County pickup stolen from fairgrounds

Thayer County Road Superintendent Roger Hofts told the commissioners the county's 2001 Ford F150 pickup truck was stolen from the fairgrounds in Deshler for a spell from April 19-20.

According to the initial Thayer County Sheriff's report, the joyride was criminal mischief.

Hofts said the vehicle smelled like beer when it was returned with the rear passenger tire blown out, which affected the brakes. After a \$200 repair, the 18-year-old truck is back on the road.

Hofts was not aware of any further developments in the case.

Bridge work has begun in Alexandria

Construction work by the Nebraska Department of Transportation began April 29 on Highway 53.

Werner Construction, Inc., of Hastings holds the \$7,859,581 contract for bridge replacements, guardrail, grading, seeding, culverts, pavement patching and shoulder widening.

One-lane traffic will be maintained at the bridge replacement locations with temporary traffic signals. There are flaggers for the remaining distance of the project.

The anticipated completion date is July of 2020.

Chester remembers the Fallen

The traveling "Remembering Our Fallen" photograph memorial to the 114 Nebraska military service personnel who have died since Sept. 11, 2001, was in Chester last week, as part of a project by Patriotic Productions.

When she was asked to host a program for veterans, Marge Vieselmeyer didn't hesitate because "they had time for us," she said, meaning those who fought for freedom. Vieselmeyer also hosted a program in Kansas.

Hebron veteran, Kathy Retzlaff read the names of the 114 fallen. Rob Kasl from Belleville gave a speech on welcoming soldiers home, and told of the efforts to place flags around the Republic County courthouse.

Heath Hoge sang for patriotism and two songs by Lucas Hoge were played, including "Medal of Honor."

The master of ceremonies was Howard Reed, and the Hebron Girl Scouts began the program by leading the Pledge of Allegiance.

Vieselmeyer makes time for veterans. She collects aluminum cans for Wounded Warrior funds and sets cash donations aside for the Canine for Vets program.

"They pair up our guys who have PTSD with dogs. A lot of guys come back and they're lost. Nothing is

the same as before. We get letters on how the dogs have their backs and saved their lives," she said.

And, as one of the family members of SPC Darren Howe, who died in Iraq in 2005, thanked Vieselmeyer for the Remembering Our Fallen program, Vieselmeyer said, "As long as you can say their name, they're not forgotten, they're not gone."

Following the program, 114 red, white and blue balloons were distributed for a release.

Harris recalls updates, stadium

It seems Thayer Central Superintendent Drew Harris is continuously expanding his desire to make a difference.

The former high school math teacher, football and wrestling coach, who worked in places like Clearwater, Kan., and Burrton, Kan., became a superintendent because it was "an opportunity to have more influence and effect on the educational system."

After 13 years at Thayer Central, he is leaving to be the chief administrator at Educational Service

Unit 9 in Hastings. There, he will work with 14 schools districts on technology, special education and professional development.

"It's similar to wanting to be a superintendent, to affect more kids and have a greater impact. Nearly 10,000 students are served by ESU," Harris said.

He'll also ride with superintendents in training and provide support.

Harris and his wife, Amy, who has served as the school's music program accompanist for 13 years and was volleyball head coach, moved to Nebraska to be closer to family. Their two sons, Cole and

Hank are Thayer Central alumni. Daughter Maggie will graduate this year.

"I have loved my time at Thayer Central. We have a great group of people to work with, and great families and kids," he said.

Harris oversaw vast improvements to Thayer Central.

Just seven years ago, football players and track competitors stepped into a new stadium that once had tree roots pushing up through the track with a practice field in the middle. Football was played at the current Hebron Sports

Long: "You're only as good as the kids you have"

Thayer Central is marking the end of several teaching eras this year, and Andy Long's is one of them. Long, a 1982 Hebron High graduate, Thayer Central social studies teacher and girls' basketball and track coach is going the Rule 85 route to early retirement.

"I've struggled since last summer knowing I would have this opportunity. I'm lucky enough to have coached and taught my daughters, but I don't want to be 65 and wonder where the time went," he reflected. He wants a chance to spend more time with his granddaughters and one he will take after spending the last eight years coaching three sports.

Long has been with Thayer Central for 11 years and taught for 32 years.

He looks forward to leaving for a weekend without planning around games, and reciprocating the support his wife, Sue, has given him all these years.

"My wife has been a big influence and support system. It's been a fun adventure with her and having her along," he said.

He never thought he would end back up in Hebron after leaving to attend the University of Nebraska-Kearney and working in Elkhorn and Cambridge.

Long said it's been a blessing to return, and he's followed a healthy list of what he considers influential teachers and coaches — Dan Desmond, Sandy Hoins, Rich Hoins, Bob Bacon, Marv Scheuler, Bob Fisher and Steve Delay, all of whom helped him shape his style.

His interest in teaching stems from spending time with two nephews, then ages seven and eight.

"I like the idea of helping kids reach their potential and enjoying the fact they went further and harder than they thought they could. We plant the seeds so they can achieve beyond high school, too," he said.

Grant for Dove Road proposed

An Economic Opportunity Program grant from the Nebraska Department of Transportation could assist in extending Dove Road east of Highway 81, and create a new road that would run north and south behind MetalQuest Unlimited.

The company is prepared to enter its third expansion since it moved into the facility in 1999. The first expansion was in 2005 and the second, toward the end of 2012.

The MetalQuest expansion will create an area for shipping and receiving on the east side of the building.

"We've never been efficient in unloading flatbeds," Harms said. "We're continuing to grow and we are positioning ourselves for the future."

Harms told the Thayer County Commissioners he sees the expansion as a vision and good for county.

"No argument there," commissioner Dave Bruning said.

Harms said MetalQuest would hire roughly five to 10 people in the next three years.

There is no timeline for the project, but Harms said the company wouldn't approve the expansion until the grant is approved.

Bruning said the commissioners will consult with the county attorney. They will also contact Merrick County for tips because Preferred Popcorn in Chapman received the state's first EOP grant for an expansion of 22,000 square feet.

That's close to MetalQuest's plan of 22,500 square feet.

Dove Road is seeing more traffic — LandMark Implement is occupying the land directly south of MetalQuest.

In his description of the project, Harms estimated paving would cost \$300,000 to \$350,000, excluding the land and right of way access.

The county would receive assistance in writing the grant from EOP, which serves to attract and sustain economic growth through strategic transportation improvements, thus establishing partnerships for growth between public entities and private businesses.

In other business, county zoning administrator, Colt Farringer, said he isn't signing a Certificate of No Zoning Violations for Bruning, which has approved a Verizon cell tower that violates setback regulations.

Farringer said planning and zoning recommended Bruning not approve the tower. He showed the commissioners a letter he wrote, opting not to sign the certificate.

"Bruning will go ahead with their project, but this clears the county of any responsibility," he said. "They're 213 feet closer than they should be."

That poses a danger because if a wind gust catches the tower, it could cross Road 6200, south of Highway 4, where the tower is set to be installed. The setback regulations are measured from Road 6200.

Farringer also reported he is waiting on the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality about a construction landfill in Chester. Thayer County Zoning does not allow landfills in wellhead protection areas.

The Village of Chester wanted information from Farringer and he provided it.

The commissioners also heard from Lela Krupicka and Delbert Virchow on the low bridge at Roads 5000 and V because flooding has progressively worsened.

Krupicka, who has lived at the location 42 years, said her fields have never looked so damaged.

The flooding causes water to rush over the road and debris piles up, which could be a hazard in a medical emergency.

1879

130 Years Ago

Mr. Goeller informs us that two petrified trees have recently been found about a mile south of Rose Creek Pottery.

George Shoup, Henry Shoup and hired man, while digging rock on Rose Creek bluffs, killed forty-three snakes in one day last week.

W. J. Thompson has purchased 12,000 feet of lumber for the erection of his Windmill Manufactory. He contemplates building 20 x 40 feet in size, two stories in height.

The election last Monday for a board of five trustees of the Incorporated Town of Hebron caused a little excitement. The issue was supposed to be high license against low license, but from the fact that both parties ran the three same candidates, it still is a matter for future determination which side of the issue will be sustained--although the high license party polled the large vote being as follows: J. J. Malowney-89; W. D. Church-94; J. G. Rice-94; F. M. Wetherald-61; A. C. Past-62; N. Behcheider-41; A. W. Stiles-39; Scattering-10. The first five mentioned were elected and constitute the new board.

South Fork Bridge: Editor Journal:--

Can you inform the taxpayers when the approaches to the bridge which was built last fall to accommodate two of the farmers of Belvidere precinct who have retired to town, are to be built? -- Taxpayer

No sire; we give it up -- ask us something easy. Oh, ask the sad sea waves, as they murmur over buried graves! Whisper to the winds that 'round thy pathway roam--with winning smiles address the ocean's foam--Go, interview the co'd and silent tomb, interrogate the chaste, unloving moon--But never ask us to unford the maze that marks a county off'ers ways.

At half past one in the morning on May 6th, the stable of Mr. Degner of Friedensburg was burned. Two horses, three cows, one steer, three heifers, a calf and a harness were burned up in the stable; his loss amounting to \$529. He had some insurance on his horses and cows. It is not known how the fire originated, although some presume it to have started from a prairie fire of the day before. The fire was first discovered by Prof. Brockmann, who was awakened by the howling of his dogs. He at once ran over and awoke Mr. Degner, but the stable was a mass of flames, and nothing could be done to save the burning animals. Had it not been for the timely arrival of Prof. Brockmann, Mr. Degner would have lost his house also.

130 Years Ago

The United Brethren of this place have commenced on their church building in the northwest part of town. The foundation is ready for the superstructure. The building will be 24 x 36 feet in size.

As soon as the vats arrive, and they are expected daily, the new creamery will be started. It is splendidly fitted for first class work.

Any man who wants work in Hebron can get it.

Thayer county has good reason to feel pleased with the honest, efficient and economical administration of the county government.

We reproduce the following pastoral for the special benefit of our rural subscribers: "Don't kill the toads, the ugly toads that hop around your door. Each meal the toad doth eat a hundred bugs or more. He sits around with aspect meek until the bug is neared, then shoots he forth his little tongue like lightning doubly geared. And then he soberly doth wink, and shuts his ugly mug and patiently doth wait until there comes another bug."

F. Macy has a curiosity in the chicken line. It has four well-developed legs.

The board of trustees of Belvidere granted a sales license to W. L. Thompson.

E. J. Huse has something that is rare in this county--a field sown to alfalfa.

A case of hydrophobia was reported in Alexandria last week.

Dr. Easton reports a severe case of diphtheria at or near Bruning.

Hebron has a manufactory that is turning out large numbers of a certain class of farming implements. We refer to Barber & Townsend's manufactory of the Barber Patent Lister Harrow and Cultivator. It appears to be an excellent implement and the manufacturers ought to receive liberal encouragement.

Rosa Bell Miller, a girl of thirteen years of age, was brought before Judge Goodhue this week, on the charge of vagrancy and incorrigibility. She has been living on Dry Creek for some time, having come from Wyoming Territory. So far as known she has no parents or other relative. For awhile she lived at Captain Holland's and later at C. J. Carrier's place. After a full examination of her case, Judge Goodhue concluded to send her to the state reform school at Kearney, and Sheriff Green accordingly took her there this week.

During the past winter, a number of hogs have been missed by various owners in the southeastern part of this county, on or near Rose Creek. The last loser was Colby Preston, living a short distance east of Hubbell, who recently had several fat hogs taken from his pen. He traced the animals to Fairbury, where they had been sold. The hogs he identified had been sold by Charles Lewis and William J. Lewis of Rose Creek. Upon Preston's complaint, a warrant for their arrest was issued to County Judge Goodhue and given to Sheriff Green for service. Anticipating difficulty in capturing the parties charge, the sheriff, accompanied by J. M. Fitchpatrick visited the home of the Lewis brothers at the unfashionable hour of four o'clock in the morning. The sheriff was successful, as usual, and lodged them in the county jail. At the preliminary examination before Judge Goodhue, they were required to give bonds of \$700 each for appearance at district court. Not having secured bondsmen, they are confined in the county jail.

A number of new buildings will be erected this year; among the number is the State Bank, Mrs. Weeden and B. S. Harrold will each build a fine residence this year. One does not have to dream the dream of Rip Van Winkle in order to see the mark of progression. It is evidently here with no uncertain sound.

Weather and crop report for the week ending Monday, April 14, 1919. The week was cloudy, cool and wet, hardly no field work was done. A bad sleet storm occurred on the 9th, doing great damage to telephone lines; apparently no fruit blossoms were injured. Apricot trees are in bloom; other fruit trees are budding. All vegetation has made a slow growth. Spring sown small grain fields are getting green and promise a good stand. Winter wheat is in excellent condition. Rainfall during the week 1.77 inches. Henry Middendorf, Observer.

May is National Stroke Awareness Month

In May alone, some 65,000 Americans will experience a stroke with many unaware that they were even at risk. Less than a third will arrive in the emergency room within three hours, the optimal time period for better outcomes. May marks National Stroke Awareness Month, and this year the National Stroke Association is turning the spotlight on the 10 modifiable risk factors that account for 90% of strokes globally. Hypertension remains the single most important modifiable risk factor, accounting for nearly 48% of strokes. With eight in 10 people experiencing their first stroke having hypertension, getting your blood pressure checked is an important first step in controlling your stroke risk.

Research has shown that unhealthy behaviors such as physical inactivity, poor diet, and smoking have an adverse effect on health and increase your stroke risk. For example, smokers have an increased risk of stroke, up to two to four times, compared to a nonsmoker or those that have quit for longer than 10 years.

During National Stroke Awareness Month, the National Stroke Association is urging the public to look at their stroke risk factors, and pledge to make at least one change to reduce their stroke risk. Here's how much stroke would be reduced if each were eliminated: Hypertension 47.9%, Physical inactivity 35.8%, Lipids (blood fats) 26.8%, Poor diet 23.2%, Obesity 18.6%, Smoking 12.4%, Heart causes 9.1%, Alcohol intake 5.8%, Stress 5.8%, and Diabetes 3.9%.

Beyond reducing your risk for stroke, knowing the signs and symptoms of a stroke are equally important. Every 40 seconds someone in the U.S. has a stroke and around



800,000 people will have a stroke in the United States this year alone.

Sadly, however, fewer than half of 9-1-1 calls for stroke are made within one hour of symptom onset and fewer than half of callers correctly identify stroke as the reason for their call. The acronym FAST is an easy way to identify the most common symptoms of a stroke:

F – Face: Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?

A – Arms: Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

S – Speech: Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence. Is their speech slurred?

T – Time: If you observe any of these signs, call 9-1-1 immediately.

A common misconception is that strokes occur only in older adults. Although, your stroke risk increases with age, a stroke can happen to anyone at any time. About 15% of ischemic strokes occur in young adults and adolescents.

The need for public awareness surrounding stroke prevention and awareness has never been greater. Despite being a leading cause of adult long-term disability, and the fifth leading cause of death, less than one in five Americans can correctly classify all five stroke symptoms. The time to take action is now. This May, during National Stroke Awareness month, get to know your stroke risk factors and learn to better identify the signs and symptoms of stroke. The life you save just might be your own.

Bruning Legion pays tribute with roll call

In the year of the American Legion's 100th birthday, Dave Rinehart points out the organization honors members who never aged.

"The thing that rings with me is we look at them as old, but they were in their 20s when they died and came back in a body bag," he said.

Roll call

Members of Bruning Post 166 honor soldiers with white ceremonial helmets graced by red roses on Memorial Day as the roll is called.

Fewer members answer the call these days.

"We've had as many as 91 members and we're down to 24," Rinehart said. "We're losing 200 to 300 veterans a month overall. The young ones aren't coming on board."

Rinehart said it's different now — the Legion was a social part of people's lives, and included dinners and parties.

The Legion's main projects — Boys' State and baseball teams — used to be supported by stag fundraisers, Rinehart said.

Although the member-

ship has decreased and funds are for projects are limited, one of the Legion's bright spots is its Auxiliary.

"They've helped us greatly in all aspects with Memorial Day programs, decorating cemeteries, and many other functions," he said. "They are a very active

Auxiliary."

The American Legion welcomes individuals who served in federal active duty in the United States Armed Forces during war eras listed on the Legion's website, coupled with an honorable discharge or are still serving.

He was around good coaches in Elkhorn, like Kim May.

"I still touch base with her for advice," he said. "My philosophy is to build relationships and push the kids, but I want them to enjoy what they're doing."

He's proud he was able to coach all three of his daughters, Chelsea, Shelby and Cody, in regular and post season contests, and of the girls' basketball team this past season.

The team has grown because of the senior leadership, he said.

Long was also excited to watch Aubrey Fangmeier earn two state titles in the 800 run, that middle distance part of the program Long's brother, Tracy, mastered.

"It's invigorating," he said.

Fangmeier, who is a red shirt this year, keeps in touch with Long.

He said he's lucky to have returned to Hebron and become part of a coaching staff that has supported each other.

"It's a good culture up here," Long said.

Looking back, Long said he heard the news Hebron High was renamed Thayer Central while he was teaching in Cambridge.

"I do have to admit, it caught me off guard," he said.

But Thayer Central is now a part of him.

"I can say, once a Titan, always a Titan. The Titans have made their own identity," he said with certainty.

Complex at a rental price, set by the City of Hebron.

"We decided instead of continuing to rent the field and replace the bleachers there, we could create a facility. It's a beautiful stadium and one of the nicer ones around," Harris said.

"Early identification

opens up that ability to correct impediments and behaviors," Harris said.

What shines above all in Harris' opinion is the academic performance of Thayer Central students, who score consistently high on assessments.

"It's certainly toward the top third in the state," he said. "Our Quiz Bowl kids went 3-2 at state. Our athletic conference has 11 schools and our programs are successful and competitive."

Thayer Central is the third smallest school in the conference, but has swept one-third of conference titles overall.

"I'm proud of that fact," Harris said.


