Shell Station check-in reports over 160 deer

The Shell Station gas station in Hebron reported 167 deer check-ins over the weekend, which is up from the last couple of years.

According to Nebraska Game and Parks, deer prospects looked good this year because of restrictions on antlerless deer permits in recent years.

The firearm season closes Nov. 22. Firearm deer hunters and archers harvesting deer during the firearm season must deliver their deer to a check station no later than 1 p.m. on the day following the close.

Hunters may donate their deer to the Hunters Helping the Hungry Program, which provides ground venison to Nebraskans in need.

Less than two percent sick in Thayer County

Across five counties, Thayer included, the level of influenza-like illness has claimed a low, 1.88 percent of students who have had to miss school. Of those, 25 percent were respiratory related.

The data was reported by Public Health Solutions for Thayer, Jefferson, Gage, Fillmore and Saline counties as part of the statewide influenza surveillance system that uses records from schools, hospitals, long term care facilities and Head Start.

Tracking shows sporadic reporting last week, which translates to minimal influenza activity.

Rising costs spur potential billing for fires

A formal meeting to decide billing for rural fire calls will be held in the Hebron Fire Hall Dec. 2 at 5:30 p.m.

The Hebron Rural Fire District, which owns six vehicles equipped to handle large structure fires, could bill the insurance companies of homeowners or businesses anywhere from \$150 to \$500 on average, depending on many hours a truck and its equipment would be used for sizable fires in the district, which covers the outlying areas of Hebron and the four miles to Deshler.

Billing would work much like the

Emergency Medical Services have for years on rescue calls - a bill is submitted by the fire department to a third-party company detailing the type of equipment used and the length of time it was in operation. The third-party then submits the information to the insurance company.

The potential proposal comes at a time when fire equipment prices, including trucks, jump approximately \$10,000 per year while the value on existing trucks drops well below the budget cushion.

"The cost of trucks are going up faster than the appropriation of tax funds," Fire Chief BJ Linton said. "We're losing ground."

Ten years ago, air packs cost \$2,500.

Now, they're \$6,000, Linton said.

"It's hard to keep updating," he said.

High costs have also led the fire department to reevaluate how long it holds onto a truck.

Linton told the Hebron City Council Nov. 2 a new truck runs \$300,000 to \$325,000 and he expects the cost to reach \$400,000 in several years. Market value on a new truck plunges \$35,000 to \$60,000 on average in just four years.

The value doesn't include the 12 to 18 months it takes to custom prepare

all the specifications before the trucks are delivered to fire departments.

Currently, the City of Hebron has \$99,000 in its sinking fund for fire equipment.

The department would like to see the city plug more into that fund.

"This year, the rural district is looking to turn the trucks over instead of letting them depreciate," Linton said.

The district is contemplating a sale of its rural fire pumper to Deshler, but a price has not been negotiated, Linton said.

Should Hebron sell to Deshler, it would need a new mainline pumper.

Thayer drops to eight-man

The Thayer Central School Board of Education voted to reclassify the school's football team to eight players, following a lengthy discussion, Superintendent Drew Harris said.

The decision was due to the safety of students and the declining number of students interested in football, Harris said.

Schools across the state are moving to eight-man football teams, including two others in the district's conference - Superior and Tri county.

In other business, the district planned the format for its Dec. 10 meeting when it will hear from three vendors for the school's Phase I renovation.

Each vendor will have one hour to present a plan that fits within the district's design-build construction model and estimated cost of \$3.5 million for Phase I. Vendors will discuss their timelines as well.

An eight-member committee was selected to make recommendations to the board, which will take place at a second meeting, Dec. 14. The vendors will be ranked from one to three and negotiated with in that order.

The Design-Build Selection Recommendation Committee includes one teacher, Diane Jacobsen. The other members are Anne Baden, Scott Harms, Rob Marsh, Thad Mumm, Chad Oswald, Dawn Thieme and Tyler Watson.

Although the committee will make its recommendations to the school board, the board will have the final say to begin Phase I.

In October, the board listened to Clarks Enersen Partners describe how the district could efficiently expand and renovate to include the primary grades.

Bridge to be finished by late 2016

Thayer County Commissioner Dave Bruning reached out to the Nebraska Department of Roads for an update on First Street bridge, which was roughly scheduled for bid-letting in December.

"I know a lot of people are getting impatient," Bruning said because the bridge is a thoroughfare for local residents to the hospital and farmers who are hauling grain.

Bruning spoke to NDOR Local Project Engineer Larry Legg.

"I kind of let him know we're getting impatient. We want to see something happening," Bruning said.

The bridge, a casualty of the May 7 flooding, will be raised from its original height and lengthened, requiring NDOR to acquire land on each side.

Plans for the bridge are finished and must pass through four offices for approval, Bruning said.

"They will then do the bid-letting in February," he said. "They still plan on finishing in October of 2016."

Although it's over a year out, Bruning said the timeline is quicker than most federal aid projects. In addition, the Corps of Engineers has lended its approval.

Bruning said he also asked Legg if the county could have completed the bridge sooner than the state. The answer was yes, but the expense would have been much higher.

As it stands, the county will owe approximately \$300,000, or 20 percent of the estimated \$1.5 million bridge project. The remaining 80 percent will come from the federal government.

In a related matter, the county laid extra gravel in addition to its regular maintenance of the roads.

Bruning said a total of 34,000 yards of gravel were used on county roads this year.

1885

130 Years Ago

THE FIRE FIEND—A Fire Destroys All the Buildings Along the South Side of Lincoln Avenue, in Block 15, Except Three--Loss Heavy and Insurance Light.

Never before in the history of Hebron has the town suffered a disaster equal to the one of Thursday morning, Nov. 19.

About half past 2 o'clock in the morning, a fire was discovered by A. J. Skipper in the back part of Segin's bakery. He cried out "fire," and Lewis Schiefendecker ran to the engine house to give the signal. Finding the wire attached to the bell broken, he climbed to the roof and rang the bell giving the alarm. A crowd of people soon gathered, and a strong effort was made to subdue the flames, which were now burning with great fierceness, but without success, the engine of the fire company not working well, as the packing on the plungers was soon cut by the rust in the cylinders.

From Segin's bakery, the flames rapidly spread east and west, destroying the buildings with fearful rapidity.

All that could be done with the limited appliances at hand was done by hundreds of willing hands. There was plenty of water in the town cistern, and the number of the town pumps afforded considerable help. But Malowney and Wilson's reservoir did more for the preservation of J. M. Bennett's double building next to the First National Block, than anything else, and without it these two buildings would have gone with the rest. But this splendid supply of water would have been useless had it not been for F. J. Hendershot. No one present (J. J. Malowney was away) knew where the valve was. Mr. Hendershot climbed into the tower in the dark, and with much risk hunted around until he found a lever, then with his whole weight he opened the valve and dropped in the dark a distance of 10 or 12 feet. With the abundant supply of water this afforded, the first was checked in its eastern course.

The fire rapidly spread westward in its destructive course until it reached J. E. Thomas's store. It seemed then as if human energy and determination had resolved to stay its further progress. Never did men work with more heroic effort or grander determination. The building was a mass of flames and was only four feet from the lodge building, but after a terrible struggle between men and fire the lodge building was saved.

There were more gallant acts. The members of the fire company performed their duty nobly. Among those who deserve special mention for gallant conduct are Ed Rapalje, Wm. Tait, C. C. Fletcher, J. H. Lynch, Will Ellison, Henry Burgess, W. D. Galbraith, Noah Bristol, J. W. Hughes, J. H. Boyle, E. E. Dunmire, Bethscheider Brothers, A. J. Clute, H. W.

Werner, O. P. and Sherman Hendershot, Fred Hohensee and J. F. Gates.

But not alone to men should credit be given for heroic effort, even the ladies worked with an energy and bravery equal to the Carthaginian women when they cut off their lovely tresses to make bow-strings so that arrows might be sent against the invading Roman legions. Among the ladies most noticeable for their work were the Miss Lowrie, Mrs. Carrick, Mrs. F. J. Brown, Mrs. Mall, Mrs. J. F. Gates, Mrs. O. M. Boyd and Mrs. W. J. Green. They carried water, pumped, took goods from the burning buildings, and rendered themselves generally helpful. Not least among the good work of the women was the preparation of coffee by the three first mentioned ladies for the tired men.

THE LOSSES: It is, of course, impossible at this time to give an accurate schedule of the losses, the total amount will reach about \$30,000.

E. M. Correll lost the Journal office, a new building costing \$1,200, four presses, a large quantity of news print and printing material, besides three small buildings in the rear of his printing office. Insurance, \$1,500. Considerable type, one job press and some other machinery was saved.



National Rural Health Day

In a state like Nebraska, access to quality health care in rural communities is a major concern. Approximately two-thirds of the 1.88 million people in Nebraska live in the eastern one-fourth of the state. The remaining communities west of this section are than considered to be rural.

Rural communities in Nebraska don't usually have the same doctor to patient ratio for medical services, primary care physicians, and specialists as in the urban areas of the state. One of the main causes of physician shortages in rural communities is the decreased ability of small towns to recruit and retain physicians.

Recruitment challenges are fairly obvious. There are less social amenities, career opportunities for spouses, and educational choices in rural communities. Recruiting a physician who was not raised in a rural community can also be challenging. Even after a new physician is recruited, it may be difficult to retain them if they did not grow up in a rural community.

Studies have also shown that workload can be a big influence on retention. Rural physician usually have a busier workload because they are often one of a few or the only physicians in the area. On average, a rural physician sees more patients than their peers in an urban practice. In addition, fewer physicians mean more time on-call for rural provider.

To help with this shortage of healthcare professionals in the rural areas; the University of Nebraska Medical (UNMC) and the state of Nebraska have worked together to establish programs that entice students going into healthcare careers to "go rural."

Rural high school students are educated about rural health opportunities by the Rural Health Education Network. They learn about the rural career opportunities available. The Rural Health Opportunities program reserves spots in the professional schools for graduating high school students if they make a commitment to return to a rural community in



the state.

In addition, UNMC sends medical students into rural areas after their first year of medical school. This is designed not only to observe and practice medicine, but also to live in a rural community and experience rural life. Third year students spend an eight-week rotation in rural areas with the same goals in mind.

Throughout the year, Thayer County Health Services hosts medical students during one of their rotations. These rotations can vary from just a few weeks to a couple of months. If you should meet one of the medical students doing a rotation at the hospital or clinic, be sure to welcome them and let them know the positive benefits of living in a rural community.

Thayer County is fortunate to have a highly trained and dedicated medical staff that have chosen to be rural healthcare providers. They provide exceptional care to patients at the hospital in Hebron and work together to cover the schedules at six medical clinics: Bruning, Chester, Davenport, Deshler, Hebron and Milligan. With the addition of Dr. Leann Heinrichs, Thayer County Health Services now has four Family Physicians on staff and three mid-level providers. In addition, Angie Albert, PMHNP provides behavioral health therapy services through the Hebron Medical Clinic.

As we celebrate Rural Health Day, we want to also thank Leann Heinrichs, M.D., Bryan Hubl M.D., Scott Vonderfecht M.D., Randy Waldman M.D., Maggie Johnson-PAC, Brent Madsen-PAC, Kay Elting-APRN, and Angie Albert, PMHNP for choosing to be a rural healthcare provider.

Hidden expenses that can sink your wedding budget

In the days of yore, the responsibility of paying for a wedding fell to the bride's parents. But that tradition has largely fallen by the wayside in recent years, when more and more couples have used their own savings to finance their weddings. Few couples enter the process of planning their weddings unaware of just how expensive weddings can get, but costs can easily begin to escalate if couples are not careful.

Couples know that certain wedding expenses, such as the cost of booking a reception hall, will eat up a large portion of their budgets. But there are some hidden expenses that couples must build into their budgets to avoid finding themselves in debt as they walk down the aisle as husband and wife.

Taxes: Sales tax might not seem so significant when you're buying everyday items, but the taxes add up quickly when paying for a wedding. Depending on where you live, state and local sales tax can exceed 9 percent in the United States, and some Canadians pay as much as 15 percent in combined sales taxes depending on where they live. Before signing contracts with any vendors, couples should get the price including sales tax written into their contracts, as failing to do so may result in a several thousand dollar surprise when the time to pay up arrives.

Gratuities: Gratuities are another potentially hefty expense that often takes engaged couples by surprise as they start to plan their weddings. Some reception halls build gratuities for staff into their estimates, and these tips for the staff can be as high as 25 percent at some venues. But even if gratuities for reception hall staff are already accounted for, don't forget to include tips for additional vendors the day of the wedding. Couples may be expected to tip the florist, photographer, band or deejay and even the reception hall maitre d' if his or her gratuity is not included in the aforementioned staff tip. Brides-to-be typically tip their hairstylist and makeup artist on the day of the wedding as well.

Postage: Couples who plan to invite guests via email or online invitations can skirt the cost of postage. But many couples still prefer traditional paper invitations, which include return envelopes that tradition suggests should also be stamped. Save-the-date cards have grown in popularity as well, and these cards must also be stamped and mailed. Depending on the size of your guest list, postage can cost several hundred dollars before you mail your last invitation. And don't forget to save some money for postage to mail thank-you cards once the big day has come and gone.

Overtime: Overtime fees for reception hall staff and additional outside vendors are typically written into contracts, but few couples imagine needing more than the predetermined allotment of time noted in their contracts. But it's better to be safe than sorry, as unanticipated events such as a misplaced wedding license or heavy traffic on the way to the venue can force the party to start late and thus extend past its deadline. Set aside some money for overtime so you don't find yourselves scrounging for dollars or charging the extra few hundred dollars on your credit cards.

Weddings are expensive, and even more so when hidden fees start to make their presence felt. Couples who build such fees into their budgets will find it easier to avoid breaking the bank than those who don't.

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

USDA Provides Funding For Water Conservation In Ogallala Aquifer



Ogallala Aquifer Initiative Adds Focus Area in Nebraska

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack recently announced USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will invest about \$8 million in the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative in Fiscal Year 2016 to help farmers and ranchers conserve billions of gallons of water annually while strengthening agricultural operations.

NRCS launched the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative (OAI) in 2011 to reduce aquifer water use, improve water quality and enhance the economic viability of croplands and rangelands in Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, New Mexico, Texas, South Dakota and Wyoming.

Nebraska currently has Ogallala Aquifer Initiative project areas in the Central Platte, Little Blue, and Upper Big Blue Natural Resources Districts. An additional project area in the Middle Republican Natural Resources District has been added for Fiscal Year 2016 (see map). The total Ogallala Aquifer Initiative

project investment in Nebraska for Fiscal Year 2016 is \$2.4 million.

The Ogallala Aquifer is the largest aquifer in the U.S. and includes nearly all of Nebraska and sections of Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, and Wyoming. It is the primary water source for the High Plains region. Covering nearly 174,000 square miles, it supports the production of nearly one-fifth of the wheat, corn, cotton, and cattle produced in the U.S. and supplies 30 percent of all water used for irrigation in the U.S.

According to Nebraska State Conservationist Craig Derickson, Nebraska is ahead of the curve when it comes to managing groundwater in the Ogallala Aquifer.

"Thanks to the Natural Resources Districts' management of groundwater, the Ogallala Aquifer in Nebraska is in good shape. The work the NRDs are doing to manage groundwater in a sustainable way is far ahead of other regions within the Aquifer making them the perfect

conservation partner for the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative," Derickson said.

The newly approved Middle Republican Natural Resource District project area includes Hayes, Hitchcock, and Red Willow counties, and part of Frontier and Lincoln counties. The project will enable participants to voluntarily implement practices to conserve irrigation water and improve groundwater quality.

Nationwide, the Natural Resources Conservation Service will target nearly \$8 million to support local efforts to conserve the quality and quantity of water in nine focus areas through the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative (OAI). These projects include building soil health by using cover crops and no-till, which allow the soil to hold water longer and buffer roots from higher temperatures; improving the efficiency of irrigation systems; and implementing prescribed grazing to relieve pressure on stressed vegetation.

NRCS is working with farmers and ranchers to help them implement proven conservation solutions on targeted landscapes to improve the quality of water and soil, increase water supplies, increase the infiltration of water into the ground, and make lands more resilient to drought.

NRCS analysis of Environmental Quality Incentives Program conservation projects in the region, including those implemented through OAI, estimated reduced water withdrawals of at least 1.5 billion acre-feet, or 489 billion gallons of water, from 2009 through 2013 and an energy savings equivalent of almost 33 million gallons of diesel fuel due to reduced irrigation.







Thayer Central holds "Tribute to Our Veterans"



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Father Hupp WMA Temporarily Closed to Protect Whooping Cranes

Father Hupp Wildlife Management Area (WMA) is temporarily closed effective immediately due to the presence of six endangered whooping cranes. The closure will be lifted once the cranes have left the area.

Father Hupp WMA is located 2 1/2 miles west of Bruning in Thayer County.

The closure is a standard procedure for the Commission once whooping cranes are confirmed on a property owned or managed by the agency. "We value the outdoor opportunities our properties provide to hunters and other recreationists, but our WMAs also provide valuable habitat to an array of wildlife, including threatened and endangered species," said Scott Taylor, the Commission's wildlife division administrator. "This temporary closure is intended

to not only protect whooping cranes, but to also protect the public from accidentally disturbing or harming the birds, which is illegal under federal and state law."

Whooping cranes are an endangered species and their wild population totals only about 300 individuals. The entire population migrates through Nebraska each spring and fall between wintering sites along the Texas coast and breeding areas in northern Alberta. Whooping cranes are protected by both the federal Endangered Species Act and the Nebraska Nongame and Endangered Species Conservation Act. Penalties for killing, possessing, or harassing whooping cranes or other species protected under these laws may include fines of up to \$50,000, up to year in jail, or both.
