Food Bank of Lincoln puts food on the table

Since 1982, the Food Bank of Lincoln has been committed to alleviating hunger in Southeast Nebraska, explained public relations director Alex Shada last week as he visited with Thayer County Commissioners Dave Bruning, Chris Frye and Dean Krueger. "We deliver food to Blue Valley Community Action, partner with Catholic Social Services to hold a food distribution service,

oversee the distribution of food-filled backpacks for 22 students at Thayer Central schools and offer assistance in helping low-income individuals apply for SNAP (food stamps) benefits," Shada said. "We serve 16 counties in Nebraska."

More than 11 percent of the population in Thayer County is food-insecure, Shada added. "Many are children who are not sure how or when they will get their next meal."

Which is how the BackPack Program was started. Food-filled backpacks are given to students in need of food over the weekend. The program primarily targets students who qualify for their school's Free Lunch Program.

Many of these students rely on their school's breakfasts and lunches for their most nutritious meals of the day, Shada added. "In some cases, these are their only meals of the day. These students are then faced with a food crisis over the weekend."

The BackPack Program is a way to help these students and their families until students return to school on Monday. Currently, the BackPack Program sends over 3,000 backpacks home to students on Friday afternoons in 30 Lincoln Public Schools. five Lincoln Catholic schools and 39 rural communities in southeast Nebraska. According to a fact sheet, the Food Bank of Lincoln distributed over 112,464 backpacks in 2011.

The Food Bank also works with Catholic Social Services of Southern Nebraska to hold mobile pantries in 11 communities in the service area. Distribution takes place every three months on a rotating basis at a variety of sites including a Knights of Columbus Hall, the 4-H building at a county fairground, a National Guard Armory, and several Catholic parish halls. In Hebron, the distribution takes place on the third Wednesday of the designated month at the Sacred Heart Catholic Church hall. November's distribution was one week early due to the Thanksgiving holiday. The next distribution will be Jan. 23, from noon to 1 p.m. "Food will be available to anybody in need," Shada said, "and all are encouraged to attend. There are 600 people receiving food in Thayer County; almost 12 percent









the month of November. "All food goes to the Blue Valley Community Action in Hebron," said manager Lonnie Kolar.

Pounds of food will be written down as donated to the BVCA, he said. The top three weights win prizes including a sandwich platter and gift card from local Subway owner Jeff Overturf and Kolar for first place; a gift certificate to Central Market from owner Steve Anderson for second place; and a Hebron Car Wash key from owner Terry Burkey for third place.

Kolar said he is also looking for someone to donate a cow and a group to cover the cost of processing it for BVCA. "They are in need of meat," he said.

EHD affects deer numbers...

As of 9:30 a.m., Monday, Nov. 19, the final day for firearm season check-in, hunters had turned in 454 tags at the local Shell Food Mart station in Hebron. Firearm season ended Nov. 18.

Manager Delores Boman said the number is way down possibly due to the EHD disease. "People just aren't seeing any," she said. Last year the local check-in center recorded 599 tags, which was down slightly from 2010 numbers. The season was also extended by a couple days due to the "earn-a-buck" program, but no such extension occurred this year.

Epizootic hemorrhagic disease continues to kill deer across Nebraska, with nearly 5,000 reported deaths attributed to the disease in the past few weeks. The acute, infectious, viral disease is often fatal and is spread by biting flies.



During this month, we also seek to express our gratitude to the family members and caretakers who love and comfort those afflicted, and we all should renew our commitment to finding a cure to this devastating disease.

The greatest risk factor for Alzheimer's disease is age. Scientists are studying how other factors such as family history, nutrition, environment, and education, also affect an individual's risk for Alzheimer's disease. The National Institutes of Health and the Department of Veterans Affairs continue to conduct research to better prevent, detect, and treat Alzheimer's disease and provide information and support to caretakers and families.

Important facts about Alzheimer's disease:

• 5.4 million Americans are living with Alzheimer's disease.

· One in eight older Americans has Alzheimer's disease.

• Alzheimer's disease is the sixth-leading cause of death in the United States and the only cause of death among the top 10 in the United States that cannot be prevented, cured or even slowed.

• More than 15 million Americans provide unpaid care valued at \$210 billion for persons with Alzheimer's and other dementias.

· Payments for care are estimated to be \$200 billion in the United States in 2012.

Clinicians can now diagnose Alzheimer's disease with up to 90 percent accuracy. But



it can only be confirmed by an autopsy, during which pathologists look for the disease's characteristic plaques and tangles in brain tissue.

Clinicians can diagnose "probable" Alzheimer's disease by taking a complete medical history and conducting lab tests, a physical exam, brain scans and neuro-psychological tests that gauge memory, attention, language skills and problem-solving abilities.

Proper diagnosis is critical since there are dozens of other causes of memory problems. Some memory problems can be readily treated, such as those caused by vitamin deficiencies or thyroid problems. Other memory problems might result from causes that are not currently reversible, such as Alzheimer's disease.

Currently, there is no cure for Alzheimer's disease. Researchers are continually testing the effectiveness of various drug therapies that will control symptoms; slow, reduce and/or reverse mental and behavioral symptoms; and prevent or halt the disease.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved several medications for the treatment of Alzheimer's disease. Some of these medications can be used alone or in combination, and can provide some relief of symptoms and may slow the decline in mental function to some extent.





Turkey Anytime: Be Safe Turning Leftovers into Planned-Overs


Part of the pleasure of a Thanksgiving or other holiday meal is the aroma of a turkey baking in your oven. Continue that great feeling by planning a variety of pleasing postholiday meals with leftover turkey. Handle holiday foods safely to avoid a trip to the hospital like some of my friends awhile back.

From the time you take the turkey out of the oven, you have two hours to serve it, eat it, and then refrigerate or freeze the leftovers — the turkey, stuffing and gravy. Why just two hours? Because bacteria that cause food poisoning can multiply to dangerous levels on perishable food left longer than two hours at room temperature.

It is important to take out all of the stuffing from the turkey soon after you remove the bird from the oven. Extra stuffing can be kept hot in the oven at 200° F while you eat, or should be refrigerated within two hours of cooking. Cut the turkey meat off the bones.

Store leftovers properly to prevent bacterial growth. Large quantities should be divided into smaller portions and stored in several small or shallow covered containers that are less than two inches high. That's because food in small amounts will get cold more quickly. The temperature of the refrigerator should be 40° F or slightly below.

Leftover turkey will keep in the refrigerator for three to




For longer storage, package turkey in freezer paper or heavy-duty aluminum foil and freeze them. Proper wrapping will prevent freezer burn. Freezer burn is white, driedout patches on the surface of food that make it tough and tasteless.

Don't forget to date your packages and use the oldest ones first. Frozen, cooked turkey, should be used within four to six months, and stuffing and gravy should be used within one month. Foods frozen longer than recommended remain safe but may become dry and lose flavor.

of the population in this county are food-insecure."

Shada said food-insecure means they aren't sure where their next meal is coming from. "This is pretty consistent with other counties," he said.

In 2011, the Bank collected 8,477,447 pounds of food for distribution and provided 6,416,582 meals, or 17,580 meals per day.

The Food Bank delivers bags of grocery staples to **Community Action Programs** in under-served counties on a monthly basis. The bags are made up primarily of government commodity vegetables, fruits, proteins, cereals and juices, which can be quickly and easily distributed to families by program staff. Bag distribution from the Food Bank of Lincoln go to Lincoln Action Program of Saunders County; Southeast Nebraska Community Action of Richardson and Nemaha counties;

and Blue Valley Community Action of Jefferson, Fillmore, Thayer, Butler, Polk, and Saline Counties.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), formerly known as the Food Stamp Program, helps low-income people and families buy the food they need for good health. The SNAP Outreach Program, at the Food Bank of Lincoln, provides food stamp information and application assistance, as another means of providing meals to the community's most vulnerable families. In 2011, the Food Bank of Lincoln provided \$637,014 in benefits.

"Our plea is for suggestions on how we can help your county," Shada said to the commissioners during the meeting. "The current need is great, and we rely heavily on local support to help those who are struggling to put food on the table during the holidays."



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Coach Wiedel steps down...

In an interview, Wiedel reminisced on his short time as a walk-on kicker for coach Tom Osborne at the University of Nebraska. There's not a better model for a coach, Wiedel said. "There's no parallel. There's nothing like he is,' said Wiedel, with a laugh.

Wiedel finishes his career with 486 wins, and led 13 teams to the state volleyball tournament. His 2010 Thayer Central club finished third. In 1978, he led then-Hebron High School to a runner-up finish in Class C.

"Twenty-five years is a long time, when you look back on it. The thing that we've been really fortunate in is that kids have bought into the program," he said. "They understand, whether we like it or not, the amount of effort it takes.

"Volleyball is not a sport, these days, that you can play just within the season to be successful. You've got to keep your skills sharp. In 25 years, I've had a lot of kids buy into that philosophy and buy into that system."

His latest team finished 22-8 and went out in the first round of the state tournament. But, he feels like he's leaving the program in a place where it can be successful.

"I wanted to make sure I stepped down at a time that the kids would still be a competitive team there. We're going to have six starters back, and I really feel that it was just the

right move," he said. "These seniors this year, they were my managers way back when they were in third and fourth grade. I wanted to follow them through. The kids that are juniors this year, I know they're going to be competitive next year. It will be a good time to get a new coach in so that there will be some success there, and can start to build that next program.'

Wiedel is proud of what his volleyball program has done for the players over the years.

"When you look at the full picture and you say to yourself, 'I never won a state title.' We got to state often, but I think we've produced kids that take their work effort that they have learned from playing a simple game of volleyball, and they've applied them to their school or their job," he said. "That's the only thing that matters in life. When I look back, we've been able to teach kids hard work does pay off. It's not just about sports, it's about life.'
