## Belvidere man arrested in Gresham

### Faces five drug-related counts

Following the search of a vehicle that turned up cocaine, marijuana, methamphetamine and components for a mobile meth lab, police officers from the York County Sheriff's Department arrested James D. Paugh, 23, of Belvidere, and Raymond (aka Charlie) Purzycki, 25, of Tennessee last month. The arrest took place near Gresham where the two men had been living.

Lt. Paul Vrbka of the Sheriff's Department reported that earlier in the day, officers arrested an individual on theft charges regarding stolen semi batteries which eventually led to the arrests of Paugh and Purzycki.

On Tuesday morning, May 22,

Paugh, who is a 2006 Thayer Central graduate, appeared in York County court where he was bound over to district court on four felony counts and one misdemeanor count.

He is charged with felony possession of cocaine and methamphetamine, possession of a controlled substance with intent to manufacture, possession of money obtained in a crime, and possession of marijuana.

Lt. Vrbka reported that a drug dog was used to search the vehicle, where most of the evidence was found; however, a search of the men's residence at 230 Maude Street in Gresham also turned up paraphernalia. Lt. Vrbka told the York News-Times newspaper it appeared both men had only lived a short time in Gresham and appeared to be in the course of moving.

quickly turns to chronic Lyme."

Lyme Borreliosis is a bacterial infection transmitted by the bite of an infected tick (all species), fleas, biting flies, mosquitoes, keds and lice. The bacteria can invade and infect any organ in humans and animals and if it isn't diagnosed early, may develop into debilitating arthritic, cardiac, neurological, digestive, or psychiatric conditions. It can cause long-term disability or can even be fatal.

Thumann says since 2008 she has suffered from the onset of Lyme disease. "I found a tick on my back and got the classic bull's eye rash," she said, "but after having it medically checked locally, was told we did not have Lyme here - we do not have that type of tick here."

Thumann said she continued to suffer side effects including migraine headaches (a condition she had never suffered from before), extreme fatigue and severe joint pain, and it's where an arduous journey through 20 physicians, including an endocrinologist and migraine specialist would eventually lead to a Lyme literate doctor. "I went to Missouri on the recommendation of a friend, and it's where I finally received the correct testing and treatment for Lyme disease," she said.

Symptoms may appear from 48 hours to several weeks after an infected tick bite. Fatigue, muscle

## Sewer rates headed up

Sewer rates are going up, but not water, says the Hebron City Council.

At the regular meeting on May 7, the officials agreed to raise the sewer service fee to \$6 inside the city limits and \$10 for rural customers. A surcharge fee of \$1.30 for each 100 cubic feet of water is also included in the raise for a minimum monthly rate of \$8.91.

Council president Larry Fangmeier said the sewer rates prior to the raise were not adequate as the City had consistently lost \$5,000 a month for the last few months. "A lot of our

costs are infrastructure and the fact that we have two individuals working at the sewer plant," he said.

While one employee is working under certain restrictions due to illness, another is being substituted in to complete necessary tasks. "Our sewer rates have not been raised in a very long time," Fangmeier added, and said the raise was necessary to get back in the black ink on the utility.


A detailed publication of the new ordinance (#835) can be found in the legal section of this newspaper, and is currently kept on file at the Hebron City Office.

In keeping with the underground system, the city leaders then turned to a new sewer project that will be

getting underway very soon on the northern edge of Hebron. Metal-Quest is currently requesting to hook into the city's system because a planned expansion will tax the company's septic tank. At the same time, the City of Hebron would like to extend the current system to the property cordoned off for a future community center at the north edge of town and across Highway 81 from MetalQuest.

Initially the project for the City was supposed to cost \$50,000; however officials were told the new system's pipes must be sleeved which, in essence, triples the cost. Fangmeier

and joint pain, headaches, fever, chills, swollen glands and throat, a stiff neck are just some of the symptoms that can occur. Unfortunately, these symptoms may move around the body with the only consistency being a lack of consistency. According to the Lyme Disease Coalition, those infected may have flu-like symptoms one day, and fatigue, or muscle and joint pain a few days later. Only about one-third of those infected by Lyme get the bull's eye rash like Thumann.

Treatment for Lyme is a 2-4 week course of antibiotics; however, if the infection turns chronic, other therapies (as well as another battery of antibiotics) are used to treat further symptoms. Diagnosing the disease is the trick, Thumann says, in that people often think they are suffering

from something else due to the imitated symptoms. Normal testing includes the Lyme Antibody Test, but will only test high enough to register a positive if the infected individual is tested between the 18th and 45th day. The Coalition suggests a second test called the Western Blot. If the first test is positive, most doctors will insist on the Western Blot.

Thumann, who has been active in Lyme disease awareness for the last year, said she was finally diagnosed correctly after receiving the Western Blot test. "If you don't catch the disease in the first two weeks, it turns chronic," she said. "So I tell everyone, if you are bitten by a tick, and even if you don't get the bull's eye rash, demand antibiotics for two weeks and save yourself a lifetime of illness."



# Wilson Foundation Scholarships Presented

"Providing students with educational opportunities", the Warren and Velda Wilson Foundation has awarded \$1,000 scholarships to seniors residing in and graduating from high schools located in nine central and south central Nebraska counties the past eight years. According to John Farrell, president of the Wilson Foundation board of directors, the late Warren and Velda Wilson farmed for over 60 years in and around Clay County. They had no children, so prior to their deaths; they decided to establish an educational foundation to help deserving young people. "It is our desire that these scholarships not be limited to graduating seniors with only the highest levels of

academic achievement. Other factors are also important to us, including good citizenship, involvement in school and community activities, and potential for future academic success," according to Mr. and Mrs. Wilson.

Additional Warren and Velda Wilson Foundation scholarships will be awarded in future years with the number and amount of scholarships available to be announced early in each school term. This is a non-renewable scholarship.

# Physical Fitness Month

May is National Physical Fitness month. Let's use this month to promote the value of physical activity in leading a happier, healthier, and more productive life. Being physically active is one of the most important steps we Americans of all ages can take to improve our overall health.

According to the Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans, children and adolescents should get at least 60 minutes of physical activity daily, while recommendations for adults are 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity or 75 minutes of vigorous-intensity activity each week.

The obesity rate among our children is at an all time high. If we want future generations to be healthier, it is important to ensure our children are developing healthy habits that will lead to them to be physically active.

In a study by the National Institute of Health (NIH), it showed the activity level of American children drops sharply between age 9 to age 15. The results showed children aged 9 averaged three hours of physical activity daily, but by age 15, they averaged only 49 minutes per weekday, and 35 minutes per weekend. Most children aged 15 in the study failed to reach the daily recommended activity level of 60 minutes.

The lack of physical activity in childhood raises the risk for obesity and other health problems later in life. Helping our children maintain their activity levels is important if we want our youth to maintain a healthy weight and lead a healthy lifestyle as adults.

The NIH study used data collected from Early Child Care and Youth Development programs. It was a long term study of more than 1,000 children from ethnically and economically diverse backgrounds. The study collected information on various other aspects of children's health and development. It was geared toward gathering

information on children's experience in various child care arrangements but did not constitute a nationally representative sample of the United States as a whole.

This study showed there is a real need to have programs starting as early as possible at the family, community, school, health care, and governmental levels. These programs need to address the problem of decreasing physical activity as we age. Our schools can play a key role by ensuring our children receive periodic recess breaks and education on physical fitness. Local governments can also ensure families have adequate facilities like safe biking and walking paths.

However, the key to the success of any program is parents taking the lead in ensuring their children are active. Parents need to plan and encourage family activities. A family walk for only 15 minutes a day can provide many health benefits. Then on weekends, family outings could be centered on activities that last for longer periods of time.

NIH is working to promote physical activity with their "We Can!" education program. This program is aimed at helping children ages 8-13 maintain a healthy weight and stay active. We Can! provides tips, evidence-based education and other resources for parents and community programs. said that with the help of TIF funding and dollars from the Community Center funds, the city has the potential to cover \$219,000, well over the estimated \$155,000 for the project. MetalQuest will connect into the City's system on the north side of Dove Road on the planned Community Center property.

In other business, Howard Mills reported over 300 volunteer hours have been recorded since work started on the Pioneer Center in downtown Hebron. He said 35 volunteers have shown up consistently to make the area a viable and attractive public meeting place. "We're getting a lot of interest, people are walking by and sticking their heads in to see what's going on or how far along we've come," he said. "We'll have it ready for use this summer - already have it booked for an arts and crafts show on the Fourth of July."

The City earmarked \$50,000 to improve the place and is currently under budget by about \$9,000 due to the volunteers. Mills asked if new furniture could be purchased, specifically chairs. "I'm getting rid of the old couches and love seats and want to furnish the place with chairs only," he said. "But the last time we asked for furniture donations,

Park Board; tabled a new Pit Bull ordinance; and will discuss animal control with current dog catcher Stephanie Willhite next month.
