Memorial Day Services

Hebron: Opening ceremonies will take place Monday May 30, at 10 a.m., in front of the courthouse with the advancement of colors by combined VFW Post 5328 and American Legion Post 180. At 9:45 a.m., prior to the advancement, Andrew Powell of Wichita, Kan., will perform a bagpipe medley of hymns.

A welcome address will be conducted by American Legion Post 180 Commander Lyle Bucholzer and the opening prayer will be given by the Rev. Steven Speichinger of the First Community Church in Hebron.

Speaker Rodney Kirchhoff, Thayer County Veteran's Service officer, will present "Remember and Honor" for the Memorial Day address and following the presentation at the courthouse, laying of the wreaths will take place right away at the Rose Hill Cemetery.

In case of rain, ceremonies will move the Hebron Country Club.

Belvidere: A Sunday morning Memorial Day service will take place in the United Church of Christ at 10 a.m. Local teacher Jane Dodes will give the Memorial Day address and local children will read patriotic essays.

Locals are invited to visit the Belvidere cemetery to view the Avenue of Flags following the church service.

Bruning: The Durham-Mammen Legion Post 166 will hold a Memorial Day service, Monday, May 30, at 10 a.m., at the Bruning Opera House followed by a salute to fallen comrades at both the Bruning and Harmony cemeteries.

Carleton: The village of Carleton will hold its Memorial Day service at 10:30 a.m., at the Carleton cemetery.

Hubbell: The Hubbell Legion Post 317 will hold Memorial Day services in both Chester and Hubbell, Monday, May 31.

The services begin at the Chester City Cemetery at 9:30 a.m., move to the St. John Lutheran Cemetery at 10 a.m., then move to the Zion Lutheran Cemetery at 10:30 a.m., and the Lamb Cemetery at 10:45 a.m. At 11:15 a.m., services will be held at the Mahaska, Kan., cemetery followed by a final service at 11:45 a.m., at the Hubbell Cemetery.

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HVFD drills for aircraft emergencies

Airport Authority okays sprayer plane load pad

When Hebron Volunteer Fire Department member Justin Johnson found out the Hebron Airport Authority recently approved plans for an access and loading platform for aerial sprayers, he thought the local emergency volunteers needed to know a little something about the industry. "Just in case there's an emergency," he said. "Spray season is coming up and I thought it would be a good idea for our guys to become familiar with aircraft and what to look for should there be an emergency situation."

Johnson, a pilot of light aircraft himself, organized a special drill for the HVFD last week incorporating the help of aerial sprayers Rick Boardman and Troy Thomas. Both flew craft in to Hebron for a 'show-and-tell' presented to local volunteer emergency workers.

"The best way for me to help you understand what to look for in a plane crash or to tell you about aircraft is for you to ask questions," Boardman said to the volunteers.

Boardman, piloting a white 2010 Turbo Thrush spray plane, has been flying aircraft for 30 years – spray planes for 28 years and has his own company, Boardman Aerial Spraying, of Henderson. His company is affiliated with Aurora Cooperative.

Thomas has been a pilot since 1988 and has been spraying since 1991. He owns Shickley Air Service and brought to Hebron a bright yellow 2004 Air Tractor 402 for the demonstration.

Both pilots said the emergency scene in the case of a crash would most likely have the aircraft upside down on the ground. "The plane is light and will likely flip right over in a crash," Boardman said, and added that the pilots have the capability of dumping tanks before a crash, but it depended on the situation, mostly what they were flying over. The craft is capable of carrying 200 gallons of jet fuel and 500 gallons of agriculture chemicals, and could potentially create a hazardous material spill situation in an emergency.

HVFD members have experience cleaning up hazardous materials such as gasoline, oil and agricul-

tural chemicals, but in an airplane crash, the damage could be more widespread.

Thomas said fires were not such a concern today as in the past since the craft's tanks are impact tested and have fuel shut-offs, but spills could still occur and wondered if the local firemen had any guidelines for hosing down an area.

Hebron's volunteers are trained in hazardous materials assessment and containment upon first arrival to an emergency, but none have ever included aircraft. And although they do not currently have guidelines or procedures for airplane emergencies,

the HVFD will look to additional training now that the Airport Authority has okayed a loading platform for sprayers.

Spray season is generally condensed into July and August, but can take place all growing season up until the ground freezes, Boardman said.

During the course of the drill, and serving as a potential bonus for emergency workers, HVFD members asked if the sprayers could be used to douse fires. "Yes," Boardman said and added he has done so in the past. "I helped in a situation where the fire was next to a river and it was too muddy to take in ground

equipment."

In the meantime, Johnson said he felt the drill turned out to be a good introduction to local firefighters of the different types of aircraft used by Hebron's airport.

My Thoughts Exactly

"The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance no form of ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit." ~General John A. Logan, Grand Army of the Republic, General Order No. 11, 1868

Memorial Day, a time of remembrance for those who have passed and who hold special meaning in our lives. Generally speaking, it doesn't take a specific day to recall memories of those we cherish, but setting aside a special day of tribute shows compassion, gratitude and honor for those who have come before us.

Originally, Memorial Day was known as Decoration Day, a day set aside to honor those who perished during the Civil War and, in 1868 during the first celebration, General James Garfield gave a speech at Arlington National Cemetery. Following the ceremony, over 5,000 participants helped decorate more than 20,000 graves.

Several communities claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day, but it wasn't until nearly 100 years after its inception that President Lyndon Johnson declared Waterloo, N.Y., the official birthplace. The town began celebrating a community-wide day of memorial on May 5, 1866, by decorating graves of soldiers with flowers and flags and closing businesses in observance. President Johnson's declaration came in 1966.

In 1971 Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be celebrated the last Monday in May and each year observance at Arlington National Cemetery is held by placing a small American flag on each grave. Also, it is customary for the president or vice-president to give a speech honoring the contributions of the dead and lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Today, as in the past, about 5,000 people attend the ceremony each year.

"So on this day of silent remembrance and solemn prayer I ask all Americans, wherever you are, whoever you're with, whatever you're doing, to pause in national unity...I ask you to ring a bell, or offer a prayer, say a silent "thank you." And commit to give something back to this nation - something lasting - in their memory; to affirm in our own lives and advance around the world those enduring ideals of justice, equality, and opportunity for which they and so many generations of Americans have given that last full measure of devotion." ~President Barack Obama, Arlington Cemetery, Memorial Day Speech - 2009

It's Grilling Time

The warm weather has finally arrived and it's time for campouts, grilling and picnics.

Always wash hands before and after handling food especially raw meats. Do you remember how children are taught to wash their hands? Wash hands for 15 to 20 seconds using warm, soapy water – about the amount of time it takes to sing “Happy Birthday” twice through.

Also, use clean utensils, containers and surfaces because if they aren't clean, they can contaminate food with bacteria and viruses that could cause foodborne illnesses. Don't use utensils that have touched raw meats on other food items.

Grilling is a healthy way to prepare food because foods are cooked without adding extra fat. Marinades tenderize meat surfaces, but cutting a quarter inch deep cut with a knife in several places of the meat before coating it with the marinade will help the marinade soak into the meat. Marinating meat or vegetables requires three things:

- an acid ingredient to tenderize the meat, such as lemon juice, wine, vinegar, yogurt, balsamic vinegar or soy sauce

- herbs and spices for flavor and zest, such as garlic, red pepper flakes, green onions, rosemary, thyme, onion or ginger

- time: 30 minutes for flavor and up to four hours for marinating

Use a non-reactive, sealed container or a sealable plastic bag. Also, try to avoid using metal containers, especially aluminum or cast iron. Once the marinade is added, be safe by placing the meat and marinade in the refrigerator. Make sure any marinade used on raw meat or poultry is not used on cooked food unless it is boiled. Discard leftover marinade that is contaminated with raw meat or poultry juices.

If cooking vegetables on the grill, large vegetables – like corn on the cob, eggplant or asparagus

– can be placed directly on the grill. Chopped vegetables should be wrapped in aluminum foil. Add flavor by adding herbs and spices to the vegetables before wrapping them in the foil and placing them on the grill.

Make sure the grill is hot before placing food on it. Preheat coals on a charcoal grill at least 20 to 30 minutes before adding food. For other grills, allow 15 to 30 minutes for it to preheat before cooking foods.

Thoroughly cook food at one time because if food is partially cooked, bacteria can grow without being killed by enough heat. Use a food thermometer because the meat's color or juice is not a reliable indicator on how well it's cooked. Make sure to use a clean food thermometer to check for correct internal temperatures:

- Hamburgers should be 160 degrees Fahrenheit

- Beef, veal, lamb steaks and roasts should be 145 degrees Fahrenheit for medium rare; 160 degrees Fahrenheit for medium

- Poultry should be 165 degrees Fahrenheit

- Fish should be opaque and flake easily, 145 degrees Fahrenheit

Always remember to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Foods shouldn't sit out for more than one hour, especially when it is hot outside. Make plans so that food is eaten almost immediately after it is cooked. If there are leftovers, refrigerate them right away or put into coolers with a lot of ice.

If leftovers have been sitting out in hot weather for more than one hour, throw them away. The longer food is at unsafe temperatures, the more likely harmful bacteria can grow and cause foodborne illness. Cold foods kept in coolers with ice are safe, but if ice has melted, that food should be thrown out.

Kugel Huss Inducted Into Creighton University's Athletic Hall Of Fame

the second round of the 1992 NCAA tournament.

Her junior season started off on a high note, earning Missouri Valley Conference Player of the Week honors, Creighton's first week as a league member. She capped her career in 1994 by earning All-MVC First Team notice her senior year and helping her team to another NCAA tournament appearance, one of the most memorable experiences. "In the 1994 NCAA tournament we were the last team of the 64 team field to be selected as an at-large team. That was awesome," Huss said.

Not only did she start in Creighton's only two NCAA tournament wins during her career, she was part of 94 victories — the most wins in a four-year period in school history. She was the seventh player to surpass 1,000 career points in a game against Nebraska in December 1993. She ended her career ranked sixth in career points with 1343. Currently she ranks 11th in career scoring at Creighton.

Kris currently remains the most accurate shooter in school history, making a school record 57.6 percent of her field goal attempts throughout her four seasons. She set a school record by shooting 63.2 percent from the field as a senior, year 1993-1994, while she ranks fourth and tenth in single-

season Creighton history field goal percentage. She holds the school record for blocked shots with 7. She ranks seventh in free throw attempts (435) and eighth in free throws made (297).

"More than any of her statistics, Kris was a consummate team player, doing whatever it took to win," Creighton University Athletic Director Bruce Rasmussen remarked.

"She was an outstanding defensive player and often guarded the other team's best inside player," Rasmussen said.

Kris has continued to be involved in athletics since graduating from Creighton in 1994, officiating volleyball and coaching various age groups of basketball in Fairbury as well as playing in many charity basketball games to support several different causes.

Kris currently works at Jefferson Community Health Center in Fairbury as the social service director, where she works with families who are transitioning loved ones from the hospital care to other facilities.

Both her career and personal life emulate the Jesuit ideals of being men and women for others. She and her husband Bryce have three children, Cody 13, Sara 9 and Emily 6.

She is the daughter of Dennis and Sharon Kugel of Hebron and the granddaughter of Betty Bohling of Fairbury.



4.) If alcohol is part of your celebration, make sure there is a designated driver ahead

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

Dragons, Eagles bring home top medals

Thirty-one student athletes from Thayer County headed to the 2011 NSAA State Track and Field Meet last Friday and Saturday at Burke Stadium in Omaha. The Thayer Central Titans and Deshler Dragons competed in Class C while the Bruning-Davenport/Shickley Eagles competed in Class D. BDS Eagles junior Cynthia Mick defended her pole vault title with a golden leap Saturday, and the Dragons' 1600 meter relay team finished first in the closing race of the competition late Saturday afternoon. Below, find details of each team as they progressed through the two-day trial.

Thayer Central boys were able to place in three events last weekend. Leading the way with a fifth place finish was the 3200 relay team including members Michael Feulner, Tyler Van Cleef, Kalen Wenske, and Keson Fink. The team finished the race in 8:27.433.

Individually, junior Michael Feulner and sophomore Greg Dightman also placed in their respective events. Feulner finished the 800 meter run in 2:02.215 for sixth place while Dightman leaped 20'9.75" for sixth place in the long jump.

Thayer Central alumni Seth Wiedel still holds the Class C record for this event with 23'8.5" which he set last year at the state meet.

Other non-placement performances for Thayer Central boys included Dietrich Brinegar in the 300 meter hurdles preliminary with a race in 42.899 seconds; Greg Dightman in the triple jump with a leap of 40'4"; and Michael Feulner in the 1600 meter run with a run of 4:40.725.

The Thayer Central boys' team finished with 21 points.

The Lady Titans got off to a slow start at the state meet after finishing out of medal contention in the 3200 relay race. The race, traditionally opening the running events, was paced by freshman Bailey Linton, sophomore Bridgette Baden, recent graduate Michaela Marsh and freshman Madison Reece who finished in 10:23.908.

Later Friday morning, recent graduate Cody Long faced three dash preliminaries, but was unable to qualify for the finals. She finished the 100 meter dash in 13.121, the 200 meter dash in 27.450 and the 400 meter dash in 1:01.692.

On Saturday, freshman Bailey Linton rounded out the Lady Titans' performances running the 1600 meter in 6:00.609.

Eagles

BDS junior Cynthia Mick ended her second trip to the state track meet as an Eagle in fine style after collecting a gold medal in the girls' Class D pole vault. Her championship leap of 10'10" defended her title from last year which she earned with a vault of 10'6".

Her brother, recent graduate William Mick, picked up a silver in the boys' division of the same event with a leap of 13'8".

Cynthia went on to finish the 100 meter hurdles in 16.860 for seventh place on Saturday after qualifying for the finals with a preliminary time of 16.221 on Friday.

Recent graduate Derek Swartzendruber added a bronze medal win to the boys' total score after clearing a 6'1" bar in the high jump.

Erika Schroeder, also a recent graduate, ended her track career in the 300 meter hurdles. After qualifying for finals on Friday with a 48.782 run, she earned a seventh place finish Saturday with a run of 48.775.

Rounding out placement performances for the Bruning-Davenport/Shickley Eagles was the girls 400 meter relay team including freshmen Taylor Kindelspire and Jennifer Mick and juniors Anna Lichti and Cynthia Mick.

The Lady Eagles team finished with 14 points while the men finished with 15 points.




Lentfer Honored At Midland
