City keeps nuisances on agenda

A formal nuisance notice will be issued to 250 S. 13th St., while the City of Hebron leaves the motels, Budget Host Inn and Wayfair, and 249 S. 13th St., on its list of nuisances.

Five properties were on the city council's agenda Monday evening.

City Administrator Chris Fangmeier will consult with the owners of the pending nuisances. He believes progress has been made at 249 S. 13th St., and the owners of the motels, Kwang C. Chi and Sok Wang, attended the meeting to update the council.

In other news, library director Terry Olson said she is resigning for family reasons. She will see the transition to new director, Chuck Reichwein, through. His start day is Nov. 13.

Olson also noted a beautification plan for the library for the bushes, trees and flower beds. The library presented 35 programs to the community last year, checked out 13,682 media items and issued 55 new library patron cards.

The council also opened bids for the Roosevelt new park equipment project with Crouch Recreation at \$124,031 and Sterling West for \$99,831.

The park board will review the bids. The city is expected to contribute \$50,000 to the project.

A little over 67 percent of the funds for new equipment have been raised, park board member Lance Pacht said. The council expressed its appreciation for the active city park board.

The council heard from Blythe Norder for the Stastny Community Center update.

A brief discussion was held on reception bookings. Norder said the top complaint of brides is Hebron does not have the facilities to accommodate wedding parties.

Travelers at the campground or coming to see the porch swing will soon see all Hebron has to offer because of two message centers the chamber has acquired, chamber director Jana Tietjen said.

The centers will hold current events, movies, attractions and more.

The chamber is actively ushering travelers into the city and Thayer County at large.

Tietjen said the directional signs to Hebron received compliments from both inside and outside the community, and a campaign with a county-wide slogan will raise awareness for Thayer communities, such as the importance of shopping local.

A T-shirt for county-wide distribution could be designed, Tietjen said. She has visited with the Deshler chamber and was scheduled to attend Bruning's meeting as well. Tietjen also noted communities in the county are submitting events for the City of Hebron's website at www.hebron-nebraska.us.

Wednesday morning chamber coffee gatherings at D's Daylight Donuts feature speakers between 8:30 and 9 a.m., updates from the city and general discussion.

Tietjen said city councilman Larry Fangmeier was a recent speaker. County clerk Marie Rauner was the speaker Nov. 1 as she marked 30 years in the clerk's office.

Region V is scheduled to present, Tietjen said.

Anyone can attend the Wednesday morning coffee talks. More information is available on the chamber's Facebook page.

Family serves over 100 years

Between the Paul and Patricia Hergott brothers and sisters is over 100 years of military service.

Thirteen of the 16 siblings served in some capacity, sibling No. 11, Rita Luongo said. She was in Desert Storm (Aug. 2, 1990-Feb. 28, 1991) in army intelligence and was assigned to Kuwait, Iraq and Saudi Arabia.

One by one, the siblings, with the oldest and youngest children almost 20 years apart from each other, joined the army.

"Many of us who lived it, it was the way of life. It is hard to say it was unique," Luongo said. "Years ago, everyone knew someone who served and that is getting less and less."

Her father, Paul, served in the Navy in World War II. He and her mother, Patricia, did not discourage their children from joining.

The military was also a road to a college education.

Barbara was the first to join of the Hergott children, right after the Vietnam War. She served three years in the army and worked in health care. Then came Robert, who was stationed in Germany during peacetime.

Richard was next. He did a tour in Korea and worked in Washington state. Herbert was in Colorado Springs and never went overseas.

Margaret spent a majority of her service in Colorado at the Fitzsimons Army Medical Center.

Cheryl was in the Army Reserves out of Lincoln for years. Michael was in the Reserves and ended up in Colorado. Steve and Brian were also in the Reserves, along with Janelle, who is currently a teacher at Norris High School.

Jeff and Jan opted for the Army National Guard with both of them stationed in the Virgin Islands for hurricane recovery.

Patricia visited her children and traveled many places, from Hawaii to Germany to Panama.

"I have a quite a few cousins who were in, too," Rita said.

One of those cousins, Col. Pauline Gross, has served since 1974, but it is her sister, Kathy Retzlaff, who is her role model.

"Kathy deployed to Iraq before I did," Gross said. "The things she has done over the years and her positions — I've always looked

up to her and what she was able to accomplish."

Gross had three sisters and two brothers join before her. The family is from Alexandria.

"We all just felt it was what we were going to do. We never really talked about it," she said about the military.

Gross wanted to go into the medical field. She thought she would do her three years in the army and get out, but later, Gross realized she was paving a path of firsts for women, reaffirmed by her husband.

"He actually thought of that

aspect of it before I did," Gross said. "Over time, I realized, I did the job and I did it well."

After basic combat training at Fort Jackson, S.C., Gross graduated from 91B Combat Medic Training in 1975, then went on to train as an operating room technician.

She was a member of the Women's Army Corp that ended in 1978 and she is currently the last member of the corp who is still serving.

She was one of two women selected to enter the Army Physician Assistant Program in 1982 and the first female PA to be sent to Honduras in 1986.

"When I got there, they said they didn't really want a female," she said. "The women wouldn't understand what the men were going through, but once you start talking to these guys, they had the same issues as women did."

She advanced through the ranks, serving as Warrant Officer, then Chief Warrant Officer, and was promoted to Captain in 1992.

Gross was also the first PA to become a Clinic Officer In Charge and the first assigned to the United States Army Recruiting Command and under her, the first USAR soldiers were approved for the

Auxiliary and Legion formed court

In 1967, American Legion and Auxiliary members from several Thayer County communities met to form the Court of Honor, that recognizes deceased veterans with flags around the courthouse twice a year.

They met again in 1968 and it was decided — casket flags would be stenciled with the names of the veterans and their branches of service, along with the wars they served in.

The poles were five dollars (now \$30) and if the family didn't want to use the casket flag, they could buy a new one.

"Weather permitting, we have between 150 and 200 flags out every holiday," veterans service officer Dr. Marlin Bauhard said.

Volunteers, including the boy scouts, place the flags in the spring and fall for Memorial Day and Veterans Day.

Pipes in the ground hold the flags

in place. As the flags are removed, caps plug the holes.

"It takes about a half a day to get them uncovered," Bauhard said about the caps.

Lyle Arnold made the caps and recently, Reinke Manufacturing produced replacements.

Bauhard sometimes uses a metal detector to find them.

There are 455 veterans in Thayer

1887 130 Years Ago

Among the important inventions of recent date is the pruning knife invented and patented by J. M. King, one of our townsmen. The King pruning knife is one of the inventions that sells itself. Several of our farmers have bought farm rights and considerable territory has been disposed of. Mr. King intends soon to extend his right to embrace the Dominion of Canada.

Reed & Garmire have erected a public telephone between their yard and Wm. Hill's meat market for the convenience of those wishing to order lumber or coal.

Sophia Picard, aged 14 years, daughter of C. Picard, living east of Hebron, died very suddenly Wednesday morning. She had been sick with fever, but had so far recovered as to be able to do a washing on Monday. As a result she had a relapse which proved fatal.

Architect Brewer showed us this week, the front elevation plan for the new front to the Central House, soon to be erected by J. W. Hughes. It will be brick, with stone trimmings, three stories high, and of an ornamental style, with porches to each story.

From Hosier Row: Fred H. Eno, a nephew of W. A. Storey, arrived here last Saturday from Celia, Kan. He came through on a bicycle. Mr. Eno is editor of the Celia Enterprise. He seems to be quite a jolly sort of fellow, most unmarried editors are though. (What's the matter with married editors? Ed.) A week later: "What is the matter with married editors."

Why there's a mortgage on their hearts, See? Or a "time lock," rather, and we don't "understand the combination." Does that make it plain? From the editor: Yes, but the illustrations are unfortunate to prove that unmarried editors are "nicer" than married ones. Valueless property is rarely mortgaged, and "time locks" are only provided for the custody of the most valuable articles.

Chester Dots: There was a candy pulling at the home of Misses Minnie and Nora Drullinger Wednesday evening.

Alexandria Axioms: Tramps in this vicinity are getting quite cheeky. Last Sunday night one of them entered the room of Alonze Clark and went to bed, and it required the combined efforts of Frank Corey and his

revolver, B. L. Terry and his tuba, Harry Nightingale and his bass drum and "Polly" and his prayer book to get him from the room.

Hubbell Hits: Hurrah! Hurrah! A two-foot vein of lignite coal has been found four miles east of Hubbell on the farm of Frank Vincell. Mr. Vincell was boring a well and the vein was found at a depth of 80 feet from the surface. It is said that Mr. Vincell will have a shaft sunk at once...A young man by the name of Wransky, living eight miles southeast of here, was going to mill on Rose Creek and having a loaded shotgun in the wagon, by some means it was discharged, the load taking effect in his hip,, making a terrible wound, from the effects of which he died a few days ago.

Country Crumbs: The schoolhouse in Dist. 38 is nearing completion. Miss Emma Brinegar will teach her third term there this winter.

The Belvidere foundry was started up last week for a trial effort. The work performed was the casting of a cog wheel which sold at auction for the neat sum of \$10. The proprietors feel much elated with the success of the enterprise.

1897 120 Years Ago

J. F. Aufderheide of Deshler, has taken Martin Albrecht into partnership in the implement business. Mr. Albrecht sold his valuable farm near Friedensau and moved to Deshler.

Married: At the Catholic Church, Oct. 27, Adolph J. Dewald and Miss Florence Prentice. Rev. Petrarsch officiating.

Mrs. W. P. Strow, who has been a great sufferer for many months, died at her home on Dry Creek, Oct. 28.

Percy Brown, the 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Brown of Gilead precinct, died of cholera infantum, Oct. 26. The little boy was laid to rest in the Rose Hill Cemetery Wednesday.

Wednesday evening the community was inexpressibly shocked to hear of the death of Hebron's highly esteemed citizen, M. G. Leach. He had been at his place of business and apparently in his usual good health, until the afternoon of his death, when he complained of rheumatic pains in his left arm and shoulder extending down his side.

Gilead: Grain men are contracting new corn for 13c... The farmers are all begin-

ning to nail the loose boards onto their old corn cribs, and build new ones...Mrs. Blood of our city was married on last Thursday evening to Mr. Keeling, a stranger in these parts. They were married at Rev. Shook's, the Rev. officiating. They will soon occupy her residence here.

Hubbell: A. Wilson returned from Denver Tuesday afternoon bringing with him six carloads of cattle from New Mexico, which he will dispose of to the farmers in this vicinity for feeders... There is hardly an empty house in town and almost every day we hear inquiries for dwellings by parties desiring to locate here.

Liberty Gossip: Liberty society has purchased new hymn books, and we hope the music will be more interesting now, both to the society and outsiders.

1907 110 Years Ago

Hubbell: The saddest tragedy it has been our misfortune to write about in several years occurred last Saturday morning at Thompson when Mrs. Mary Patten was burned so severely, by a coal oil explosion, that she died in a few hours. The remains were brought to Hubbell that evening and funeral services were held from the Methodist Church...In getting off the streetcar last Wednesday at Lincoln, J. A. Miller was thrown to the ground and fell on his hip which was severely hurt.

C. F. Koch sold his blacksmithshop and residence property to D. R. Churchill. Mr. Koch's many friends here will regret to learn that he will soon leave for Oregon where he will make his home. He has a position as instructor of mechanics in the State agriculture college at a salary of \$130 per month...Davenport can well feel proud of the splendid light system we have here and the low prices made on the light by Mr. Beam.

1917 100 Years Ago

As will be noticed by their professional card, W. E. Goodhue and H. W. Hess have formed a law partnership, under the firm name of Goodhue & Hess.

A very pretty wedding occurred Oct. 18 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Ahrens, near Williams, when their cousin, Miss Marie Ekhoff, was united in marriage with Mr. George Messing of Gilead.

The city employees tore down the old smoke-stack at the light plant, replacing it with a new one.

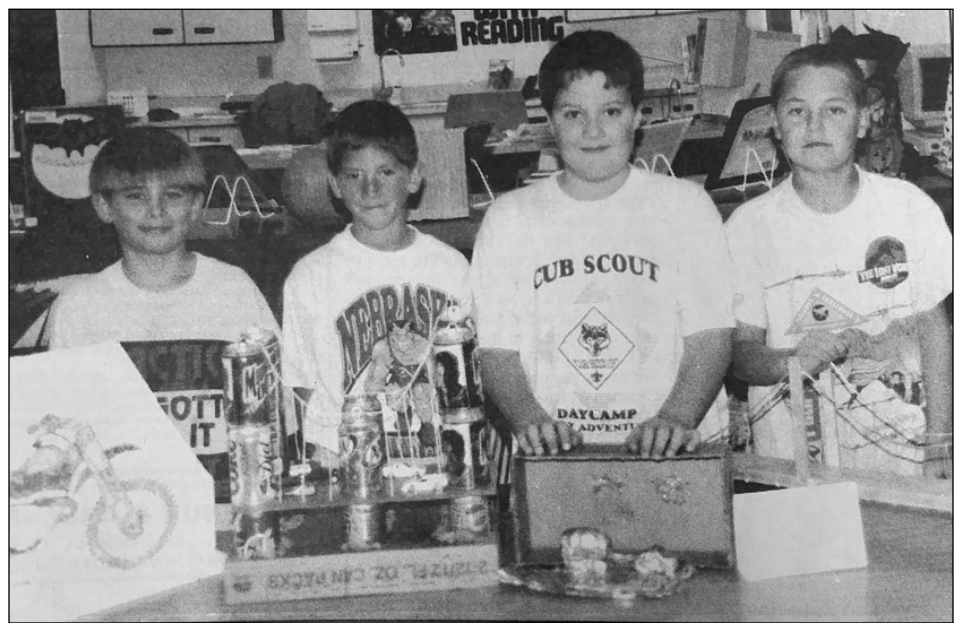
The Boy Scouts have been busy fixing up their sod house for winter quarters.

Deer hunting prospect look good for 2017

Excitement and anticipation are building for Nebraskans as the Nov. 11 opener of firearm deer season approaches.

Deer populations for 2017 are higher for mule deer and about the same for whitetails. Favorable habitat and weather conditions this past year should provide for good fawn production and good survival of adults and fawns.

The state's mule deer herd produced the highest harvest on record in 2016 (9,257) and expectations for 2017 are for a modest increase. Whitetail buck harvest declined slightly in 2016. Expectations for 2017 are for a modest increase in buck harvest and a decline in doe harvest due to a reduction in doe tag quantities.

"Hunting prospects have improved in all management units as herds are mostly recovered from the drought and disease losses

of 2012," says Kit Hams, big game program manager for the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission. "Mule deer in five southern units are doing very well and whitetails are increasing in several units."

Nebraska still is recovering from the epizootic hemorrhagic disease (EHD) losses to whitetails that occurred in 2012, and a reduction in whitetail antlerless permits will help with that recovery.

The firearm season closes on Nov. 19.

Deer permits may be purchased at OutdoorNebraska.org or at any Game and Parks permitting office. Other resources for hunters available on the website include: the 2017 Big Game Hunting Guide, the Public Access Atlas, check station locations, and information on participating in the, Hunters Helping the Hungry and Deer Exchange programs.

Alone, On Their Back, In a Crib - Helping Babies Sleep Safely

On October 30, Thayer County Health Services was officially designation as a Safe Sleep Champion Hospital. The goal of the Nebraska Safe Babies: Safe Sleep Campaign is to provide evidence-based education to parents of newborns as well as birthing hospital staff.

Educating new parents and caregivers within the hospital setting will provide a consistent, evidence-based safe sleep message to parents of more than 26,500 newborns across the State, to decrease SUID in Nebraska.

The Safe Sleep Campaign starts within the hospital setting. The hope is to encourage all Nebraska birthing hospitals to become a Safe Sleep Hospital Champion.

To be considered a Safe Sleep Champion, the hospital signs a pledge, creates or updates their Safe Sleep Policy, provides yearly education to hospital personnel, models safe sleep recommendations, and educates parents with evidence-based safe sleep material.

The program's ABCs of Safe Sleep are:

A - Your baby should always sleep alone.

B - Your baby should always sleep on his or her back.

C - Your baby should always sleep in a safe crib.

For years, the American Academy of Pediatrics has recommended the supine positioning for infant sleep. The decline in death due to sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) is said to be attributable to having babies sleep in the supine position. It is believed that in the prone position babies are more at risk to re-breathe their own

carbon dioxide.

Since the launch of the Back to Sleep Campaign, the overall SIDS rate in the United States has declined by more than 50 percent. Still SIDS remains the leading cause of death in the first year of a baby's life between one month and 12 months of age. Within Nebraska, infant deaths have recently shown an increase. In 2015, 26 babies were listed as Sudden Unexplained Infant Deaths (SUID), up from 22 SUID deaths in 2012. Almost all of these are preventable.

A survey of all birthing hospitals in Nebraska revealed that hospitals were not always providing consistent safe sleep messaging to their employees and in patient education. The following:

- 78 percent of hospitals have an Infant Safe Sleep policy and procedure;

- 63 percent required education or training for hospital personnel in contact with newborns;

- Patient education materials and educational processes vary between hospitals.

Thayer County Health Services is excited to be a Safe Sleep Champion Hospital. They know an increase in awareness of safe sleep for infants will result in: more babies sleeping safely, a decrease in the number of SUID deaths, a decrease in the infant mortality rate in Nebraska, and more babies celebrating their first birthday.

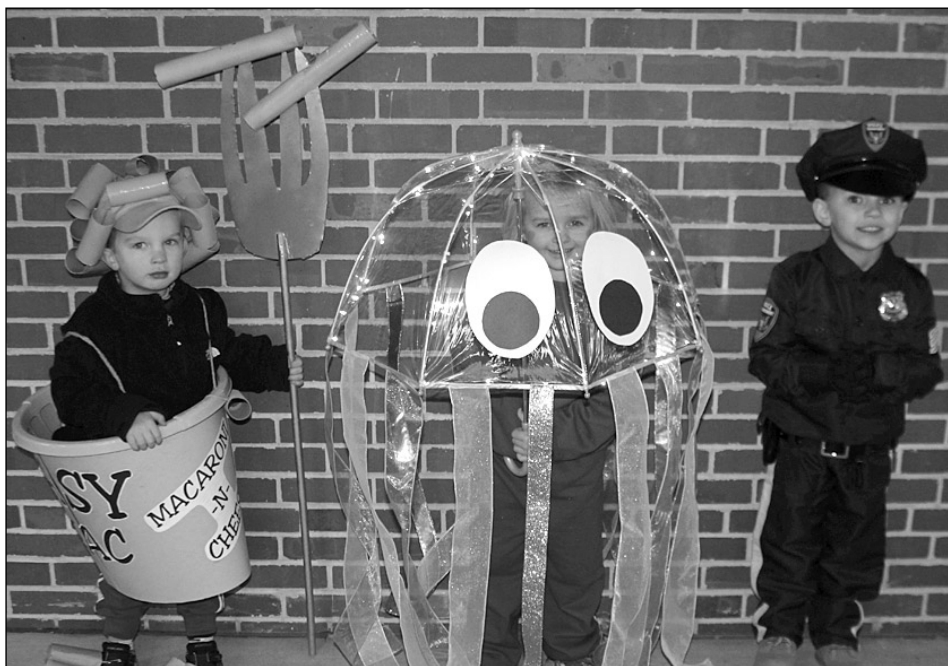

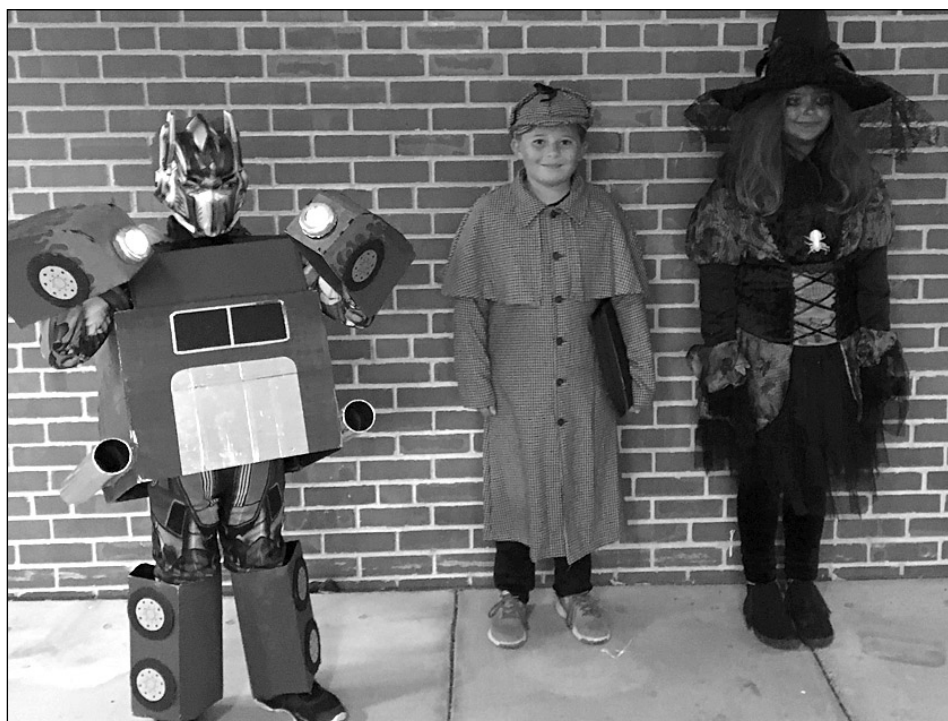
