Manager Delores Boman said she thought the numbers were down because people are waiting to check in deer due to the "earn-a-buck" program. Hunters can earn the right to shoot a buck once they've killed a doe.

"Some hunters wait because they'll get the buck first, then have to shoot a doe before they check tags," she said adding that it is perfectly legal to do this. "I checked," she said.

Boman said there have been several bucks checked in with nice wide, uniform antlers. A 23-pointer was checked in Monday morning.

Firearm season runs through this Sunday, Nov. 20, (earn-a-buck units run through Nov. 22), then take a five-week break and resume Dec. 26-Jan 18.

## Council discusses sewer line issue

It isn't unusual for city leaders to hear about sewer problems, especially when Hebron's sewer system seems to suffer from "old age." What is unusual, however, is when the complaint comes after the problem has been fixed.

"We can't be sure that's true," said Shirley Lindsay of Fresno, Calif. "We can't be sure that sewer water won't back up into my parents' basement, again."

Lindsay is the daughter of Leroy and Phyllis Wulf who live on N. 4th St., in Hebron. According to Lindsay, the Wulf's have had raw sewage in their basement six times since 1994. Two others in the Wulf neighborhood have too, she added.

"For over 20 years my parents have been promised the sewer line would be replaced and it has not been done," Lindsay told board members at the

regular city council meeting Nov. 7. "We want you to replace the line all the way to Barger Avenue, like promised."

City worker Merv White said part of the line was replaced shortly after the last back up on Sept. 26 of this year. "We replaced 350 feet of the line from the Wulf house to a new manhole," he said this week. In a report of the Sept. 26 back up filed Oct. 3, White said city employees were called to the Wulf home and immediately used the sewer jetting machine to clear out the main. As soon as the main was cleared, the backup "went away."

He also said at the time he filed the report that an old six-inch pipe was currently being replaced by an eight-inch pipe.

Lindsay said at the council meeting she was aware of the 350 feet of replaced pipe, but that it wasn't enough. "We don't have a lot of

confidence in the City of Hebron when it comes to sewer problems," she said. "We want the entire line fixed. It should be replaced all the way to Barger Avenue."

Lindsay said her parents were told repeatedly that the back up problems were due to blockage in their private line, so they replaced it in 2007.

"Once they did that, their back ups became less frequent, but the neighbors had more," she said and added, "You have the responsibility to provide basic civic services. The City has an obligation to keep that line clear. You have neighbors who don't trade keys to check the mail and water plants when they go on vacation. They trade keys to check the basement and make sure it isn't full of raw sewage."

Councilman Rich Koch said he is aware of the problems the Wulf's have had over the years. "Sometimes it was their sewer line and sometimes

it wasn't," he told Lindsay during the meeting. "Most of the time it wasn't."

Koch said the city could send a camera through the remaining 250 feet of old sewer line to see if the pipe warranted replacing. It would also let them know if tree roots or anything else could be causing blockage.

As of Monday, Nov. 14, White said the line had been jetted and pictures taken. A second camera would be sent into the pipe as soon as possible, he added.

In the meantime, Lindsay is having difficulty understanding the City's reluctance to replace the final 250 feet. "What happens if it backs up again," she asked the council. "We're simply appealing to your sense of fair play. We just want the peace of mind that the line is fixed."

## Shooting accident results in death of Hubbell hunter

A Hubbell man was accidentally shot and killed while hunting early Sunday morning, Nov. 13, the second day of rifle season. David R. Donan, 69, of Hubbell, was hunting near the village when he was shot by his hunting partner George McLeod just before sunrise.

According to a statement released by Thayer County Attorney Daniel L. Werner, McLeod said he shot at what he believed to be a deer and upon walking to the area where the deer should have been, he found he had wounded his friend and hunting companion.

Donan was rushed by rescue unit to Thayer County Health Services in Hebron where he died while waiting for a life-flight helicopter to transport him to a Lincoln hospital.

Werner said he determined the shooting to be accidental and no charges will be filed.

According to the release, Donan was dressed in blaze orange as required by Nebraska hunting laws. McLeod was hunting with a Marlin 30-30 rifle when the accident occurred. Contributing factors were that the shooting occurred during the predawn hours shortly after shooting was permitted, and a failure to identify the target which was assumed to be a deer, Werner stated in the release.

Residents of Hubbell said Donan was the mayor of their village and president of the local Lions Club.

## Commissioners hear hospital financial status

### Net assets back on plus side from last year

Thayer County Health Services CEO Joyce Beck told county officials earlier this month that the hospital is getting back on track. Last year the facility's worth showed a loss of \$560,788 from 2009, but this year the net assets increased by \$194,770, or two percent, she said. The net assets are still approximately \$350,000 less than in 2009, but the two percent increase for this year is a good sign, she said.

TCHS chief financial officer Michael Pracheil accompanied Beck to the commissioner's meeting on Nov. 3 and went over the financial report with the officials. In the report, Pracheil says a significant component of these assets is accounts receivable, or amounts due for care related to patient services.

In 2011, patient accounts receivable increased by approximately \$219,000, or 9.9 percent. In 2010, that amount decreased by \$68,193, or three percent. "The increase in

2011 accounts receivable is due to increased revenues compared to 2010," he said and added that factors affecting the overall collection of patient accounts continue to be the slowdown by third-party payers in making payments, the continued stress of the economy, and the rising number of uninsured/underinsured patients as well as those requiring charitable discounts.

Last year Pracheil and Beck said the loss was attributed to the recession's presence in Thayer County; one less provider which meant fewer patients; huge insurance changes to private policies; and a declining population in the county. A couple of these factors have been eliminated showing one reason for the increase in 2011.

Other components of the overall net assets are operating income which showed a loss of \$36,929; non operating revenues of \$119,327; and capital grants and contributions of \$112,372.

### Let's Talk Turkey

UNL Food Specialist Julie Albrecht has the following suggestions for cooking a turkey safely.

When buying a turkey, allow one pound of meat per person. Whether fresh or frozen, be sure to keep it refrigerated for safety.

A safe way to defrost the frozen turkey is to place it in the refrigerator until thawed. For a bird that is up to 12 pounds, you will need to leave it in the refrigerator for one to three days. The largest birds from 20 to 24 pounds will take five or six days to thaw in the refrigerator.

You can also thaw the turkey by placing it in cold water. The bird should be in a secure wrapping that will not allow water to leak through it. Put the bird in cold tap water and change the water every 30 minutes. For a four to 12 pound bird, this will take from two to six hours. The largest birds over 20 pounds can take ten to 12 hours to defrost in water. Once thawed, cook the turkey and do not refreeze.

To safely roast the turkey, do not place the oven temperature lower than 325 degrees. If you are using an oven cooking bag, follow the manufacturer's guidelines.

You may want to roast the turkey in a shallow roasting pan. For optimum safety, it is recommended that you do not stuff the bird but place the stuffing in a casserole. Both the bird and the stuffing should reach 165 degrees internally. Even if your turkey has a pop-up temperature indicator you should check the temperature with a safe thermometer in the thickest part of the thigh and the thickest part of the breast.

If your roasting pan does not have a lid, you may place a tent of heavy-duty aluminum foil over the turkey for the first one to one-and-a-half hours. This allows for maximum heat circulation, keeps the turkey moist and reduces oven spatter. To prevent overbrowning, foil may be placed over the turkey until it reaches the desired color.

For more even cooking, add a little water to the bottom of the pan and tuck the wings under the shoulders.

Once the bird reaches 165 degrees, take it out of the oven and let it stand for 20 minutes before carving to allow the juices to set. The turkey will also carve more easily if it stands for those 20 minutes.



# November — Alzheimer's Awareness Month

November is National Alzheimer's Awareness month. Alzheimer's is the most common form of dementia, which is a general term for memory loss and other intellectual abilities serious enough to interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's disease accounts for 50 to 80 percent of all dementia cases.

In the United States an estimated 5.4 million people are living with Alzheimer's disease and unless something is done, it is projected that as many as 16 million will have the disease by 2050. In Nebraska, the percentage of people living with the disease is projected to increase by 21 percent in the next 15 years.

Alzheimer's is not a normal part of aging, although the greatest known risk factor is increasing age, and the majority of people with Alzheimer's are 65 and older. But Alzheimer's is not just a disease of old age. Up to 5 percent of people with the disease have early-onset Alzheimer's (also known as younger-onset), which often appears when someone is in their 40's or 50's.

Scientists have identified factors that increase the risk of Alzheimer's. The most important risk factors—age, family history and heredity—can't be changed, but emerging evidence suggests there may be other factors we can influence.

Research is beginning to reveal clues about other risk factors we may be able to influence through general lifestyle and wellness choices and effective management of other health conditions. Some of them are:

- Head trauma: There may be a strong link between serious

head injury and future risk of Alzheimer's, especially when trauma occurs repeatedly or involves loss of consciousness. Protect your brain by buckling your seat belt, wearing your helmet when participating in sports, and "fall-proofing" your home.

- Heart-head connection: Growing evidence links brain health to heart health. Every heartbeat pumps about 20 to 25 percent of your blood to your head, where brain cells uses the food and oxygen your blood carries. Heart conditions such as high blood pressure, heart disease, stroke, diabetes and high cholesterol may increase the rise of Alzheimer's. Work with your doctor to monitor your heart health and treat any problems that arise.

Many people have trouble with memory — this does not mean they have Alzheimer's. There are many different causes of memory loss. If you or a loved one is experiencing symptoms of dementia, it is best to make an appointment with your doctor so the cause can be determined.

If you or a loved one has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's or a related dementia, you are not alone. Thayer County Health Services can help you find trusted resources for reliable information, education, referral and support through state run organizations or National organizations such as the Alzheimer's Association.



**Envy**

Envy, is the thirteenth work of the flesh mentioned by Paul in his epistle to the Galatians, and is the translation of the Greek word "phthonos." In contrast to the Greek word "zelos," which can have both a positive and a negative sense, phthonos almost always has a negative sense. Phthonos is the envy which inspired the chief priests to deliver Jesus to Pilate (Mark 15:10); it is often produced by a morbid craving for controversy and disputes about words (1 Timothy 6:4); it is a prominent characteristic of our behavior prior to becoming true Christians (Titus 3:3); and it is something which we are instructed to put aside (1 Peter 2:1). What distinguishes zelos from phthonos is that zelos is jealousy which desires what someone else has, and thus can have the positive which desires what someone else has, and thus can have the positive connotation of emulation, whereas phthonos is a malicious jealousy which seeks to deprive others of goods which they have and we do not. For instance, the child who imitates his fellow student's good work is exemplifying zelos, whereas the child who sabotages his neighbor's work is exemplifying phthonos. This type of envy often occurs in politics, where false and malicious character assassination is seen as sport, or in higher education, where it is often the motive for attacking someone's research, or even in the church, where we intentionally misrepresent other religions or denominations, thereby slandering them, often without making the effort to find out what they really believe.



**So put away all malice and all guile and insincerity and envy and all slander. Like newborn babies, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up in salvation, for you have tasted the kindness of the Lord.**

### 1971 — 40 Years Ago —

Lily A Kirchoff was appointed the postmaster at Byron. She had been officer-in-charge at the Byron Post Office to replace the late Dale W. Jones.

Tom turkeys for Thanksgiving dinner were selling for 39 cents a pound, hens for 45 cents a pound and fryers for 49 cents a pound.

Showing at the Majestic in Hebron was "Pretty Maids all in a Row" starring Rock Hudson.

Used combines for sale at Buchli Implement in Hebron included: 1958 and 1959 A Gleaner, 14 foot, some with cabs, \$1,395. A new 180 Allis-Chalmers diesel tractor, loaded, was \$6,395.

### 1976 — 35 Years Ago —

Viola Bruning of Belvidere accepted the Otto G. Hoiberg award and Erma Bennett of Alexandria accepted the honorable mention Class I, Community Award from Gov. J. James Exon at the Nebraska Community Improvement Program awards banquet in Lincoln.

Janene Becwar, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Becwar of Davenport, was to attend the National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

The newest church to be established in Hebron was the New Life Assembly. Pastor was the Rev. James Burnette. The family was living at 315 N. Third in Hebron.

The Thayer County Community Theatre's new season was set to begin with Neil Simon's comedy, "The Prisoner of Second Avenue." Lead parts were played by Don and Carol Wassom of Chester.

### 1981 — 30 Years Ago —

Lewis O. Secrest died in 1917 and bequeathed \$15,000 for the purpose of establishing a public library in the city of Hebron. The city of Hebron passed an ordinance establishing a free public library in 1918 and a tax, not exceeding three mills should be levied annually for its support. The library became a reality in 1921. The library was celebrating its 60th anniversary with an open house.

Dennis Dye, a native of Mankato, Kan., was named to replace Richard Hickman of Hebron as Farmers National Company farm manager in the Thayer County area.

Mary Smith was named to the Nebraska Bakers Association Board of Directors, being only the second woman named to the board.

## Birthday Coffee Held



## B-D Education Association Returns Holiday Premium

The Bruning-Davenport Education Association acknowledges that in order for our school district to qualify for the EHA (Educator's Health Alliance) Blue Cross Blue Shield premium holiday savings this December, both the Association and the BD School Board must agree to sign off or the funds must be forfeited. The holiday premium savings for all certified teachers is \$27,999.27, but the total for all members who receive insurance benefits in the district totals \$38,686.50 in savings.

The BDEA held several discussions within our association to come up with what we felt were reasonable options for utilizing these funds so that the students and the district would receive the most benefit.

The Association recognizes

that some school districts returned part or all of the savings directly to their teachers, some set it aside to be used towards future health insurance increases, and some districts agreed to purchase new laptops for the teachers.

After much consideration, the Association made the decision that the District and its students would best be served by seeing to it that the entire amount of the holiday premium savings be returned to the District's general fund in hopes that the Bruning-Davenport school district will be able to benefit from the savings in future spending considerations.

The BDEA is pleased to be able to do its part to help return these savings to the general fund.
