### Historical society to celebrate Reinke

The Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation will host a 50th anniversary commemoration of Jennifer Reinke's National Spelling Bee championship June 10.

The celebration will begin in Hebron and end at the Jennifer Reinke Public Library in Deshler.

At 1:30 p.m., Melissa Marsh, author of POW Camps and winner of the 2015 Nebraska Book Award for Nebraska History, will give a brief talk next to the historical marker in Riverside Park.

The next event is scheduled for 2:15 p.m., on the lawn of the Thayer County Courthouse, next to the historical marker. The courthouse was the setting for Reinke's county spelling bee heat March 11, 1967, the first step in her journey to winning the national championship.

Trevor Jones, director and chief executive officer of the society, will give a presentation. In case of rain, the event will be moved indoors to the district courtroom on third floor.

In the afternoon, the celebration continues at 3 p.m. in the Reinke Library. Executive director of Historical Society, Leslie Fattig, will give remarks.

Reinke will present an autographed issue of the Summer 2017 Nebraska History publication to all who attend. In the edition is an article about Reinke's bee championship.

## Students weigh in on Hebron's future

Hebron Chamber of Commerce Director Jana Tietjen facilitated a discussion among Thayer Central seniors and sophomores for input on the future of Hebron through the thoughts of young people.

Tietjen posed questions to the groups and to the seniors, she hypothetically offered \$5,000 for improvements. Seniors were given one month to spend the money.

A plethora of suggestions came from the discussion, including youth activities during summer's lull in July, mini YMCA and repairs to the pool and slide.

The senior group also suggested attractions, such as an archery/trap shooting facility, which was picked up by Nebraska Game and Parks Commission Officer Matt Taylor, who is working with other agencies and organizations on the topic.

A small arcade, indoor water park, updating hotels, raquetball court for badminton/squash, vending machine for renting movies, indoor and outdoor basketball courts next to the Korff Fitness and Wellness Center and a child care center for the wellness center were other ways to spend funds.

On parks, seniors would like to see improvements to the tennis courts, new equipment and rubber matting, an update to the picnic tables, better landscaping and updates to the basketball court at Willard Park, including marking court lines.

For Arrowhead Park, seniors suggested replanting and signs for plants, new benches, a gazebo/bandstand on the east side, raking

leaves and picking up sticks. Volunteers could be designated to care for the park throughout the year.

Solar lighting was an idea for the walking trail, which is currently expanding.

Streets were also an issue with seniors expressing more stop signs are needed for intersections and especially, those on the north side of Hebron. First to Third and Barger Streets could be paved as could the gravel road from the third baseball field to the camp and Jefferson Street.

Lincoln Avenue's potholes and brick pavement could also use a facelift, the seniors said.

On a more serious note, helping the mentally ill and preventing suicide was suggested.

The seniors were also asked what they want to see developed while they attend college. More hangouts and activities for high school students and retail clothing stores.

To return to Hebron after college, students posed more job opportunities and reasonably-priced child care. More housing was also a suggestion.

Some sophomores wanted more parking in the school lot, more activities at the bowling alley and picking up litter around town. They also wanted more restaurants.

They were asked what youth can do for Hebron and one suggestion was a community watch program.

Another was volunteering for the elderly. Being a positive influence and good in school were also focuses.

## Kassebaum holds 50-year record in 1600

As the 2017 state track meet gets underway this week, a 1967 mile record with a time of 4:18.6 stands.

Hebron High graduate, Larry Kassebaum, who will also celebrate his 50th high school reunion this year, still can't believe it, although over time, the mile became the 1600-meter run with a difference of approximately nine meters.

"All you have to do to break my record is run a little shorter," Kassebaum said from his Arizona home.

But back then, Kassebaum was determined to earn a gold medal after seeing a fellow runner take it the year before.

"Of the returning runners, I had the best time and said, 'that is going to be me next year,'" he said.

The pressure was on as he and his opponent turned friend, Cliff Colglazier of Grant, were photographed on every turn in the state

meet at the Kearney track.

"I knew I could win if I could stay with him for three quarters," Kassebaum told the Hebron Journal-Register after the race. "But if he's as good as everybody said he is, I didn't think I could do it."

He was told by classmates he might as well check his suit in because he couldn't beat Colglazier, the Journal-Register reported.

"But Bears' Coach Randy Smith and Kassebaum thought that was all a bunch of mish-mash."

Kassebaum had "spunk" as Colglazier took off in the backstretch and "whistled around Cliff on the turn for the tape."

"This is the happiest day of my life," Kassebaum told the newspaper. He and Colglazier are still friends.

As soon as that medal weighed on his neck, Kassebaum saw flashes of his future.

"Now I can afford to go to seminary. I knew college would



## 1887

### 130 Years Ago

New farm houses are going up all over the county.

Never get up another "boom" train lest it result in another deluge of book agents.

A lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen will be instituted here Monday.

S. H. Coon has been appointed town marshal. We believe he will make a good and fearless officer.

C. J. Deming, of this precinct, has set out 3,225 forest trees and 75 fruit trees. That is a good report. Next!

A force of men are building the C.K.&N. stockyards south of J. L. Willett's residence. The town board should at once notify the company to place it outside the town limits. It will prove a nuisance to that part of town.

J. E. Freeman greets the readers of the Journal with a card relative to furniture, embalming and kindred matters of interest. It is stated that he will soon associate with himself a partner and build a fine two-story brick furniture store.

Last Monday, Mr. Ball, county surveyor of Gage County, commenced laying off the town of Bruning, on the B.&M. between Belvidere and Strang. The present town site contains 80 acres. The owners are Messrs. Frank Bruning, Fred Bruning, Henry J. Voss and John F. Carroll. Lots will be for sale next week.

The following bulletin notice headed "Danger!" has been sent out by Supt. W. F. Allen: "Big fill two miles east of Gilead is sliding and breaking badly. East end of first bridge west of Gilead is sinking. Run slow over the track until repaired. You had better stop and examine before crossing and know they are safe."

H. J. Struve will build a new creamery at Deshler, using part of his Friedensau creamery machinery in the new creamery.

It is suggested that a sausage factory might utilize the numerous canines infesting Hebron.

Hebron saloon license, \$1200.

The license for auctioneers in Hebron is \$25.

The Gilead elevator will be finished early next week.

License, \$500; occupation tax, \$700; total \$1,200 for a saloon license.

There are now four pauper inmates on the county poor farm. This we consider a pretty fair showing for about 12,000 population.

W. L. Thompson has sold his interest in the Farmers' Mercantile Co.'s. store to Benjamin Young.

Hogs, \$4.80 per cwt.

Butter is 20 cents a pound.

Potatoes are \$1 a bushel.

Rye, 30 cents; oats, 22 cents.

Thayer County Health Services is excited to announce plans to join Nebraska's state designated health information exchange known as the Nebraska Health Information Initiative (NeHII).

As a member of NeHII, Thayer County will be joining a network of over 7,500 participants, including hospitals, medical clinics, and health care professionals across Nebraska.

NeHII is designed to share patient's clinical and administrative health data among the healthcare providers in Nebraska participate in the exchange. This exchange securely and instantly connects Nebraska hospitals, labs, physicians, pharmacies, and clinics in serving approximately 1,521,268 patients throughout the state.

NeHII is designed to securely share clinical health information electronically between a patient's healthcare providers. Being a part of this exchange will assist physicians, nursing staff, and the entire care team at Thayer County in providing a comprehensive view of a patient's medical history.

NeHII's exchange system allows the information to be available in emergencies or in the event that a patient receives care from a doctor or hospital at other participating facilities in Nebraska.

Being able to access a patient's health information saves time, money, and improves the lives for our patients by reducing the number of repeat laboratory tests and diagnostic images such as X-Rays and CT Scans. The easy avail-

ability of a patient's health information allows doctors to better coordinate with other specialists and clinics across Nebraska.

A patient participation in NeHII is optional. However, both Thayer County and NeHII want patients to recognize the important benefits that come with participation.

If a patient should choose not to share their medical information, they may opt-out of the exchange simply by contacting NeHII.

Emily Welch marked a sixth place in the discus, throwing 104 feet, 5 inches.




