### Deshler digs out

By 1 p.m., Sunday, the National Weather Service out of Hastings had canceled the blizzard warning and weather advisories as blowing and drifting snow caused whiteout conditions in the morning, along with icy roads. Parts of Interstate 80 were closed. Wind gusts peaked at 41 miles an hour in Carleton, and up to 55 at the Hastings Airport. Thayer County Sheriff David Lee issued travel warnings and told folks to stay home. Lee said one accident occurred in the area during the storm. All county schools had a late start Monday.

## Belvidere in the 32-LIFE spotlight

Belvidere means, "Beautiful to see," as documented on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's virtual "Historical Nebraska" website.

The home of the Belvidere Bobcats is in the spotlight for this month's 32-LIFE Campaign, which was formed to celebrate the communities of Thayer County by making connections with the people in them.

Belvidere is the second community to be highlighted by the chamber — Alexandria was the first.

This month's town was the second stop on the ABC Railroad (Alexandria, Belvidere and Carleton) and surveyed in 1872.

Upon entering Belvidere, travelers will see the second oldest house of worship in Thayer County, the United Church of Christ, built in 1866.

On the Thayer County Visitors Committee website, Memorial Park, the "Miracle of Main Street," shows how a block of old buildings was transformed into a serene space with a gazebo, flowers, trees, shrubs and a white fence.

"We're able to maintain a good town," Linda Hudson said about the people who keep it going — the Belvidere Volunteer Fire Department, Woman's Club and all those involved with the Thayer County Museum and Historical Society.

Memorial Park was a project of the Belvidere Woman's Club and one of many. The club also installed the restrooms at the Whistle Stop Station, where the Union Pacific's antique steam engine train routinely rolls through. The path to the restrooms is accessible for people with disabilities.

Hudson said the club doesn't have to worry about maintaining the facility — Carol Aude voluntarily takes care of it.

"We plan to keep improving the Whistle Stop," Hudson said. "The object is to stay stable. Look at the town of Powell. It's gone because no one cared."

The train station includes Teresa's Garden, a memo-

rial bed of flowers, named after Teresa Priefert Demma.

Hudson isn't alone in her quest — Jackie Williamson, curator of the county museum wrote nearly a 10-page report on museum efforts for 2017-2018, including the Hubbell United Methodist Church that will be transported to the museum grounds. The church had two historic stained-glass windows. The windows were removed and are at the museum awaiting the church building.

Add in the early 1900's stones for the new blacksmith shop and Bob Reinke's donation of the CCC quarters, and the museum is guaranteed to draw visitors well into the future.

"I should say something about our volunteers," Williamson wrote in her report. "Kate Lemke of Bruning has been volunteering the past year. She is a busy wife and mother, but she comes once a month and loves helping us. Linda Hume is still working on cemetery records and Deb Aaron comes once in a while."

The museum has a number of volunteers. The Historical Society officers are Reinke, president; Jay Buckles, vice president; Michael Zlab, secretary; and Suzie Wenske, treasurer with assistance from Lois Struve Pederson.

The museum board of directors are Hume, Mary Bruning, Lori Kuhlman, Henry Laber and Kent Williamson. Stephanie Zlab manages the museum's Facebook page.

A friend of Hudson's in Geneva, Vina Mody, recently donated an organ and player piano with the rolls to the museum.

Hudson said the organ is from a Catholic church near Ohio.

More surprises are coming out of Belvidere. Next year, it will be the 50th anniversary of the Bobcat students joining the Hebron school district.

## Paving, bridges topics of meeting

The property at 535 Jefferson Ave., will remain on the Hebron City Council's agenda every month until the members are satisfied the property isn't a nuisance, the council ruled during a special meeting Nov. 19.

Around 25 people attended the meeting, which included a nuisance hearing for the property; paving Barger Avenue from 1st to 3rd streets; the 1st and 4th Street river bridges; and a FEMA property grant application regarding the Jarchow home in the floodplain on South 3rd Street.

Owner of 535 Jefferson Ave., Aaron Taylor, told the council he may move the roll-off now sitting adjacent to the property on Jefferson Avenue to 6th Street in front of the house. He said he was behind on improvements due to weather and unforeseen problems with the sewer.

"It's not going as fast as I wanted it to. I want it done more than you guys do," Taylor said. He owns multiple properties in Hebron and has been on the path to renovation before.

Neighbors to the property have complained during the four months Taylor has worked on it. The council originally granted Taylor two to three months to renovate. The neighbors don't want the roll-off in front of their homes.

Taylor said he also ordered roofing materials in the hopes the house will be enclosed by the end

## County takes action on security

The Thayer County Commissioners have approved a software system for security purposes.

The courthouse's safety committee recommended the Community Response System, which will alarm employees in the building if an incident is taking place.

For example, if a disturbance is on first floor, an employee will hit a key to communicate the disturbance with other computers in the courthouse. Computer screens will display the message.

Ray Wright, who contracts with the county for information technology, will install the system. A CRC representative will be available for assistance with the installation and implementation.

Employees will do a preliminary training on the system in February, which will take about 45 minutes to an hour. The courthouse will be closed during the training.

Of the \$6,246 the county paid for the CRS system, \$1,500 is the annual fee. The remainder is for the installation and equipment.

In other business, Tom Brandt visited the commissioners and gave a general overview of what it will be like at the Nebraska Legislature once he starts Jan. 9. Brandt was elected over Sen. Laura Ebke for District 32.

He thanked the commissioners for inviting him, and mentioned he had an orientation at the leg-

## 1888 130 Years Ago

McAnally, who is expected here soon, when he will have the remains of his wife taken up and conveyed to Illinois for permanent burial... There is a phrenological lecturer holding meetings in the Christian Church every night. His blackboard sketches of heads afford the young considerable amusement as well as instruction.

Hubbell Items: The Sabbath School in District No. 1 is progressing splendidly with Mr. Ford as superintendent, Wm. Gallant as secretary. Attendance last Sabbath, 35...The rush of prairie schooners to the east this fall is greater than has been for several years on account of the severe dry weather which has prevailed during crop season...Albert Pike gave a birthday party last Wednesday night which was well attended by the fair sex and lots of ugly boys...Alva Matheny has traded his well auger for territory on the patent right churn...Fisher & Sons have sold out their grocery department of their store...Chenoweth & McFarland having closed out their grocery department of their store, will sell exclusively dry goods and clothing...The two young ladies found what they did not want in a certain buggy will apply for a divorce soon.

Country Crumbs: News is rather scarce this week. Everyone is so busy husking corn and preparing for winter...The school in district 38 is dismissed for this week on account of the illness of the teacher, Miss Susie Stevens...Last Thursday a little child of Mr. Morris, living about nine miles northeast of Hebron, while following its grandfather who was snapping corn, got lost. Mr. M. did not notice the absence of the child, only to think it was playing near him, until he was ready to start for home. When upon calling it did not answer, he began the search with the help of neighbors at 10 o'clock and the child was found at dark about two miles from home, asleep in a draw unhurt...We have just received news of the death of the baby boy of Mr. and Mrs. O. T. Johnson, formerly residents of Thayer County.

The child died while on the way to Thayer County from the west, where they went last spring.

The order of call was postponed... Remmer Voss of Carleton was the first boy of that place to give his life for his country. He was killed "Somewhere in France"...Carlisle Jones wrote the Lincoln Star about the Lincoln boys who got their first introduction to war in the St. Mihiel smash. Among the boys mentioned was the name of Sgt. Cyrus Overman...A recent letter from Louis L. Spotts states that he is now in a hospital "Somewhere in France" suffering from a burn on one side of his head caused by some of "Fritz's" mustard gas, but is improving and will return to his company

as soon as possible.

In rural Nebraska, "Be it ever so humble, there's no place like home" is no cliched wall hanging. It captures the trade-offs residents make in choosing to live in small towns. That's one way to interpret the Nebraska Rural Poll's consistent finding, during 13 years of surveys, that rural Nebraskans recognize their communities lack some amenities. But they stay put anyway, drawn by a sense of trust, security and belonging. Seventy-three percent of rural Nebraskans rate their communities as friendly, 61 percent say trusting and 67 percent say supportive. About two-thirds agree that "my community is very special to me" and 63 percent say "I fell I can really be myself in my community." The smaller the community, the stronger those feelings were, according to the survey.

The Clipboard form is accessible when you are logged into your patient portal account in the View Upcoming Appointments



list. Click the Begin button to open the Clipboard form to the Overview page. Follow the prompts on the form to complete each section. Once the Clipboard has been completed and submitted, clinic nurses will review it and add the information to your chart.


Lucinda reported that she gave comic books to the third graders in Davenport/Bruning and Thayer Central schools in October for National Education Week.

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

of the year, therefore, he said the roll-off would stay on Jefferson Street for disposal of the existing roof.

Councilmember Kurk Wiedel said Taylor was making a mockery of the city's efforts to rid Hebron of unappealing properties.

"I struggle with that," Wiedel said. "We're willing to work with you. Don't make a mockery out of what we're doing. You better worry about your neighbors. The dirt that sits in front — is that going to be gone as well?"

Taylor said the pile would be removed and suggested it was a part of a project to install carports on both sides of the house.

"It's not my intent to make a mockery," he said. "I'm doing my part to make this town better. I bought that place with the intent to make that area really nice."

The city has addressed 20 nuisance properties in the past two years. Two of the houses were purchased and abated, and two others were purchased after the owner paid for the demolition.

Taylor said the city and the neighbors are hindering his efforts.

Councilmember Denise Sudbeck noted it was the first time Taylor had shown up for a council meeting regarding the property.

"My request is you come to every meeting and give

us an update," she said to Taylor.

Her request turned into a requirement for Taylor, who will provide the council with monthly updates in person or through city administrator, Chris Fangmeier.

On paving Barger Street, Fangmeier was planning to communicate with the five property owners along the 1,295-foot stretch.

"Unless the city is going to force the project and force people to pay for it, have them solicit a petition for a paving district," Fangmeier said.

As far as material, Fangmeier said he didn't see an option other than using concrete for the project, although he included the cheaper price for asphalt in his breakdown of feet and costs among the five owners. The total cost for concrete was \$261,140. On asphalt, it was \$254,960.

Fangmeier said at least one of the owners has been interested in the project for a year.

For the river bridges, Fangmeier recommended the council seek bids over the winter for the approaches on the 1st Street bridge (\$30,000 for a 50-year lifespan) and rehabilitating the structure on 4th Street (no cost estimate, however, the project will repair the deck, steel and beams) for a 30-year lifespan.

The council decided to move forward on the FEMA property grant application for the Jarchow property, which would transfer ownership to the city under a purchase involving FEMA matching funds and possible grant monies.

"We're going to ask any cost share would not come from city funds," Fangmeier said.

The Jarchows are most likely qualified for FEMA's Repetitive Loss List because of multiple flooding incidents.

That may place the property in a 90/10 matching range with FEMA picking up the majority of the tab. In turn, the city could rent the land out. Structures would no longer be allowed because of the grant agreement for the space.

In other business, the city is looking forward to starting the LB840 program, which will use one-third of Hebron's sales tax for economic development.

The program was voted in by Hebron residents in May and members of an LB840 committee were selected in preparation for the start of the program, scheduled to begin in January of 2019.

An ordinance providing for and approving the transfer of The Hebron Community Antenna Television and Closed-Circuit Electric System Franchise Ordinance in the City of Hebron, Nebraska (the "City") originally granted to Hebron Cable T.V., Inc. pursuant to Ordinance 538, dated October 2, 1979, and thereafter assigned to Cunningham Communications, Inc. on December 4, 2000 (the "Franchise Ordinance"); amending the Franchise Ordinance in certain respects; and providing the effective date of the transfer.

WHEREAS, by the Franchise Ordinance, City has granted to Cunningham Communications, Inc. ("CCI") the authority to operate a cable television system within the City; and

WHEREAS, CCI has requested that the City approve the proposed transfer and assignment of the Franchise Ordinance by CCI to Diode Cable Company, a Nebraska corporation ("DCC"), and the City is willing to consent to such transfer and assignment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FRANCHISING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY:

Section 1. Transfer of Franchise Ordinance. Pursuant to the Franchise Ordinance, consent and approval is hereby granted by the City for the transfer and assignment of the Franchise Ordinance by CCI to DCC. The Mayor, City Council Chairperson, or Presiding Officer of the City, or any person designated by the Mayor, City Council Chairperson, or Presiding Officer are hereby authorized to execute the Consent to Assignment attached hereto as Annex 1.

Section 2. Ordinance Affirmed/Term. Except to the extent modified or amended by Ordinance 661, dated September 3, 1991, or this Ordinance 786, all terms and provisions of the Franchise Ordinance shall continue in full force and effect. O the effective date of the transfer of the Franchise Ordinance, as specified in Section 3 hereof, the term of the Franchise Ordinance shall be extended for a period of twenty-five (25) years.

Section 3. Effective Date. The transfer of the Franchise Ordinance shall be effective upon the closing of the sale by CCI to DCC of the cable television facilities serving the City. DCC shall notify the City of the transfer of the Franchise Ordinance within thirty (30) days of such closing, and provide therewith a copy of the Assignment and Assumption of Franchise by which the Franchise Ordinance was transferred and assigned by CCI to DCC.

Section 4. Inconsistency. In the event any of the terms and provisions of any other ordinance or regulation of the City are inconsistent with the terms and provisions of this Ordinance, the term and provisions of this Ordinance shall govern and control.

Section 5. Publication. The City Secretary/Clerk is hereby directed to publish the caption of this Ordinance in an official newspaper in the City and to comply otherwise with all applicable notice requirements of law.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEBRON APPROVING THE ASSIGNMENT TO GLENWOOD TELECOMMUNICATIONS, INC., OF THE FRANCHISE GRANTED TO DIODE CABLE CO. DATED SEPTEMBER 15, 2001 GRANTING SAID GLENWOOD TELECOMMUNICATIONS, INC. THE RIGHT, AUTHORITY, POWER AND FRANCHISE TO ESTABLISH, CONSTRUCT, ACQUIRE, MAINTAIN, AND OPERATE A HIGH SPEED INTERNET SERVICE WITHIN THE CITY OF HEBRON NEBRASKA, TO RENDER, FURNISH AND SELL HIGHSPEED INTERNET WITHIN ANY AREA OVER WHICH CITY HAS JURISDICTION, AND TO USE AND OCCUPY THE FACILITIES (BUILDINGS, POLES, TOWER, ETC.) THAT ARE REQUIRED TO OPERATE HIGH SPEED SERVICES FOR A TERM EXTENDING UNTIL NOVEMBER 1, 2028.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HEBRON:

Section 1: City of Hebron does hereby consent to the assignment to Glenwood Telecommunications, Inc., by Diode Cable Co., of all rights granted by a Franchise Agreement which was signed September 15, 2001.

Section 2: Said Franchise Agreement shall be and remain in full force and effect according to its original terms subject to the following changes: a) the name Glenwood Telecommunications, Inc., shall be substituted throughout for the name Diode Cable Co.; b) Glenwood shall furnish high-speed Internet Services and reception equipment to City's Municipal Office at 216 Lincoln Street, City Library at 146 North 4th Street, City Fire Hall at 5th and Jefferson Street, Municipal Airport on U.S. Highway 136 and the Community Center at 1350 Dove Road; and c) the term of this Franchise shall be for 10 years beginning November 1, 2018 and ending on November 1, 2028, and shall automatically renew for additional one-year terms unless 90 days written notice is provided by either Party.

Section 3: All provisions of said Franchise Agreement dated September 15, 2001 shall be binding upon Glenwood Telecommunications, Inc., (Grantee) and all successors, lessees and assigns of Grantee whether expressly stated herein or not, and all the rights, authorities, powers, grants and privileges secured by said ordinance to the Grantee shall be held to inure to the benefit of the Grantee and all successors, lessees, and assigns of the Grantee; provided, however, that this franchise may not be assigned without the consent of the City, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 787

An ordinance of the City of Hebron granting to Diode Cable Co. Its successors, lessees and assigns, for a term of twenty-five (25) years, the right, authority, power and franchise to establish, construct, acquire, maintain, and operate a community antennae and closed-circuit electronic service therefrom within the City of Hebron and environs thereof, and to use and occupy the streets and other public places of the City of Hebron, for such community antennae and closed-circuit electronic system.

Be it ordained by the governing body of  
City of Hebron:

Section 1: City of Hebron does hereby grant to Diode Inc., a corporation duly authorized to do business in the State of Nebraska (hereinafter called the "Grantee") and to the Grantee's successors, lessees and assign, pursuant to Section 18-2201-2205, R.R.S., 1943 for the full term of twenty-five (25) years from the date hereof, the right, authority, power and franchise to establish, construct, acquire, maintain, and operate a Community Antennae and Closed-circuit Electronic System within the City of Hebron, Nebraska (hereinafter called the "City") to render, furnish and sell community antennae and closed-circuit electronic service from such system to the inhabitants of the City and its environs, and to use and occupy the streets and other public places within the corporate limits of the City as the same now exist or may hereafter exist for its community antennae and closed-circuit electronic system, including the right to enter and construct, erect locate, repair and rebuild in, on, Under, along, over and across the streets, alleys, avenues, parkways, lanes, bridges easements, rights of ways, and other public places of the City, all towers, poles, cables, amplifiers, conduits, and other facilities owned, leased or otherwise used by the grantee for the furnishing of community antennae and closed-circuit electronic service within the City and environs thereof during the continuance of the franchise hereby granted, but expressly subject to the restrictions and conditions hereinafter set out.

Section 2: Any pavements, sidewalks, or curbing taken up or any and all excavations made by the Grantee shall be done under the supervision and direction of the governing body of the City under permits issued for work by the proper officials of the City and shall be made and done in such manner as to give the least inconvenience to the inhabitants of the City and the public generally, and all such pavements, sidewalks, curbing, and excavations shall be replaced and repaired in as good condition as before, with all convenient speed, by and at the expense of the Grantee, which shall at all times make and keep full and complete plats, maps and records showing the exact location of its facilities located within the public ways of the City. The Grantee shall not place poles or other fixtures where the same will interfere with any gas, electric or telephone fixtures, water hydrants or mains.

Section 3: It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the Grantee and the City that the Grantee shall save the City harmless from all loss sustained by the City on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim, or demand whatsoever, resulting from negligence on the part of the Grantee in the construction, operation or maintenance of its system in the City, and Grantee shall cause to be defended at its own expense all actions that may be commenced against the City by reason of the construction and operation of such system. The Grantee shall carry public liability and property damage insurance in the sum of \$100,000.00 for individual, \$1,000,000.00 for each accident and \$25,000.00 for property damage.

Section 4: The Grantee shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms, and conditions of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable the Grantee to exercise its rights and perform its services under this franchise and to assure an uninterrupted service to each and all of its customers. The Grantee shall have the right and power to fix, charge, collect and receive reasonable rates for community antennae and closed-circuit electronic service furnished within the corporate limits of the city.

Section 5: The City reserves the right of reasonable regulation of the erection, construction or the installation of any facilities by the Grantee and the reasonably designate where such facilities are to be placed within the public ways and places.

Section 6: The Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the City, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of any such buildings. The expense of such temporary removal, and of raising or lowering of wires shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and the Grantee shall have the authority to require such payment in advance. The Grantee shall be given not less than forty-eight (48) hours advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes.

Section 7: The Grantee shall have the authority to trim trees upon any overhanging streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the City so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires and cables of the Grantee, all trimming to be done under the supervision and direction of the City and at the expense of the Grantee, Grantee shall protect and save harmless the City from any and all claims for damage arising out of the trimming of trees as herein provided.

Section 8: The City is the owner of certain utilities, and in order to keep the number of poles to a minimum, hereby consents to the installation of Grantee's facilities on poles belonging to it except as hereinafter set out. Such installation shall be made in accordance with the National Electric Safety Code, the electric code of the City of Hebron, and such other safety requirements as may be applicable. Should the existing poles be inadequate to support Grantee's facilities, or if for any reason the manager of

the City Utilities deems it unsafe, or that the facilities of the Grantee will unduly interfere with the use of any pole or poles for an existing utility, City shall have the right to refuse Grantee the right to install its facilities or any part of such facilities on any such pole or poles. As compensation for the use of said poles, Grantee will pay to the City the sum of \$2.00 per pole per year. The use of said poles by Grantee for the purposes authorized herein shall be subject to inspection by the City, and Grantee agrees that it will correct any deficiency or improper condition upon notice from the City of such condition. Grantee's use of said poles shall not vest in Grantee any ownership, and its relationship shall remain that of lessee.

Section 9: In the event that at any time during the period of this franchise the City shall lawfully elect to alter, or change of the grade of any street, alley, or other public way, the Grantee, upon reasonable notice by the City, shall remove, relay and relocate its poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other fixtures as its own expense.

Section 10: The Grantee shall, at all times during the life of this franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the City, and to such reasonable regulations the City shall hereafter by resolution or ordinance provide in the exercise of such police power.

Section 11: In consideration for the rights, privileges and franchise hereby granted, and as compensation to the City for the use of its public ways and places by the Grantee, and in lieu of all occupation and license taxes, the Grantee shall, on or before the 31st day of January and the 31st day of July of each year in which this franchise is effective, pay to the City a sum equal to three percent (3%) of the gross receipts from the sale of community antennae and closed-circuit electronic service within the then existing corporate limits of the City for the preceding six (6) month period ending on the 31st day of December and the 30th day of June. The term "gross receipts" shall mean gross subscriber revenues per year from basic cable television operations, but pursuant to the rules of the FCC shall not include revenues from "ancillary" or "auxiliary" services such as advertising, leased channels and programming supplied on a per program on a per channel charge basis, or refunds or credits to subscribers.

Section 12: The City reserves the exclusive right to terminate this franchise and rescind all rights, powers, privileges and authority herein granted by written notice to the Grantee if the Grantee has not accomplished significant construction of a community antennae and closed-circuit electronic system within one year from the grant of a Certificate of Compliance from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), or if the Grantee having commenced such construction shall fail to prosecute its construction work with reasonable diligence until a working community antennae and closed-circuit electronic system shall have been completed. The City may, in its discretion, extend the time for commencement of construction where delay is due to causes reasonably beyond the control of the Grantee. In the event that Grantee shall fail to secure a Certificate of Compliance from the FCC within one year from the date of the ordinance, or in the event the FCC shall deny a Certificate of Compliance, then and in either of such events, the City shall have and it reserves the exclusive right to terminate the franchise and to rescind the retake all rights, powers, privileges, and authorities herein granted.

Section 13: In the event the Grantee shall fail to comply with the provisions of this ordinance or any existing signed agreement or subsequent agreements, then this franchise shall terminate sixty (60) days after notice by the City of noncompliance and Grantee shall remove all equipment within ninety (90) days; provided, however, Grantee may comply during said sixty (60) day period, it shall be deemed to have been cured if within said period Grantee shall commence to cure the same and shall diligently prosecute the same to completion. Grantee shall promptly proceed to make application to the FCC for a Certificate of Compliance and after receiving the same shall proceed with reasonable diligence to complete said system.

Section 14: This franchise and the rights, privileges, and authority hereby granted shall take affect and be in force from the after final passage hereof, as provided by law, and shall continue in force and effect for a term of twenty-five (25) years.

Section 15: It shall be the policy of the City to amend this franchise, upon application of the Grantee, when necessary to enable the Grantee to take advantage of any developments in the field of transmission of television and radio signals which will afford it an opportunity to more efficiently or economically service its customer, and to enable the Grantee to conform to the rules and regulations of the Federal Communications Commission as they may be amended from time to time. Any modifications required of Grantee by the amendment of the rules and regulation of the Federal communications Commission shall be incorporated into this franchise as of the date such modifications become obligatory under Federal Communications Commission regulations, or in the event no obligatory date is

established, within one (1) year of the adoption of such modification or at the time of the renewal of this franchise, whichever first occurs.

Section 16: Upon termination of service to any subscribers, the Grantee shall promptly remove all its facilities and equipment from the premises, of such subscriber upon his request.

Section 17: All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 18: All provisions of this ordinance shall be binding upon the Grantee and all successors, lessees and assigns of the Grantee whether expressly stated herein or not, and all the rights, authorities, powers, grants and privileges secured by this ordinance to the Grantee shall be held to insure to the benefit of the Grantee and all successors, lessees, and assigns of the Grantee; provided, however, that this franchise may not be assigned without the consent of the City, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

## FSA encourages farmers and ranchers to vote in County Committee elections

The 2018 Farm Service Agency County Committee Elections began on November 5, when ballots were mailed to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices is December 3, 2018.

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations of

an entire farm, may also be eligible to vote.

The 2018 election in Thayer County will be conducted for the representative Local Administrative Area (LAA): LAA #2 which includes the townships of Belvidere, Bruning, Friedensau, Hebron and Stoddard. This year's incumbent candidate is Karen Hinrichs from rural Bruning.

Eligible voters in local administrative area #2, who do not receive a ballot can obtain one from their local USDA Service Center. December 3, 2018, is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local USDA Service Centers. Ballots returned by mail must also be postmarked no later than December 3. Newly elected committee members will take office January 1, 2019.

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

She said the Bobcats asked only one thing of the Hebron district — they wanted school canceled if the country roads were affected by the weather because students who lived

in the country couldn't get to school.

Brandt is currently in transition to the legislature. He will be sworn in Jan. 9. Committee chairs will be elected. Incumbents will be sworn in Jan. 5.

As a freshman senator, Brandt joins 10 other new senators with two of them appointed by Gov. Pete Ricketts.
