In addition, the council approved an upgrade for wastewater valves at a cost of \$14,940.

# Pages of the Past...

## 1889

### 130 Years Ago

F. N. Renwick, formerly a banker at Belvidere, and now engaged in that business at Kanapolis, Kan., is visiting relatives in Carleton. He reports business very dull in that part of Kansas--the result of crop failures for three years in succession.

Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Clay of Belvidere precinct, gave a sumptuous dinner on New Year's Day to their neighbors and immediate friends. A good time was had, the merry party enjoying themselves hugely at croquet and various other outdoor sports. The mild climate of Nebraska affording splendid temperature for the enjoyment of such.

On Tuesday morning the northbound B&M train from Chester to Fairmont discovered a railway velocipede on the track south of Stoddard, and a little further on found a man lying by the track in an insensible condition. He was picked up by the train and brought to this city. He did not regain consciousness until about 2 o'clock in the afternoon of the day in question. The unfortunate man is quite prominently connected with local railway circles and had come up from Chester to this place to attend the masquerade ball on Monday evening in this city. He had started on his homeward journey when he met with his misfortune.

C. B. Trout was the successful one of the three bidders for the poor farm superintendency, and will be his own successor.

If one half of those who have "sworn off" this year will maintain their new positions, Hebron will have a number of model men by the close of 1889.

## 1899

### 120 Years Ago

Judson Marsh, Oscar Carter and Howard Kingsley have a very attractive and interesting exhibit of curios that they collected on the other side of the waters. An admittance of 10c is charged. Patronize the boys and you will get your money's worth. The collection consists of coins, knives, swords, pictures, handkerchiefs, doilies, shoes and many other reminders of the days spent in and around Manila.

Capt. John W. Richards died at his home two and a half miles southwest of Hebron, Jan. 21, aged 72 years, one month and seven days. He was born in Cornwall, England, coming to American in 1852. He worked for years in the copper mines and came to Thayer County in 1885, locating in Hebron, where he bought property and built a hotel. Five years ago he bought a fine farm on Spring Creek

where he lived at the time of his death.

P. W. Anderson and family departed this week for their new home at Webster, Harris County, Texas. Thayer County thus loses one of its best citizens, but possibly Texas may need just such brawn and brain to develop its agricultural and political possibilities.

## 1909

### 110 Years Ago

Stoddard Moonbeams: John Watson, living west of town, died Sunday evening, January 31. He died suddenly of heart trouble. Mr. Watson was an old and highly respected citizen and a great favorite...In the drawing contest at Lockwood's store last Saturday, Mrs. Dora Steele took first prize, a bedroom set; Mrs. Sisson, 2nd prize, a pair of portieres; Joe Garner, 3rd prize, a suitcase; Mrs. Ball, 4th prize, a salad dish; Mrs. Simpson, 5th prize, a teakettle.

Gilead Gabbles by Gob: The store of H. J. Bauer was robbed early Tuesday morning. Quite a large amount of goods were taken, and as yet no clue to the robber has been discovered.

Spring Creek Doings: Master Everet Walters, the 9 or 10-year-old son of Mr. Sam Walters, while doing chores Saturday evening, slipped and fell down out of the hay loft, breaking his arm between the wrist and elbow and dislocating one bone in the elbow. Dr. Boyes was called and reduced the fracture, and the little fellow is fine at present.

From the Chester Herald: If the women of this country had the right of suffrage it is likely they would look more clearly into a brutal tariff that imposes duties of upward of 100 percent on their woolen dress goods and the flannels of their children.

## 1919

### 100 Years Ago

Earl Smith purchased W. R. Hall's barber shop at Carleton, and moved over there. Mrs. Smith will finish teaching her term in the Hebron school.

Hubbell News: The town board and business men of Hubbell met at the town hall and discussed the electric light proposition...The German Lutheran church bell, four miles north of Hubbell, was heard tolling for Ex-President Roosevelt's funeral, Wednesday.

The Burlington round house at Chester burned Saturday night. No trace of how the fire started could be found. One engine and all the tools, etc., were burned. The friends and patrons of the Blue Valley Hospital will be pleased to learn that its doors are again open and ready to receive patients. The general management will be

A year ago Secretary Sheldon of the Nebraska Historical Society learned that the captured girl, now Laura Roper Vance, is still living, at Enid, Okla. (The Alexandria Argus) After a lapse of several years, the North Prairie wolf hunt was revived, on Wednesday of this week, when between 400 and 500 men took part in a big seven mile square hunt, which was sponsored by the Alexandria band. Two wolves were in the ring, as the lines were nearing the final round-up, and were killed. One thing noticeable was the absence of jack rabbits and cotton-tails to any great number. In hunts of former years in this territory, several truck loads would have been killed.

### 70 Years Ago

(The Alexandria Argus) The annual athletic banquet of Alexandria High was held at the Legion Hall. Letters were awarded to the volleyball girls and to the basketball and football boys. Bonnie Joe, president of the pep club, served as toastmistress. The student manager for basketball, Jerry Cortney, received not only an appropriate letter, but a red sweater to wear it on. Each of the cheerleaders were introduced by Miss Kirk, the pep club sponsor. They are Kathleen Dill, Eleanor Schweer and Ruth Walsh. The nickelodeon of Shorty's Cafe was loaned by Mr. and Mrs. Harold Wiswell and served as part of the music for dancing. The other music was furnished by Miss Newell, our primary teacher.

### 60 Years Ago



Physiatrists are physicians who specialize in helping patients with disabilities. Their focus is rehabilitation, restoration of function and a return to a high quality of life. Patients may have muscle, bone, soft tissue or nervous system injuries. Subspecialists include sports medicine specialists and pain management specialists.

Pain management doctors specialize in caring for patients who are dealing with chronic pain, whether resulting from injury, disease or otherwise. Dr. Wik creates customized pain management plans for patients that may include therapy, medication management, or minimally invasive procedures.

When creating a customized pain management plan Dr. Wik will evaluate the

patient and their medical history, in addition to performing tests to arrive at a precise diagnosis.

As an interventional pain management specialist in Nebraska, Dr. Wik focuses on relieving chronic pain in patients. Interventional pain specialists offer pain relief by blocking or interrupting the transmission of neurological pain signals in the brain. Dr. Wik may perform treatments such as spinal cord and nerve stimulation, nerve or medial branch blocks, medication management, or the implantation of drug delivery systems.

Physical medicine and rehabilitation specialists, or physiatrists, are doctors who specialize in helping patients rehabilitate from injuries or complications of disease. This could include coming back from a broken leg, or an aging grandmother dealing with arthritis. Dr. Wik may employ a range of treatment and rehabilitation techniques, including physical therapy, occupational therapy and nerve stimulation treatments, among others.

is in itself a relief," he said. Kenner will return to Washington this spring to meet with congressional representatives as part of the Nebraska Independent Community Bankers. Kenner is past chair.

Burd said the meeting didn't have a set agenda and mostly general in nature.

"I was very appreciative of his time and willingness to come and speak to us," Burd, who worked with Smith on several bills when Burd was with the NHA, said. "He has always been supportive of rural health care and hospitals. Those efforts have been appreciated."

Burd said he thought the meeting was productive.

"Being a rural healthcare provider in today's environment is challenging," he said.

There is an abundance of uncertainty in the future of health care. Providers are watching to see what happens with the Affordable Care Act, pharmaceutical discounts and the Medicare For All proposal, which has been juxtaposed with eliminating private insurance companies.

"Depending on how it was implemented, it could have a significant impact," Burd said. "It makes it very challenging to plan ahead."

He also mentioned existing regulatory burdens, which causes the hospital to spend time and scarce resources, but doesn't have an impact on improving patient care.

Also featured during the discussion was Smith's perspective on the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018.

Weigle issued a press release that reaffirmed Smith's support for the Act.







## Eagle girls claim Sterling Jets

Bruning-Davenport/Shickley Lady Eagles finished third in the 2019 Class D2 state basketball consolation round Saturday.

The girls defeated the Sterling Lady Jets in a tight 36-34 contest for the placement to finish the season 23-5. Sophomore Bryn Kadel scored the winning basket — a layup at the buzzer after a pass from Senior Jadyn Kleinschmidt.

"I would like to thank the seniors for their commitment, and a special thank you to all the BDS team members for all their hard work," Gerberding said.

The girls entered the state championship after winning the Class D2-2 district contest over Exeter-Milligan.

They faced the Mullen Lady Broncos for the first round at Lincoln North Star High School.

"The 21-3 Broncos proved to be a tough competitor for the 21-4 Eagles," Gerberding said.

Both teams traded baskets in the opening quarter. Kadel dropped in a 3-pointer to give the Eagles a 7-6 lead with just 30 seconds left in the first quarter.

Second quarter had the better of the Eagles — they were foul trouble, but the bench provided a spark by going on a 7-3 run with junior Kaylee Noel sinking an old fashioned 3-point basket.

Despite the run, the Eagles trailed 17-15 at the half. Early in the third, the Broncos extended their lead to 10 points, but the Eagles cut it to 6 points, and then Kleinschmidt knocked a 3-pointer down to narrow the score 30-27.

The girls chipped away and took the lead with 3:59 left on the clock. They held the Broncos scoreless in the final six minutes of the game to advance.

The Eagles played the Wynot Blue Devils at the Bob Devaney Sports Center for the semi-final round. Neither team led by more than 8 points until the fourth quarter when the Blue Devils went on an 18-2 run to put the Eagles away.

In the first quarter, the Eagles led 11-7 despite having committed 10 turnovers.

final 4 points of the quarter to take the lead at halftime by 1 point.
