Three individuals get probation in District Court

Three individuals were sentenced to probation in Thayer County District Court on Nov. 7.

All those sentenced were part of the fourteen person drug bust that began May 20 and continued throughout the summer. The arrests were made after a two year investigation by the Thayer County Sheriff's Office, Rural Apprehension Drug Task Force and Nebraska State Patrol.

David Powers entered a plea agreement with the state in September. After the plea agreement he was charged with one count of

distribution of a controlled substance near a school. A pre-sentence investigation was done concerning Powers. This investigation listed Powers as a medium to low risk to reoffend. Remarks were heard from the state where County Attorney Daniel Werner spoke about recent Center for Disease Control and Prevention findings concerning overdoses from prescription pain killers. He stated facts including 48,000 women in the United States died of prescription painkiller overdoses between the years of 1999 and 2010. This number has increased more than 400 percent over that time. This increase in women is compared to a 265 percent increase

in men.

After hearing from both attorneys, District Judge Vicky Johnson sentenced Powers to 30 months of probation.

Patricia Hooks was also sentenced on Nov. 7. After entering a plea agreement in September, she was charged with two counts of distribution of a controlled substance near a school. After viewing the results of the pre-sentence evaluation, District Judge Vicky Johnson sentenced Hooks to two terms of 24 month probation to be served concurrently.

Sarah Rexroad also reached a plea agreement in September.

Accident near Deshler injures one

An accident at the intersection of Highway 136 and Road 5300 near Deshler sent one driver to the hospital with injuries.

Deshler Fire and Rescue responded to the accident which occurred on Nov. 6 around 1:30 p.m.

Mary Christlieb of Deshler was westbound on Highway 136 in a 1994 Ford Explorer when she slowed down to turn left onto Road 5300. As she slowed, Juan Mendez of Great Bend, Kan., was also westbound and attempted to pass her in his 2000 Kenworth truck. As he attempted to pass in the left hand lane, he collided with Christlieb's turning vehicle.

Christlieb was transported by Deshler Fire and Rescue to Thayer County Health Services with injuries to her shoulder/upper arm.

Mendez was not injured. There were no passengers in either vehicle.

The SUV was totaled in the accident and the truck and trailer sustained \$6,000 in damage.

Along with Deshler Fire and Rescue, the Thayer County Sheriff's Office also assisted at the scene.

TC Board talks about changes for roads department

The Thayer County Board of Commissioners met for a short meeting on Nov. 6.

During the meeting, the group heard updates from Richard Heinrichs.

An annual report was presented to the commissioners who moved to sign it.

They also spoke with Heinrichs about current projects in the county road department. Low water crossings and culverts are continually being installed where they are needed around the county. Annual training for employees is also coming up and will be held Nov. 19.

Commissioners and Heinrichs also addressed some concerns about county road graders. Although it has been looked into before, the commissioners spoke about possibly putting GPS devices on the machines. The cost to do this was discussed although no action was taken.

The group also discussed the possibility of changing a stop sign to a yield sign near Carleton. A stop sign study would be required before it could be changed. An estimate was given of \$8,000-9,000 to do the study. The commissioners decided to look into other options.

New road magnets were purchased to place on road graders. These magnets help pick up metal fragments as the equipment moves along the road.

Commissioners also met with Gary Watson and discussed repairs in the courthouse. A number of rooms in the courthouse are needing new ceiling tiles. After hearing the cost for the new tiles, the commissioners approved the purchase for new ceiling tiles in one room and repair of the other damaged ones.

The commissioners will meet again on Nov. 13.

Roel Andriessen, the vice-chair, is senior vice president of Tyson Foods responsible for the international sales group of Tyson Fresh Meats. He is based in Dakota Dunes, S.D. Bruce Schmoll, a soybean and corn producer from Claremont, Minn., is the new secretary-treasurer.

1883

130 Years Ago

Hendershot and Son have built a new slaughter house. The Alexandria creamery is now in running operation. The U.S. Army numbers 25,478 officers and men. Stephen Bethscheider has been appointed town marshal in place of C. Baker who resigned.

Five and one-half miles of grading are now ready for track-laying and about five miles more nearly ready.

The piling for the bridges has been driven into position on the first ten miles of the new railroad, and the pile-driver is now at work near Spring Creek.

Three boys were arrested for defacing property and doing mischief and brought before Esquire Hendershot. After giving them good admonitions and promising severe punishment if again brought before him, he released them. Parents who do not keep their children at home evenings do now know what lessons they are learning.

The post office at Meridian, Jefferson County, has been discontinued by the post office department. Those early settlers who remember Meridian in its palmy days as the frontier supply town will appreciate the force of the quotation, "Sic transit gloria mundi."

Last Saturday night several individuals who had imbibed "bug-juice" freely, created considerable disturbance. In every instance where people "ill up" and imagine themselves cowboys an arrest and a reasonable fine would have wholesome effect.

R. Ellison will soon build another farm residence for a renter near the cheese factory.

Since the first day of last June, the town of Hubbell has had built 25 houses, including three additions and several others are now in course of erection.

J.A. Mossbarger of Hebron, returned from Illinois where he went to attend the funeral of his mother.

How about the celebration on the completion of the railroad?

The thin corn husk as a winter weather indicator is unreliable.

Aman from Atchison, Kan., a swindler and deadbeat, met his fate in Hebron. From papers found on his person, it appears that he has been collecting various sums of money, ranging from five dollars to 50 cents, from confiding saloon keepers in various towns in southern Nebraska. His mode of operation was to impersonate a deputy United States Marshal and Deputy U.S. Revenue Collector.

Our road supervisor, Spencer Ward, is doing good work on main street.

Frank Wight is building a large corn crib on his farm. He is one of the sensible farmers who intend saving their corn for a better price.

Between the Centennial Hotel and Carman's Restaurant, J.A. Stockton opened a restaurant. This now completes "eating house row."

1893

120 Years Ago

Mail service to Hebron is miserable. Remember no extra charge for work Sunday mornings at Cummins' Barber Shop, only 10 cents a shave, 25 cents hair cut.

I.C. Gray sold his barber shop to the McKee brothers who at once took possession.

Mrs. Otto of Kiowa, mother of Wm. Otto, democratic nominee for sheriff, died.

Mrs J.H. Lynch has reopened her studio, corner of Union Avenue and Fifth Street, where she will receive pupils in all branches of art. China firing a specialty.

The Ladies' Aid Society of the Presbyterian Church has been busy this fall making comforts for most of the stores of Hebron. Anyone in need of those articles will find them good and substantial.

The locomotive of the freight going north on the Chester and Fairmont branch of the B&M had a break between Hebron and Belvidere that came near resulting in a

fatality and a bad wreck. Wednesday was republican ratification night. And what a ratification. It was an army with banners a jollification, enthusiasm, triumph. It was an expression of joy over a well-earned victory.

Mr. Alphonso Bethscheider and Miss Mary Mappes were married.

Edgar Wetherald of Connersville, Ind., brother of C.M. and F.M. Wetherald, arrived and will take the position of assistant cashier in the Thayer County Bank.

About 22 years ago a few Catholics located in this then new county. Others came and in a few years their numbers had increased until they built a small frame church building and had a resident priest. In course of time their numbers required a larger building. Rev. Petrasch, present resident priest, threw himself with such vigor and tireless energy into the work of building a new church and in an astonishingly short time, the structure was completed. It is 44 by 102 feet in size. The tower is 124 feet high. It is surmounted by a gilded cross six feet in height. The material is Florence, Kan., stone and brick, faced with hydraulic brick. The building cost \$15,400. The dedication is planned for Nov. 12 and will be a date long remembered in local Catholic annals as it witnessed the dedication ceremonies of their new church.

A Mrs. Fitch from Indiana has rented Mrs. Talmadge's building and put in a stock of millinery.

Mrs. Murphy and two daughters, Miss Hattie and Mrs. Ryder have arrived from Chicago and intend making Belvidere their home for a while. They will reside at A.P. Griffin's, a brother of Mrs. Murphy.

J.H. Reed came home from Kansas City. His horse, "Little Fred," made some money at the races in that city.

Mrs. Frank Bronson of Lincoln and Mrs. Andrew Partch of Missouri, arrived with her children, summoned by the severe illness of their sister, Mrs. T.E. Hitt.

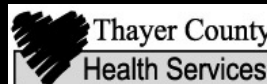

November — National Alzheimer's Awareness Month

Alzheimer's disease is a progressive, degenerative disorder that attacks the brain's nerve cells, or neurons, resulting in loss of memory, thinking and language skills, and behavioral changes. It is also the most common form of dementia among people aged 65 and older which is a general term for memory loss and other intellectual abilities serious enough to interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's disease accounts for 50 to 80 percent of all dementia cases.

In the United States an estimated 5.4 million people are living with Alzheimer's disease and unless something is done, it is projected that as many as 16 million will have the disease by 2050. In Nebraska, the percentage of people living with the disease is projected to increase by 21 percent in the next 15 year.

Alzheimer's is not a normal part of aging, although the greatest known risk factor is increasing age. But Alzheimer's is not just a disease of old age. Up to 5 percent of people with the disease have early-onset Alzheimer's (also known as younger-onset), which often appears when someone is in their 40s or 50s.

Scientists have identified factors that increase the risk of Alzheimer's. The most important risk factors — age, family history and heredity — can't be changed, but emerging evidence suggests there may be other factors we can influence.

Research is beginning to reveal clues about other risk factors we may be able to influence through general lifestyle and wellness choices and effective management of other health conditions. Some of them are:

- Head trauma: There may be

a strong link between serious head injury and future risk of Alzheimer's, especially when trauma occurs repeatedly or involves loss of consciousness. Protect your brain by buckling your seat belt, wearing your helmet when participating in sports, and "fall-proofing" your home.

- Heart-head connection: Growing evidence links brain health to heart health. Every heartbeat pumps about 20 to 25 percent of your blood to your head, where brain cells uses the food and oxygen your blood carries. Heart conditions such as high blood pressure, heart disease, stroke, diabetes and high cholesterol may increase the rise of Alzheimer's. Work with your doctor to monitor your heart health and treat any problems that arise.

Many people have trouble with memory — this does not mean they have Alzheimer's. There are many different causes of memory loss. If you or a loved one is experiencing symptoms of dementia, it is best to make an appointment with your doctor so the cause can be determined.

If you or a loved one has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's or a related dementia, you are not alone. Thayer County Health Services can help you find trusted resources for reliable information, education, referral and support through state run organizations or national organizations such as the Alzheimer's Association.

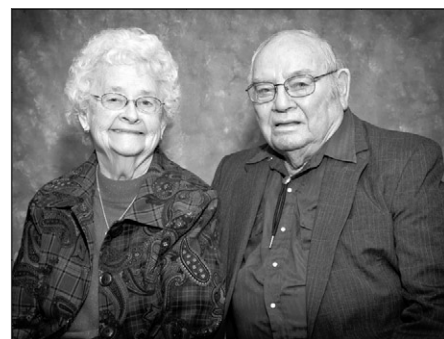
