



Davenport addresses nuisances

The Davenport Village Board discussed mowing, vehicles in disrepair, parking and garbage at its Monday evening meeting at the Davenport Fire Hall.

The board will follow the same process as Hebron and issue warning letters to take future action if the nuisances are not addressed. The board will send two letters with the deadline set for its July meeting.

At the same time, a new ordinance on nuisance properties for Davenport does not include a grandfather clause.

In other business, the board focused on residents have said they can't hear the town siren, which is 25 feet lower on a pole than sirens in other towns and 60 to 70 years old. A new siren is \$45,000, but Mike Onnen of the Natural Resources District said a hazard mitigation grant may cover the expense. The issue will be discussed at the fire department's meeting this week.

Pagers are also needed for firemen. Every fireman must have a pager and while the village is in need of at least one pager, the cost is \$409. It is possible to include the rural fire board in on the cost.

The Village of Davenport will have a town cleanup this Friday,

beginning at 8 a.m. The cleanup is for residents only and ends Saturday at approximately 4 p.m.

A representative of the Southeast Nebraska Development District visited the board to inform them there is a push at the federal level to eliminate Community Development Block Grant funding and the state may choose to monitor the program more closely while ensuring towns and villages using the CDBG funds are following regulations.

In addition, projects may not be limited to just one issue on a property. If a loan is needed to repair

windows, for example, but the rest of the property is not up to code, then the loans must be raised to repair the entire property.

Contractors must be registered with the state and be certified in lead-based paint as well as meeting other requirements.

Scrunity will also center on whether owners meet the income guidelines. They cannot be above the federal threshold to qualify for CDBG.

Villages will still be required to submit reports, which are more detailed than in the past.

"We have good control of our product," Pruitt said.

Pruitt predicted at least two more employees will be hired in the future, depending on customer growth. The Hebron location has space to grow.

Hubl qualifies, trains and runs in marathon

She had anticipated the feeling of crossing the finish line on Boylston Street for so long, when she did at the 3:39.31 mark, Ann Hubl raised her arms and smiled big.

"I saw the line and I was trying to hold it together. It was the best feeling ever," she said. "You are running and tired. The spectators, they get you through it."

Hubl had qualified for the historic run in February of 2016 as her time in a marathon in Phoenix was 3:27, 13 minutes faster than the first time she qualified in a 2015 marathon. She missed getting into the 2016 Boston Marathon by one minute. Last year, Hubl was anxious to find out if she would be included for the 2017 contest.

She received the news through an email at the end of September. As she waited for more information, she thought, 'I'd better be ready.'

To add to the excitement, her twin sister, Amy Barry from Gretna, had qualified as well.

"Her time was faster than mine," Hubl said.

They have always been competitive with each other, despite Hubl leaning toward cheerleading and dancing. Barry was the faster of the twins, but in Hubl's senior year, she started to beat her sister in one and two-mile runs.

It was fitting then they should both qualify for the marathon together, although Hubl didn't see her sister until the end.

Hubl was having hamstring issues at the marathon — she had tweaked her hamstring in the 16-week advanced training regiment, set by the Boston program.



By the second mile, Hubl could feel her knee.

"I prayed a lot and it honestly worked," she said, adding the spectators also helped. A lot of them offer their hands for a high five and Hubl kept pushing forward to the 18-mile mark, where her and Amy's husbands and a friend and her husband were waiting.

"I did not see them," she said.

But, she heard them and turned around. Hubl backtracked for a hug.

"It gave me the extra boost I needed to get the rest of the way," she said.

The day was warm and while it was good for spectators, the stagnant air left many runners dehydrated, including Hubl, who didn't let her body react until she crossed the finish line. Amy, who was on pace to run a good time, finished in 3:41 because the heat began affecting her at mile 14.

"She had to walk a lot of the last half. I crossed the finish line and saw her in a wheel chair! They thought she was dehydrated," Hubl said.

Hubl finished in 3:39.31. In her gender, she was 2,651 out of 11,973. In her age division (18-39), she finished 1,962 out of 5,846.

And, she would run the Boston Marathon again. She is going to wait because of the time it takes to plan such a feat until her children are older.

Her eyes glisten from tears as she recalls the race and her children.

"The goal in Boston is obviously not to win. It's just to go out there and see all the runners who have worked just as hard as you have," she said. "I think about my family and setting an example for my boys."

The Boston Marathon was held on Patriot's Day, April 19, from 1897 to 1968 unless the holiday, which was only recognized in Massachusetts and Maine, fell on a Sunday. In 1969, the marathon was moved to the third Monday in April. Boston became the first major marathon to include a wheel chair division in 1975.

On April 10, at Tindell, Mo., T. C. Marshall, of Belvidere, was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Martin. Mr. and Mrs. Marshall will keep house in the building vacated by Geo. Talmadge.

Work has commenced for the new Masonic building. The basement is being excavated and rock is being delivered. The lodge has purchased more land in the rear and will make the building 100 feet long. A. B. Gregory has received a letter from his father-in-law to investigate the cost of material, as he contemplates joining on to the Masonic building in the north.

A train of stock, consisting of cattle, sheep and hogs, was shipped from Belvidere last Thursday by Leslie & Sperry for Chicago, via the B&M. The train was beautifully decorated with flags and appropriate mottos, setting for the advantages of Belvidere, the best town in southern Nebraska "for its size." About 500 of the citizens were at the depot to see the train leave.

The new planing mill is being ornamented with appropriate signs.

As will be seen by their dissolution notice in this issue, Freeman and Mall have dissolved partnership. Mr. Freeman will continue the furniture and undertaking business and Mr. Mall will retain the hardware.

100 Years Ago

At the Commercial Club meeting Monday evening, it was decided to put on the light opera "Mikado" for three nights, out-door performance, early in June under the direction of Prof. White. The question of street sprinkling was referred to the committee. A communication was read from F. L. Werner of the National Produce Co., at Newton, Iowa, inquiring if there was a suitable building that might be procured for the manufacture of a farm gate. The secretary reported that for the semi-

centennial observance of Nebraska's statehood, a band of Indians could be procured from the reservation for the cost of transportation, altho considerable red tape would have to be observed in securing them. Dr. Shepherd accepted the office to deliver his address, "The Evolution of Old Glory," illustrated by a collection of flags, at Hebron on July 4th, and will come for \$25 and entertainment. It was decided to have a number of business men go to the farm of Aug. Beisner on Tuesday afternoon to witness the demonstration of his one-man spreader for manure and straw and to give him encouragement to manufacture the machines.

Byron is the first town in Thayer County raise a flag with ceremonies. It was held on Tuesday under the auspices of the Byron schools, of which Prof. Barbee is the able principal. A good crown of patriotic citizens were present. The flag is 12 x 18 feet in size and floats from a pole 61 feet high. It was raised by popular subscription among both Americans and Germans of that vicinity. Care should be used to not confuse the issues, in your zealous expressions. This is no time for quarreling over sympathies for England or Germany. A war is now being waged against the United States. Uncle Sam has picked up the gauntlet that was hurled at him, and we must present a united front to the enemy.



Belvidere Woman's Club celebrates 90 years

The Belvidere Woman's Club members and friends gathered on April 30, at the Community Center, to celebrate 90 years of commitment to the community, nation, and world. The club has touched hundreds of members' lives down through the years. It presently has 18 members and three juniors.

Ever since 1926-1927 the club has played an important role in keeping Belvidere on the map. A town that probably would have decayed long ago if not for the efforts of women who believed in the club's motto.

The Nebraska Federation club members are volunteers representing the full spectrum of women today. Women who are interested in self improvement as well as community improvement. These volunteers are united in their community efforts across the state. Our members give their time, talents, and resources to improve the quality of life through our service to others.

The club was organized in 1926 and federated in 1927. In the early days, the women focused on libraries, music and peace. At that time there were 30 members. They were interested in the school, as minutes from meetings tell about efforts to make the school lunch room a more pleasant place in which the students could eat their lunches brought from home. One of their projects was to build a table so there was a place for the students to sit and eat.

Records show they sponsored buying magazines for the library, holding teacher receptions and in later years honoring seniors at a Senior Tea. Before World War II, they held meetings and prayed for peace. Later on in the 50's the Belvidere Club was responsible for starting the hot lunch program in the school.

Then on a cold, rainy, wintry day, April 30, the club of today honored all the years and dedication of the many women who have contributed to this great organization.

The afternoon began as a regular club meeting with all repeating the Club Collect. Roll call names were taken from the guest book and those present responded with a volunteer project or meeting they remembered.

Today's secretary, Jenn Waldmeier read the minutes from the original minutes record. Some of the interesting facts were they had money

making projects such as waffle suppers. At one of these they made a profit of \$21.52. Dues then were \$1.10. They also offered to serve the Junior-Senior Banquet for 75 cents. This was in the year of 1929. It was reported that no action was taken about billboards with cigarette advertisements on them. They also had a meeting to promote better English. The regular meeting for April 3 was called off because of the Scarlet fever.

Besides the Hot Lunch program, some members were responsible for helping with the Thayer County Historical Society and played an important role in establishing the Thayer County Museum in Belvidere.

The afternoon celebration continued with the introduction of past presidents. They each gave a brief description of their administration. Jane Dodes lighted a candle for all the deceased members of the club, plus the reading of the deceased presidents.

Ardys Dunsmoor read two of her mother's poems that she had written while a club member and entered in the club's District poetry contest. Linda Hudson, Pres., read member Virginia Priefert's poem that was also entered. Tiny Johnson was mentioned for her involvement in the art contest and was honored with a national award from Bright of America for her drawing of a lily. Helen Hudson and Denise Anderson participated in the knitting and tatting areas.

One must not forget former member Vi Bruning for her community improvement projects. She will always be known as the lady with the match. The club entered and won many improvement projects. The very first money came from the Shell Oil Improvement Contest and also Sears sponsored a contest in which the club won first also. The \$500 Shell money was the first taste of winning for the club. These contests were won through Federation contests.

It seemed this winning set the club afire and many contests have been won since then. The latest of these was the Club placed fourth in the National Woman's Club project. This added \$1500 to the club's treasury. Bonnie Priefert and Linda Hudson flew to Phoenix, Ariz., to accept this award. The theme was the two-year project, "Miracle on Main Street."

The Belvidere club has also received money from the NRD, Union Pacific Foundation and Norris Public Power Round-Up. There have been many projects and a few more major ones are the Belvidere Community Center and the Belvidere Whistle Stop Station. Thousand of dollars have been donated.

For example over \$8000 dollars and 850 hours of labor were volunteered at the time of the building of the Community Center in the year 2000-2001. The Whistle Stop Station has required thousands of dollars and hours of volunteer labor. It must be pointed out that these projects would not have been successful had it not been for many citizens willing to support these ideas.

The Belvidere Club has also had the luxury of many women from Hebron and the area belonging to the federated club. For years Thayer County had at least ten Women's Clubs. Time has taken its toll and now the county just has two Nationally Federated Club's. Perhaps the men organizations have become more prominent. (Good idea-- let the men do the work.)

Just a few of the other projects are giving money for 4-H, Quilts of Valor, Thayer County Health Services, Arbor Day, Little Public Library, Toad's business "seed money," helping with the Museum's Fall Festival, new sidewalks at the Museum, Community Center's new wall TV, town Christmas lights and Nativity scene, donations to families, pop tabs for Ronald McDonald House, Youth Rehabilitation center and St Jude's Hospital.

The club has seemed to be always interested in cleaning an area and then invariably it becomes a park. Perhaps it could be called the town of parks.

The program for the afternoon was the presenting of styles down through the Woman's Club years with Jackie Williamson narrating. Starting with the "flappers from the twenties," fashions from the war years, hats that were always worn to club meetings, bell bottoms, double knit long dresses and pant suits. All leads to the present where just about "anything" goes--from dressy dresses, hats, jeans to tight leggings. Whatever the dress, it didn't seem to matter as volunteer women are still alive and kicking! Just like some of the

Another highlight was the presence of the 4th District president, Kim Fisher, and her husband, Kevin. He was the special photographer for the afternoon.

Now that this celebration is history, may the club continue with its good works!







The Foundation for Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) has been selected to receive a grant from the Kenneth & Glenn Korff Endowment of the Hebron Community Foundation Fund (HCFF). This \$4,922 grant will be used towards the purchase of a Mira90 LED Labor and Delivery room light to be shared between the two new LDRP rooms.
