Holiday fair more hands-on

The annual Christmas Fair in Hebron will be more interactive than in the past with tastings, building goodie baskets and other demonstrations.

The "Christmas Market" is Sunday with vendors at the Southeast Community College Learning Center from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., where Santa Claus will also be receiving visitors.

Visitors to the market will be able to create wreaths at a Santa's workshop, hosted by Thayer County Extension. A "Decadent" bath balls display will be hosted by SCC Director Crystal Fangmeier.

The Majestic Theater will show its free movie, "I'll Be Home for Christmas" at 11 and 11:30 a.m.

Thursday, the Hebron Chamber of Commerce hosts its live drawing at 12 p.m. The chamber's Facebook page encouraged visitors to share its Christmas Fair poster and be entered into a drawing for \$20.

Chamber director Jana Tietjen said shopping local supports the community because a portion of sales tax revenue is used for local projects, such as the recent directional signs to Hebron, parks and other recreational activities.

Hebron's second holiday activity, the Christmas Stroll, is Dec. 3. Once again, the chamber will feature a snowball drop for prizes.

Senior centers receive grants

Out of the 195 invitations Immanuel Vision Foundation sent to senior centers in Nebraska, 155 center directors responded with the two required paragraphs on what their centers could use within the scope of \$1,500.

"We were able to give the grant as long as they said what they needed," executive director of the foundation, Mark Gorud, said. Grant invitations went out in early August. Applications were due by Aug. 31.

The foundation's goal is to serve the ministry of the church, seniors and the health of the community, as stated in the foundation's invitation to apply.

In the process of awarding the grants, Gorud said the foundation discovered not all senior centers operate the same.

"Some have a more hands-on approach," he said, meaning most center directors directly received the grants and will oversee how the monies are spent.

In Thayer County, the center managers for Chester, Alexandria, Davenport, Deshler and Hebron each applied for and received the \$1,500 grant.

The Chester center, however, closed at the end of October because no one was eating there, Zoe Olson said. Olson is the executive director of Blue Rivers Area Agency on Aging, which serves seniors in eight counties.

"No one was eating there for months," Olson said. "The home delivery (meal) program in Chester is still going."

Olson said Chester senior center manager, Linda Jensen, chose to send the \$1,500 grant back to the foundation.

Although each senior center in Thayer County received the \$1,500, the grant funds are man-

Quilts of Valor awarded during Veterans Day program

The "Tribute To Our Veterans" program at Thayer Central Nov. 10, was filled with songs, a poem, Veteran Doug Graul's war experience as told on video and a medley of branch service selections by the high school band.

It was also a day to present Quilts of Valor to veterans. The sixth-grade students held the quilts up as the veterans' names, branches, commendations and other details were read to the audience of the tribute program:

Loren Mach joined the Kansas Army National Guard in May of 1958 after graduating high school.

He received his training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., and advanced training at Fort Bliss, Texas.

He was with the Belleville Unit, Battery C, that was activated during the Berlin and Cuban Missile crises to Fort Bliss.

He served as an ammunition storage specialist. Mach handled all types of ammunition. He was part of the group of servicemen who handled the disposal of explosives at the Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland.

Mach received commendation in grateful recognition of honorable and faithful military service during a period of national emergency from September of 1961 to August of 1962.

His honorable discharge was in 1964.

Mach, who is from Belleville, Kan., has assisted in raising the flags for the Court of Honor. Patriotism and encouraging others to show their patriotism have been important to Mach.

His quilt was pieced by Kathleen Stump of Belleville.

Eldon Kassebaum enlisted in the Army in August of 1964. His training was at Fort Leonard

Wood, Mo. Kassebaum was then stationed in Germany. He served two years and seven months.

Kassebaum was a battalion mail clerk and received the National Defense Service medal and Marksman Rifle badge.

He was honorably discharged Aug. 16, 1967.

Kassebaum's quilt was made by Cindy Bartels of Bruning.

His service commendations include, Army Service ribbon; Overseas Service ribbon; Expert Qualification badge M16; National Defense Service medal; Armed Forces Expeditionary medal; Army Good Conduct medal; Noncommissioned Officer Professional Development ribbon; Vietnam Service medal; Vietnam Campaign medal; Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Palm; and

Veteran, who enlisted twice.

He joined the Army Jan. 10, 1964 and was honorably discharged Dec. 22, 1967. Braithwait's training was in Fort Hamilton, N.Y. and he served in Vietnam for two years and nine months.

He enlisted again June 11, 1981, and was honorably discharged June 10, 1984.

During his tour, Braithwait was stationed in Fort Wainright in Fairbanks, Alaska, where he served in the hospital and patient administration.

Oversea Service Bars.

The quilt presented to Braithwait was made by the Thayer County Quilts of Valor Sewing group and Lori Werner of Hebron.

Donald Day enlisted in the Navy in 1946. He was assigned to the USS Statler Destroyer in the Pacific Ocean and served eight years.

Day was honorably discharged Aug. 19, 1954.

Pages of the Past...

1887

130 Years Ago

From the Belvidere Era: Considerable excitement is caused by the announcement of several cases of hydrophobia in the county north of here. At Frank Bruning's a dog and a cat went mad and have been killed. Three hogs and a calf have died suffering terrible agonies. This afternoon a three-year-old heifer at the same place is suffering and about to die. It is not known to what extent other animals have been bitten. A little child of Mr. Bruning's has been bitten and was taken to Wymore to test the merits of a mad stone.

An elopement involving more than ordinary sin and sorrow, occurred here several weeks since. A man and a young woman, the German wife of an elderly man who moved from Alexandria where he formerly kept hotel and who recently moved to this place are the erring parties. The details of the affair are imperfectly known, but appear to be as follows: The man took his eldest daughter, about six years old, and went to visit his parents near Lincoln. Some time after he left, the young woman also went away, buying a ticket for Lincoln. The wife, not hearing from her erring husband, wrote to his parents to inquire where he was and received in reply information that he also had gone to Lincoln. Former incidents and intimacies between the parties lead not only the wife, but many citizens acquainted with the parties, to believe it beyond question, a case of elopement. The desertion of his wife is peculiarly cruel and heartless. Besides leaving her in destitute circumstances, with two little children, one but a few weeks old at the time he left, he took with him the oldest, a bright little girl, and the mother is almost crazed with grief. Public opinion here is strong against the offender, and personal violence of a nature he would not soon forget would likely be his portion if he should be placed in the power of those who know all the crimes and cruelties he has committed against his bereaved and sorrowing wife.

The crazy man from Gilead precinct who has been in jail, has been taken home by his relatives and will be kept there at county charge.

1897

120 Years Ago

Alexandria: F. M. Samms and wife, of Burlington, Mo., arrived here this week and expect to make Alexandria their future home. They will live in the Methodist parsonage and the minister, Rev. A. W. Partch, will live with them. Mrs. Samms is a sister of Mrs. John Healy...W. M. Atkinson & Son are preparing the old Alexander farm east of town, for the feeding of several hundred head of stock the coming winter... The school and churches are closed on account of a few cases of diphtheria...Last Sunday, Geo. W. Bowen, our worthy postmaster was taken by surprise. His father and mother, brothers and sisters came to pay him a visit. They had not all been together for 20 years.

Belvidere: J. Thatcher and Nathan Lamm went to Colorado the first of the week to buy sheep to feed this winter...Mrs. Bloomer and Miss Dougherty of Omaha are here to open up their fall stock of millinery...Willie Wilson has secured a position on the railroad in the western part of the state. Guy Barlow is now proprietor of the confectionery shop.

Bruning: Mr. Gottlieb Muscheitis, a brother of our Fritz, has just arrived from East Prussia, Germany, coming on here direct from New York...Mr. James Covington died very suddenly Wednesday morning. He will be buried at Belvidere Thursday...S. J. Fitzsimons of Hebron, but formerly of this place, was up here Monday and bought out the Duis & Geiken stock of hardware and farm machinery. This business, S. J. built up from its infancy in

1887 when this town was first started. He sold it out to Garmire on account of poor health, and the latter sold to Duis & Geiken...Mrs. Herman Schwear had her limb amputated Wednesday morning by Dr. Schneiler & Son. It had been badly fractured some time ago, but it did not do well and it had to be taken off at last...Philippi & Kugel shipped out this week 720 dozen of eggs and 1820 pounds of chickens. Charlton shipped out 420 dozen eggs.

H. L. Boyes, secretary of the Thayer County Agricultural Association, was summoned to Belvidere yesterday, where he was sued by W. M. Varnum of Belvidere, who sought to recover \$32 due him from the association as premiums for 1896.

1907

110 Years Ago

Belvidere: L. H. Wissenburg and family departed for their new home at Kramer the fore part of this week. He has charge of the lumber yard and grain elevator up there...Mrs. P. T. Crawford and Mrs. E. D. Williamson have returned from Illinois where they were visiting relatives for some time. P. T. Crawford will not return from Illinois for some time. He is receiving treatment of doctors there who will not let him return before a complete treatment. An x-ray was used in the examination of his case.

Pleasant Mound: Mr. Montanye bought a quarter section of Custer County land at his last trip.

Southeast Corner County: The infant child of W. E. Goodson's died Monday night and was buried Tuesday in the old town cemetery.

Under the auspices of the Women's Council of Defense, a highly successful "Liberty Bon-fire" was held Tuesday evening. The parade formed at the courthouse and comprised members of the Women's Council of Defense, the school children, high school, the Boy Scouts, Uncle Sammy's girls and the Home Guards. From the courthouse, the parade started west to Third Street, south to Lincoln Avenue, north to Olive Avenue and to the chautauqua grounds, east of the Christian Church, where the Boy Scouts had prepared a huge bonfire which brilliantly lighted up the square. The Scouts did good work in keeping the fire under control, although the fire department was ready for any emergency. The band, under the direction of Prof. Paysen, furnished good numbers. The high school pupils sang rousing songs and added pep to the occasion with some improved yells about "Buy a bone" and "Be a backer, not a slacker." W. H. Rhodes, chairman of the Liberty Bond committee, ably presided and introduced the four minute speakers--T. H. Carter, A. G. Wilson, J. P. Baldwin and E. E. Correll.

Aug. Ahrens had his left hand badly mangled by a corn binder at his home between Hebron and Deshler on Monday.

1917

100 Years Ago

Gilead: Dr. Dragatz and wife left Tuesday for Belleville, Kan., for a visit. From there he will go to Lincoln and then where duty calls him, as he has joined the Army as a physician. Dr. Adamson has bought his practice here.

Belvidere: The little 4-year-old son of Wm. Priefert and wife died Sunday morning. Funeral services were held at the Christian Church Tuesday afternoon...B. C. Willard has moved his household goods into their new home in the northern part of town...C. F. Woker is putting in the foundation for the addition to the M. E. Church.

Stoddard: Mrs. Rudolph Glazelman died in the hospital Sunday after an illness of four weeks. She leaves her husband, one daughter and three sons (all small children) to mourn her departure.

1927

90 Years Ago

"A man wanting to buy a farm should do it now, for land will advance, and Thayer County real estate is a good investment," said H. J. Deaver of Gilead, while renewing his Journal subscription. When Mr. Deaver came here 43 years ago, Gilead was all open, with no town or railroad, and land selling at \$10 an acre. Farmers in his vicinity would take \$150 per acre now, although land is not bringing that price. Mr. Deaver is a lover of Nebraska, and his optimism shows in his vigorous vitality at 75 years of age, although he looks 10 years younger. But he has been blessed like Abraham in multiplying of seas, and has 77 descendants--nine children, 58 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. He raised six sons and three daughters, all now living, except one son, who died leaving two boys and four girls.

1937

80 Years Ago

Eighteen boys from Thayer County were enrolled in the Nebraska Civilian Conservation Corps on Oct. 12.

"Burning crop residues is a sure method of reducing yields and speeding up erosion," according to Alfred W. Christensen, agronomist at the Hebron Soil Conservation Service Camp. "Fall fires leave soil unprotected during the winter months. Fire destroys millions of tiny soil bacteria that are needed to decompose waste plant material and get it into food. Leaving plant cover on the soil in winter months is one of the best known methods of erosion control. Wild life finds little protection on farm land which has been "burned over." Wind and water erosion follow quickly on the heels of fire. Leave that crop residue on those fields and help control erosion.

Arnold Durlinger has traded his 28 acre farm and filling station north of Belvidere for a 60-acre farm in Clay County.

70 Years Ago

Word was received this week of the death of Michael Cruise, 75, in Tucson, Ariz. A former resident of Hebron, Mike has lived in Tucson for some time. As an old fiddler with his long flowing beard, he has been a picturesque character for several years. He also appeared in several motion pictures in character parts.

The casketed remains of Staff Sergeant Arnold B. Werner, the first World War II deceased member of the Army from Hebron to be returned from overseas for final burial, will arrive in Hebron within the next two weeks.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward G. Jagels of Davenport, and long time residents of the area, were killed instantly last Wednesday in a collision with a John W. Wilkins Co. truck of Geneva, driven by Ed Rachow, also of Geneva and accompanied by George Hinrichs of Western. Coats and Car Seats

Health News



Using a car seat is the best way to protect kids when traveling by car. Every state in the United States requires that an infant or small child be restrained. And with good reason—unintentional injury is the leading cause of death in children, and most such injuries are from automobile crashes.

When used correctly, child safety seats can greatly reduce the risk of a potentially fatal injury, especially for children. But even when installed correctly in your vehicle, it is also important that you consider what your child is wearing when you strap your child in their car seat. As temperatures start to drop, you want to bundle your children up to keep them warm. But even with good intentions, a bulky coat and a car seat can be a dangerous combination.

As a general rule, winter coats should not be worn underneath the harness of a car seat. Although you may think you have the straps on the harness tight, a bulky coat under a child seat harness can actually result in the harness being too loose to be effective in a crash.

It is very important that the car seat harness is tight enough that you can't pinch the webbing between your thumb and forefinger. Extra slack in the harness can be very dangerous; it can lead to too much excursion or even ejection during a crash.

The following are steps you can take to check to see if your child's coat is too big and bulky to wear under their harness:

- Put the coat on your child, sit them in the child seat and fasten the harness. Tighten the harness until you can no longer pinch any of the harness webbing with your thumb and forefinger.
- Without loosening the harness, remove your child

from the child seat.

- Take the coat off, and put your child back in the child seat and buckle the harness straps, which are still adjusted to what they were when they were wearing the coat.

If you can now pinch the webbing between your thumb and forefinger, then the coat is too bulky to be worn under the harness. During a crash, the fabric of the coat will compress and leave too much slack in the harness to keep your child safe.

So then how do you keep your children safe and warm while traveling in the car? If you find that your child's coat cannot be safely worn under the harness, here are a couple things you can do to keep your child safe and warm in his/her child seat:

- After securing your child in his/her child seat, turn the coat around and put it on backward with their arms through the arm holes and the back of the coat acting like a blanket
- Lay a blanket over your child to keep him/her warm.

- You can also plan ahead and warm your vehicle before placing your child in their car seat.

Working to end veteran homelessness in Nebraska

On Nov. 11, communities across the State of Nebraska took time to honor their veterans. Earlier in the year, a major milestone in supporting some of those veterans was reached.

On May 28, 2017, the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness presented the Balance of State Continuum of Care with confirmation of effectively ending veteran homelessness.

The Balance of State Continuum of Care represents the vast geographic majority of Nebraska (90 of the 93 counties in the state; all except for Douglas, Lancaster, and Saunders Counties).

What that means is, any veteran who wants a stable home in those 90 counties, can have one. A collective, cooperative effort among agencies across the continuum of care has made instances of homelessness among the veteran population rare, brief and non-recurring.

"The system is now in place that allows us to identify and engage any veterans who come into homelessness. Some veterans choose to remain homeless, and for them, continued outreach and engagement is essential," said Ryan Bailey, Blue Valley Community Action Partnership's Family and Community Services Director. "Our priority is housing stability, and we are proud to say that through partnerships with the Veterans Administration and local resources, we are able to help veterans find and maintain stable housing."

BVCA's Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) is dedicated to serv-

ing veterans who are homeless or at imminent-risk of becoming homeless.

The program helps the veteran locate safe and affordable housing and connects them to resources so they can remain in a stable situation. It's a short-term crisis intervention that utilizes the "Housing First" model.

Housing First focuses on getting the veteran in a stable living situation first, and then addresses any barriers to continued housing stability. Lack of income, mental health issues, poor rental history, substance abuse, etc. are all addressed after housing is secured, Bailey explained.

It has been proven that once a person is stably housed and does not have to worry about basic needs, he or she can then address other issues more successfully, she added.

The Balance of State Continuum of Care implemented a data collection system that allows any agency that comes in contact with a veteran (either through programs, referrals or outreach efforts) to identify and name every veteran in Nebraska. Not every veteran chooses to be housed but when they do the system allows the opportunity to provide the best foundation for their success.



"Wow, what a Herculean effort that was," Coach Harris remarked. "We knew we had every chance of winning that match after the way we played them on our home court on Oct. 12, but to see

ing to Coach Harris.

"Somehow the girls found a way to put the ball to the floor on a very scrappy Superior team," she said. Welch led the way with 19 kills on 51-of-61 attempts, and Harris added 13 kills on 41-of-45 attempts.

Chloe Souerdyke got eight kills on her 23 good hits, and Williams got seven kills on her 17 good attempts.

Richardson was 11-for-11 with four kills. Richardson also controlled the net with two solo and three assist blocks, while Welch added a solo and two assists, and Chloe Souerdyke added one solo and one assist.

Cottam was able to connect with her hitters for 38 assists.

"What really made the difference for us that night was our passing and defense," Coach Harris said. "I think the numbers we posted that night were our best all year, and they came when it really mattered."

Havel led serve reception with 31 perfect passes on 60-of-66 attempts, and Welch

next two, 31-29 and 26-24.

"We battled so hard in those first three sets, and I knew our girls were exhausted, but I wasn't worried — not after looking at their faces in the huddle before they went out for that fourth set. I knew they were determined to get the job done, and they knew they deserved to win," Coach Harris said.

Once again, strong serving was a factor in the win against Freeman, but this time Welch led the charge on 27-for-27 serving with six aces, and Cottam was close with 23-for-23 serving and two aces.

Harris was 21-for-22 and Meyer was 17-for-20 with one ace. Williams was 13-for-14 and Grace Souerdyke was 12-for-13.

"As a team, we served 95 percent on 120 attempts. That was extremely important. We hadn't done that all year on that many attempts," Harris said.

The team was hot at the net, too, with a hitting efficiency of .212, as Cottam was able to connect with hitters for 46 set assists.

"Again, that's the best we've hit as a team all season. With only 22 errors on 203 attempts and 65 total kills, we really gave their defense a workout," Harris said.

Welch led the hitters with 25 kills on 66-of-77 attempts, and Harris added 17 kills on 48-of-51 attempts. Williams came on strong with 11 kills on 26-of-28 attempts. Chloe Souerdyke was a force with eight kills on 25-of-28 attempts and six total blocks, while Richardson added three kills and four total blocks. Welch added three total blocks.

"Passing and digging once again made the difference for us," Coach Harris said. "Sydney was just on fire in the fifth set, passing all 10 of her attempts perfectly, but all of our defensive specialists stepped up their game."

Havel ended the night with 31 perfect passes on 64-of-68 attempts and 18 digs, and Welch added 28 perfect passes on 46-of-49 attempts with a whopping 38 digs.

"Practically nothing got past Emily that night. She played incredible defense," Harris said. "Stephanie, too. She only missed five digs on 29 attempts the whole night, which was just awesome."



"We spent the rest of the week reviewing film and establishing a game plan for Stanton. In addition, the agency is now transitioning the bank accounts to a Blue Rivers account. The accounts were held by individual senior centers, like Hebron and Chester.

The Hebron senior center account, made up of donations, bake sale proceeds and other center activities, is scheduled to close after a \$1,000 check from the center to the Roosevelt Park equipment fundraiser clears.

"What I want people to know it's business as usual with these accounts as far as the use of them," Olson said. "It is just the process is different because we're able to provide oversight and protect the staff from chances of accusations."

Olson said the grant requests from the senior centers had a common thread — the Hebron, Alexandria and Deshler centers wanted funds for more presentations — Deshler on health and benefits for senior citizens and Hebron and Alexandria on Humanities Nebraska programs.

"The centers will still benefit from the grants," she said, noting Davenport's request to add to its garden. "That is a benefit. If you are getting people out to do physical activity, that is definitely a benefit."

Grant requests made by the senior centers were:

Davenport — Its garden, as well as purchasing additional games and puzzles;

Deshler — New sink in the women's restroom to replace the "old and rusty" one; high-rise toilet; a new mat for the front door; and a light cover for the hallway light;

Alexandria — Larger bookcase to store books, magazines, puzzles, word searches and games; larger informational board to post notices; and quilt racks;

Hebron — Automatic door and painting in the restrooms and kitchen.

Senior centers residing in rented buildings, such as in Hebron, will most likely not see structural improve-

ments.

"Those are our senior centers, our employees. We pay rent on the buildings and we do have to have oversight as to what our employees are doing. Our primary job is to make sure we have strong organization in our agency so we can serve all eight counties," Olson said.

As Olson became executive director two years ago, she was faced with losing funding for Blue Rivers because of noncompliance with state and federal regulations.

"We weren't doing things, according to regulations. If you don't comply, you don't get to keep your money," Olson said. "We don't have a lot of resources in these eight counties."

On her ninth day in the office, she discovered Blue Rivers had very little time to correct its mistakes.

"No one was doing anything illegal," she said. "But what had happened was the regulations said and what they meant, they were just not being met."

For example, people were under the impression that if there was a Meals on Wheels or other home delivery meal program operating in the area, the area agency couldn't also deliver meals.

"One of the first things I did was to research that," Olson said. She found the regulation had been misinterpreted.

Olson said she looked at the path to compliance like a road map of what needed fixing.

"We're doing everything we can to serve these folks," she said. "I want our small communities to continue helping. The home delivery meals are like a daily welfare check."

She said seniors provided as much help as possible stay in their homes and those homes stay on the tax rolls.

"They just don't disappear. Blue Rivers is proud to be a partner. We all work together," she said.

The tower, mill, tank and electric fencing are to be considered personal property and are subject to removal by the previous lessee.

In order for anyone to be eligible to bid on a school land lease, they must be able to contract in accordance with Nebraska Law and have deposited with the County Treasurer of the County in which the land is located, or with a representative of the Board, a bank draft, cashier's check, certified check or money order made payable to the Board of Educational Lands and Funds, or cash, equivalent to the 2018 rental of said tract. Said rental deposit may be submitted at any time until the tract is announced "Sold".

If more than one qualified bidder is interested in a lease, it will be sold to the party bidding the highest cash bonus, in addition to the first year's rent, at the auction. Bonus bids must be paid to the Board of Educational Lands and Funds immediately following the auction. Bonus bids are a one-time payment which covers the entire term of the lease.

All improvements affixed to the land which are not listed above are and shall remain owned by the School Trust. No improvements shall be placed on the land by Lessee without the prior written approval of the Board; and any improvements made by Lessee without the prior written approval of the Board shall be permanently owned exclusively by the Board.

All monies received by the Board's agents will be deposited subject to approval of the lease by the Board of Educational Lands and Funds. In the event a lease is not approved, the appropriate refunds will be issued.
