Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$120,672.44 in sales tax for the month of February 2015 after showing a 13.6 percent decrease in net taxable sales over February 2014. For February 2015, the county had \$2,194,040 in net taxable sales - down from \$2,539,220 in 2014.

According to Hebron Treasurer Marcy Welch, the City of Hebron collected \$23,804.32 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,215,295 for the month of February. That shows a decrease of 13.1 percent in net taxable sales over February 2014 which was \$1,397,982. The motor vehicle tax (\$3,846.92) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$19,957.40) goes into the sales tax fund.

The Department of Revenue releases figures approximately three months later than the actual month being profiled. March 2015 figures will be released in June.

Nebraska Bankers Association selects chairman elect



Jerry Catlett, senior vice president and chief financial officer of Bruning State Bank in Bruning, was selected as chairman-elect of the Nebraska Bankers Association during the association's Annual Convention on Thursday, May 7, at the Embassy Suites in La Vista. Catlett will assume the chairmanship of the Nebraska Bankers Association (NBA) in May 2016.

Severe storm causes flooding and wind damage: Two tornadoes spotted in county

Gov. Pete Ricketts declared a state of emergency after surveying storm damage done in last Wednesday's storm.

Thayer County, as well as the southeast region of Nebraska, experienced severe flooding, wind damage and several tornadoes that touched ground.

"I have authorized an emergency declaration. At this time the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) is in contact with other state agencies and they are actively monitoring the situation and will provide assistance as needed," said Governor Ricketts in a news conference. "The good news is nobody was hurt and everybody is safe. Utility crews are out there working."

There were two known tornadoes that impacted Thayer County on May

6, though Thayer County sheriff David Lee admits there could be some that spotters missed.

During the six o'clock hour, a tornado moving up from Kansas, missing Hebron, and instead veered east of town. The twister damaged a home south of Hebron, according to Bill McPherson, Thayer County Emergency Management director. Local volunteer firefighters assisted moving the occupants out. No injuries were reported.

A second tornado passed through Ruskin and Hardy and moved into the southwest rural part of the county between 4:45 and 5:15 p.m.

McPherson was first alerted of the possibility of severe storm early Wednesday afternoon.

"Beginning [that] afternoon at 12:09 p.m., I received an email from the National Weather Service that contained a briefing on the weather," said McPherson. "They were calling

for an enhanced probability risk of severe weather, which was somewhat more than we believed we were getting. Prior to that we were in a slight probability risk."

The county was placed under a tornado watch at 1:42 p.m. which was not lifted until 9 p.m. Around 5 p.m. the county was under a tornado warning. According to McPherson, the county had seven tornado warnings until 9:45 p.m., as well as two severe thunderstorm warnings.

Heavy rain and hail were reported with rain fall reaching around 12 inches for the county average, according to Lee.

Flooding occurred throughout the county, and quickly became a major issue.

"No one could get into Hebron the night of the storm," said Lee. "There

Planting season in full swing: Storm may call for replanting

For many farmers, planting season is coming to a close; however, with last week's flooding, it could mean replanting for some farmers.

"With that much rain there was erosion," said Darren Sudbeck, local agronomist. "The water took out some of the corn that was planted. Some areas need to be replanted but it's not widespread."

Fields near creeks and rivers that flooded will have to be replanted; however, in general, Sudbeck does not anticipate a large number of acres being replanted.

"There's thin spots that got washed out but for the most part you're not replanting whole fields," said Sudbeck. "You just need to make a decision on whether to replant or not. It's too early to tell too much."

As an agronomist, Sudbeck is a crop consultant for farmers. He contracts with farmers and scouts fields on a weekly basis checking for things like weeds and irrigation scheduling. Sudbeck also sells seed.

Up until last week, corn planting was going right on time, if not a little bit ahead of schedule.

"We're 90-95 percent planted on corn," said Sudbeck. "That's fairly typical for this time of year."

Sudbeck also claimed a 25-30 percent progress with soy beans.

Prior to the big storm, the recent downpours had proven helpful for

the season.

"A lot of corn was starting to emerge," said Sudbeck. "[That] rain [allowed] for easier merging and better population."

Wheat has experienced a fair amount of winter kill. Wheat is planted in the fall and due to the cold temperatures of winter, some of the wheat crop was killed off.

"There's some thin spots in wheat fields," said Sudbeck.

Stripe rust, a fungal disease, is also showing up in wheat fields.

According to Sudbeck, the disease starts in the south. Then the spores get in the air and blow up north.

There's also a fairly high population of alfalfa weevil and aphids which also reside in alfalfa.

Sudbeck is still evaluating storm damage on fields that were planted.

Long time extension educator retires

The Extension Office will be saying goodbye to one of its long time employees this Friday: Phyllis Schoenholz, Extension educator for Thayer and Nuckolls Counties.

Schoenholz first became an Extension educator in June of 1987.

After graduating from the University of Nebraska with a degree in education, she taught home economics in Ohio for several years.

"At that time you either went into teaching or Extension," said Schoenholz.

When her family started to grow, she stopped working and lived on a farm to raise her children.

Once her children were grown, she decided it was time to go back to work; however, she had a difficult time finding teaching jobs.

"Around that time, the Thayer County Extension job opened up but I was not successful getting that job at first," said Schoenholz. "So I was hired as a part-time Extension agent."

According to their website, University of Nebraska - Lincoln, Extension is dedicated to "incredible impact on the success of our state — its youth, its families, its farms and ranches, its communities, its economy" and "committed

Bell Prairie Echoes: Farmers have all been so busy the past week that they haven't had time to die, get married or do anything of importance, consequently news is rather scarce.

110 Years Ago

A good crowd was in attendance at the concert given by Watt's band and orchestra, Tuesday evening, each number on the program being well received.

Win Wood went to Lincoln a week ago, and in competition with others, had his plans accepted for an exposition building for poultry at the state fair grounds, 60 x 110 feet in size, price \$2,500.

Bruning: When they build the big hotel and opera house on Railroad Street, then look out for the airs that Bruning will put on. Hebron will be nowhere to it.

Davenport: At Frank Bradley's the water was the highest in the South Sandy yesterday morning that it ever has been since he lived there 20 years. The water came up over the floor in the hog house and the rats that had been making their home under the floor had to hunt an ark, so took to the rafters overhead. Frank tells us that the rafters were filled with half drowned rats, which he proceeded to exterminate with a club.

Good records prevailed as the first Thayer county track meet was put down in history books with Chester high school the champion, as predicted.

Crashing nine strike balls down the alleys last Saturday night, Doc Ring bowled a fine 258 score for the highest score ever attained by a Hebron bowler on the local alleys.

(The Bruning Banner) Elden A. Philippi, S. 2-c, Bruning, who was previously reported missing, has now been given up for lost, according to a telegram from the Navy Dept. received by his wife. was a point where waters were so high we could not get to the hospital if we needed to.”

The aftermath of the storm was just as ugly as the storm itself.

“There were washed out bridges, road damage, county roads and lots of residents dealing with the clean out,” said Lee.

U.S. Highways 81 and 136 were both closed due to flooding but by Thursday afternoon, both were opened up.

The waters took out at least three bridges: one located on First Street in Hebron between the country club and Thayer County Health Services, another on River Road east of Hebron between Roads 6300 and 6400, and a third on Road K between Roads 5800 and 5900 that was a wooden bridge.

“These are just ones we know of,” said George Gerdes, Thayer County road superintendent. “A lot of times we find out more damage when the water goes down and dirt starts to settle. [It’s] nothing we can’t fix. It’s just going to take some time. The roads have to dry out so we can get dirt to repair them. We pretty much have all the roads passable other than ones with bridges out ... there’s lots of silt and gravel in ditches that will take awhile to clean out. A big rain like that will make your little problems big. We’ve been running all over the county trying to cover everything and people have been calling in which is good.”

Calling to Lee, many



of study including art, biochemistry and molecular biology, business administration, chemistry, communication studies, economics, political science, psychology, and Spanish.

The students from each school combine to form three groups. Each group then selects a problem of global significance to address as socially minded entrepreneurs.

The students then build business models to address their chosen challenge by working face-to-face and in virtual work sessions. The course concludes in Charleston, S.C., where the groups pitch their plans to the Huger Foundation and a select committee of potential angel investors.



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

The girls had a pair of 1-2-3 finishes in the field events to lead the way to their victory. The long jump got things started as Catherine Mick, Kristin Troyer and Megan Grote took the top three places respectively with Grote having a personal best leap of 14'5.75. The pole vault was next with Mick, Tristen Mosier and Courtney Kamler taking the first three places. Mosier and Kamler vaulted to personal bests as Mosier cleared 10'10 which is not only her best but the second best in class D behind only teammate Mick, and Kamler made 8'6. Troyer came back with another gold medal and a personal best of her own as she jumped 34'3 in the triple jump while Grote also added a gold medal winning the high jump with a leap of 4'9. Shaya Dierking continued the string of field event personal bests as she leapt 29'8 to take fourth in the triple jump, and McKenna Schardt and Kim Armgardt completed the field events scoring with sixth place

finishes in the discus and the shot put.

The running events were all run as finals and the girls again had some strong events propel them toward the team victory. The 100 hurdles saw Mosier, Troyer and Grote finish 2-5-6, while the 300 hurdles with Mick, Mosier and Grote went 1-2-5 with Mosier again turning in a personal best performance of 49.0 finishing just behind Mick's 48.2. Mick completed her busy day with a personal best time of 13.0 in the 100 to take second with Nicole Swartzendruber finishing sixth in the 100 as well. Brice Ardissono took second in the 400 and came back later to take fourth in the 800, while Morgan Lowery and Johanna Kluck took sixth in each of those races respectively. Lexi Kadel turned in a personal best finishing the 3200 in 14:22.2 to claim second place and Madison Yantzie ran to a fourth place finish in the 1600 as well. The relays also contributed as Kadel, Kamler, Kluck and Haley Pena Lopez finished third in the 3200, Dierking, Schardt, Swartzendruber and Carley Elznic took second in the 400, and Troyer, Kamler, Elznic, and Mosier took second in the 1600 to complete the girls scoring.

The boys also were strong in the field events with Blake Stengel winning the lone gold medal in the pole vault to get things started on the right foot. Chris Lichti was right on his heels as he took the runner up spot finishing second. The high jumpers took the 2-5-6

Cody Garland and Garrett Schardt were second and fifth in the long jump with Garland also claiming third in the triple jump. Stuart Rohr and Colton Lowery finished fourth and sixth in the discus while Kendall Dixon and Holden Stengel each turned in Personal bests in the shot put with Dixon hitting 42'2 and Stengel 35'2.5 to take the third and sixth places in that event.

The relays were the strength of the teams running events as the group of Chris Rohr, Charlie Martin, Karson Dixon and TJ Krupicka won the 3200 relay with a time of 9:03.9. The 400 relay also took first with Krupicka being joined by Garland, Grant Norder and Kale Kleinschmidt to turn in a season best 46.4. The 1600 relay team of Norder, Chris Rohr, Dixon and Krupicka finished in second place. The hurdles were strong as Christensen and Hunter Krehne finished second and fourth in the 110s with Norder and Christensen taking second and fourth in the 300s as well. The 100 meter dash saw Kleinschmidt, Noel Gines and Norder finish 4-5-6, with Kleinschmidt and Garland finishing fourth and fifth in the 200 respectively. Dixon and Gines were third and fifth in the 400 while Brett Holtzen and Kale Smith took fifth and sixth in the 800. Karson Dixon rounded out the boys scoring with a sixth place finish in the 1600.
