Graduating seniors at lowest count in a decade

The number of seniors graduating at Thayer County schools was down considerably this year; in fact, the county witnessed 64 seniors - down from 107 in 2012 - graduate from five area schools including Bruning-Davenport, Deshler, Meridian, Shickley and Thayer Central. It is the lowest number of seniors to receive diplomas since 2003.

In the past decade the number of graduating seniors has been in a steady decline, but not necessarily at an alarming rate, until this year. Deshler and Meridian saw the biggest decrease losing over half their graduating classes from last year. Deshler patrons witnessed 11 seniors graduate this year, down from 29 last year. Meridian had eight seniors walk the path, down from 25 last year.

On average since 2003, Thayer Central High School sees 34.7 seniors graduate each year. Its biggest class in the last ten years was in 2003

when 46 seniors received their diplomas. It was the second graduating class following the consolidation of Hebron and Chester-Hubbell-Byron. This year's graduating class and the class of 2007 had the least amount of seniors graduate with 26.

Deshler Public Schools has traditionally seen an average of 27.7 seniors receive diplomas since 2003, and has maintained that average until this year. Its largest graduating class was in 2008 when 32 seniors received diplomas; its smallest prior to this year was in 2009 when 23 seniors graduated.

Bruning-Davenport has seen an average of 16.8 seniors graduate each year since 2003. In 2009 patrons watched the most graduates, 26, receive diplomas while the Class of 2013 had the smallest with 10.

For all five high schools in the Thayer County area, 2003 had the most seniors graduate with 128, while, prior to this year with its lowest turnout, the class of 2011 had 95 seniors graduate.

Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program

"The Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program could prove to be a very viable option to Nebraska crop producers in 2013," said Farm Service Agency Director Dan Steinkruger. The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012 provided a one-year extension of the ACRE program. "Signup is underway and producers must elect and enroll their farms on or before June 3, 2013," said Steinkruger.

Farms that were enrolled in either the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) or ACRE in past years may elect ACRE for the one-year extension in 2013. Any farms that have already enrolled in DCP for 2013 may still elect to switch to ACRE on or before June 3, 2013.

Producers who elect and enroll a farm in ACRE agree to forgo DCP counter-cyclical payments and accept a 20 percent reduction in their direct payments, plus a 30 percent reduction in marketing assistance loan rates. ACRE payments are tied to current plantings on the farm as opposed to counter-cyclical payments, which are tied to the farm's base acres.

ACRE payments are revenue-based payments and are tied to crop production and the National Average Market Price for commodity crops on the farm. Payments are issued for crops if two triggers are met for the crop. The State

Trigger must be less than the State ACRE Guarantee and the Farm trigger must be less than the farm ACRE Guarantee.

During the 2008 Farm Bill, these triggers were met and payments issued in Nebraska in 2009 for barley, oats, dry peas, sunflower seed and wheat. In 2010, the triggers were met and payments issued for irrigated barley and dry peas.

According to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Cornhusker Economics bulletin, ag economists are predicting substantial payments for non-irrigated corn and soybeans for 2012 in Nebraska due to the size of the projected state payment rates.

"Based on currently published NASS yields, it appears that substantial ACRE revenue payments may be earned on certain 2012 non-irrigated crops," said Steinkruger. He encourages producers to contact UNL Extension educators to assist in the analysis for 2013.

Additional information, including access to a free ACRE webinar for public viewing, is available at www.agecon.unl.edu/farmbill. Contact the local FSA County Office for additional information. "It is very important for all producers to evaluate the ACRE decision before the June 3 deadline," said Steinkruger.

May is National Brain Tumor Awareness Month

Brain tumors do not discriminate. Primary brain tumors – those that begin in the brain and tend to stay in the brain – occur in people of all ages, but are more frequent in children and older adults. Metastatic brain tumors – those that begin as a cancer elsewhere and spread to the brain – are more common in adults. Metastatic brain tumors are four times more common than primary brain tumors. Cancers that most commonly metastasize to the brain are lung and breast.

All living creatures are made up of cells. The adult body normally forms new cells only when they are needed to replace old or damaged ones. A tumor develops when normal or abnormal cells multiply when they are not needed. A brain tumor is a mass of unnecessary cells growing in the brain or central spine canal.

An estimated 66,290 new cases of primary brain tumors are expected to be diagnosed each year. This includes both malignant and non-malignant brain tumors. Approximately 4,200 children younger than age 20 will be diagnosed with primary brain tumors, of which about 3,020 will be under age 15. Brain tumors are the:

- Second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in children under age 20 (leukemia is first)
- Second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in males ages 20-39 (leukemia is the first)
- Fifth leading cause of cancer-related deaths in females ages 20-39

The central nervous system is the core of our existence. It controls our personality – thoughts, memory, intelligence, speech, understanding and emotions; our senses – vision, hearing, taste, smell and touch; our basic body functions – breathing, heart beat and blood pressure; and how we function in our environment – movement, balance

and coordination. Understanding the workings of the brain and spine is important in understanding the symptoms of brain tumors; how they are diagnosed and how they are treated.

The symptoms of a brain tumor are different for each person. While it is not possible to know exactly what symptoms to expect, understanding what may occur can help you recognize symptoms such as memory problems, seizures, or changes in personality or in speech. In some cases, tumors are discovered by accident, such as when a scan is performed for another purpose. It is possible a tumor may not cause any symptoms or interfere with the normal workings of the body. Symptoms may be so minimal you may not be aware of a tumor until a scan is done.

Treatment for a brain tumor depends on a number of factors, including the type, location, size, and grade of the tumor, as well as the age and health of the patient. A doctor can give you your treatment options and tell you what to expect from each one. In addition your treatment team may include specialists, nurses, dietitian, mental health counselor, social worker, physical therapist, occupational therapist, and/or speech therapist.






Mumm Representing Post 180 At Boys' State

Little Blue NRD receives Grant from Nebraska Environmental Trust

The Little Blue Natural Resources District will receive \$135,000 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust for a project to improve the function of Rainwater Basin wetlands. This is the first-year award, with potential second- and third-year funding of \$135,000 per year.

The "Watershed Restoration to Enhance Rainwater Basin Wetlands" grant will help restore the watersheds of Rainwater Basin wetlands by filling unneeded irrigation re-use pits.

Filling unused pits provides additional farmable acres for producers and also removes an obstacle from their farm field. In addition, it allows water that would otherwise collect in the pits to flow instead to nearby wetlands. Improved wetland function not only provides more habitat for the estimated 8.6 million waterfowl that migrate through south-central

Nebraska each spring; it also benefits local residents and producers by contributing to groundwater recharge, which naturally occurs through Rainwater Basin wetlands.

The objective of the project is to fill at least 60 pits in high-priority watersheds. Emphasis will be placed on pits that have large storage capacity and are relatively close to affected wetlands.

The Little Blue NRD is a core member of the Rainwater Basin Joint Venture, a public-private partnership working to improve and protect wetlands in the Rainwater Basin and Nebraska's mixed-grass prairies.

The Nebraska Environmental Trust, using revenue from the Nebraska Lottery, has provided over \$195 million in grants to over 1,500 projects across the state, and has awarded over \$24 million to 134 projects this year.



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
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Your Guide To A Perfect Wedding

Tips for Selecting Wedding Day Flowers

What would a wedding day be without flowers? The beauty and the aroma of fresh-cut flowers can create a welcoming atmosphere and complement the beauty and the style of a wedding wardrobe. Flowers are often the first things that guests see upon arriving for the ceremony, and they may even be something guests take home at the end of the night. Flowers create an air of romance, and most couples want to make flowers -- whether fresh or silk -- an integral part of their wedding day.

As with any decision when planning a wedding, choosing the right flowers requires some research and a basic knowledge of which flowers will convey the message and the theme of your wedding. The number of colors, textures and combinations that can be created are so numerous that couples may feel the decision on the floral arrangements is best left to the florist. But it doesn't take a lot of expertise to know what you want, and it is important for couples to convey their feelings to the florist. Consider these tips when choosing a florist and selecting flowers.

* Experts advise that a couple start looking for a florist at least six months before the wedding, especially if the wedding will take place during the peak season of May through September. Get recommendations from friends as to which florist they used or find out if your wedding planner or banquet hall manager recommends a particular florist. Some catering halls have agreements with florists, and they work together.

* Browse magazines to get ideas of what you like. You also may be able to find a florist through an advertisement or if he or she has been featured in publications. Keep a scrapbook of the colors, types of flowers and arrangements and any other ideas that attract you so you will be able to present this information to the florist.

* Establish your flower budget prior to sitting down with the florist. You should expect to pay at least 8 percent of the total wedding cost on flowers. Get an estimate on the floral arrangement and then tweak your needs according to your budget. Many florists can modify arrangements and find a middle ground with regard to cost. Selecting flowers that are in-season will result in more affordable rates than if you desire exotic or out-of-season blooms.

* Once you've hired the florist, you can come up with a wedding flower worksheet that establishes all of your needs. The florist may request specific information, such as photos of the bride's gown as well as the colors and styles that the wedding party will be wearing. A good florist knows that a bouquet should not overpower or detract from the beauty of the bride. The florist may want to mimic textures from the dress, such as beading, with smaller flowers or berries within the arrangement. The groom's boutonniere is traditionally one of the flowers from the bride's bouquet so that the look is cohesive.

* Ceremony flowers may be traditional, and some houses of worship have strict guidelines as to what can and cannot be used. However, reception flowers can be where you show off your creativity and whimsy. After all, this is a party and it should be fun. You may want to give the florist more freedom of expression with regard to reception centerpieces and flowers that adorn other areas of the room.

* Because receptions tend to take place in the evening hours and are often indoor affairs, experts say that added lighting may be needed to put emphasis on the floral centerpieces and help present them in their best light. You may want to think about hiring a lighting designer to spotlight some areas of the room or at the very least incorporate candlelight into your centerpiece arrangements.

* To give the impression that there are more flowers than there really are, use fragrance and filler as your tools. Fragrant flowers can fill up the room with a welcoming aroma. Look for frangipani, lilies, hyacinths, and sweet peas for a big impact. Florists know how to stretch arrangements by using greenery and other filler to lend bulk without too much extra cost.

* Experienced florists will know how long it takes certain buds to open and show off their maximum beauty. Therefore, expect a florist to be working on your floral arrangements as much as a week before the wedding date -- purchasing containers, cleaning flowers and waiting for certain ones to open fully. Minimize changes close to your wedding date as most things will already be started.

* It is possible to make your own centerpieces or bouquets if you so desire. Simplicity will work best for the novice. Think about grouping similar-hued calla lilies together for a bridal bouquet. Hydrangea and peonies are larger flowers that can easily fill up a vessel on a table as a centerpiece. White flowers will coordinate with any color scheme and could be the easiest to mix and match. The white blooms include sweet pea, rose, camellia, stephanotis, narcissus, gardenia, orchid, lily of the valley, jasmine, and gypsophila.

Flowers are one component of the wedding that will help achieve the magic and beautiful atmosphere couples desire.

COMMISSIONER PROCEEDINGS MAY 6, 2013

The Thayer County Board of Commissioners met in open and public session in the commissioner's room of the courthouse at 9:00 a.m. on May 6, 2013. Present were Commissioners Dave Bruning, Chris Frye, Dean Krueger and County Clerk, Marie Rauner.

Dave Bruning, chairman of the board, called the meeting to order.

Public meeting laws are posted and available on the north wall of the meeting room in compliance with Nebraska statutes.

The minutes from the previous meeting were mailed to the commissioners for review. Chris Frye moved and Dave Bruning seconded to approve the minutes from the May 1, 2013 meeting. Result of vote: Frye-yes, Bruning-yes, and Krueger-yes. Motion carried.

Richard Heinrichs, Thayer County Road Superintendent, met with the commissioners to discuss ongoing road projects and department updates.

David Lee, Thayer County Sheriff and Dan Werner, Thayer County Attorney, also attended the meeting to discuss procedures to address pivot end guns watering county roadways. Following discussion it was decided that all pivot irrigation road violation issues will be reported to the Sheriff's office. Dean Krueger made a motion and Chris Frye seconded that due to liability issues the County Commissioners will enclose an owner notification in tax statements requesting due diligence to keep end guns working properly and serve notice that end gun violations are to be reported to the Thayer County Sheriff's office for proper documentation and investigation. Result of vote: Krueger-yes, Frye-yes, and Bruning-yes. Motion carried.

Discussion was held concerning the replacement of the old county vehicle, mainly used to transport veterans, which is experiencing electrical problems. Board members discussed how to dispose of the vehicle and a replacement that has easy access for county veterans. Dean Krueger made a motion and Chris Frye seconded to authorize the sheriff to set a date and publish notice for sealed bids for used vehicles owned by the county and purchase of a used vehicle to replace the Impala. Result of vote: Krueger-yes, Frye-yes, and Bruning-yes. Motion carried.

Bill McPherson, Emergency manager, met with the board to discuss the billing received for GIS services for the next budget year. Also discussed was the "Page My Cell" program for fire department notifications to be sent to cell phones as well as the pagers. A couple of the county fire departments have already enrolled in the program but due to interest from the additional fire departments the manager has become aware of a county wide program through the same company at a cheaper rate for the smaller departments. The departments already enrolled will be credited for their previous enrollment. The emergency manager was authorized to proceed with implementation.

Gary Watson, safety committee member, met with the commissioners to ask for adoption of a County Safety Manual. The manual will be reviewed by the safety committee and presented to the commissioners at a later date for adoption. CPR training is in need to be updated, this will also be discussed by the safety committee at their next meeting.

Bryan Schardt, county weed superintendent, met with the commissioners to discuss mowing of the pioneer cemeteries. It was decided that Mount Gilead will be cleaned by volunteers one more time and then the weed department will take over the mowing duties. Bryan had looked at the Letterman Cemetery for mowing as well as continuing to mow Pleasant Plain Cemetery near Bruning. The clerk will review previous commissioner minutes to check the status of the pioneer designation of a couple of other mentioned cemeteries in the county.

Board members reviewed the document prepared by Bruning State Bank, Mass Mutual deferred comp program administrator. The administrator had researched and prepared a list of new investment options since the acquisition of Hartford by Mass Mutual. Chris Frye made a motion to approve the listing. The Marxhausen Gallery is the on-campus exhibition space for Concordia and hosts a variety of exhibitions each year. It is located in Jesse Hall.

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


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
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
