Digital training session scheduled for Dec. 6

One year ago, 94 percent of teenagers were using social media sites, like Facebook, Instagram and Snapchat daily, according to a Pew Research Center survey.

Karen Haase of the KSB School of Law in Lincoln said in a recent speech at Papillion-LaVista 80 percent of children under the age of 18 have sexted.

"It's a middle school problem and increasingly, elementary. The youngest case I've ever worked was 10 years old," Haase said.

She said students as young as second or third grade may be sexting.

"They're growing up on a digital playground and no one is on recess duty," she said.

She added she has never seen a child incarcerated for sexting, but one student who recorded female athletes in a Gering school was charged with 100 felony counts of invasion of privacy and 100 felony counts of possession of child pornography.

That student will most likely have to register as a sex offender.

Haase will be in Hebron Dec. 6 at 6:30 p.m., to talk to students and parents at Thayer Central.

"We're not as tech savvy as our kids. She'll talk about things we can do at home to keep them safe and out of trouble," High School Principal Tom Kirburz said. "She talks about popular apps."

Haase is also expected to hold an open question and answer session.

In the speech at Papillion LaVista, Haase said 77 percent of attorneys have filed charges in sexting cases.

Attorneys are charging more under the age of 18, not less, Haase said.

She also went into apps that can hide photos and store them. Parents have to know how to use the app to see the secret photos.

More teens than people realize have offered personal information about themselves online — they have given out cellular telephone numbers and addresses — and have made arrangements to meet someone they

met online.

Haase gave simple tips on how parents can keep their children safe — computers should be placed in public areas of the home, not charging phones in bedrooms and schedule times to use technology. Communication in families is also crucial for safety.

But sometimes, the pressure to sext is too much for girls.

Haase said the girls need to be armed with a pocketful of responses so they don't feel pressure when they are told over and over to send racy photos.

"Start living your lives online alongside your kids," she advised be-

cause the more parents know, the better they can protect their children.

Haase was at Thayer Central two to three years ago, but didn't speak to a large crowd. Thayer Central is hoping to change that with the upcoming visit.

"She is really good with kids and very informative. Parents may not realize what their kids are doing," Kirburz said.

Haase also addressed bullying in her recent presentation. While bullying is increasing, students are lacking in the tools needed to defend themselves.

The description of bullying has expanded to include the victim's

perception of what bullying is, which is a perceived power imbalance between one or more persons and their victims.

In addition, bullying used to be defined by repeated acts, however, it is now classified as one or more act because some bullies do not repeat their offenses.

For certain offenses, Haase rallies behind the school policies for discipline.

"Schools have a moral obligation to raise good people," she said.

She is aggressive when it comes to school consequences because suspensions are a lot easier to overcome than criminal offenses.

Southeast to open learning center in April

The Thayer Central School Board of Education briefly discussed a leasing plan they are working with Southeast Community College on for the primary building.

Southeast is planning to open a Learning Center as soon as April. It hopes to begin renovations on the building in January.

The college will pay a portion of the rent fee between January and April, with utility payments to begin in January. The college is not planning to purchase the building.

Maintenance is the board's other issue with the building. The lease will be further discussed at the board's Dec. 12 meeting, scheduled for 5 p.m. because of the elementary's vocal concert.

In other business, the district will clean up a budget compliance issue discovered during the school's audit. Funds were transferred to cover the cooperation agreement with Bruning-Davenport and Deshler involving school nurse services.

The transferred funds were recorded for the new fiscal year, which is a budget violation under an audit.

Superintendent Drew Harris said the funds are accounted for, but coded into the new budget year.

The board also added an attendance improvement plan to the district's truancy policy to improve attendance.

"There are a few less students this year with a truancy issue," Harris said.

The speakers were Rev. Goodale, English; Rev. Harsha, German; Rev. McDonald, Scotch; Rev. Desllets, French.

The last spike on the B&M Railroad from Strang to Hebron was driven on Monday morning, and the construction train with tracklayers and outfit started for Broken Bow. The track could have been completed on Sunday evening had the ties not given out.

The law firm of Savage & Richards has been dissolved, the co-partnership having expired by limitation of time. Mr. Savage will continue the practice of his profession in the rooms now occupied by him. Mr. Richards will occupy rooms in the Julius Thomas building.

Yesterday about noon the fire bell called together out-citizens to extinguish a fire which had started in the second story of Julius Thomas's building. The efficiency of Hebron's volunteer fire department was shown by the rapidity with which the hose companies and hook and ladder company reached the scene of action. It was not necessary to use the hose, as the fire was quickly subdued with buckets of water. The origin of the fire is known. When discovered a truck in the room occupied by Christina Burback was burning, with other articles in the room. The trunk was thrown out of the building, but it, with its contents, was a complete loss. The damage to the building is about \$50, covered by insurance. The heat of the fire broke the glass in the transom, the noise of which, as it fell, attracted the attention of Mrs. Thomas in the room below. Otherwise the fire might not have been discovered until too late, when the business portion of Hebron might have suffered seriously. A curious incident connected with the fire is the fact that it occurred on the anniversary of Hebron's big fire, which consumed the business portion of that side of Lincoln avenue, just eleven years ago, November 19, 1885.

The W.C.T.U. county convention was held at Chester Nov. 15. It was one of the best ever held and delegates were present from every town in the county.


LaVieve Gates was hostess to 29 of her little friends Saturday, that day being her fifth birthday.

Regular hand washing, particularly before and after certain activities, is a great habit to develop. So how often should you wash your hands? Often! Probably more often than you do now. Germs are everywhere—you can't see them but they are out there. That is why it is especially important to wash your hands:

- Before, during, and after preparing food
- Before eating food
- Before and after caring for someone who is sick
- Before and after treating a cut or wound
- After using the bathroom

- After changing diapers or cleaning up a child who has used the toilet
- After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
- After touching an animal, animal feed, or animal waste
- After handling pet food or pet treats
- After touching garbage.

What happens if you do not wash your hands frequently? You can pick up germs from other sources such as food to hands, hands to food, hands to others and hands to objects. Your hands will infect you when you touch your eyes, nose or mouth. And before you know it, everybody is getting sick. Other more serious diseases are spread through this type of contact including hepatitis A, meningitis, and infectious diarrhea.




