Meeting held for truancy

Thayer County schools, including superintendents and principals, county probation officer, commissioners, Region V and county attorney Dan Werner, gathered for a meeting May to discuss a truancy program that will help secure funding from the federal crime commission.

Werner said the truancy problem is growing.

"I prosecuted one parent for not getting children to school," Werner said. "That resident did time in jail."

Two years ago, Werner had about 40 juvenile cases with many of them related to truancy.

"We need to begin a process and be proactive with a number of agencies," he said.

The discussion is in its early stages, but officials are already looking at the program in Seward and Butler counties, and plan to hear more about it.

Superintendent Drew Harris said Thayer Central's truancy is a huge problem — about five percent of the students have missed 15 days or more.

"Some are valid reasons, like illnesses, that would be excused," he said.

He said they are trying to address the issue before it manifests into 20 absences, which is the maximum number of days before cases are turned over to the county attorney.

He noted that last year, Jefferson County entered into the three-year services plan for juveniles and has had success.

"Our numbers are less than half of Jefferson's," Harris said. "We've got to help these kids learn good skills because we want them to be successful. A big part of employment is just showing up for work."

There are other components to the three-year plan, such as mental health and delinquency issues.

Harris mentioned part of the plan may involve following up with students and families when they reach five absences. Someone would work with the families to ensure they understand truancy laws and mandatory attendance at school.

About 20 to 24 people were at the meeting, and truancy was not the only issue talked about, Harris said.

Harris said a program could be introduced for the 2018-2019 school year.

Eight semis delivered big tent

The Cattlemen's Ball this weekend will see a new tent structure this year, which was delivered to the Hergott Farm from Tennessee and is now dominating the ball landscape of several smaller tents.

"It makes us pretty excited," Janice Wiedel, who, with her husband Gregg, has been involved since the idea to hold the ball in Thayer County hatched. "We've been working on this for a long time. It's exciting to know it's close."

The new tent structure, delivered in parts on eight semis, is safer and will withstand more wind, Wiedel said.

Before it was announced the ball would be held locally, she and Gregg were approached by future co-host Rob Marsh and other couples on the undertaking of the event, which pulls 4,500 or more people every year.

"We just started talking and brainstorming and we all had things we could help with. I ended up with the catering," she said.

Every meal under the big tent will be provided by Premier Catering out of Lincoln. Wiedel said the ball core committee met with Charles Herbster, who provides the beef for the balls, at a tasting.

"He critiqued the food," Wiedel said.

Wiedel has adjusted the amount of food according to ticket sales, but with the ball now sold out, the meals are set.

For those who hold a Trail Boss ticket for both days, they'll dine Friday evening at the reception, at Saturday morning's champagne breakfast and at a luncheon.

Top Hand ticket holders will receive the Saturday evening meal.

The reception and Saturday's lunch and dinner, will have beef

entrees, with kabobs, New York strips and prime rib.

For the reception, sweet chili sauce meatballs, gourmet shrimp station and spiced tortilla rollups will be part of the menu.

At the champagne breakfast, a frittata and pastries will be available.

New York strip tops the lunch menu for Saturday, along with seasoned baby Russets and a Lemonberry Jazz dessert.

For dinner, the prime rib will be served with Bistro Style Garlic mashed potatoes, two salads and an array of desserts. Wiedel said the caterers were great to work with.

"They've done the ball for several years in different locations throughout the state," she said.

Along with the food decisions came the tablecloths and table service.

"All those decisions had to be made, like how many tables, long or round," Wiedel said.

They ended up with 170 round tables and 357, 8-foot banquet tables for the main tent.

The tablecloths will be royal blue with colored toppers to coordinate meals. Nancy Hofts is overseeing the centerpieces.

Wiedel said tables were also ordered for other tents. The ball will have a history tent, emergency medical tent and a Buffett Cancer Center tent, along with several others.

The ball's target — raising funds for cancer research — completed a milestone earlier this month with the Calf-For-A-Cure proceeds, netting \$260,000.

Water tower makeover

Patient billing and follow-up

Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) continues to move forward in our efforts to bring patient billing and follow-up back in-house on August 1, 2018. TCHS is finalizing the hiring process for the "medical billing and follow-up specialist" positions and has started the training process, which is lengthy and complicated due to the enormous amount of different insurance plan requirements.

Customer service for patients with billing questions is currently being handled by TCHS employees. TCHS is working very hard to complete this transition and is committed to significantly improving our billing processes.

Self-pay (also known as private pay) billing will continue to be handled by a third party service. Self-pay refers to the balance on a patient's account remaining after any insurance claims have been filed and appropriate payment has been received by TCHS. TCHS will continue to utilize a third party for self-pay collections to avoid putting staff in a situation where they might have to make collection calls to friends and family.

After much research, TCHS has engaged a new company, Clear Health Finance Solutions (CHFS) to assist us in ensuring our patients have a quality self-pay billing experience. CHFS will be responsible only for producing statements and following up on self-pay balances once the internal TCHS billing staff has processed the claim through the patient's insurance and confirms the insurance company paid appropriately. The CHFS self-pay billing partnership will begin on June 1, 2018.

CHFS has a terrific reputation of providing customer service for hospitals and other healthcare facilities, including several other small rural hospitals in the Midwest. TCHS is partnering with them to provide four main services:



1) Making sure that statements are clear and accurate and are sent on regular intervals. The statements will have a new look and will provide a bit more detail than what was previously seen on TCHS statements.

2) Placing courtesy calls to our patients to ensure that they received their statement and that they understand how the balance reflected was calculated.

3) Providing excellent customer service to our patients when they call to pay their hospital bills, make payment arrangements, or ask questions about their bill.

4) Making reminder calls to our patients who may have overlooked their bills or waited a bit longer to pay to help arrange payment prior to TCHS needing to pursue collections more aggressively.

The patient bills generated from CHFS will provide a Hebron number for patients to contact that will ring directly to their office and a toll free number for patients outside the local area. CHFS has assured us that should a patient need assistance beyond their scope of work or ability to resolve, they will work with us to ensure the patient's concerns are addressed.

In an effort to answer any questions regarding our billing changes, TCHS will be holding community forums in several of the local communities in June. A representative from CHFS, along with staff from the TCHS billing office, will be in attendance at these forums.

A complete list of the dates and times for the forums will be in next week's paper. We hope you are able to join us, and we look forward to hearing your feedback regarding our new statements and the changes being made.

"Anytime you can do that and be running your best end of the season is all a coach could ask for," he said.



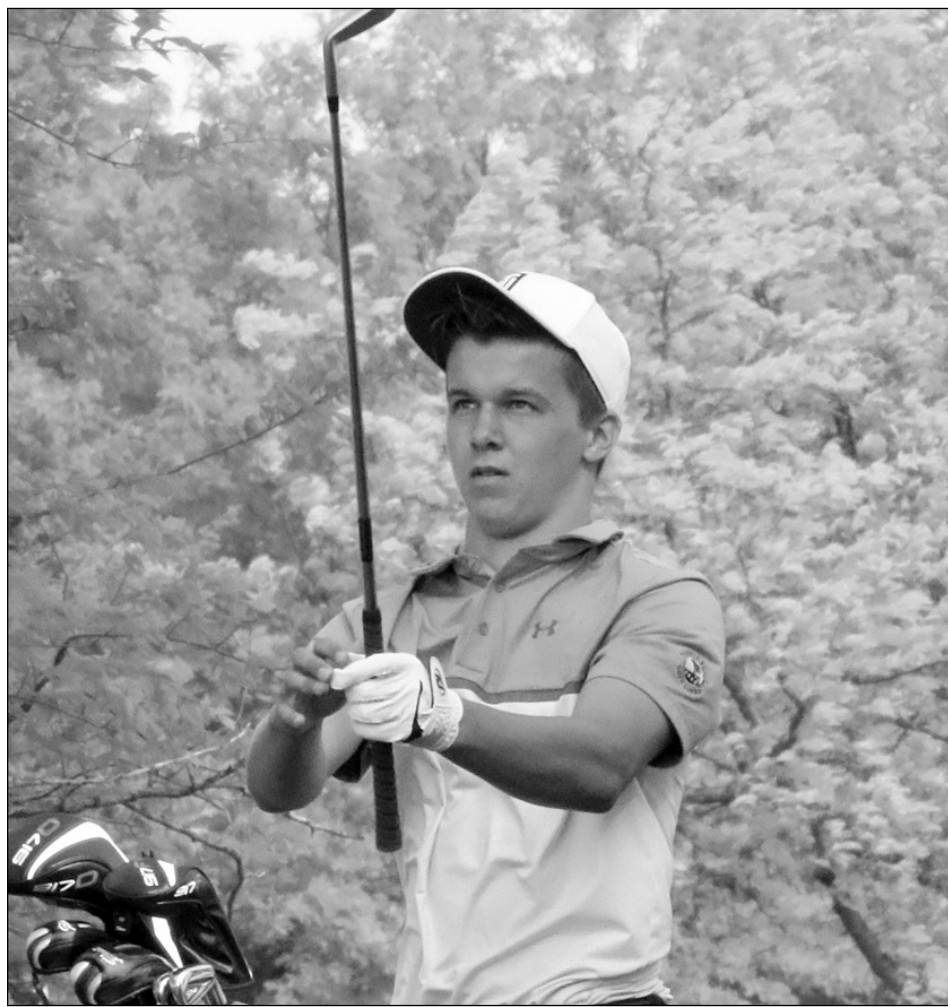
Lunch and go
