Mitchell Participates In Warfighter Challenge

FORT LEONARD WOOD, Mo. - Not many people would put themselves through four days of extreme physical and mental exhaustion just to prove they are one of the best at what they do, but the son of a Hebron couple recently did just that.

Army Sgt. Kevin W. Mitchell, son of Chuck and Lori Mitchell of Hebron, put his body and mind to the test during the Warfighter Challenge, an annual competition held to determine which of the 35 three-man teams can stave off pain and fatigue to be called the best in the Army's Military Police Corps.

"I felt that representing the Criminal Investigation Command [CID] and the military police regiment as part of the first Triple Strand team was a challenge as we got to set the standard for future Triple Strand teams," said Mitchell, a member of the 48th Military Police Detachment, CID, Fort Carson, Colo.

The Warfighter Challenge kicked off with a physical fitness test consisting of three minutes of push-ups, sit-ups with 25 pound weights, chin-ups and a six-mile run on the evening of day one and ended with a 15-mile endurance march with gear weighing as much as 40 pounds.

On day two the teams ran an obstacle course with 12 challenges, cleared buildings and detained suspected insurgents, spotted and reported improvised explosive devices hidden along paths, and performed a day and night land navigation.

Day three started out with a mixed martial arts style combatives tournament, zeroing weapons before completing a team move and fire event, driving in a simulator resembling driving a HMVEE through an urban environment and engaging targets and IEDs. The last event of the day was a night fire exercise.

Before the final 15-mile march on day four, the competitors had to take a written exam.

Mitchell and the other competitors trained to prepare for the competition without knowing exactly what skill sets would be tested.

"I went to Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Wash., to train with my teammates over all aspects of the MP corps," said Mitchell, a 2003 graduate of Thayer Central High

School.

Even with all of the work before hand, there were one or two events that gave Mitchell more trouble than the others.

"The ruck marching with an extremely heavy ruck sack up long hills that never seemed to end was the most difficult part of the competition. It was also challenging because it

required the knowledge of all three jobs within the military police corps," said Mitchell.

For Mitchell, being a competitor is an accomplishment, but finishing in the top of the field would make the four days of events that much more meaningful.

"I think that completing the competition is more important than winning

it," said Mitchell, who has completed seven years of military service.

Military police have a very demanding job, and competing in the Warfighter Challenge proves that Mitchell and the 104 other contestants have what it takes to not only meet those demands, but to exceed them.

City Council raises sewer prices eight percent

Five properties determined nuisances

Sewer prices are going up as the Hebron City Council voted to increase rates at the regular meeting Oct. 4. The board had been discussing the possibility of raising rates throughout the summer. Monday night, the board approved the new rate schedule. "The new increase reflects an eight percent increase across the board," said interim mayor Larry Fangmeier. "The minimum monthly rate will increase from \$7.50 to \$8.10."

According to Ordinance 820, sewer service fees within the city limits will be \$4, while outside the city limits, the fee is \$8. A surcharge of \$1.18 for each 100 cubic feet of water or portion used during the base period will be assessed.

Income from the sewer service fees goes to the wastewater treatment facility operation and maintenance, a sewer sinking fund, and the general sewer fund.

In other business, Fangmeier notified the board that former council member "Bud" Ficken agreed to take on the task of building permit inspector for the City of Hebron. Although the job pays \$25 per permit, Fangmeier said he didn't think it covered the requirements of the duty properly, especially in regard to the enforcement of such permits. "I think we should allow \$100 per month for enforcement in addition to the regular \$25 per permit," he said. The Council agreed, but will draw up and pass the new ordinance at next month's meeting.

The board, however, went ahead and approved the assignment of Ficken.

Hebron Volunteer Fire Department Chief B.J. Linton updated council members on new warning sirens. "This has been in the works for about two years," he said. "We secured a grant from SENDD for new sirens, but Hebron will need to commit to 25 percent of the cost." He explained that he was at the meeting Monday night to get the council's approval for the commitment.

He noted that the grant was for \$80,000 which would buy five new rotating sirens. "We only have one rotating siren now which is at the fire hall," he said. "It was also recommended we move the siren by the school up to the water tower." Linton is currently awaiting details of the sirens such as a map indicating coverage. As soon as he receives the coverage measurements, location of the new sirens will be determined. The new equipment will be installed sometime this spring and be up and running by October 2011.

Finally, City attorney Joe Murray advised the board it needed to determine five areas in Hebron as nuisances to get the ball rolling on cleanup. "Once you determine them to be public nuisances, we can get notice to them," he said. "They can then request a hearing where you tell them why you think it is a nuisance and what you feel they need to do to clean it up,

or they can simply clean it up." The five properties are located at 740 Lincoln Ave.; 148 S. 10th St.; 415 N. 2nd St.; 340 S. 6th St.; and

115 S 7th St. The Council okayed notification to the owners that the properties were considered nuisances.

LINCOLN – Illegal immigration. The 2011 Legislature. Yes. The latter will talk about the former. No. Nothing significant is likely to be enacted. Relax. The same is true in virtually every state.

To flustered, frustrated voters who want Nebraska lawmakers to somehow do something that will make those in the state illegally go away, rest assured: legislators would like to do it. Fact: They can't.

Be of good cheer, however, if you're among those who want state government to be economically efficient. Until federal courts have ruled on the constitutional validity of the so-called Arizona law it would be a waste of money to enact a state statute and then try to enforce it. Let Arizona and local governments in other states bear the burden of those expensive court procedures. Proceed only after the U.S. Supreme Court provides what everyone hopes will be a clear explanation of what states can and cannot do in deal with illegals. Meanwhile, just hope that any high court ruling is, in fact, very clear. Ambiguity would only lead to even more attempts at the state to deal with the issue, and thus to even more expensive litigation.

Gov. Dave Heineman recently predicted that every state's legislature will consider get-tough immigration measures in 2011, with little being accomplished other than an airing of the frustration and perceived wishes of each state's electorate. Heineman cited the practical realities facing the states, acknowledging that the ultimate leadership roll resides with those in Washington D.C.

The view from here: Those whose position is that the law's the law and must be enforced should make a list of ways the government could / should deal with the issue. How, for example, could the government round up illegal immigrants en masse and ship them to their countries of origin? Try to envision such a scenario.

It seems most likely that illegal immigration has effectively taken its place among the nation's other perennial campaign issues: guns, gays and abortion.

Legislative budget

The Legislature's Executive Board recently completed a study of its own budget and how individual senators, and the Unicameral as a whole, could reduce annual spending. A lot of things are on the table, including cuts in senatorial staff and offices that compile a lot of information and handle much internal business for lawmakers.

Count plenty of lobbyists among those who wouldn't mind seeing lawmakers have to rely more on them for information about specific issues. There is a difference between a lobbyist's "research," a Google search and information gathered by those who work directly for lawmakers and the Legislature.

Rural stimulus dollars

The state's Rural Development Office, a USDA agency, recently noted the federal economic stimulus program had poured more than \$193 million into Nebraska for rural projects.

Maxine Moul, director of the agency, said the stimulus program has achieved a central goal. "It has saved jobs," she said.

Pushing Back on the EPA's Overreach

Over the last two years, the EPA has proposed burdensome new air and water regulations on everything from irrigation canals to methane from cows. We all know too well how these actions could negatively impact our nation's rural and agricultural economies.

America's farmers and ranchers are our nation's finest conservationists. Their livelihood has long depended on maintaining high quality soil, water, and even air. In spite of these efforts, the EPA has led a non-stop regulatory assault on America's farmers and ranchers.

As I meet with Nebraska agriculture producers, time and time again they express their concerns with onerous regulations being handed down by bureaucrats in Washington.

Recently, the Rural America Solutions Group – a caucus established by House Republicans – hosted a forum entitled "The EPA's Assault on Rural America: How New Regulations and Proposed Legislation are Stifling Job Creation and Economic Growth."

As a member of this group, I welcomed the opportunity to hear firsthand from those affected by EPA's job-killing agenda. Gerald Simonsen, a sorghum producer from Ruskin, Nebraska, offered testimony detailing agriculture producers concerns with EPA's regulations and the associated costs to rural America, jobs, and our nation's economy.

The forum covered the EPA's: Unnecessary and costly regulation of crop protection tools;

Proposed zero tolerance standard for pesticide spray drift; Attempts to stiffen the current regulatory standard on farm dust, which would make tilling a field, operating a feedlot, or driving a farm vehicle nearly impossible; and

Unprecedented proposed ban on the popular weed control product, Atrazine.

If any of these efforts are successful, the EPA could be responsible for the loss of thousands of agriculture-related jobs.

Moreover, the EPA recently considered classifying lead-based ammunition and fishing tackle as "toxic substances." That the EPA would even contemplate such an action shows how out of touch it and this Administration are with our way of life here in Nebraska. In fact, in 1976 Congress specifically exempted lead-based ammunition from being regulated as a toxic substance, and the EPA later confirmed it does not have the legal authority to regulate ammunition, though it left the door open to banning lead in fishing tackle.

Recreational angling contributes more than \$125 billion annually to the American economy and creates and sustains more than one million jobs. Cabela's – a major employer in our state – has described the proposal as having "a significant negative impact on the entire fishing community," in a letter sent before the forum.

I question the agency's authority and remain concerned about the lack of scientific evidence to warrant such regulation, which is why I sent a letter to EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson opposing banning lead in fishing tackle.

During a time of economic downturn, further federal overreach is not the answer. Farmers and ranchers should not have to worry about unreasonable federal regulations threatening their livelihood. It is imperative we prevent the EPA from imposing standards which would cripple American agriculture and stifle economic growth in rural communities.

Harvest Time in Nebraska

The fall harvest season is in full swing and Nebraska's farm families are putting in long hours to bring in what is expected to be record and near-record crops for many commodities.

I had an opportunity to visit with many producers recently when I spent a day last month at Husker Harvest Days. The event is a tradition for many Nebraska farmers and ranchers. It attracts producers and exhibitors from across the country.

Periodic rains this season have helped crops to be prosperous with a much-reduced need for irrigation. The outlook for an above-average yield, coupled with decent prices, led to optimism by many Husker Harvest Days participants I spoke with.

Farmers are eager to be in the fields as reports have predicted the potential

for record yields for both corn and soybeans. Good growing conditions across much of the state this year have benefitted corn and soybeans in particular. Both crops have matured ahead of last year, which has allowed farmers to get into the fields earlier than last fall when cool, wet weather made for a complicated harvest.

Western Nebraska producers are busy bringing in dry bean and sugar beet crops, winter wheat is being seeded, and ranchers are preparing to pull cattle in off pastures, moving spring calves to backgrounding or feedlot locations.

Harvest time is a good reminder of how important the success of Nebraska farmers and ranchers is to our state. A recent study of Nebraska's growing industries highlighted the fact that our strong agriculture industry has helped

maintain a relatively stable and positive outlook for the Nebraska economy, buffering many communities from feeling the full impact of the national economic slowdown. The outlook is not as bright in other parts of the country where agriculture plays a lesser role.

Strong demand for Nebraska's agricultural exports has contributed to our stability. As economies around the globe improve, demand for agricultural exports is expected to remain strong. Asian countries are among the key growth areas and Nebraska is well-positioned for continued growth in several markets. In August, Agriculture Director Greg Ibach returned from a trade mission to Taiwan and Hong Kong with an agreement for sales of \$436 to \$516 million of Nebraska grain commodities over the next two years.

A recent report by Battelle further emphasizes the critical role of our farmers and ranchers to the Nebraska economy. The report noted our diverse economy with at least 12 industries positioned for growth. Some of those industries include: renewable energy, transportation-warehousing and logistics companies, hospitality and tourism, food processors, research and development, and the biosciences. Each of these sectors has a connection to Nebraska agriculture and is the reason that one in three Nebraska jobs is tied to the work of our farmers and ranchers.

Fall harvest is the culmination of months of hard work for our farmers and ranchers. Their work is critical to our state's ongoing economic development and progress.





Thayer County Health Services is partnering with other healthcare providers in Nebraska to increase flu and pneumonia vaccinations. The campaign, Vaccinate and Communicate, has two goals: 1) encourage individuals to get immunized and 2) improve communication between patients and their healthcare providers regarding vaccination status and updates.

It is important for patients to inform their primary healthcare provider about any vaccines they receive outside their primary clinic. These updates will ensure your immunization status is up-to-date with the most current information. This communication will also ensure your vaccinations are administered properly and help avoid any missed opportunities and/or duplication.

Thayer County Health Services pledges to do their part in sharing immunization information with other healthcare providers as needed. This important information is a valuable tool used by healthcare providers to track and treat patients throughout the year. This combined effort, will improve patient safety and the overall health and well-being of our local communities during the flu season. Flu and pneumonia vaccinations are the first and most important step in protecting patients from these serious diseases. The flu shots being offered this year include the seasonal flu and HINI vaccine combined in the one shot. If you have questions regarding your vaccinations contact your primary healthcare provider.

This year, the immunization clinic at TCHS will again try to reach as many individuals as possible with the seasonal flu vaccine. To help facilitate this, TCHS will be offering a mass influenza vaccination clinic for adults on Oct. 28-





Warn the Sinner



The first of the spiritual works of mercy is to warn or admonish sinners. However, this is an extremely difficult thing to do in a way that is both caring and non-judgmental. Therefore, we should deliberate seriously about how or even whether to carry out this act of mercy and we should remember always that it is intended to be just that, an act of mercy. We should not be scolding or standing in judgement, but rather gently warning a fellow human being of their peril. One should enter upon this course of action with great humility, possibly misjudged the person's actions or their motives. But, if we are convinced that someone is sinning and thereby imperiling their soul, we should speak gently to them, in private if at all possible, using whatever tact and discretion we can muster. If the person refuses to listen, we should then consider calling on the help of someone who this person might trust and listen to. Finally, we should not expect to be thanked or appreciated for this act of mercy. The recipient of our warning is likely to think we are being judgmental, intolerant, and "holier than thou." So, we should make sure that we are one of these things, and reflect on how we might effectively warn the sinner.

My brethren, if any one among you wanders from the truth and some one brings him back, let him know that whoever brings back a sinner from the error of his way will save his soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins.



ELECTION PREVIEW

EDITOR'S NOTE

Nebraskans will be voting on two issues when they go to the General Election polls on November 2. So that voters can better understand these important proposed changes to the state Constitution, the Nebraska Press Association in cooperation with this newspaper has prepared this report. This report briefly defines each issue, explaining its purpose.

Amendment 1

Voters have a chance to allow the use of state and federal funds for local economic and industrial development projects, and to take some of the burden for those projects off their local property taxes and other levies.

If adopted at the general election, Proposed Amendment Number 1 would change the state constitution so the Legislature could give that option to voters in cities and villages. Lawmakers voted 47-0 to put the choice to a statewide vote. It was endorsed by the League of Nebraska Municipalities.

The constitution currently requires such projects to be financed only with money generated by local taxes.

Amendment 2

The size of state government will be reduced if voters adopt Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 2 at the November general election. The measure would eliminate the office of State Treasurer as of Jan. 8, 2015. The Treasurer's office now costs taxpayers \$26.5 million. The Treasurer receives an annual salary of \$117,000.

Proponents of the change note the Legislature would assign the current duties of the Treasurer's office to other state agencies. Critics contend it would be better to continue the practice of electing a State Treasurer.

The Treasurer's office has three duties: It receives and disburses most money that comes into state government; manages unclaimed property; and administers the child support enforcement and college savings programs.

PROPOSED BY THE 2010 LEGISLATURE PROPOSED AMENDMENT NUMBER 1

Fund sources may include property taxes, local option sales tax, or any other general tax levied by the municipality or generated from municipally owned utilities or grants, donations, or state and federal funds received by the municipality.

A vote AGAINST this amendment will not authorize the Legislature to permit municipalities to fund economic or industrial development projects or programs from additional fund sources.

TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT NUMBER 1

THE MEMBERS OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST LEGISLATURE OF NEBRASKA, SECOND SESSION, RESOLVE THAT:

Section 1. At the general election in November 2010 the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of Nebraska shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval or rejection:

To amend Article XIII, section 2: XIII-2 Notwithstanding any other provision in the Constitution, the Legislature may authorize any county or incorporated city or village, including cities operating under home rule charters, to acquire, own, develop, and lease real and personal property suitable for use by manufacturing or industrial enterprises and to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of acquiring and developing such property by construction, purchase, or otherwise. The Legislature may also authorize such county, city, or village to acquire, own, develop, and lease real and personal property suitable for use by enterprises as determined by law if such property is located in blighted areas as determined by law and to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of acquiring and developing or financing such property by construction, purchase, or otherwise. Such bonds shall not become general obligation bonds of the governmental subdivision by which such bonds are issued. Any real or personal property acquired, owned, developed, or used by any such county, city, or village pursuant to this section shall be subject to taxation to the same extent as private property during the time it is leased to or held by private interests, notwithstanding the provisions of Article VIII, section 2, of the Constitution. The acquiring, owning, developing, and leasing of such property shall be deemed for a public purpose, but the governmental subdivision shall not have the right to acquire such property by condemnation. The principal of and interest on any bonds issued may be secured by a pledge of the lease and the revenue therefrom and by mortgage upon such property. No such governmental subdivision shall have the power to operate any such property as a business or in any manner except as the lessor thereof. Notwithstanding any other provision in the Constitution, the Legislature may also authorize any incorporated city or village, including cities operating under home rule charters, to appropriate from local sources of revenue such funds as may be deemed necessary for an economic or industrial development project or program subject to approval by a vote of a majority of the registered voters of such city or village voting upon the question. For purposes of this provision, funds from local sources of revenue shall mean funds raised from general taxes levied by the city or village and shall not include any funds received by the city or village which are derived from state or federal sources. Subject to such vote, funds may be derived from property tax, local option sales tax, or any other general tax levied by the city

or village or generated from municipally owned utilities or grants, donations, or state and federal funds received by the city or village subject to any restrictions of the grantor, donor, or state or federal law.

Sec. 2. The proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors in the manner prescribed by the Constitution of Nebraska, Article XVI, section 1, with the following ballot language:

TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT NUMBER 2

THE MEMBERS OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST LEGISLATURE OF NEBRASKA, SECOND SESSION, RESOLVE THAT:

Section 1. At the general election in November 2010 the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of Nebraska shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval or rejection: To amend Article IV, sections 1 and 3:

IV-1 The executive officers of the state shall be the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, State Treasurer, Attorney General, and the heads of such other executive departments as set forth herein or as may be established by law. The Legislature may provide for the placing of the above named officers as heads over such departments of government as it may by law establish. The Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State,

and Auditor of Public Accounts, and State Treasurer shall be chosen at the general election held in November 1974, and in each alternate even-numbered year thereafter, for a term of four years and until their successors shall be elected and quali ?ed.

Each candidate for Governor shall select a person to be the candidate for Lieutenant Governor on the general election ballot. In the general election one vote shall be cast jointly for the candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor. The Governor shall be ineligible to the office of Governor for four years next after the expiration of two consecutive terms for which he or she was elected. The records, books, and papers of all executive of ?cers shall be kept at the seat of government. Executive of ?cers shall reside within the State of Nebraska during their respective terms of of ?ce. Of ?cers in the executive department of the state shall perform such duties as may be provided by law.

The heads of all executive departments established by law, other than those to be elected as provided herein, shall be appointed by the Governor, with the consent of a majority of all members elected to the Legislature, but of ?cers so appointed may be removed by the Governor. Subject to the provisions of this Constitution, the heads of the various executive or civil departments shall have power to appoint and remove all subordinate employees in their respective departments.

~~IV-3 The treasurer shall be ineligible to the office of treasurer, for two years next after the expiration of two consecutive terms for which he was elected. The term of of ?ce of the State Treasurer elected at the general election at which this constitutional amendment passes shall end on January 8, 2015, at which time the of ?ce shall be abolished.~~

Sec. 2. The proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors in the manner prescribed by the Constitution of Nebraska, Article XVI, section 1, with the following ballot language:
