

## School Bond Issue a Close One

Patrons of Thayer Central Community Schools decided not to allow a \$12.9 million renovation bond last week during the primary election. The vote was exceptionally close, but ended any forward movement of the plan by a mere 45 votes. Officially all votes for the issue are in and accounted for. ## Area senior centers work together to provide food, activities to locals

Several volunteers and employees make it possible for seniors around the county to get a nutritious meal once a day.

The process starts early in the morning and isn't complete until late in the afternoon. The meals begin at the senior center in Davenport. This is where Janet Voss, kitchen manager, prepares the meals and gets them ready for delivery.

Before the meals can even be prepared, Voss must plan ahead by creating menus for upcoming meals. She must follow several requirements. Each week she is required to prepare two beef entrees, one pork entree and two of either chicken, fish or turkey. She also tries to include fiber and vitamin C. Voss works to include fresh raw vegetables when she can. All food included must be from certified sources with the exception of fresh garden produce.

These meals are prepared for an average of 100 Thayer County citizens five days a week.

"I always tell people it's like doing a small wedding reception every day," Voss said.

Once the meals are ready, Kathy Sutton will make a loop from Deshler to Hebron to Alexandria. In Hebron,



## Valuation notices coming soon

The County Assessor's office is in the process of preparing valuation notices to be sent to all property owners whose taxable value has changed. Notices will be mailed on or before June 1. "Please review your notice," suggests Thayer County Assessor Karla Joe. "It is the goal of our office to have all the information as correct as possible."

Joe added that due to increases in the market of agricultural land, the office has made substantial adjustments in value to all the land class groups. Nebraska real property regulation 10-002.01B requires that agricultural land be valued at 75 percent of market, she said. "These increases were necessary to maintain an acceptable level of value (69 to 75 percent)."

# Pages of the Past...

## 1884

### 130 Years Ago

F.J. Hendershot reports the sale of six quarter sections of wild land, in as many days, to parties who will become citizens of Thayer County.

As will be seen by reference to another column, a company of boys from the Children's Aid Society of New York will arrive at Davenport. These are parentless and homeless waifs whose unfortunate condition strongly appeals to the sympathies of the charitable and childless. Those whose homes do not echo the tread of youthful feet or resound with the laughter of children can take this opportunity to fill their hearts and houses with joy and happiness.

A disgraceful triangular row was promptly quelled by Marshal Boyle. He at once took the combatives before his honor, Squire Hendershot, who administered rebukes and fines. Many citizens speak highly of the promptness and efficiency of the marshal. Those who desire to amuse themselves by pounding and being pounded should retire to some secluded spot, some lone and quiet dell, or some daisy-spangled hillside with a sufficient slope to carry off the crimson gore. These, under the cerulean skies and cheered by the singing of birds, they can knock and kick and gouge and swear.

At the opera house, the Belvidere Comedy Company will present the nautical drama, "The Turn of the Tide" and the laughable Dutch farce, "Hans Van Smash." Turnout and appreciatively welcome the talent of our sister town.

John Hartley of Illinois, brother of James Hartley of Carleton precinct, is visiting the latter. He has just returned from a visit to relatives in England. He reports money matters close in the old country.

Mrs. Cook, a lady who recently bought 800 acres of land in the southeastern part of Thayer County of ex-Senator Alvin Saunders, and moved on her new possessions, died this week of paralysis.

Married at the residence of the bride's parents near Chester, T.N. Boner to Miss Fannie H. Marsh, all of Thayer County.

Married in Hebron, W.F. Sellars to Miss Mary Nelson, all of Thayer County.

J.J. Kern of Friedensau will soon commence the construction of a unique and ornamental residence on his stock farm, the plans and specifications for which he received from Palliser & Palliser, the celebrated architects of Bridgeport, Conn. It will be 24x32 feet in size, have a double cellar, two stories and an attic.

### Belvidere

The Belvidere Cornet Band has been fully organized and officers elected.

J.W. Crawford is building a large two-story house in Wilson's addition, facing E Street.

His many friends will be glad to know that postmaster Henry E. Garzee of Belvidere was recently the recipient of \$1,200 back pension from the government. He has purchased the former post office building, fitted it up neatly and conveniently and stocked it with attractive goods. In view of the many smiles of the goddess Fortuna upon the good-looking postmaster of Belvidere, it would not surprise us to hear, in the near and saccharine subsequently, that he had started a bank.

## 1894

### 120 Years Ago

The new town board commenced work and granted licenses for two saloons at \$1,500 each.

It has been remarked that this is a good season of the year to plant young republican clubs. They are said to flourish even in seasons of drought, as they are not dependent upon moisture for sustenance.

Geo. Wasson sold his interest in the furniture store, Coon & Wasson, to a Mr. Foltz of Oberlin, Kan., who will move his stock to that place. Mr. Coon will continue the furniture business in this city.

The Carleton Leader says the hardware business is rather peculiar for some reasons.

There are twins in the families of Beachy of Carleton; Boggs of Davenport, Garmire of Hebron and a hardware man of Ong. Next!

It is reported that a family by the name of Schroeder in Kiowa precinct lost two children by scarlet fever in one day this week, one in the morning and one in the evening. The mother is also reported dangerously sick.

The number of ex-soldiers whose remains have been removed from the old to the new cemetery is ten instead of seven as stated last week. The cost was \$50 for removing the ten. A committee from the G.A.R. was in charge of the removal.

The rain of Wednesday was very heavy in the southern half of the county. Dry Creek, which usually pursues a course of conduct befitting its name, went on a tear and was as full as a ward bumper.

Hebron is to have a circus. Howe & Cushing's railroad shows will be here June 1. The average small boy will now begin to save nickels for the circus.

Willie Ring, the only child of Mr. and Mrs. A.C. Ring of this city was so severely hurt that the general opinion was he could not live, but we are glad to state that he is now rapidly recovering. While he was watching the men working in the new city well, one of the supports to the derrick gave way. All others except Willie who were near the falling timbers escaped. Willie was hit on the head and knocked down. Physicians were at once called, and he was taken to his home in an unconscious condition. Careful and constant attendance has prevented either brain fever or paralysis and he is improving each day.

M.E. Talbot, of the Bon Ton Cafe, has entered into partnership with Judson Marsh. The business will hereafter be conducted under the firm name of Talbot & Marsh.

M.E. O'Brien, superintendent of the Nebraska Fish Commission at the state fish hatcheries at South Bend, in compliance with a request, shipped to E.M. Correll, four 20-gallon cans containing many thousands of young pike about one-fourth of an inch long. The fish arrived in splendid condition and were at once emptied in the Little Blue River above the new city well. He also writes that he will send a supply of black bass this fall.

Died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Jerome Longbrake in Hebron, Frederick Stair aged 92 years.

Mrs. Oat Bean shipped her household good to Concordia, Kan., where she went to join her husband.

### Belvidere

J.L. Neville arrived in the city from Chester with his father and at once set a force of men at work in his brickyard at this place.

### Carleton

John Beavers reports a destructive hail at his farm. His wheat field looks like plowed ground. A large number of window glasses were broken out in the neighborhood and fruit was considerably damaged.

J.L. Burtis has resigned his position as butter maker at the Carleton creamery and will be succeeded by Anton Schultz of Monto Video, Minn.

### North Prairie Items

Uncle Henry Nachtigall died of lagrippe. Uncle Henry was a homesteader and has lived here ever since.

## 1904

### 110 Years Ago

Twenty-three members of the Woman's Relief Corps spent the day with Mrs. George Whittman and in addition to a social time sewed 24 pounds of carpet rags for their hostess. In a test guessing game of kitchen utensils, Mrs. Leach and Mrs. Barger carried off the honors.

Mrs. G.M. Fowler received the sad news that Mrs. Slocum, her mother, who had made her home in Hebron many years, had died at the home of a son in Michigan.

Lew Secrest will depart on June 4 for an extended trip to Chicago and back to his old home at Bethesda, Ohio.

Mrs. C.C. Doll, who has made an extended visit at the

home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Max Degenhart, left to join her husband at Kansas City, where they will make their future home.

W.R. Macy of Carleton was transacting business in the county seat. Mr. Macy is said to be the only homesteader in this county who is still living on his original homestead entry, which is located half a mile south and three miles east of Carleton.

G.W. Kitson received a letter from E.F. Walker announcing the death of his daughter, Lena May, at their home in Sullivan, Ind., with consumption, aged 15 years. She will be remembered as a sweet little girl of six or seven years when the family moved away in 1896.

## 1914

### 100 Years Ago

### Carleton



## Grilling Tips

Happy Memorial Day! It is a time to pause to remember the brave men and women who paid the ultimate price for the freedom we enjoy in America. In addition to Memorial Day Services on Monday, the weekend is also the time for high school reunions and families celebrating the weekend with family cookouts, camping or picnics.

The holiday is also thought of as the beginning of summer. To prevent food borne illnesses remember simple food safety advice.

Always wash hands before and after handling food, especially raw meats. Do you remember how children are taught to wash their hands? Wash hands for 15 to 20 seconds using warm, soapy water – about the amount of time it takes to sing “Happy Birthday” through twice.

Also, use clean utensils, containers and surfaces because if they aren’t clean, food can be contaminated with bacteria and viruses that could cause illnesses. Don’t use utensils that have touched raw meats on other food items.

Grilling is a healthy way to prepare food because foods are cooked without adding extra fat. Marinades tenderize meat surfaces, but cutting a quarter inch deep cut with a knife in several places of the meat before coating it with the marinade will help the marinade soak into the meat. Marinating meat or vegetables requires three things:

-- an acid ingredient to tenderize the meat, such as lemon juice, wine, vinegar, yogurt, balsamic vinegar or soy sauce

-- herbs and spices for flavor and zest, such as garlic, red pepper flakes, green onions, rosemary, thyme, onion or ginger

-- time: 30 minutes for flavor and up to four hours for marinating

Use a non-reactive, sealed container or a sealable plastic bag. Also, try to avoid using metal containers, especially aluminum or cast iron. Once the marinade is added, be safe by placing the meat and marinade in the refrigerator. Make sure any marinade used on raw meat or poultry is not used on cooked food unless it is boiled. Discard leftover marinade that is contaminated with raw meat or poultry juices.

If cooking large vegetables such as corn on the cob, eggplant or asparagus on the grill – they can be placed directly on the grill. Chopped vegetables should be wrapped in aluminum foil. Add flavor by adding herbs and spices to the vegetables before wrapping them in the foil and placing them on the grill.

Make sure the grill is hot before placing food on it. Preheat coals on a charcoal grill at least 20 to 30 minutes before adding food. For other grills, allow 15 to 30 minutes for it to preheat before cooking foods.

Thoroughly cook food at one time because if food is

partially cooked, bacteria can grow without being killed by enough heat. Use a food thermometer because the meat’s color or juice is not a reliable indicator on how well it’s cooked. Make sure to use a clean food thermometer to check for correct internal temperatures:

-- Hamburgers should be 160 degrees Fahrenheit.

-- Beef, veal, lamb steaks and roasts should be 145 degrees Fahrenheit for medium rare; 160 degrees Fahrenheit for medium.

-- Poultry should be 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

-- Fish should be opaque and flake easily, 145 degrees Fahrenheit.

Always remember to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Foods shouldn’t sit out for more than one hour, especially when it is hot outside. Make plans so that food is eaten almost immediately after it is cooked. If there are leftovers, refrigerate them right away or put into coolers with a lot of ice. If leftovers have been sitting out in hot weather for more than one hour, throw them away. The longer food is at unsafe temperatures, the more likely harmful bacteria can grow and cause foodborne illness. Cold foods kept in coolers with ice are safe, but if ice has melted, that food should be thrown out.



If your answer to any of these questions is “yes,” or if you are unsure, it is best to call 911. EMS personnel can be there within minutes and begin medical treatments at the scene. They all provide medical care on the way to the hospital and can even alert the emergency department of your condition en route.

Letter to the Editor:

In response to Doug Hubers letter to the editor last week, basically everything he stated I would have to agree with, but there is additional information that needs to be added.

Kall School Management LLC, in Feb. 2005, considered the conditions of the schools in Thayer County, Fillmore Central, and Fairbury School district, and did a feasibility study of merging all of them.

In the summary of the study, three high schools would be kept in the towns of Deshler, Fairbury, and Geneva. On page 61, it states that Thayer Central students of grades nine through 12 would be transported to Deshler. Thayer Central had no more participation or correspondence regarding the study.

Conclusion: No one wants to give up their high school. One consideration of a merger

is the increased cost of transportation for both the school and the students and parents. Another is the increase in teacher cost.

While it is likely to eliminate some teachers by combining some of the classes, the remaining teachers, because they are unionized, compare their pay to schools of similar size which is larger than the individual schools that merged. In many cases of merger, there ends up with very little overall savings when all things are considered.

I still have the study if anyone wishes to look at it. On a good note, however, is that there have been many instances of cooperation between local districts in the areas of sports and other activities, as well as long-distance learning. These have generally had positive results.



### 11 headed to state meet

#### C-3 District Team Finishes

The Thayer Central boys' track team demolished the competition Thursday in a race to the C-3 district championship. The squad collected 129 points throughout the day to garner the trophy. Wilber-Clatonia finished second with 92. Nine athletes qualified for the state competition held at Burke Stadium in Omaha this weekend. The Titans will compete in nine events including two relays.

Cameron Asche and Simon Wiedel led the way in medal collections. Wiedel earned four individual medals including golds in both the 100 meter (10.7) and 200 meter (22.3) dashes and silvers in the long (21'4") and triple (43'4") jumps.

Asche collected a gold medal in the long jump (22'9") and a couple of bronzes in the triple jump (42'1") and 110 hurdles (15.1). He was also a member of the 1600 meter relay team that finished in first place (3:33.2) to qualify for state. Other members of the team include Caleb Goedeken, Jamie Lange and Jared Marsh.

Marsh also collected an individual silver medal in the 800 meter run (2:07.7) then joined Heath Fink, Ben Hintz and Adam Hellbusch to take first in the 3200 meter relay (8:40.6).

Schroeder, who also runs a leg on the 400 relay team, earned a third qualification after finishing second in the triple jump event (34'5").


Kalli Schroeder earned an
