fields and pastures.

There was dam damage from where the water came up so fast that it spilled over and started to erode the dams. In some of the terraces in fields, water couldn't escape fast enough so there were erosion problems there as well.

On the farming side there was a lot of crop loss.

"There's silt that's out there and some of the top soil that was washed away," said Wiedel. "There's going to need to be replanting. A lot of crop inputs were lost due to high water."

Pastures were also damaged when they were covered in sand and silt.

"I've got some pastures that were down along the creek and I don't know when I'll be able to graze them again due to the sand and silt," said Wiedel. "There's like two to three inches of mud and sand deposited. The grass won't grow as well. It will probably take a couple of years for the pastures to get back to where they were before."

With all the damage, Wiedel foresees struggle ahead for the county.

"With the replanting of crops, we're getting later in the season: the yield will not be there," said Wiedel. "There are finances that people were not expecting and that does hurt the whole county ... down the road it will have an impact."

Despite extensive damage, some fields that practiced conservation methods, saved themselves from a lot of potential destruction according to NRCS resource conservationist Aaron Hird.

In one case, on two adjacent fields, one field had a cover crop growing on it and the other field was conventionally tilled. The conventionally tilled field had standing water on it while the field with the cover crop had very little water movement across the field and very little standing water. After such a significant rainfall, Hird was impressed to see what a difference a conservation practice can make.

"The water infiltration rate after six years of cover crops changed this field drastically," said Hird. "I can't believe that [the producer] was able to infiltrate ten-plus inches over an 11 hour storm event."

Since this has been declared a disaster area, the county is hoping for assistance from the government to rebuild "but the wheels turn slowly and people can't wait," said Wiedel. "You just have to see what has to be done and start taking care of the problem."

Despite these setbacks, farmers, ranchers and many others are set on moving ahead to get back on their feet.

"After the initial shock you start figuring out what you need to do. You just go ahead and tackle the problem," said Wiedel.

"I expect this disaster to be like most hardships experienced by Thayer County in the past," said McPherson. "People will pick themselves up and move forward like we always do."

Carleton native inducted into NPW Hall of Fame

Joan Rossiter Burney and Dr. Beverly Deede Keever were inducted into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame during Nebraska Press Women's recent spring convention.

Keever, a Carleton-area native, now of Honolulu, Hawaii, was the longest-serving Western correspondent during the Vietnam War. Burney, a Hartington native, now of Lincoln, has touched countless lives with her columns, books and speeches.


In addition to being the longest-serving Western correspondent continuously covering the Vietnam War, Keever is known for advancing First Amendment issues in her 29 years of teaching at the University of Hawaii. Her seven years of living and reporting in Vietnam include dispatches and detailed articles for the New York Herald Tribune, Newsweek and others.

The war's first female correspondent, Keever held her own,

"asking no favors," traveling by elephant, speedboat, helicopter and on foot, in trying to make sense of the bloody, bitter war. Early on, Keever's exclusive interviews predicted the accurate outcome that the United States would "lose Southeast Asia."

A five-part series described the vital role Vietnamese women played on both sides of the man-made havoc.

Her work for the Christian Science Monitor, reporting from the embattled Khe Sanh Outpost, was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize. Keever's international

passions were nurtured by a love of learning about peoples far from her Carleton farm home; the rewards of taking well-calculated risks; and her degrees from the University of Nebraska and the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. In 2001, hers was among the works showcasing 148 years of war reporting lauded at the Newseum in Washington, D.C. Keever's books include Death Zones and Darling Spies and News Zero: The New York Times and the Bomb.

Keever was presented her plaque on March 9 at Hebron when she was in Nebraska visiting family. The

1885 130 Years Ago

J. C. Lyon has put in 500 cabbage plants.

The new M.E. Church at Hubbell will be dedicated Sunday, June 7.

Sixty-seven carloads of stock were shipped from Davenport, this county, in eight days. Davenport is one of the best stock shipping points on the St. J&W RR.

The Belvidere skating rink, Upton & Rasher proprietors, is nearly completed.

The race at the skating rink last week between Louie Hughes on roller skates and Harry Coon on a tricycle, resulted in a victory for the former. He made his mile in a little less than ten minutes.

The commencement exercises of Hebron High School will take place in the Opera House on Tuesday evening, May 28th. The graduating class consists of the following young ladies: Misses Cora M. Easton, Rosa M. Frost and Leota P. Hendershot.

On Wednesday, the new bell for the Methodist church, of this place, was received, placed in position and joyously rang its first peal on the air of Nebraska. It was manufactured in Cincinnati, weighs 514 pounds, cost, delivered here, \$107.50; and has a clear, sweet tone.

Mrs. Carrick, of Chicago, has arrived and opened her dressmaking establishment in the millinery rooms of the Misses Lowrie.

At the last session of the board of county commissioners, the building of six new bridges was authorized.

It affords the Journal much pleasure and pride to demand of the state board of agriculture, that the premium for the greatest number of trees planted by one person be awarded to a citizen of Thayer county. John J. Kern, proprietor of the Friedensau Stock Farm, in the county, informs us that he has planted this season 80,000 forest trees on his farm. The varieties are principally black walnuts, catalpas, black locusts and ash. He is also engaged in fancy gardening, having in his employ a skilled gardener, a Mr. Ohse, recently from Hanover, Germany.

1895 120 Years Ago

In Fairbury, an admission of 10 cents will be charged at the graduating exercises and alumni banquet. This would be a very good plan for the Hebron schools to try, as it is thought nearly everybody would be willing to pay a dime, and it would perhaps keep some of the smaller children away, who always flock there as soon as the doors open, and fill the seats, while the older citizens and taxpayers have to stand up and look in at the windows.

1905 110 Years Ago

C. D. Schell of Nuera Ecija province, Philippine Islands, arrived from St. Joe last night to visit his parents and brother. Mr. Schell and his wife are teachers on the Islands.

Byron: W. D. Fisher, the president, the principal stockholder and founder of the Farmers & Merchants bank, sold his interest Tuesday to the following residents of this place: Rev. Oscar Lompe, E. Eggers, Wm. Gruer, Wm. Hoops, Sr., and Albert Hellmer. All of these gentlemen are among our most prosperous farmers, who have made a success financially of farming. They intend to increase the capital stock to \$20,000 thus making it one of the best in this part of the state.

Bruning: Albert Emberson of Lincoln came down this week and will play ball with the boys here this summer. Bruning will have one of the strongest ball teams that they have ever had heretofore. They will sure succeed if they keep the team they are figuring on...The new stone factory is busy every day and have all the orders they can fill. Stone fence posts are one of their outputs. This, with building blocks, water tanks and material for walks, keeps them busy...The new elevator has been completed and the men paid off and gone to other jobs. All expenses have been paid and the elevator starts out clear of debt.

Chester: Elmo Roper is at

present in Chester and has hired James Wilson for an indefinite period. Elmo is fitted for a high position in commercial circles, but owing to failing health, he thinks outdoor rustling and rough work will be good for his health, and we think it will too.

1915 100 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner)

Thursday, a bridge on the Fairmont-Chester line south of Stoddard was burned, and for two days trains were held up there. Trains going north were compelled to back all the way to Fairmont, and that reminds us -- one morning when the northbound freight was standing at the depot, headed south, a traveling man came out of the depot and asked us if that was the train for Fairmont. Upon receiving an affirmative answer, he said he was always turned around in Bruning. He climbed on the train, stopped on the platform and looked at the sun, and probably would have alighted if the train had not begun to move.

The Meridian Auto Polo company put on an exhibition at the park Sunday before a small crowd. It was an exhibition that is not often seen. Wheels were torn off, cars turned completely over, and it is a wonder someone was not hurt.

1925 90 Years Ago

A trip to the sand pit east of town reveals an industry that is assuming large proportions. Eleven men are employed on the job, and \$10,000 worth of power machinery is used for excavation. The sand pit is 70 feet deep and 300 feet across each way. The pits have been worked for 15 years. About 8,000 yards will be moved this year. Eight trucks are in use. The Shearer Sandpits are interesting to visit.

Deputy sheriffs, scouting about timber lands in Thayer County Friday, had all the earmarks of squirrel hunters. They were not looking for the tree squirrel, but for the squirrel that finds habitation in key, jug and bottle and is gizzled down the throats of those who forget that the nation and state are dry. Three offenders were nabbed.

A rare fossil was found in the Shearer sand pit at a depth of about 75 feet Monday when the tooth of a pre-historic animal was brought to the surface. Mr. Shearer has presented to the Journal the skull and thigh bones found last week, and a fine specimen of petrified bone, all of which may be seen at this office.

On May 25, there was a heavy frost and thin ice formed on water. A few days previous the temperature reached 95.

A two-column story taken from The Wichita Eagle is printed in this issue, in which Mrs. Laura L. Roper Vance, a resident of Enid, Okla., gives a personal reminiscence of her capture by Indians on the war path in Nuckolls county in 1865. Many early day settlers lost their lives in these Indian raids of 1864, including several in Thayer county.

1945 70 Years Ago

The present Germany Army straight arm Fascist salute has been outlawed for use by prisoners of war interned in prison camps in this country, it was revealed today by Major General G. H. Danielson, Commanding General of the Seventh Service Command, following receipt of directives from the War Department. Italian prisoners will also be affected by the new ruling. Both the Germans and the Italians will be compelled to use the conventional U.S. Army right hand salute from now on. Further restrictions placed on the prisoners include confiscation of all German flags upon which the swastika appears.

Pvt. Lester R. Bowen wrote V-Mail letters to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Bowen of Belvidere and wife at Courtland, Kan., that he is free. Pvt. Bowen was taken prisoner by the Germans, Dec. 21, and entered Stalag 9B on Christmas Day. He was officially released late in the evening of Easter Sunday.

Listed among the wounded in the European area of war is Alvin J. Niemeyer, son of Willy Niemeyer of Bruning.

Lt. Patrick T. Bailey, 26, formerly of Hebron, is missing in action over Guam, the war department last Saturday morning informed his wife. He was a bombardier on a B-29. Lt. Bailey's mother, Mrs. F. J. Maher, is a resident of Hebron.

About 1 p.m. Saturday a wind of hurricane proportions struck Hebron and surrounding territory. It was accompanied by damaging hail and a torrential rain. The wind velocity was estimated at approximately 85 miles per hour. The most extensive damage in Hebron was to the trees. A few houses were badly damaged and a number of plate glass windows in store fronts were broken. Old-timers say they do not remember any storm as severe in the past.

U.S. Small Business Admin may help with disaster loans

If you are in a declared disaster area and are the victim of a disaster, you may be eligible for a low-interest rate disaster loan from the U.S. Small Business Administration—even if you don't own a business. As a homeowner, renter and/or personal property owner, you may apply to the SBA for a loan to help you recover from a disaster.

Renters and homeowners alike may borrow up to \$40,000 to repair or replace clothing, furniture, cars or appliances damaged or destroyed in the disaster. Homeowners may apply for up to \$200,000 to repair or replace their primary residence to its pre-disaster condition.

The loans may not be used to upgrade homes or make additions unless required by local building authority/code. Loans may be increased up to 20 percent of the total amount of physical loss, as verified by SBA, to make improvements that lessen the risk of property damage by future disasters of the same kind.

Secondary homes or vacation properties are not eligible for these loans. However, qualified rental properties may

The recent flooding in Thayer County has us all evaluating our response to the situation and questioning how we can be better prepared.

Floods are one of the most common hazards in the United States, however, they are often hard to predict and not all floods are alike. Some floods develop slowly, while others such as flash floods can develop in just a few minutes.

It is important to be aware of flood hazards no matter where you live or work, but especially if you are in low-lying areas, near water, behind a levee or downstream from a dam.

Even very small streams, gullies, creeks, culverts, dry streambeds or low-lying ground that appear harmless in dry weather can easily flood.

If the forecast is predicting a large amount of rainfall, you should:

- Be prepared. Pack a bag with important items in case you need to evacuate. Don't forget to include necessary medications.

- If advised to evacuate your home, do so right away.

- If there is any possibility of a flash flood, move to higher ground immediately.

- If possible, bring in outdoor furniture and move essential items to an upper floor.

Many local residents have been impacted by flood waters. After a flood it is important to make sure your surroundings are safe.

Floods can result in contaminated food and water as well as health issues associated with animals and insects. Here are a few things to keep in mind.

- Turn off utilities at the main switches or valves to

- If you have to walk in water, wherever possible, walk where the water is not moving.

- Do not drive into flooded areas. If floodwaters rise around your car, abandon the car.

- Do not touch electrical equipment if you are wet or standing in water.

- Listen for news reports to learn whether the community's water supply is safe to drink.

- Avoid floodwater; it may be contaminated by oil, gasoline, or raw sewage

- Stay away from downed power lines, and report them to the power company.

- Return home only when authorities indicate it is safe.

- Stay out of any building if it is surrounded by floodwaters.

- Clean and disinfect everything that got wet with flood water.

- If you have been in flood water, check to make sure you have a current tetanus vaccine.

Area students are recipients of scholarships from Warren and Velda Wilson Foundation

"Providing students with educational opportunities," the Warren and Velda Wilson Foundation has awarded \$1,250 scholarships to seniors residing in and graduating from high schools located in nine central and south central Nebraska counties. The recipients are from high schools in Adams, Clay, Fillmore, Hall, Hamilton, Nuckolls, Thayer, Webster and York counties.

This year 220 high school seniors were awarded \$1,250 scholarships by the Warren and Velda Wilson Foundation. The total amount awarded was \$275,000. The recipients were chosen from over 460 applicants and scored by 21 volunteer evaluators from throughout the scholarship area.

Warren and Velda Wilson Foundation scholarships can be used at any public, private, community college or accredited technical school located

in Nebraska; the \$625 will be applied starting with the 2015 fall term and the remaining \$625 will be applied to the 2016 spring term.

According to John Farrell, president of the Wilson Foundation board of directors, the late Warren and Velda Wilson farmed for over 60 years in and around Clay County. They had no children, so prior to their deaths; they decided to establish an educational foundation to help deserving young people. "It is our desire that these scholarships not be limited to graduating seniors with only the highest levels of academic achievement. Other factors are also important to us, including good citizenship, involvement in school and community activities, and potential for future academic success," according to Mr. and Mrs. Wilson.

USDA invests \$1.8 million to help improve and Ogallala Aquifer; June 19 deadline to apply

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced recently that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is investing \$6.5 million in the Ogallala Aquifer region this year to help farmers and ranchers conserve billions of gallons of water and improve water quality. Funding will be targeted to seven focus areas in five states, including Nebraska, to support their primary water source and strengthen rural economies.

"This funding support assists conservationists and agricultural producers to plan and implement conservation practices that conserve water and improve its quality," said Vilsack. "This work not only expands the viability of the Ogallala Aquifer but also helps producers across the Great Plains strengthen their agricultural operations."

Underlying the Great Plains in eight states, the Ogallala supports nearly one-fifth of the wheat, corn, cotton and cattle produced in the United States. It has long been the main water supply for the High Plains' population and is being depleted at an unsustainable rate. The reservoir was created more than a million years ago through geologic action and covers about 174,000 square miles.

Through the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative (OAI), USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is directing funding in fiscal year 2015 to support targeted, local efforts to improve the quality and availability of this vital water supply. This year's work is planned in seven focus

areas and will continue for up to four years.

It will conserve billions of gallons of water per year, extending the viability of the aquifer for multiple uses. This conservation investment builds on \$66 million that NRCS has invested in the region through OAI since 2011, which helped farmers and ranchers conserve water on more than 325,000 acres.

In Nebraska, NRCS will target \$1.8 million in OAI funding towards portions of three Natural Resources Districts (NRDs) (see map) to provide conservation assistance to improve water quality and quantity. Producers located in the focus areas have until June 19, 2015, to apply for conservation funding through the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative. Below is a description of the three focus areas in Nebraska:

-Upper Big Blue Natural Resources District Groundwater Improvement Project: NRCS will work with targeting intensive row crop producers in high nitrate areas within the Upper Big Blue NRD. The conservation of irrigation water and nutrient management will be the primary practices in addressing water quality and quantity concerns.

-Little Blue Natural Resources District Ogallala Aquifer Initiative: NRCS will work with agriculture producers within the Little Blue NRD to address resource concerns in seven water quality sub-areas. Project goals are to conserve 18,000 acre-inches per year and decrease and maintain

nitrates to below 10 parts per million with the implementation of conservation practices and proper management.

-Central Platte Natural Resources District Ogallala Aquifer Initiative: Objectives of this project are to reduce water consumption and related depletions to surface water flows and groundwater withdrawals in critical areas by converting irrigated land to non-irrigated on a permanent or temporary basis. Additionally, surface and groundwater quality and quantity concerns will be addressed with the implementation of improved irrigation system and management technologies to increase irrigation efficiencies, reducing impacts to the Platte River and local groundwater supply.

"Water is a precious resource, and the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative helps our farmers and ranchers use it wisely," said Craig Derickson, state conservationist in Nebraska. "This is especially important in Nebraska, where drought conditions have prevailed in recent history. We know we can't change the weather, but we can help producers be ready for it."

Producers eligible to apply for OAI funding should visit the Natural Resources Conservation Service located in their local USDA Service Center. 

Producers must report prevented planting and failed acres

Jay VanWesten, Executive Director of Thayer County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA), reminds producers to report prevented planting and failed acres in order to establish or retain FSA program eligibility.

Producers must report crop acreage they intended to plant, but due to natural disaster, they were prevented from planting. Prevented planting acreage must be reported on form FSA-576, Notice of Loss, no later than 15 calendar days after the final planting date as established by FSA and Risk Management Agency (RMA).

According to Mr. VanWesten, the final planting dates for the following crops in Thayer County are: Corn - May 25th, Soybeans - June 10th and Grain Sorghum - June 15th.

If a producer is unable to report the prevented planting acreage within the 15 calendar days following the final planting date, a late-filed report

can be submitted. Late-filed reports will only be accepted if FSA conducts a farm visit to assess the eligible disaster condition that prevented the crop from being planted. A measurement service fee will be charged.

Additionally, producers with failed acres should also use form FSA-576, Notice of Loss, to report failed acres.

For losses on crops covered by the Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and crop insurance, producers must file a Notice of Loss within 15 days of the occurrence of the disaster or when losses become apparent. Producers must timely file a Notice of Loss for failed acres on all crops including grasses.

Wilber grew up in a Christian home and was a lifetime active member of St. Peter Lutheran Church where he was baptized and confirmed.


He attended rural school District 88 through eighth grade, and then began farming with his father. He truly loved the land and life of a farmer.

On May 22 and 23, the BDS track team members who qualified traveled to Omaha for a chance to participate in the Nebraska State Track Meet.

The girls scored 30 points and ended in eighth place while the boys scored six and ended up in a tie for 36th.

The boys 4X800 relay got things going for the Eagles on Friday by running to a new school record of 8:52.15 and placing 12th. Members of that relay were seniors TJ Krupicka, Jayden Otto and Charlie Martin, and freshman Karson Dixon.

Sam Christensen, who was running in the 110 hurdles at State for the third year in a row, ran 16.64 to finish fourth in his heat but didn't qualify for the finals on Saturday finishing 14th.

The 1600 meter relay team finished off the boys portion of the meet with a solid run in the 1600 relay and a seasons best time of 3:34.4 which was good enough for a third place medal. Members of that relay were Seniors Chris Rohr, Grant Norder, TJ Krupicka, and Junior Kendall Dixon.

"Our senior boys really did an outstanding job of leading us in our two relays all year

long," said head coach Fred Kluck. "I remember when they were little freshmen and sophomores and struggled to compete with other team's older kids and we kept reminding them work and wait. When you're juniors and seniors things will fall into place. Well they did it and now they own school records and State medals. They've really been good leaders by example for us in all ways this entire school year."

Catherine Mick led the way for the girls. She brought home gold medals in each of her three individual events and anchored the 1600 relay team which broke the school record with a time of 4:18.17 and finished in ninth place. Other members of the relay were Kristin Troyer, Tristen Mosier and Courtney Kamler.

Troyer capped off her senior year by leaping 32'10 1/4 which just missed making the finals in the triple jump as she finished 11th place.

Freshman Megan Grote had an opportunity to participate at State for the first time in the high jump where she failed to medal but got some valuable experience.

After qualifying in both the 100 and 300 hurdles on Friday, Mick began her day Saturday with an extremely close win in the 100 hurdles by beating the competitor who had just edged her out for first

place in the same race the year before. Mick's winning time was 15.35. Things got a little more complicated later on as the pole vault and the 300 hurdles often overlap at State.

"It didn't seem to affect Catherine much, and maybe the cooler weather helped some," said Kluck. "Some years we've had jumpers who are really worn down by their races and had a difficult time coming back to field events. This almost seemed to help her."

Mick won the 300 hurdles with a school record time of 45.39 and then turned around and broke her own State record in the pole vault with a leap of 12'3". She also had to go and run the leg on the 1600 relay prior to the pole vaults completion, but by that time had already set the State mark. In addition, Mick won the school's first All Class Gold medal by beating all the pole vaulters in classes A, B and C.

"It's difficult to explain to someone who doesn't come to practice each day just how hard Catherine works out," said Kluck. "Sometimes she makes things seem pretty effortless, but that's because of an extreme determination she exhibits continually in her workouts. She's a great example for our younger kids."


