MEMORIAL DAY MAY 27th

Area Services

Hebron: Opening ceremonies will take place Monday May 27, at 10 a.m., in front of the courthouse with the advancement of colors by combined VFW Post 5328, American Legion Post 180, Sons of the American Legion and Oregon Trail Post 180 Riders.

Guest speaker for the event will be John Brueggeman, lay pastor at the King of Kings Bible Church.

A welcome address will be conducted by American Legion Post 180 Commander Lyle Bucholzer and the national anthem will be performed by Sue Joachim. During this time, "Barbara Jean," a P-51 Mustang airplane piloted by Duncan Aviation senior pilot Harry Barr, will perform a flyover.

At approximately 10:45 a.m., the ceremony will move to Rose Hill Cemetery for laying of the wreaths by the American Legion Auxiliary and 21-gun salute led by Joe Hergott, Sgt. at Arms.

Thayer County "Court of Honor Flags" are to be raised on the courthouse lawn at 7 a.m., and retired at 4 p.m. The service organization commanders of American Legion Post 180 and Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 5328 would appreciate any and all community involvement in this worthy effort to honor our departed veterans.

Hebron Boy Scout Troop 305 will hold a flag retirement ceremony following the cemetery services. The troop is not accepting flags at this time.

Belvidere: A Sunday morning Memorial Day service, May 27, will take place in the United Church of Christ at 10 a.m. Remarks will be given by Korean War veteran Dave Rinehart, of Bruning.

Locals are invited to visit the Belvidere cemetery to view the Avenue of Flags following the church service.

Bruning: The Durham-Mammen American Legion Post 166 will hold a Memorial Day service, Monday, May 27, at 10 a.m., at the Bruning Opera House. Immediately following, honors will be rendered at the Bruning Public Cemetery and the Trinity Lutheran Cemetery.

Hubbell: The Hubbell Legion Post 317 will hold Memorial Day services in Chester, Hubbell, and Mahaska, Kan., Monday, May 27.

The services begin at the Chester City Cemetery at 9:30 a.m., move to the St. John Lutheran Cemetery at 10 a.m., then move to the Zion Lutheran Cemetery at 10:30 a.m., and the Lamb (Williams) Cemetery at 10:45 a.m. At 11:20 a.m., services will be held at the Mahaska, Kan., cemetery followed by a final service at 11:45 a.m., at the Hubbell Cemetery.

Memorial Day Service to feature aerobatic pilot

The Thayer County Memorial Day services, held each year in front of courthouse, will feature a fly over this year during the singing of the national anthem. American Legion Post 180 Commander Lyle Bucholzer organized the event scheduled to take place at approximately 10:10 a.m., Monday, May 27, on Memorial Day.

Harry Barr, senior pilot at Duncan Aviation in Lincoln, will fly his P-51 Mustang aircraft "Barbara Jean" over the ceremony on Fourth Street in Hebron.

Barr has been flying since 1954 and has been flying with Duncan Aviation since 1956. According to a short biography, the pilot tries to fly every day and especially enjoys aerobatics and air shows.

A native of Clarinda, Iowa, Barr moved to Omaha in 1955 and worked as a line boy for Lang Aircraft. Donald Duncan, also of Clarinda, acquired Lang Aircraft and Barr continued his employment at Duncan Aviation. Today he is the "oldest pilot and oldest employee" at the company.

Barr is an early member of the Midwest Aerobatics Club, competing in numerous contests, organizing competitions for other aerobatic pilots, and performing air show routines. He has been a mentor to many young adults, helping them to further their aviation careers and in 2007, received the FAA "Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award." He is also a member of the Nebraska Aviation Hall of Fame.

Fond memories of Bruning Air Base

Every year, as Memorial Day approaches, my thoughts drift back to a little town in Nebraska. Other than

those who live in or near this place, few ever heard of a little town named Bruning.

My first encounter came when our group of control tower opera-

tors was assigned to a new base in Nebraska. Remote is an understatement. As we entered the area, we saw a small sign reading, Bruning, population, 232. It hasn't grown much. Investigating the town on my computer, I learned that in 2010, the population was 279. In those two and a half years of my life, Bruning and the residents of neighboring communities like Fairbury and Hebron, were the most caring, compassionate and patriotic Americans I have ever met. Unfortunately, not many will realize the role this town's Army Air Base played in World War II.

While my fond memories of the residents are everlasting, so, too, are the sad ones, the memories of those who lost their lives there, and those who sustained the heaviest losses of any Army Air Force group when ordered into combat.

First is the story of the 449th bomb group, the B-24 Liberators that suffered the loss of more than 70 percent of the planes and personnel on missions over the

Ten arrested in two-year drug probe

On May 20, officials with the Thayer County Sheriff's Office along with members of the Rural Apprehension Drug Task Force (RAP), and Nebraska State Patrol initiated several drug arrests in Thayer County. These arrests are the result of a two year investigation regarding the distribution of illegal narcotics in Thayer County. Nine individuals living in Hebron and one from Beatrice were arrested Monday on charges of distribution of controlled substances including hydrocodone, oxycodone and amphetamines. All are class 1D felonies.

Individuals from Hebron and their charges include: Antonio Ayala, 50, one count of distribution of a controlled substance,

Discussion of Dam project to be held May 29

"As Nebraskans, we recognize the value that water plays in sustaining life and our agricultural economy," says Mike Onnen, Little Blue Natural Resources District manager. "The Little Blue NRD continues to examine projects and programs which capture the water which falls in the district and conserve our valuable water resources for the future."

Last fall, the Little Blue NRD Board of Directors authorized the re-evaluation of a project envisioned over 30 years ago in the northwest corner of Thayer, two miles north of Davenport. The project was identified in the original Master Plan of Surface Water Development of the Big Sandy Creek Watershed.

The reconnaissance level investigation of the proposed dam is intended to evaluate the conceptual design and, based on the current values attributed to land and water, determine if the project is physically,



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Titan men grab Class C title

BDS women take third

Twenty-four student athletes from Thayer County headed to the 2013 NSAA State Track and Field Meet last Friday and Saturday at Burke Stadium in Omaha. The Thayer Central Titans competed in Class C while the Bruning-Davenport/Shickley Eagles and the Deshler Dragons competed in Class D.

The Thayer Central Titans brought home the Class C state trophy Saturday night after turning in top performances at the 2013 NSAA State Track and Field meet held in Omaha. In all, two relay teams and four individuals earned medals as the Titans placed in 10-of-17 events scoring 70 points over a field of 55 schools. Ord finished second with 43 points while Freeman was third with 35.

Titan standout Simon Wiedel led the way pocketing two gold medals in both the 100 (10.85) and 200 (22.39) meter dashes, a silver in the triple jump (44'7.5"), and fifth place in the long jump (21'5.5") for 32 points. It is the freshman's first appearance at the state venue for high school.

Recent graduate Greg Dightman finished out his high school career collecting

(16.11) and finished sixth in the 300 hurdles (49.57) for a total of 19 points. Older sister, junior Jennifer Mick, added six points after finishing fifth in the 100 meter dash (13.09) and seventh in the pole vault (9'6"), and recent graduate Taylor Houck earned eight points after pocketing a silver medal in the 100 hurdles (15.95) to round out the individual performances.

The Mick sisters then joined junior Jill Schroeder and freshman McKenna Schardt to snag a silver medal in the 400 relay for eight points after running the circuit in 50.95. Schroeder, Schardt and Houck then grabbed Christina Swartzendruber for a seventh place finish in the 1600 relay (4:21.37) to give the Eagles team its final two points.

For the men's team, four individuals competed at the state meet including senior Nolan Schroeder in the discus (115'/16th place) and shot put (42'3.25"/19th place); recent graduate Luke Christensen in the 200 meter dash (23.842/prelims); sophomore Grant Norder in the 110 hurdles (18.214/prelims) and 300 hurdles (43.293/prelims); and freshman Sam Christensen in the 110 hurdles (17.443/prelims).


