Local construction projects make progress around county

Now that the spring weather has dipped into the sixties and seventies, construction projects are making headway all around. The following is a compiled list of several local construction sites currently in progress.

Region V Services: Region V Services, a community based provider that supports individuals with developmental disabilities, is constructing a new building in Hebron on 2nd Street and Olive Avenue.

A ground-breaking ceremony was held in September of 2014.

"It'll be more spacious and roomy," said Tammy Hinrichs, area director for Region V Services. "We need more room, handicap access and a parking lot."

Though the building was originally scheduled to be finished at the beginning of March, Hinrichs said they now hope for it to be finished sometime this fall.

Region V services include employment services, job coaching, school contracts, among many others.

Cording Organ Company: An organ tuning shop is being built north of the Thayer County Bank.

The store will perform pipe organ tuning, repair and construction.

According to Dave Cording, owner, the projected plan is to be finished early to mid-summer.

Cording installed his first organ in 1986 and has been working on them since. Because organ tuning is a unique business, Cording has traveled to places such as Altoona, Pa., San Marcos, Texas and even Honolulu.

Currently workers are finishing the roof.

"It is possible to have an organ pipe that is 18 feet so the building is tall," said Cording.

With this spacious area, Cording will be able to set up and move long organ pipes. He will also use the building as a woodworking shop as well as a space for re-leathering and re-voicing - the process to get the pipes to sound the way they want.

The front building, which is already constructed, was built in 1930 and was the original telephone building.

Construction for the back end of the shop was started around January.

Roehr's Machinery Inc.: Roehr's Machinery Inc. is relocating from their business in Hebron to a new building on U.S. Highway 81 and Monument Road. According to Matt Beals, general manager, the construction, which began last November, is

Thayer Central state Class B champion for yearbook layout

After the Class B NSAA State Journalism Championship, Thayer Central yearbook students found themselves ranked number one for yearbook layout.

"The competition was fierce since we were competing against schools in Omaha with full-blown journalism programs," said Steph Lanik, the Titan yearbook advisor. "The girls did awesome. They took the challenge head-on and practiced for a couple weeks prior and researched the principles of design and photography. They really let their talent speak for itself and I'm proud of all of them. The best part was seeing the championship podium for Yearbook Layout Design with half the students on it representing Thayer Central. Brinley Linton taking a state championship in that event highlighted her skill and was impressive."

Brinley Linton, junior, took first place, sweeping 20 points for Thayer Central. McCall Madsen, senior, fol-

lowed up in third place with 16 points and Haley Huhman, senior, in fourth place with 14 points.

"I didn't exactly know what state was going to be like, but it turned out to be really fun," said Linton. "I was worried I would forget how to make a layout at competition but thanks to McCall [Madsen] and Haley [Huhman] they taught me a few more things the night before."

Madsen also scored in sports action photography in fifth place with 12 points as well as eighth place in yearbook feature writing. Huhman also garnered attention for her sports action photography and took eighth place.

In all, the Titan yearbook team accumulated 62 points, ranking 11th place overall in the Class B championship.

The yearbook staff includes McCall Madsen, editor, Haley Huhman, photo editor, Brinley Linton, Cassie Beeman, Cheyanna Tietjen and Robert Dodes.

School board continues its research on construction methods

Last Wednesday, the school board held another facilities meeting, this time inviting Allan Quick of Architectural Studio and Tim Ripp of The Clark Enersen Partners as guests.

In this round of research, attendees focused more on the construction management and design/build methods of construction.

According to information presented by The Clark Enersen Partners, in design-build, the builder and designers are hired under one contract. The designer/builder may use an in-house design team or hire an outside entity. The team works together throughout projects and construction begins before final design is complete, thus allowing completion in shorter time frame. The design and construction contracts are combined in one contract with a single point of responsibility.

"It puts the designer and construction on the same team," said Quick on the design-build method. "It's a better project in the sense of efficiency and quality ... You get direct input in scope

and quality of the project."

Construction management at risk allows the owner to hire designers and contractor up front under separate contracts. The contractor typically guarantees a maximum price and works with the design team throughout the project to meet budget and intent. The design and construction contracts are separate in this method.

The final method, design-bid-build, was discussed more so at the previous facilities meeting. Most owners are familiar with this method and it is most widely used. Plans and specifications are completed then advertised for bids. Contractors bid the project exactly as it is designed. With this method, the design and construction are also different contracts with the owner.

Above all, Ripp advised, "make sure [you choose] someone you can trust and someone that will be your advocate as a district."

The school board will discuss the matter more at their next meeting, Monday, May 11.

Neb. spelling champ donates library

The National Spelling Champ of 1967, Jennifer Reinke, has made a generous donation for a new library in her hometown of Deshler.

Reinke's donation was conditional on some matching funds, which the library board has now raised.

She also provided an upkeep and maintenance fund to ensure the library is kept up well into the future.

Reinke now resides in Hebron and works as a secretary for the company her dad founded: Reinke Manufacturing Company, Inc. of Deshler.

The spelling champ wanted to donate and give something back to the town, and what is more fitting for a speller than a building full of words?

The construction schedule is set to have the library completed for the 50th anniversary of her win, and maybe even for her mother's 90th birthday in December.

The Deshler Public Library Foundation fundraising group will have a ground breaking ceremony Tuesday, May 12, at 5:30 p.m.

The event will take place at the new library construction site on 3rd and Pearl Streets in Deshler.

The public is invited. Construction is scheduled to begin in mid-May.

The contracted completion date is the end of January 2016.

The building was designed by JEO and will be built by Lacey Construction.

USDA Farm Service reminds producers to file annual report

Jay VanWesten, County Executive Director of the Thayer County Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers to submit their annual report of acreage to their local FSA county office to meet FSA program eligibility requirements.

"Once the producers have finished planting they must file their reports accurately and timely for all crops and land uses, including prevented and failed acreage, to ensure they receive the maximum FSA program benefits possible," said VanWesten.

Accurate acreage reports are necessary to determine and maintain eligibility for various programs, such as the Price Loss Coverage Program (PLC)/County Agricultural Risk Coverage Program (ARC-CO), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and other programs authorized in the 2014 Farm Bill.

All acreage must be reported for a farm, including crops planted on non-cropland such as hayed or grazed grassland. It is also important to accurately report crops' intended use. Intended use is used to determine eligibility in many FSA programs and cannot be revised once reported.

Acreage reports are consid-

ered timely filed when completed by the applicable final crop reporting deadlines. In Nebraska, deadlines include:

--July 15 for all spring planted crops including CRP.

--NAP acreage must be reported by the earlier of the final reporting date or 15 days prior to harvest or disposition to the crop.

--Prevented acreage must be reported with 15 calendar days after the final planting date.

--Failed acreage must be reported before the disposition of the crop.

Producers should contact their county FSA office if they are uncertain about reporting deadlines. Late-filed provisions may be available to producers who are unable to meet the reporting deadline as required. Reports filed after the established deadline must meet certain requirements to be accepted and may be charged late fees.

Producers should visit their county FSA office to complete acreage reporting. For questions on this or any FSA program, including specific crop reporting deadlines and planting dates, producers should contact their county FSA office. More information on FSA programs can be found at: www.fsa.usda.gov.

National Hospital Week

Health News



As Thayer County Health Services and many other rural hospitals across the country make plans to celebrate National Hospital Week (May 11-17), it is important to ask ourselves, "Besides providing healthcare services, what impact does a rural hospital have on the local economy?"

When you stop and think about it, rural hospitals in Nebraska contribute a lot more than just healthcare to the local communities they serve. The American Hospital Association estimates rural hospitals provide essential health care services to nearly 51 million people, but the impact doesn't stop there. The contribution made by Thayer County Health Services to the local economy goes far beyond the services it provides and plays a key role in us living the "Good Life."

In 2010, \$815 million was the figure attributed to the community benefits provided by Nebraska hospitals. These benefits were seen in areas such as health education, charity care, outreach programs, educational services, research, and other community activities. Besides these direct benefits, hospitals also contribute to the local economy by creating jobs and supporting local businesses.

In Nebraska, nearly 101,000 individuals are employed in healthcare throughout the state. Another 70,000 jobs were created indirectly from these jobs. Healthcare jobs account for 14 percent of the state's total employment. The healthcare sector has become an economic mainstay for most communities and provides stability even during a recession.

In rural communities with a critical access hospital like Thayer County Health Services; the economic impact is significant. This is because after manufacturing, healthcare is the second largest employer in the Thayer County.

The Nebraska Center for Rural Health put together a Health Economic Profile for each county in Nebraska. Based on this report, in Thayer County, there are over 450 jobs directly in the health care sector. An additional 175 plus jobs are

indirectly linked to health care in Thayer County.

This 2010 report also included a study on critical access hospitals. The following was found regarding healthcare in rural communities:

- Every two jobs in healthcare creates at least one job in another sector
- Every two dollars earned in healthcare results in more than a dollar earned in another sector of the state's economy.
- The overall income earned due to critical access hospitals in Nebraska (directly or indirectly) was estimated at \$513.62 million.
- The overall economic output (direct or indirect) from critical access hospitals in Nebraska is estimated to be \$1.52 billion.

Thayer County is fortunate to have a financially strong rural hospital. This isn't always the case. Since 2010, a total of 50 hospitals in the rural U.S. have closed, with more closures in the past two years than in the previous ten years combined, according to the National Rural Health Association.

In recent months, the Board of Trustees and the Administration at Thayer County Health Services have been working on a hospital renovation project to not only improve the care provided locally, but will ultimately bring more jobs and services to Thayer County.

As your local healthcare provider, they have a vested interest in improving local healthcare, while also making Thayer County an attractive place to live and work.

When you support your local healthcare services - everyone benefits. You are making an investment in both the local economy and the overall health of the region.





Dove Road: As part of the construction of the community center, the entrance into Dove

Road from U.S. Highway 81 is also being altered.

To adjust to the amount of traffic the entrance/exit receives for Subway, Sinclair and now the up-and-coming community center, the road is being widened.

"So far they have poured wider turning radiuses," said Fangmeier.

There will be a center turn lane to turn into Subway, Sinclair and the community center.

Constructors Inc., of Lincoln, was awarded the project last fall at a bid of \$166,180.

According to Fangmeier, the road is estimated to be completed in two to three weeks.







LBNRD receives grant from Nebraska Environmental Trust

The Little Blue Natural Resources District will receive \$135,000 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust for a project to improve the function of Rainwater Basin wetlands. This is the third and final year of a three-year grant.

The "Watershed Restoration to Enhance Rainwater Basin Wetlands" grant is helping to restore the watersheds of Rainwater Basin wetlands by filling unneeded irrigation re-use pits located in the drainage area of priority basins. Re-use pits can prevent overland flows from reaching the wetland.

As an added benefit, filling unused pits increases farmable acres for producers and also removes an obstacle from their farm field.

Improved wetland function not only provides more habitat for the estimated 8.6 million waterfowl that migrate through south-central Nebraska each spring; it also benefits local residents and producers by contributing to groundwater recharge, which naturally occurs through Rainwater Basin wetlands.

The objective of the project is to fill at least sixty pits in high-priority watersheds. Emphasis is placed on pits that have large storage capacity and are relatively close to affected wetlands.

The Little Blue NRD is a core member of the Rainwater Basin Joint Venture, a public-private partnership working to improve and protect wetlands in the Rainwater Basin and habitat in Nebraska's mixed-grass prairies.

The Nebraska Environmental Trust, using revenue from the Nebraska Lottery, has provided over \$233 million in grants to over 1,700 projects across the state since 1992, and has awarded \$19,491,958 to 113 projects this year.
