"Tribute to Veterans" presented by Thayer Central

Attention was called to eight veterans during the Thayer Central "Tribute to Veterans" to commemorate Veterans Day and 100 years since the ending of the first World War.

Handmade Quilts of Valor were presented to the veterans, a continuation of the foundation project that began in 2003 to "cover service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor."

Thayer Central's program began with the Rhythmairs performing the national anthem under the direction of Sam Zitterkopf. Kindergarten students signed the lyrics.

Veterans in the audience were asked to stand for their branch of service as a medley of service songs was played by the Thayer Central band directed by Emily Seifert.

"In Flanders Fields" was presented by Dylan Fischer and Keegan Casey, who also closed the program with a solo of "Taps."

Leah Lammers, Hebron High alumni from the Class of 1978, sang "American Anthem" accompanied by Ila Curry on piano, as area veterans were recognized on a screen.

The Quilt presentation was made by sixth grade students, the Class of 2025. The veterans who received quilts were:

Stanley Arthur Hoffmeyer — originally from Deshler and now of Trumbull, Hoffmeyer entered into the US Navy shortly after graduation in 1965.

He was in Special Forces and a Navy Beachmaster Unit 2 radio man RM-4. He served from 1965 to 1968.

Hoffmeyer fought proudly for the United States in Hue, Fubi, Dong Ha and Quang Tri Provinces. He was honorably discharged in 1968.

His quilt was pieced by Delainey Mumm, quilted by Carli Johnson and bound by Kaye Mussmann.

Dale Edwin Pletcher — Dale Pletcher of Alexandria joined the US Army Nov. 28, 1950. He served in Korea.

Pletcher completed leadership training at Fort Riley, Kan., and was stationed at Camp Carlson in Colorado at the time of his discharge in 1952.

He received the United Nations Service Medal with one Overseas Bar and the Korean Service Medal with four Bronze Stars.

His quilt was pieced by Thayer County Quilts of Valor. It was quilted and bound by Lori Werner.

Ronald Raymond Hintz — Hintz enlisted in the US Army in June of 1961, right after high school at the age of 18.

He trained at Fort Riley, Kan., as a private. While in the army, Hintz was assigned to Temporary Duty Assignment (TDA). His assignments took him to Camp McCoy, Wis., Fort Dix, N.J., Little Creek, Va., Fort Carson, Colo., Fort Hood, Texas and California.

Hintz was stationed in Germany from 1963 to 1964, staying in barracks in Wildflecken and Berlin, Germany. He worked in personnel using a standard typewriter because electric typewriters had not been invented.

Hintz received the Marksmanship Medal while

Wittrock has held a number of post, district, state and national offices and appointments. He is a lifetime member in the VFW, AmVets, Disabled American Veterans and the American Legion.

Eagle Scout focuses on veterans

His interest in the graves of veterans was sparked while geocaching with his mother.

Sam Baysinger of Boy Scout Troop 175 became an Eagle Scout Nov. 3 in a ceremony at the Hebron Bible Church.

He and mom, Angela Baysinger, were geocaching at a cemetery near their home prior to Baysinger taking the project on.

"I researched a civil war soldier. The GAR (Grand Army of the Republic) had special privileges to the land. I thought that was pretty cool," Baysinger said. "I decided to research Belvidere. I think there are a total of 99 veterans there."

Research he did. Baysinger first had to gain approval for his Eagle Scout project that sought to identify military personnel buried in the cemetery.

After he identified them, Baysinger proposed special markers that would link the graves to an online database, known as the QR code for the Billion Graves website. He would provide background information on the soldiers for those researching the website.

"I got a list of veterans from the Thayer County Historical Society. Another Eagle Scout had done the research," he said.

Baysinger used the Billion Graves website for photographs of the soldiers' headstones.

"They're mapped out on the website," he said. "You can scan a grave marker with your phone and it will take you right to the website."

Billion Graves uses photographs and GPS technology for entries on its database. One volunteer can collect over 500 images in an hour. The website boasts a well organized group of people can map an average-sized cemetery in one afternoon.

Baysinger thanked those who helped and supported him with the project during a speech, including Jackie Williamson, curator of the Thayer County Museum.

"She was a help in finding documents on the veterans. Special thanks to her," he said.

He was also presented with his first official Bible by Angela Baysinger.

Introduction to CommonWell

CommonWell Health Alliance is a not-for-profit association dedicated to the vision that all patient data should be available to patients and providers regardless of where care occurs.

Since the emergence of electronic health records, providers have been challenged by the task of moving data between systems and technologies that are not able or willing to work together. CommonWell puts this within reach.

By retrieving data from remote points of care that were previously inaccessible, providers can easily access a more comprehensive picture of their patients' clinical histories. It provides a simple way to positively impact the quality and overall cost of care for providers and patients.

Thayer County Health Services is in the beginning stages of including the ability to interact with CommonWell through Cerner, our electronic health record vendor. About 18 months ago, TCHS joined the Nebraska Health Information Initiative (NeHII), which is a health information exchange designed to serve the state of Nebraska.



CommonWell is similar to NeHII except that it is nation-wide. Being a part of CommonWell will allow our providers to discover where patients have been seen across remote settings of care, review the clinical data, and select the information that will best improve the ability to care for patients from their available historical data.

An example of its usefulness would be a new patient comes to Thayer County Health Services where one of our providers doesn't have access to this patient's allergy list or medication history; utilizing CommonWell, the provider could potentially pull this vital information if the patient has seen a different provider.

More information will be released as the timeline gets finalized for full integration of CommonWell and Cerner at Thayer County Health Services. Thayer County Health Services - Exceptional Health, Close to Home.

Medicaid expansion passes in Nebraska

Nebraska became the 34th state Tuesday to expand access to Medicaid, the federal-state health insurance program for low-income people.

With just over 53 percent of the votes cast, Initiative 427 passed. It amends state law with the goal of bringing Medicaid coverage to an estimated 90,000 Nebraskans — ages 19 to 64 and under the federal poverty line — and creating jobs in the health care industry.

It's a win for the nonprofit Medicaid expansion organization Insure the Good Life, which pulled together more than 135,000 signatures this summer to put the initiative on the ballot. Insure the Good Life coupled with the nonprofit advocacy organization Nebraska Appleseed and others to campaign for affordable health care for Nebraskans who otherwise don't have or can't qualify for medical insurance.

"Nebraskans voted for a healthier future for our friends, neighbors and family members who have gone too long without the life-saving health care everyone needs," Nebraska Appleseed Executive Director Rebecca Gould said in a statement. "Because of you, lives will be saved and families have more hope without facing the terrible choice between physical suffering and financial collapse."

Gov. Pete Ricketts, who handily won re-election Tuesday, opposed the Medicaid expansion. With voter approval of the expansion, Ricketts and state lawmakers now will have to decide how the state pays for it. In late October, Ricketts said, "Medicaid expansion for able-bodied adults would make property tax relief nearly impossible and cut funding for education."

Under the expansion, 90-percent of Medicaid cost will be covered by the federal government and the state will have to make up the rest. Estimates show Nebraska's contribution will be \$18 million to \$20 million in

the state's budget in the first year of Medicaid expansion in the state.

State Sen. Lydia Brasch of Bancroft, who will be leaving the Legislature due to term limits, said, "Nebraskans could be forced to choose between increasing taxes or cutting funds to existing programs, such as K-12 education, roads, or current Medicaid benefits."

Her successor, Ben Hansen, who won the election in District 16, also opposes Medicaid expansion. Gould said after Tuesday's win for expanded Medicaid: "We encourage the Department of Health and Human Services to quickly develop a strategy to integrate these newly insured Nebraskans into our health care system, and the Legislature to implement the program without taking away resources from other essential responsibilities like education, child welfare or public services that help hard-working Nebraskans meet their other basic needs."

Implementing the expansion assures more Nebraskans will be insured in health care. According to a study by the Urban Institute, the 12.4 percent of Nebraskans without health insurance will drop to 9.6 percent under new Medicaid laws.

Health care jobs are also expected to rise. Insure the Good Life estimates 11,000 new jobs in the health care industry will be created in the coming years.

Nebraska hospitals, which lost \$175 million over the 1 year period, Insure the Good Life estimates 11,000 new jobs in the health care industry will occur in the coming years.

Nebraska hospitals, which lost \$175 million over the past two years from patients unable or unwilling to pay their bills, are also projected to recover over the next few years.

Now lawmakers will have to decide how the state will pay for its portion of expanded Medicaid.

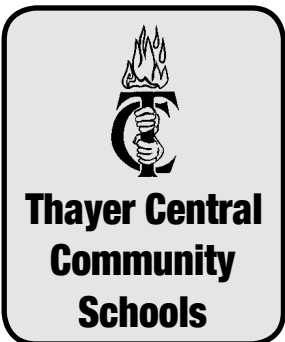

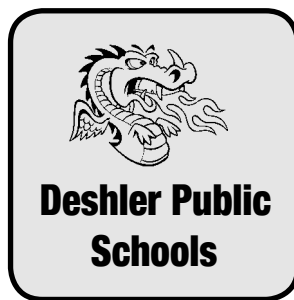

Hartington picked up its game in the final set to advance. The Titans lost, 15-9 to the Trojans, ending the season.



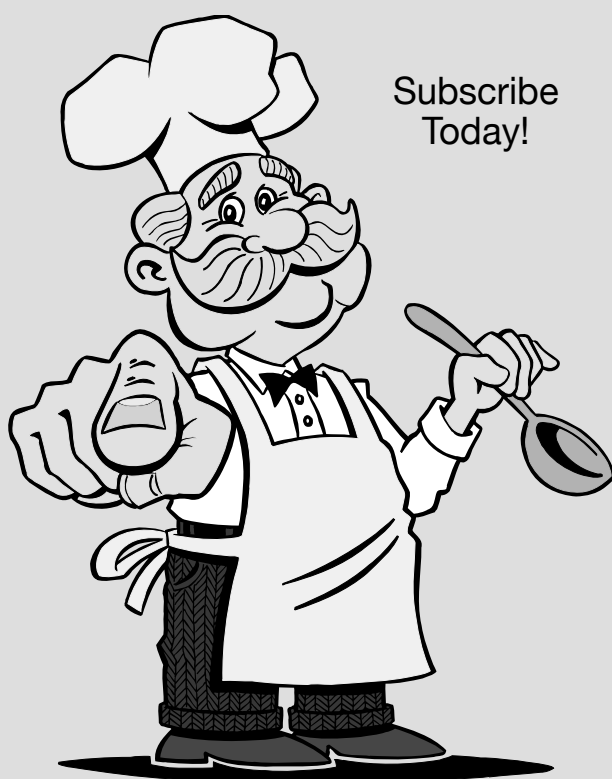

Participate in deer exchange to donate or receive venison

Nebraskans who want to donate or receive harvested deer can participate in the Deer Exchange.

This program is designed to accommodate the additional harvest of deer. It brings together hunters who have a surplus of deer with recipients willing to accept the deer meat.

The Deer Exchange, which is available annually from Sept. 1 through March 1, allows hunters and potential venison recipients to join a database and search for other participating parties in their area. Parties will work out the details of the transfer. While the venison cannot be sold, recipients may pay for the processing or butchering of the meat. Donors and recipients can register online for free.

Recipients will have the

choice of accepting whole field dressed deer, skinned and boned deer, wrapped and frozen deer or processed meat. Donors are responsible for properly field dressing and checking deer at a check station before transfer.

When transferring game animals, the hunter must provide the following information on a transfer tag: name, phone number, permit number or seal number, estimated weight of meat (in pounds), species of animal, date taken, signature of donor and name of recipient. A transfer tag is available on page 44 of the 2018 Big Game Guide. Go to Outdoor-nebraska.gov/guides.

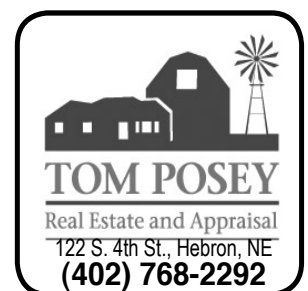

Forty high school students from Nebraska and Kentucky participated in this year's event. The symposium is designed to introduce youth to career opportunities and current issues in the beef industry, as well as offer education and a chance to practice leadership skills in a community setting.

This year, the symposium started on November 2 with a session introducing them to the beef industry in Nebraska from Dr. Galen Erickson. They then learned more about the beef carcass and how it is processed, tenderness factors, and flavor profiles from UNL meat science faculty.

The symposium continued on November 3rd with more in-depth information about the beef industry, meat science, marketing, and gave participants the opportunity to work with a professional chef in the kitchen.

All of the participants also received their Master of Beef Advocacy certification by completing the training developed by the National Cattlemen's Beef Association. By completing this training, they are now better equipped to tell the story of the beef lifecycle and answer questions about how beef is raised through advocacy efforts online and in their communities.

"It was a privilege to meet the outstanding young people from across Nebraska and Kentucky who participated in the symposium," said Alli Raymond, Animal Science Admissions Coordinator and NYBLS planning committee member. "Nebraska is the beef state and we are pleased to partner with all our sponsors to participate in the development of the future leaders of the beef

cattle industry."

The symposium featured hands-on production activities and leadership development. The students were guided by Dr. Gary Sullivan and Chef John Kennedy to develop a new product using one of the following cuts of meat: ground beef, the heart clod, or the flat iron steak. Participants created a marketing plan for their product and presented it to three judges who got to try their product and ask them

questions about their marketing plans.

The Nebraska Youth Beef Leadership Symposium is a truly unique opportunity for young people interested in the beef industry. It gives them skills and experiences that are not available from any other University in the country. 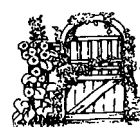
