Student leaders take action for health, coalition hosts event

Nothing but energy and leaders.

It was the tone for Leadership Day, an event coordinated by the Thayer County Healthy Communities Coalition in an effort to gather local speakers to send a message to students in the sixth through eighth grades about leadership.

Students from all county schools attended and heard from keynote speaker, Taylor Siebert, founder of Striv TV; Ted Norder of Norder Supply; and Jolene Harms of MetalQuest.

Striv TV publishes live streams of high school sports events — a job



that didn't exist before Siebert created it.

Siebert said many of the jobs students will see in the future aren't a reality today.

Norder posed examples of leadership needed in business, including humility.

Humility is a quality at every age and in leadership, Norder told the students.

Harms focused on strengths.

Different people have different strengths to rely on for efficiency and leadership, she said.

Strategies for truancy start young

The Three-Year Juvenile Services Plan (2018-2021), which required the approval of the Thayer County Commissioners for funding and county attorney Dan Werner's role as the plan's chair, follows children from Head Start age and perhaps earlier, given the plan's inclusion of parenting classes, through high school.

Its intent is to curb truancy while increasing attendance, utilizing priorities and strategies that attack a wide variety of risky behaviors observed in both students and adults.

A committee formed in May, and consists of leaders from Thayer Central, Bruning-Davenport and Deshler schools, Werner, probation, Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA), and others, and has since expanded to include the ministerial association and a health care representative.

The Thayer County Commissioners approved \$7,000 and the three schools will pick up the remainder until the program is fully funded in 2019-2020 because of the plan.

"It monitors attendance of all children early on," Werner said. "It is preventative and intended to start with young children and follow them through high school."

Actions the county and schools have taken in the past haven't been successful, Werner added.

"We have criminally prosecuted parents for not getting their kids to school and children have been removed, but we would really like to do something preventative," Werner said.

The plan involves two to three strategies under each priority with statistics on drug and alcohol abuse,

truancy and suicide.

For example, only a little over 35 percent of seniors would tell their parents if they were depressed or suicidal, according to responses provided by youth for the Nebraska Risk and Protective Factors study in 2016. About 42 percent of seniors said they drank alcohol in the past 30 days without their parents' permission.

The goal is to educate, engage and involve parents in their children's lives and programs.

One of the priorities is to gain community support for students with behavioral and mental health issues by implementing resources, such as multi-systemic therapy for children on probation. The MST is a family driven treatment designed to keep children in the home.

Agencies like Thayer County Health Services and Blue Valley Behavioral Health would provide local access for counseling to treat anxiety, depression, substance abuse, anger management, trauma and conflict in the family.

A Deshler graduate, Kelsey Koranda was recently added to TCHS as a behavioral health clinician who uses Eye Movement desensitization and Reprocessing. Her office is open to all ages.

The schools also offer services with Thayer Central and Bruning-Davenport through Educational Services Unit No. 5 and referrals to TCHS Behavioral Health. Deshler has a social worker. All schools have a full time guidance counselor and continue to offer training in suicide prevention and domestic violence signs and prevention.

The teammates program at Thayer Central and Deshler also

plays a part in student wellness.

Blue Valley Community Action Partnership provides of "Circle of Security," an eight-week parenting program to build relationships in the family and strengthen the feelings of security and confidence for children.

The plan calls for more suicide prevention and mental health first aid training of professionals.

As far as attendance, the Nebraska Department of Education placed the three schools above the 95th percentile for attendance. Deshler was at 100 percent for graduation; Thayer Central at 94.74 percent and Bruning-Davenport had a 93.75 graduation rate.

Initially, the school will try and visit with students and parents to determine why students aren't attending school.

"In the upper grades, we'll take further action," Werner said. "As always, the schools can forward cases to the county attorney for the court system to be involved."

If families are referred to the court, there are alternatives to detention, such as support to learn coping skills, conflict resolution, family goals and safety plans for when situations escalate at home.

The electronic monitoring system is ordered by the court and helpful in supervision for students who live at home. The plan also lists trackers, who are people working with families for success, but are increasing accountability for students at the same time.

Data shows 18 percent of children in the county live below the poverty line and 24.6 percent of seniors live with someone who is mentally ill.

1888

130 Years Ago

Corn picking is near at hand and the visible wealth of Nebraska will be increased with each resounding "thump" of the yellow ears against the "slingboard" of the wagon. The farmer will dip his fingers in the tar and "sail on" to pick his 50 bushels per acre--and if he can't do it in this fall's crop he never will--while the women folks will be busy making rag mittens for the corn huskers. Never has Nebraska seen such corn as this year has brought forth.

Mr. Nelson Reed, of Deshler, called upon us Tuesday, to add his name to the list of old veterans who voted for Harrison in 1848. He said, "I cast my first vote for Harrison in 1840, and I hope to be able to vote for Harrison in 1888."

The heavyweight man of the Belvidere Tribune and the like-wise heavyweight democratic candidate for float representative had a set-to in Belvidere a few days since. No harm done, however. There is something edifying in the knowledge that two men occupying the position of the above gentlemen will engage in the dignified spectacle of a common schoolboy "scraping match."

A business house well worthy of mention is Mr. C. H. Morgan's Dry Goods House. Mr. Morgan has opened in Hebron a mammoth stock of dry goods exclusively. Each and every line is complete in every respect, and there is not a clearer, better, finer, well kept store in the west today than Mr. Morgan's.

The street commissioner has done some much-needed work at the crossing of Fifth Street and Union Avenue. Hebron boasts of the prettiest streets in the west.

Last Tuesday evening, Nov. 2, was the 10th anniversary of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Stewart, living about three miles northeast of Hebron. Mr. and Mrs. Stewart were in town during the evening and upon their return home found

their house taken possession of by a goodly number of neighbors who had conspired to give them a lively reception. The house was adorned with new tinware; the guests carried well filled baskets and everything conspired to make the remainder of the evening pass as "merry as a marriage bell."

Safely enjoy firearm deer hunting this season

The November firearm deer season is one of the most anticipated times of the year for Nebraska hunters. Despite the many opportunities across the state to harvest a deer this season, hunter safety in the field remains critical.

"Hunting remains one of the safest activities to participate in, but there are always a few key things to consider while afield," said Nebraska Hunter Education Coordinator Jackson Ellis.

-- Always keep your muzzle pointed in a safe direction, safety on, and finger off the trigger until ready to fire.

-- Properly identify your target and what lies beyond it before pulling the trigger; never shoot at sounds or movement.

-- All deer hunters are required to wear 400 square inches of blaze orange on their head, chest and back

during the November firearm season, regardless if they are hunting with a firearm or archery tackle.

-- Be sure to unload firearms before travelling in a motorized vehicle and before crossing obstacles such as barbed-wire fences, creeks or steep embankments.

-- When hunting from a tree stand or elevated platform, always maintain three points of contact when ascending or descending, pull gear up with a haul line, and wear a Fall Arrest System (safety harness).

chelle was recognized at the Caring Kind Luncheon held during the NHA Annual Convention in La Vista.

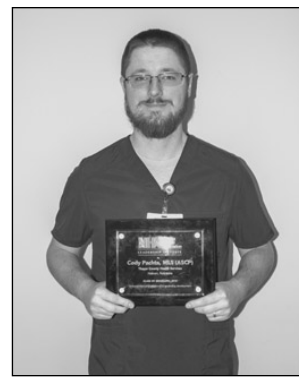

Nov. 15 - Rural Health Day



Rural communities are a wonderful place to live and work. This is why over 60 million people (nearly 1 in 5 Americans) call them home. These small towns, farming communities and ranches are places where neighbors know each other, listen to each other, respect each other and work together toward the greater good. They are also some of the best places to start a business and test your "entrepreneurial spirit". These communities provide the rest of the country with a wealth of services and commodities and they are a big part of why the United States is a world economic power.

These rural communities also have unique healthcare needs. Today, more than ever, rural communities must address accessibility issues, lack of health care providers, the needs of an aging population, suffering from a greater number of chronic conditions, and larger percentages of uninsured and underinsured residents. Rural hospitals, which are large contributors to the local economy and the primary providers of health care, struggle daily as declining reimbursement rates and disproportionate funding levels make it challenging to serve their patients.

To recognize the important role healthcare plays in sustaining the quality of life in rural America, each year November 15th is designated as National Rural Health Day. A day to celebrate the health care professionals practicing in rural communities so we can live the "Good Life."

This year, Thayer County Health Services especially wants to take the time to recognize the important role their five Rural Health Clinics (RHCs) play in meeting the healthcare needs of Thayer County and the surrounding communities.

What is a Rural Health Clinic (RHC)? The RHC designation was created by

the Federal government to increase access to primary care services for patients in rural communities. To receive certification, an RHC must be located in rural, underserved areas. They are required to use a team approach of physicians working with non-physician providers such as nurse practitioners (NP) or physician assistants (PA). The program, which oversees these clinics, requires they be staffed at least 50 percent of the time with a NP or a PA. RHCs are required to provide outpatient primary care services and basic laboratory services.

As of August 2018, there are more than 4,300 RHCs in the United States. The five medical clinics operated by Thayer County Health Services in Bruning, Chester, Davenport, Deshler and Hebron are all RHCs. The main advantage of having an RHC status is the organization receives enhanced reimbursement rates for providing Medicare and Medicaid services. RHCs are reimbursed by an all-inclusive rate for medically-necessary primary health services and qualified preventive health services furnished by their healthcare providers.

Thayer County Health Services is fortunate to have outstanding hospital and clinic staff working with their highly trained primary care providers; Dr. Bryan Hubl, Dr. Leann Heinrichs, Maggie Johnson, PAC, Wendy VanSkiver, PAC and now Jarie Sones, APRN-FNP.

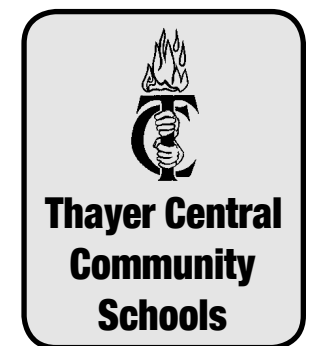
