Tour Nebraska to make stop in Davenport

At 8:30 a.m., June 4, Tour Nebraska of the Nebraska Rod and Custom Association drivers will cruise through Davenport during its two-day, 600-mile trip.

All vehicles on the tour are over 30 years old. The NRCA has a total of 480 classic, antique and special interest vehicles owned by their membership.

Tour Nebraska states the sound of engines can be heard from five miles away. The tour through Davenport will last 30 minutes.

A total of approximately 1,000 people will participate.

The goal of NRCA is to protect the rights of special interest vehicle owners who enjoy driving them in Nebraska. The goodwill tour will feature participants from Nebraska and surrounding states.

The association also provides scholarships for tech school students, legislative awareness, vehicle titling assistance, special events, automotive-related grants and communication services.

Union Pacific awards grant to Carleton

Cemetery upkeep on commissioners' list

The Thayer County Commissioners discussed a spacious cemetery in the southeast corner of the county during their May 24 meeting.

Commissioner Dave Bruning said he went to Williams Cemetery and saw two to three trees in the center of the property needing cut because removing them could upset the stones, at least one of which was leaning toward a large tree. Most of the graves are toward the middle of the cemetery. There are at least two more trees toward the fence around the cemetery.

Bruning said there aren't a lot of graves at Williams. The cemetery was started by Joseph Lamb, who owned acres of land in the area. He and his wife are buried there with petrified wood poles marking their graves.

Williams is also a future pioneer cemetery. State statute lists pioneer cemeteries as founded before Jan. 1, 1900 and the graves are of homesteaders, immigrants from a foreign nation, prairie farmers, pioneers, sodbusters, first generation Nebraska or Civil War veterans.

Bruning said a pioneer cemetery may be declared after 20 years since the last burial. For Williams, the most recent grave is 2009.

Thayer County has several pioneer cemeteries — Letterman east of Deshler, the Hebron cemetery on the north edge of Hebron and Keim near Bruning. The fourth, Mount Gilead, has no one currently caring for it and is overgrown.

To care for Mount Gilead, a resident or residents could request funds from the county to maintain it.

The county is currently mowing two cemeteries — Hebron's and another on Highway 4.

Cemeteries may be petitioned for a pioneer designation by at least 35 residents of the county and after it is, no one else may be buried in the cemetery.

Last week, Verlin and Roberta Welch were preparing for a Memorial Day service at Williams. Loren Peithmann and Chad Barton are on

the Williams Cemetery board with them. They receive a \$350 stipend for upkeep.

In other business, county officials proposed amendments to the county's employee manuals.

The commissioners cited competitiveness, compromise and reasonable changes in discussing the amendments.

The first centered on vacation days because currently, county employees working one to 10 full years are awarded 10 days of vacation, whether they are there one year or 10 years. After 10 years, the amount of vacation days bumps to 15 days and after 15 years, employees take 20 days.

The proposal suggested one to five years for 10 days, six to 10 years for 15 days and 11 to 15 years for 20 days. After, employees may earn one day per year up to 25 days.

The commissioners approved the suggested changes, along with changes to funeral leaves, which covered specific family members to targeted days off.

Next up was the county contributing to health insurance. Thayer County does not contribute while surrounding counties, such as Fillmore and Saline, do. Fillmore contributes 50 percent and Saline, 10 percent. Kimball and McPherson are like Thayer and Morrill is self-funded, according to county clerk Marie Rauner's research.

The county officials told the commissioners Thayer is not competitive in pay or healthcare.

The commissioners also agreed to a change to meal reimbursements and a 160-hour cap on compensation time.

Road superintendent George Gerdes said the time adds up quickly for the road department. The cap is to avoid large payouts at the time of retirement.

The commissioners said county supervisors are watching compensation time well.

All changes will take effect at the beginning of the county's fiscal year July 1.

Blue Valley looks to keep Willard Park clean

Blue Valley residents and staff have decided they will adopt Willard Park during the warm weather months, activities director Jeanne Budler said.

"We try to think of things that will involve our folks into the community," Budler said. "I know they were looking for people to take care of the park and we feel like it's part of our outdoor experience."

Budler said she hadn't visited the park lately and was impressed with how clean it was. She didn't know if it was city that had prepared the park for the weekend or if people were picking up litter, but she was amazed.

Speaking of the city, Budler said the city had put a sidewalk in, which helped the residents and staff enjoy their time outside.

Residents and staff are excited to pitch in and become part of the com-

munity in caring for the park.

"We fill the eggs for the Lions Club for the children's Easter egg hunt and this is just an additional thing we can do," Budler said.

Budler said the long term care nursing facility has invited its sister homes, the care and assisted living facilities to join them at the park.

She said Willard is a "beautiful" park and should be respected.

"Hats off to the city workers," she said about the park's appearance.

Blue Valley will also hold a brief memorial program June 2 for each facility to remember those who died in the past year. Following the program, each facility will hold a balloon release.

The nursing home will release balloons at 10 a.m.; the care home at 10:30 a.m.; and Courtyard Terrace at 11 a.m.



1887

130 Years Ago

The streets are being graded by waste earth from the Masonic cellar.

The B&M fencing gang is fencing the railroad in this county.

Seven families from Stephenson County, Ill., are expected to arrive at Gilead next week.

The north and south road east of John A. Jackson's is reported much in need of work where it passes through the swamp.

Instead of Mr. Low having disposed of his interest in Deshler, he has bought an adjoining quarter of Mrs. Zutter for \$3,700.

George Voll has about 50,000 brick ready for the 200,000 for the next kiln.

On last Tuesday, J. M. Fitchpatrick turned over the Hebron post office to his successor, O. H. Scott. With this change, we believe Thayer County is left without a republican postmaster. This condition of affairs is, however, only temporary, as the republican party will resume the reins of government at the next presidential election.

Postmaster Scott has moved the post office into the building recently occupied by Church & Flood, five doors west of the First National Bank.

It is said that if soup beans are dropped into each hill of potatoes when planting, the potato bug will never bother them. Besides the protection of your potatoes, you will get a crop of beans as well.

Henry Ebling, proprietor of the Sherman House is contemplating several improvements in his hotel.

Alodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen was instituted here last week.

The addition fever has struck Gilead at this early period in her history. What will the people eat when the farm land is all laid off into towns and additions?

Belvidere people say that a man by the name of Randall filled up on Hebron whiskey, ran his team to that town and was fined \$5 and costs (about \$3) for fast driving.

The 8x10 bastille, alias calaboose, alias cooler, that has stood open and unoccupied for more than a year, by a marked coincidence, received its first occupants after so long a lapse of time, with the opening of the saloons. But, then, you know, "it makes the town lively;--it makes business."

Mr. and Mrs. Dimick have taken back the confectionery store recently bargained to Mr. Gallant, the latter desiring to be released.

Next week, Werner Brothers will occupy both floors of the brick building joining the Blue Valley Bank on the south, with a large and select line of furniture and undertaking goods. Adam Werner will be in charge of this branch of the business. Their hardware business will be continued at the old stand under the charge of J. J. Werner, while Henry Werner will conduct the undertaking department.

The following were admitted to United States citizenship at the last term of district court: Jacob Engel, Larmest Radfells and Andrew Schmidt.

Joseph Nadeau, of Driftwood, Penn., an owner of real estate in this county, is here looking after his interests.

Capt. I. Reed Ferguson died at his residence in Hebron, April 28, 1887, in his 60th year.

(The Alexandria Argus) The annual commencement of the Alexandria high school was held Friday, May 24, in DeMerritt's opera house. The hall was neatly decorated in the class colors, pink and green, with a fine innerspersion of flowers and ferns. The class motto: "Not for self, but for humanity" was arranged in a beautiful arch above the stage. The graduating class: Messrs. Kenneth Church, John Stewart, Ernest and Walter Spaulding, Whitten Steele, Misses Isabella Costelloe Edna Wells and Dora Axtell are all very estimable and promising young people.

Doc Campbell, one of the Campbell brothers, the showmen, was buried in Fairbury Tuesday.

A sad accident occurred last Sunday, May 26, at the residence of L. W. Guilford, three miles east of town. Little Bert Jackson, third son of Harvey Jackson, while at the later place visiting with some boyfriends, was thrown from his pony falling some 15 or 20 feet down a bank and when found by the other boys was unconscious. His father was notified and succeeded in getting him home where medical help was summoned. His neck was found to be dislocated and a serious concussion of the brain also present. Several times during the next few days he partially roused from unconsciousness enough to recognize different members of the family, but for a short time only. He died on Saturday morning, being 12 years. Interment was in Alexandria cemetery.

1917

100 Years Ago

Gilead: Carl Uphoff, who is working for Mr. F. Naiman, had a painful accident Tuesday, being kicked in the side by a mule, throwing him against a nail on the wall of the barn, cutting his face a severe gash, it being necessary for Dr. Dargatz to take several stitches...Gottlieb Ennen, a grandson of John Ennen, died Wednesday at Great Falls, Mont. The boy

was sent here for burial. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Ennen, accompanied the remains to Gilead. He died at the age of 25 years, leaving to mourn his loss his widow and two sons, his parents and other relatives...Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Newman lost their six weeks old baby boy on April 23, 1917. Funeral services were held at the Pleasant Mount Church, with burial at the Alexandria cemetery.

Davenport: Three carloads of barley have been shipped in and sold to farmers who sowed it in the fields where the winter wheat was killed out.

1927

90 Years Ago

C. Degner, one of the good pioneers of Friedensau precinct, renews his long-time loyalty to the Journal. Mr. Degner came to Thayer county in 1874, buying his farm for \$6 per acre. The grasshoppers drove him out and he went back to Oshkosh, Wis., for awhile, but returned to Thayer county on New Year's day, 1876. At that time there was only one train a day from Omaha to Hastings, and with only one hotel he had to sleep on the floor. It took all night to travel on the freight train from Hastings to Belvidere, from which place he staged it over to Hebron. Mr. Degner met and conquered many discouragements, and in his later years is enjoying the fruits of a worthy life.

The final games in the basketball tournament staged by the Legion at the gym, last Friday night, were hotly contested. Belvidere won the championship, defeating Narka on a score of 33 to 23. Following the games there was a dance, with music by the Eddie Fales Orchestra of Fairbury.

The Hebron Oil Company the past week effected a division of their business. T. M. Taylor retains the east station and the tank supply station. H. J. Plymessenger has the west station, under the name of the Plymessenger Service Station which he will manage in addition to his western Nebraska and Kansas stations.

From the State Journal: Two bandits robbed the Farmers' State Bank of Superior of \$12,000 in bonds and \$12,000 cash today noon. While gathering the cash and bonds from the bank, they held at bay two bankers and ten customers. After securing the bank treasurer they locked the bankers and customers in the vault, coolly walked outside, got in a car and drove out of town to the southwest.

G. W. Lovercheck of Belvidere reports that for a year he kept track of the receipts from the sale of eggs from one hundred hens, exclusive of the eggs used for the home. The sale of eggs brought \$344.20. He had a mixture of Rhode Island Reds, Buff Orpingtons and Silver Lace Wyandottes. For one of two days his got was high as 87 eggs from the 100 hens.

Before a house full of distinguished guests, as well as a good representation of common Hebron people, the well advertised "Womanless Wedding" was staged in the Majestic Theatre Tuesday and Wednesday evenings. The event was a success from the start to the finish and everyone attending the wedding was well pleased.

Prescription Drug Abuse

The risks for addiction to prescription drugs increase when they are used in ways other than as prescribed. Abusing some prescription drugs can lead to addiction. If you take a medicine in a way that is different from what the doctor prescribed, it is called prescription drug abuse. It could be:

- Taking a medicine that was prescribed for someone else.

- Taking a larger dose than you are supposed to.

- Taking the medicine in a different way than you are supposed to. This might be crushing tablets and then snorting or injecting them.

- Using the medicine for another purpose, such as getting high.

Every medicine has some risk of side effects. Doctors take this into account when prescribing medicines. People who abuse these drugs may not understand the risks. The medicines may not be safe for them, especially at higher doses or when taken with other medicines.

Doctors are in a unique position, not only to prescribe medications, but also to identify abuse of prescription drugs and prevent the escalation to addiction. By asking their patients about "all" their drugs, physicians can help their patients recognize if a problem exists, set recovery goals, and seek appropriate treatment.

Screening for prescription drug abuse can be incorporated into routine medical visits. Doctors should also take note of rapid increases in the amount of medication needed or frequent, unscheduled refill requests.

Doctors should be alert to the fact that those addicted to prescription drugs may engage in "doctor shopping"—moving from provider to provider in an effort to obtain multiple prescriptions for the drug(s) they abuse. Preventing or stopping prescription drug abuse is an important part of patient care.

Prescription painkiller abuse is a rising epidemic and can greatly impact a person's personal life and work performance.

If you suspect a co-worker or employee is under the influence of prescription painkillers, common on-the-job behaviors that may indicate a problem include: lack of attention or focus, poor decision-making, decreasing work quality, poor judgment, unusual carelessness and frequently misses work.

Many of these signs and symptoms come on gradually and can be difficult to spot. None of them is a definitive indicator that the person has a problem, but if there is sus-



pication, contact your Human Resources office.

Because so many addictions stem from a serious medical problem, prevention is important. Back injuries, for example, are some of the most common work-related injuries. Though most back injuries are treated successfully with anti-inflammatory medications, exercises, physical therapy and other methods, sometimes opioid painkillers are prescribed. They should usually only be used for less than seven days, as longer use increases your risk of long-term complications.

Patients need to take steps to ensure they use prescription medications appropriately: always follow the prescribed directions, be aware of potential interactions with other drugs, never stop or change a dosing regimen without first discussing it with a healthcare provider, and never use another person's prescription. Unused or expired medications should be properly discarded.

Pharmacists dispense medications and can help patients understand the instructions for taking them. By being watchful for prescription falsifications or alterations, pharmacists can serve as the first line of defense in recognizing prescription drug abuse. Some pharmacies have developed hotlines to alert other pharmacies in the region when a fraudulent prescription is detected.


