## Tidbits

### Thayer County receives dividend...

Thayer County has received a monetary dividend of \$16,408 from the Nebraska Intergovernmental Risk Management Association (NIRMA), the county's property, liability and workers' compensation coverage provider. The dividend was part of a \$1,117,328 financial return distributed among 77 Nebraska counties and five regional area agencies on aging during NIRMA's annual conference and 25th anniversary celebration Oct. 3-4 in Kearney.

With this dividend, Thayer County has now received a total of \$256,348 in financial returns since becoming a member of NIRMA in 1988. NIRMA issues dividends from funds no longer needed for the payment of claims and general operating expenses.

NIRMA is owned and operated by the 80 member counties and 6 area agencies on aging it serves. This marks the 24th time since 1991 and the 18th consecutive year the program has been able to return funds, now totaling \$15 million, to members and ultimately their local property taxpayers.

## Backpack program provides food for families over the weekend

The Backpack Program continues in its fourth year at Thayer Central. This year it is helping to provide food for 16 area families over the weekend said Thayer Central Intermediate Principal Kurk Wiedel.

"Some of these students are guaranteed at least one good meal a day while they are at school," Wiedel said. "But once the weekend is here, there's no guarantee of that."

This program helps to ensure that

students get proper meals over the weekend.

The program is funded solely by donations and grants, but this year a donation goes a little farther because of a grant obtained by the Hebron Rotary Club. This grant will match donations totaling a little over \$1,500.

According to Deb Craig, who helped with obtaining the grant, the Hebron Rotary Club went together with Beatrice and Fairbury to apply for the grant. This gave them a better chance to receive it.

"It's a good program," Craig

said. "If you look at what the Rotary Club aims to accomplish in the community, this is a good example of it."

The non-perishable food is provided by the Lincoln Food Bank. Perishable items such as milk can be purchased by families through vouchers that can be used at local grocery stores, said Wiedel.

The program is open to any family. There are no specifications as to who can receive the backpacks. Information is given out to students at the beginning of the year and interested families are asked to

respond.

The local Girl Scout Troop 20412 puts together the backpacks on Thursday afternoons and students take them home on Fridays after school.

"In our communities there are these needs out there," said Wiedel. "This program helps in some way with that need."

The backpack program provides food for participating students throughout the entire school year, but due to limited resources does not continue throughout the summer months.

## School board discusses career education

The Thayer Central School Board met for its regular meeting on October 14.

Superintendent Drew Harris gave an update regarding the changes being made in career education. Many improvements have been made including new classes such as the small engines class, improvements to the lab and holding a freshmen parents' orientation.

Although many improvements have been made, there are some additional improvements that the school hopes to make. This includes a construction emphasis for next year that may be open for other area schools as well. There also needs

to be a career education advisory committee created. In addition to that, there is the hope that there will be more opportunities to allow students to see what jobs are available in the area.

The school board also discussed the current facilities projects. Work is underway for the new concession stand. The footings have been poured for the structure.

Board members also discussed new facility plans. They viewed a time line that would allow for a potential May election.

Harris also discussed some upcoming events for the school including the U.S. Cellular Cup

recognition on November 25.

High school principal Tom Kiburz gave an update about the many events that are happening at Thayer Central. Parent-teacher conferences were held last month. A movie night was held on October 13. There was a good turnout at the event. The hunter safety class has ended and 100 percent of participants were able to get their certificate. Many are signed up for Walk Wednesdays. This event will be held as weather permits.

In other business, the board moved to recognize the TCEA as the bargaining agent for certified staff.

## Alexandria board rejects ordinance

During the Alexandria village meeting on Oct. 9, the second reading of the proposed sex offender ordinance failed to go through.

According to Steve Deger, village board chairman, when the ordinance came up, a motion was made but there was no second. Because of this, discussion about the ordinance will not continue.

In September, the board went ahead and approved the first reading of the ordinance.

Before this approval, the village board received a letter from the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Nebraska stating issues that they saw with the current proposed ordinance. The letter stated that the restriction as presented goes beyond what is permitted by state law and what has been preempted by existing statutes.

In order for the ordinance to be established, it had to pass three separate readings.

Clara Lawson also left money to organizations around Nebraska including some local organizations. She served as County Extension Agent from 1951-1978. In total, her trust donated \$423,000 split between the organizations.

In Nebraska, she made donations to University of Nebraska Medical Center and Hastings College. She also made a donation to Oaks Indian Mission in Oklahoma. Locally, she donated to a local church, the PEO, the Hebron American Legion, Blue Valley Lutheran Home Foundation, Thayer County Health Services Foundation and Secrest Library.

# Pages of the Past...

## 1883

### 130 Years Ago

The Alexandria Creamery is nearly completed.

F. Servoss of Belvidere has added a stock of furniture to his hardware establishment.

Mrs. W.D. Galbraith will close out the millinery stock of Mrs. E.L. Johnson, deceased.

Freeman & Mall propose adding furniture and undertaker's goods to their hardware.

A large barn is being built in Talmadge's addition by a gentleman named Daniel Ellison.

Two parties, E.D. Kettlehut and Miss Alwerna Harder, living in Spring Creek precinct, were married.

E.B. Tyler has opened a new stone quarry on his farm five and one-half miles east of Hebron. He also has 500 grapevines of the Concord variety growing nicely.

The ending of the long, 15 years' waiting for a railroad, ought to be celebrated by the citizens of this place on the arrival of the first regular train by appropriate ceremonies and a big jollyfication.

Wetherald Brothers, proprietors of the Premium Flouring Mill of this place are crowded with work and are running their mill to its fullest capacity. They find a ready sale for their choice brands of flour.

There is now a little steamer on the Big Blue at Crete. The placid waters of the Little Blue at Hebron ought also to be ruffled by the prow and paddle wheels of a steamer.

Ed Hart of Kiowa reports killing this season five bull snakes, 10 rattlesnakes and 55 garter snakes, in all 70 snakes.

That 900 pound Jersey Red pig of Wetherald Brothers is almost a rhinoceros in size.

Silas Garrison of Gilead precinct is building a new dwelling house on his farm.

Hubbell will soon have a Presbyterian church building.

The case of the State against Mrs. Ellen Hinckley and Miss Sally Jackson, on complaint of Alfred Norboe, on the charge of petty larceny of lumber, was dismissed by Justice Hendershot for want of jurisdiction. A second arrest and examination resulted in a second discharge of the defendants on the ground that they "had once been put in jeopardy for the same offense."

In Spring Creek precinct, trouble arose over some sheep belonging to a man by the name of Church, but in care of a man by the name of Brush. Some of the sheep having done damage to a man by the name of August Guedes, the latter took them up and notified Brush to come over, pay damages, and get his sheep. He came on muleback, wrath. Some conversation ensued when he raised a whip to strike Guedes. The latter raised a cane, which caused the mule to throw its rider. At this juncture Guedes received reinforcements, his wife and mother-in-law, arriving on the field of battle. The settlement of the case before Justice Hendershot resulted in a judgment against Brush for fines and costs amounting to \$40.20. His attorney fees were \$25.

Obituaries: Cora I. Walker, aged 18 years, died at Hebron; Mrs. Ellen L. Johnson, aged 32 years, died in Hebron and Morgan R. Glenn, age 73 years, died in Hebron.

The Stone & McFarland block in Hubbell will soon be ready for occupancy.

Charley Parker of Hubbell has fenced his lots, painted his barn and otherwise improved. He has the nobbiest place in town.

## 1893

### 120 Years Ago

If the World's Fair is not soon closed we shall be compelled to employ a special reporter to keep note of the departures and returns. Those who do not report themselves to the Journal must not take offense if not reported.

It is reported that the drug store belonging to Otto Sperling of Belvidere, who is now attending the World's Fair, was broken into by burglars. The safe was blown open with dynamite and \$35 or \$40 taken. The work appears to be that of an expert.

Died at his home in Hebron of typhoid fever, William P. Gordon, son of Anthony E. and Amanda E. Gordon, aged 25 years. Mr. Gordon came to Hebron in 1889 from Indiana and within a month took the position of assistant cashier in the Thayer County Bank, which position he held at the time of his death. About two years ago he returned to Indiana and brought his widowed mother and two younger brothers to Hebron. At the time of his death he was Master of the Hebron Lodge of Masons and was considered one of the brightest and youngest members who ever held that position.

The sanitary condition of Hebron should receive the earnest and stern attention of the city authorities. If any citizen, no matter who he is, fails to comply with ordinances or instructions to keep his premises healthfully clean, he should be severely dealt with. The general health of the community is too sacred for any favoritism or indifference. The number of cases of typhoid fever in this city is a warning that should be heeded.

The Water Question: We invite the careful attention of the citizens of Hebron to the following propositions: The natural water supply of this city is known as "sheet" water. This is proved by the fact that water is found all over the city at the same level. That level corresponds with the river level. The water is found in a coarse gravel that has poor filtering qualities. In other words, the natural water supply of Hebron comes from the Little Blue River, and directly from that portion of it found in the sluggish and polluted water above the dam. Situated close to the river and draining into it are two slaughter houses. The polluted waters, imperfectly filtered by coarse gravel, explains, in a measure at least, the existence of typhus. The health of the community imperatively demands that the owners of the slaughter houses be requested to move them outside the corporate limits and where they will not contaminate the water of the river.

The new Lutheran church in Davenport is being built, the foundation having been laid this week.

Logan Beck of Deshler brought in 3,000 sheep from New Mexico.

The city restaurant in Belvidere which was owned by R.B. Upton, has changed hands, he having sold the entire stock to one Albert Rasher.

Gilead We have two schools in our little burg. The district school presided over by C.E. Jane and the German school, four days of each week, taught by the Rev. L.J. Gehrman.

It is rumored that a party from a neighboring town has rented the old hardware building and intends soon to start a saloon in it. What has Gilead done to merit such a curse?

High waters hit Hebron after two days of rain dropped anywhere from 6 to 9 inches on soil that was already saturated. Ernest Peithman of the local A.S.C.S. office said the figures compiled showed losses throughout the county and totals sent to the state were: Corn \$145,000, wheat \$770,000 (included sowed, washed out, etc.), milo, \$617,000, hay \$99,000 (both in field and in the stack), soybeans and other crops \$48,000. Total of damage to land area which was affected by the floods was \$1,682,416. Cattle losses were figured at \$11,000 and \$300,000 in pigs. The Hubbell community was the hardest hit where Rose Creek became at least a mile wide in places.

Approximately 550 attended the two special services held at St. John Lutheran Church in Chester celebrating its 75th anniversary.



# LBNRD Moving Toward Groundwater Metering And Reporting

The Little Blue Natural Resources District Board of Directors are moving forward on plans for metering all high capacity wells, those wells that pump over 50 gallons per minute. Their decision is based on gradually falling groundwater levels and increased nitrate levels across the district. The board's current proposal will be presented to the public at a public hearing before board members vote on the revised rules and regulations.

Groundwater in the Little Blue NRD declined approximately 4.25' from predevelopment to 1974 when the NRD assumed recording data. According to LBNRD manager Mike Onnen, "average water levels have dropped an additional 5.75' from 1974 to 2013, a total average decline of 10.0 feet across the District since predevelopment levels, some areas are down as much as 20' while some areas have shown little decline."

Many new irrigation systems are equipped with water conservation technology, and some producers are using water moisture sensors and other new technology to reduce water applications. However, there are still inefficient gravity systems in use, some irrigation systems are equipped with inefficient dump valves and end guns, and water waste and conservation are still occurring. "We can't predict an accurate water budget or manage the water resources properly unless we know what is being withdrawn said, Onnen."

Nitrate levels are also rising district-wide since the

early 1990s when the NRD began taking nitrate readings. Nearly every municipality has seen an increase in nitrates over the years of recording. For example, Onnen stated, "Hastings nitrate levels averaged about 1.5 ppm in 1960, 4.0 ppm in 1990, and today they are pushing 8.5 ppm. The rates have been accelerating in the last 10 years."

Perhaps a greater immediate concern is nitrate contamination. Rising groundwater nitrates are attributed primarily to agricultural fertilizer applications, whether from an earlier period of time or more recent activity. Over irrigation is a significant factor which can cause nitrates to percolate below the root zone.

The District Board has proposed the following timeline for action:

The NRD will require that all owners/operators record and report their total water use for 2014 crop year by either using a flow meter, an hour meter, estimated pumpage rate, or other district approved method. Pumpage reports would also be required from the owners of all businesses, industries, livestock, fish and wildlife, recreation users and municipalities who operate any high capacity wells or series of wells designed to pump over 50 gpm. Initial reports will be due by January 15, 2015.

All active high capacity water wells within the Little Blue NRD will be required to have an approved flow meter installed and operational by March 2017 according to a tentative schedule approved

by the board. Flow meters must meet the specifications adopted by the board and also be installed according to manufacturer's specifications.


If producers have meters that need repair please call the office, 402-364-2145, as soon as possible so NRD staff can retrieve and fix the meter this winter. Cost of parts for meters will be billed to the operator.

The groundwater user will also be required to report the number and location of all irrigated acres owned or under their control and all associated well registration numbers. The number of irrigated acres will be determined by using FSA records (if available), county assessor records, aerial photographs and any other available relevant information. After this process has been completed, any person who wishes to develop land for irrigation purposes or otherwise modify his certified irrigated acres will file an updated irrigation acre report.

The Board is currently reviewing their meter maintenance program and have decided not to cost share for flow meter purchases or installation.

Penalties will be imposed for failing to comply with District rules and regulations.

"We are recognizing that our groundwater supply has an ever-increasing value to our property values and economy here in the state," says Onnen. "We simply can't afford to overuse or contaminate the resource that sustains our way of life."

### FAMILY STRENGTHS

What makes a family successful? The answer is "strength" of the relationships between the family members rather than the structure of the family. Dr. John DeFrain, University of Nebraska Emeritus and colleagues conducted research with over 28,000 families.

Their research accentuates how family relationships are created and maintained over time to create a strong family. Six key family strengths can be found in their research:

- 1) Appreciation and affection for each other that is genuine and is expressed regularly.
- 2) Commitment to the family. Work and other priorities are not allowed to take too much time away from the family. The family is highly valued by its members, and individuals are faithful to each other.
- 3) Positive Communication. Family members enjoying talking to each other and listening to each other in an open, honest and pleasant attitude.
- 4) Enjoyable time together.

Family members like to be with each other and spend considerable amount of time enjoying each other's company. Besides being family, they are good friends.

5) Spiritual well-being and shared values. Family members share a sense of hope, optimism, faith, safety and happiness together. Their home is a sanctuary and their relationships bring them comfort. Extension educator Maureen Burson, writes that spiritual well-being can be seen as important and family members promote sharing, love and compassion for one another.

6) The ability to manage stress and crisis effectively. Strong families are not immune to troubles in life. They know how to work through hard times rather than exploding and blaming each other. The question is not "Who's responsible for this?" Strong families ask, "Where do we go from here?"



Assistant Coach Michelle Dubbert noted, “The JV played well with a lot of enthusiasm.


