New librarian settles in

Asking someone to name a favorite author is like asking a parent to name a favorite child, Hebron Secrest Library's new director, Chuck Reichwein said.

He does have favorites, like Edgar Allan Poe and Mark Twain, and is currently reading through Nebraska's 150 Book List.

"I have read about 100," he said. "I'm very interested in Nebraska authors."

Reichwein came to Hebron Nov. 12 to begin his position as director Nov. 13 after a train trip from Vancouver to Toronto, Canada. He is a traveler who has visited all states, provinces and over 100 countries.

"I have a collection of things from other countries — China, Russia and what used to be the USSR," he said. Reichwein is planning to display his collections at the library.

He comes to Hebron from the Shelby library, one of eight libraries in Nebraska attached to a public school. Children were by far the library's main customers.

He belongs to two other libraries, Stromsberg and Osecola, where he has family roots dating back to the late 1800's. Reichwein was also in two books clubs and he plans to continue that interest in Hebron.

Before Shelby, Reichwein, a graduate of the University of Nebraska-Kearney in business education, was an auditor for nearly 36 years in Des Moines, Iowa. After graduation, he lived for a time in Atlanta, Ga., working

at a law firm.

In Des Moines, Reichwein was instrumental in raising \$6.5 million to restore the First United Methodist Church downtown building, which was over 100 years old. He was on the finance committee for the project.

"We were able to raise enough, so that when it was completed, we didn't owe any money," he said.

Reichwein is a reader and that is what brought him to the Shelby and Hebron libraries.

"I love books. I've been a reader all my life and I thought it was a good fit," he said.

Reichwein is busy becoming familiar with library operations and his position.

"They do a wonderful job here. They know the patrons, what they like and they greet all of them by name," Reichwein said about his initial observations.

He said library staff also suggests books to patrons they think the patrons will enjoy reading.

"People don't have to come to the library," he said. "Our goal is to be friendly, welcoming and inclusive. We want everyone to come to the library."

The Shelby library was smaller in space, but had 1,700 DVDs in its collection. Reichwein would like to increase Hebron's DVD inventory.

He said he won't be making changes anytime soon.

"I'm happy to be here and excited about my new job. Come and find out our services and make use of them," he said.

Small business a hit at Region V

Just as Scott Michalak joked he is "Papa Scotty," Erin Onnen offered the name of her small business, "Erin's Magic Snacks."

"I never dreamed I'd have my own business," Onnen said about the candy vending machine in the courthouse.

For Michalak, "Papa Scotty's Pop Stop," means more than selling 60-cent cans of soda at the Stastny Community Center.

"It makes you feel good. My machine, my price, it's a decent price," he said.

Region V's building is an employment training center and teaches small business skills.

"We want to find everyone a job who would like a job," Tina Reed of Region V said. "The success has been wonderful."

In fact, Hebron is one of the top three Region V locations in the area for learning employment skills, Reed said.

If clients at the center want a job, they have to complete the center's Career Academy, where the consultants like Reed focus on helping clients discover what their likes are before honing in on job-specific skills.

"After they discover their likes, we figure out what is available. We check the internet and the newspaper," Reed said.

Clients also visit businesses and are sometimes matched with

jobs.

"We like to get our people out into the community. Some businesses don't advertise they need help," Reed said.

Clients are required to spend time in the community doing a variety of activities and having some fun, too, like going out to eat, or visiting horses and Crystal Springs recreation area.

Inside the center, skills taught cover restaurants, grocery stores, laundry work and career classes.

Reed said a handyman class was added. Clients learn the fundamentals of tools and how they work and measuring, among other skills.

Michalak takes the class and has learned how to use a power sander.

Humor is important to Michalak, who dishes out one-liners while he looks for a handshake.

"I keep a good relationship with people," he said.

Michalak told the Wednesday morning coffee crowd at D's Daylight Donuts about his business that includes another machine at the employment center in Fairbury. Region V also sells pop out of their location at 2nd and Olive Streets.

1887 130 Years Ago

Rev. Wells will occupy the M. E. pulpit at Carleton the coming year.

Rev. Hawley has been returned to Alexandria and Belvidere for another year by the M. E. conference.

Mrs. Marsh and Mrs. Green will act as deputy librarians of the Hebron Library Association during Mrs. Ferguson's visit east.

Rev. D. Fetz, who has been stationed at Carleton for the past three years as Pastor of the M. E. Church, has been stationed at Chester and Hubbell for the coming year.

M. A. Jones, a merchant of Imogene, Iowa, has arrived, and will become a resident of this place. He will reside in the building formerly known as the Metropolitan Hotel. He owns valuable property in Hebron.

Rev. Hacker and wife arrived from Indiana this morning. He will soon assume his duties as pastor of the Christian Church.

S. Fitzsimmons was admitted to citizenship by the district court at its last session.

The question of water-works for Hebron is becoming an important one. The dangerous season for fires is at hand, and the town has an adequate means of protection. We would like to see the Board of Trade submit the question to a life committee to present plans and estimates.

1897 120 Years Ago

Byron: J. L. Fitzgerald, who lives north of Byron, and recently lost his barn by fire, was the recipient of a happy and novel surprise last week. He was rebuilding his barn and had the roof on when a party of the Byron M. W. of A. invaded his dooryard one morning, armed with hatchets and hammers and mounting the roof, laid all the shingles on the same day before the sun was down. It was an act worthy of the time of Woodmen and Neighbor Fitzgerald realizes that fraternal spirit to a greater extent than ever before.

Carleton: Dr. McGee left Tuesday over land for Tecumseh, where he expects to locate for the practice of medicine...Little Walter Dobson was kicked by a horse last Sunday evening, crushing his skull, from the effects of which he died Tuesday. He was aged 5 years, 1 month and 26 days... We believe a majority of our town trustees are church members; some have classes in the Sunday school. And yet they will grant a man a permit to run a joint worse than any saloon, where drinking and gambling is carried on at all hours of the day and night. We wonder if this is an example set for their Sunday school scholars to follow...From three to five barrels of bottled beer received at the drug store each week for medical, political and mechanical purposes.

Davenport: The G.I. section house was sold to a party near Carlisle for \$60 and is being torn down this week preparatory to moving it.

1907 110 Years Ago

A letter is published in this issue from Michael Cruise at Vail, Ariz., where he, John Buller, Casper Klaes and Wm. Hiller drove to look over their mining interests. They have been joined by Henry Freund, who was formerly a Ford agent at this place. We hope the men will make millions out of their venture.

A delegation of citizens from Hubbell and Chester precincts appeared before the county commissioners Tuesday to change the route of one of the federal roads to pass through the southern part of the county, from Fairbury to Reynolds, Hubbell, Chester and on to Superior.

Mr. and Mrs. F. Oltsen, highly respected residents of Hebron, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary of Friday evening, Oct. 19.

1917

100 Years Ago

Will B. Aten formerly well known to the people of this community is First Lieut. in the army. His picture appeared in the State Journal last Friday. When transferred to France, Dr. Aten will be in the ambulance corps.

Joseph B. Little is pleasantly located in his new restaurant quarters third door north of the post office. Everything is conveniently arranged and modern and have all the equipment that is required for a first class cafe. He is worthy of a liberal patronage.

1927 90 Years Ago

Sheriff Geisler closed the school in Dist. No. 50, on account of diptheria. Miss Grace Stauber is the teacher. On Thursday morning Robert Koch, aged 7, who had been taken sick a week before, died from the dread disease at his home two miles north of Deshler. He had been attending school up to the time of his sickness. A private funeral was held Saturday. Another case has developed in an infant child at the home of Wm. Sorge about a mile west of the Koch place.

County Surveyor A. B. Thompson, who is 82 years young, called to renew his friendship to the Journal, and delighted us with his quaint reminiscences. Back in New York State, when he was younger and handsomer than now, he beat nine doctors who held a consultation over him and sentenced him to die—but the shirt that was made to bury him in, he later wore to a dance. For 30 years Mr. Thompson was a civil engineer, constructing buildings, bridges, etc., for a railroad company. In 1884, he put up the first girder bridge in the U.S. having a span of 80 feet. This was across the Fox River at Elgin, Ill.

Mrs. Chas. Lovercheck complimented the Journal with a sack of luscious seedling peaches. Mr. Lovercheck stated that his wife canned 335 quarts, assisted by Mrs. Fitzgerald, in addition to what were sold. This is an orchard about 30 years old, many of them stubs, but still yielding.

1937 80 Years Ago

Work on highway 81 is making rapid progress and the highway strip from the north city limits of Hebron to the Stoddard turn off will soon be ready for oil mat surfacing.

The construction of the viaduct over the Union Pacific Railroad with grading culverts and bridge over the Sandy, one mile west of Belvidere, on the newly designated stretch of highway 81, will be quite a project. The viaduct over the railroad will be 147 feet long and the steel girder bridge over the Sandy Creek will be 201 feet long, making a 348 feet stretch, in addition to the dirt filling between those two sections. The work must be completed in 110 consecutive working days, beginning Dec. 1, 1937.

All the digging and staking north of the mill is going to be Hebron's new ice skating rink. The Civic Club, with the cooperation of city officials, is trying to make it possible for Hebron folks, young and old, to skate safely. The new lake will be approximately the size of a football field. It will be arranged so that it can be flooded with a pump from the river. Cars can park up to the edge, so if you don't skate, you can watch the fun from your car.

1947 70 Years Ago

The Christian Church of Belvidere observed their 83rd anniversary Sunday, Sept. 29. Dallas Shafer gave the morning sermon before a large crowd.



The Nebraska Highway 81 Association met Monday, Oct. 30, with Governor Norbert Tiemann to renew its request for a north-south Interstate along the Highway 81 route. At that time the

Governor described himself "open and flexible on the route" but said Nebraska must first concentrate on getting federal aid approval of additional interstate mileage in the state. Only then, he said, can a location be worked out. Principal competitors for the 81 location appeared, at that time, to be Highways 77 and 281.

1977 40 Years Ago

Three Bruning businesses, Bruning Grocery, Hinrichs and Son Hardware and Casper Oil Company were broken into. The burglar used a bar to pry the front doors open. Two hundred dollars was taken from the safe. The other businesses were ransacked and only \$7 was taken from Casper Oil.

Thayer County farmers were to receive approximately \$1,955,269 in 1977 crop deficiency payments, according to Carl Kassebaum, chairman of the Thayer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Because of low market prices, 1,400 producers in the county would receive wheat payments.

Blue Valley Lutheran Development Center received a \$435 gift check from the members of Harold Borg's Agency of Aid Association for Lutherans. The money would be used to buy a movie projector for the center.

Diabetes Awareness Month

November is National Diabetes Month. This is a great time to help raise awareness of this ever-growing disease. Here are just a few of the recent statistics on diabetes:

- Nearly 30 million children and adults in the United States have diabetes.

- Another 84 million Americans are pre-diabetic and are at risk for developing type 2 diabetes.

- The American Diabetes Association estimates that the total national cost of diagnosed diabetes in the United States is \$245 billion

Type 2 diabetes is the most common form of diabetes. In type 2 diabetes, your body does not use insulin properly. This is called insulin resistance. At first, the pancreas makes extra insulin to make up for it. But over time, your pancreas isn't able to keep up and can't make enough insulin to keep your blood glucose levels normal. Type 2 is treated with lifestyle changes, oral medications, and insulin.

When glucose builds up in the blood instead of going into the cells, it can cause two problems:

- Your cells may become starved of energy

- High blood glucose levels can hurt your eyes, kidneys, nerves or heart.

Some people with type 2 can control their blood glucose with healthy eating and being active. In some cases, your doctor may need to also prescribe oral medications or insulin to help you meet your target blood glucose levels. Type 2 usually gets worse over time. Even if you don't need medications at first, you may need to later on.

It is estimated that one in every four people with diabetes does not even know they have the disease. If left undiagnosed or untreated, diabetes can lead to serious health problems, including heart attack and stroke. People with diabetes need to know that heart disease can

be a serious health problem for people with diabetes. The good news is that people with diabetes can lower their chances of having diabetes-related heart problems by learning how to manage their Diabetes.

There are many resources to help people with diabetes take important steps to stay healthy and prevent diabetes-related heart problems. It is important to learn what you can about the link between diabetes, heart disease and other diseases. People with diabetes need to work with their health care team to set targets and manage their blood sugar, blood pressure, and cholesterol. If you have diabetes, talk to your doctor about what goals you should have.

Diabetes is a challenging disease that affects the entire family in many ways. For people with diabetes and their families, it's important to work together to manage diabetes and prevent serious health problems such as heart disease, stroke, blindness, kidney disease, and nerve damage that can lead to amputation.

It's also important to know that having a family history of diabetes, such as a mother, father, brother or sister with type 2 diabetes, puts you at greater risk for developing type 2 diabetes. The good news is that you – and your family – can take small, but important steps to delay or prevent type 2 diabetes. 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
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Bruning participates in 2017 Nebraska Cattlemen convention


