Pheasants Forever youth mentorship hunt

Early Saturday morning on Oct. 18, 12 local youths, along with over 20 volunteers, came together for the Pheasants Forever Four Seasons youth mentorship hunt.

Pheasants Forever is a national organization dedicated to maintaining and restoring habitats for pheasants, quail and other wildlife. Four Seasons is the Thayer County chapter.

The youths were selected by the chapter's youth program chair. According to Randy Hergott, the Four Seasons chapter secretary, they try to pick youths who are not avid hunters or have not had the opportunity to hunt.

"[It was] awesome," Hergott. "I think they had a blast. They got to shoot blue rocks."

The hunts took place on local

pieces of land near Gilead and north and west of Hebron.

Each youth was partnered with a mentor for the hunt. A dog and dog handler was also assigned per pair of kids.

During the event, the youths learned about firearm safety, dog handling, landowner respect issues, wildlife habitat, trapping, outdoor survival, firearm cleaning and shooting instruction.

Overall, the organization felt the event was a success.

"Three of the youths even came back with pheasants," said Hergott.

"We had a lot of really significant donations this year," said Hergott. "Most of it will go toward habitat programs in the county."

School board approves for counseling intern

The Thayer Central school board has decided to take on a counseling intern from Doane College. The intern is a local, non-traditional student that attends Doane College.

"There are elementary schoolers and high schoolers that would benefit from talking to someone," said Kurk Wiedel, elementary principal at Thayer Central Community School. Wiedel also noted that McCool Junction took on a counseling intern as well and that it has been going well.

All students will require parental permission before meeting with the counselor.

Thayer County Economic Development Alliance awarded funds

USDA Rural Development has awarded \$90,000 to Thayer County Economic Development Alliance (TCEDA) of Hebron.

The funds will be used to develop a revolving loan fund to provide financial incentives for small and emerging private business enterprises within Thayer County.

"This is a fantastic opportunity for our small and emerging businesses," said Jeremy Voss, Executive Director of TCEDA. "Previously, our role in capital assistance was relatively small but these funds will allow us to aid in much larger projects."

"The revolving loan fund will be used to the maximum extent possible to create and/or retain jobs and broaden the county's tax base," said Bill Sheppard, USDA Rural Development business programs specialist. "More specific loan uses would include providing real estate improvements, working capital, inventory, equipment, machinery, or other fixed assets; business construction and business expansion."

Hebron American Legion Auxiliary considers inactive status

The Hebron American Legion Auxiliary (HALA), which has been around for about 65 years, is considering taking an inactive status.

The American Legion Auxiliary is the largest, women's patriotic service organization in the world. It includes nearly 900,000 members who are either veterans, immediate relatives of American Legion members or relatives of deceased veterans. They were founded to serve the needs of American veterans and their families.

According to Debra Albers, member of Davenport #335 and Historian for the Department of Nebraska, although the group has good membership, few members are attending meetings and taking on leadership roles.

Department of Nebraska President Barbara Skillman recently visited the group to discuss options.

For this group to go to an inactive status, a huge hole would be left in the community of Hebron, according to Albers. Members were encouraged to stay active, ask younger members for help, to use group methods of leadership, and promote their organization.

1884

130 Years Ago

Arnold and Solomon Scoville, father and son, of Warren, Ohio, arrived on Tuesday and are visiting relatives in this county. It is expected they will become Thayerites. Contrary to the general political sentiment of the Scoville family in this county, who are Jacksonian democrats, the new arrivals are solid republicans.

Four members of the family of J.R. Reynolds, of Gilead precinct, have been quite sick with typhoid fever, but are now convalescing.

It is said that Monroe Bolton of Davenport, in connection with an Iowa capitalist, will start another bank at Davenport, this county.

The Wisconsin Lumber Co., of Carleton, will soon build an elevator. A 10-horse power engine will furnish power for the elevator machinery. (Alexandria News)

Samuel Fitzsimmons of Somerset Avenue, Carleton precinct, has recently built a new barn.

J. L. Brown has purchased the creamery established here some months ago, by J. L. Reed and L. Lyon.

At the school meeting recently a building committee was selected and work will be commenced on the new school building at an early date. The house will be two stories high and contains four rooms.

1894

120 Years Ago

Robinson & Orendorff will take a trip in a few days to Oklahoma. They go to find a location to which they will move their soda water plant.

John Sawyer has been having W.B. Hughes' steam irrigating plant thoroughly soak a portion of his farm for next year's melon crop.

Heinrich Kerl, Albert Lorenz and Focke E. Osterkamp were admitted to citizenship at the last term of district court.

H.H. Flagg has bought H. Kockentier's bakery and restaurant, retaining the latter's baker in his employ. Mr. Kockentier will move on his farm about three miles west of the city.

The Saloon case came up for action before the city dads Wednesday night. The remonstrators did not appear and Wm. Otto was granted license to sell wet goods in this village until next May.

1904

110 Years Ago

A.A. Brown of Fredericksburg, Iowa, has moved to Thayer county with his family, consisting of his wife, five young men and a girl. Also from the same place, P.J. Padden and family, Jr. Kendall and son, and Mrs. Julia A. Padden and two daughters.

Wetherald, Wood & Co. are putting in a solid support stone wall from the eastern abutment of their dam to the mill. S.S. Wilson, of Clay Center, is chief engineer.

The first gun in the campaign in Deshler was fired last Tuesday by the republicans at a largely attended meeting held at the A.O.U.W., hall, Congressman Hinshaw being the speaker. He dwelt at length on the national issues and in closing gave a splendid eulogy to the high ideals and the broad statesmanship of President Roosevelt.

1914

100 Years Ago

A wedding of more than ordinary interest was solemnized at the South Lutheran church Wednesday when Miss Amelia Eppler and Christof Johnson were united in marriage. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Eppler of near Ohiowa.

While killing a beef Tuesday morning, Adolph Peggee, the butcher at Deshler, accidentally shot Will Oehling, the porter of Uphoff's saloon, at the slaughter yard, a mile east of town. The cartridge passed through the steer's head, then through a board of the wall and hit Will in the right leg, just above the knee.

The Gilead post office changed hands last week. Mr. McKinney is the new postmaster. Quite a change will be made here this week. The post office will be moved to the hardware store building; the hardware will be moved to the butcher shop, and the butcher shop to the building erected for that purpose by Mr. Goldstein.

Monday, the large electric light on the top of the tower was lighted for the first time. It shed a nice light and can be seen for 20 miles. The light plant is now in operation and the town wears a much better appearance. A large number of buildings are being wired, a large number having been completed.

1924

90 Years Ago

The Farmer's Grain Company is making a big improvement on the site of the grain office. The old red shack that has weathered many a storm is being torn down and H.R. Park has his men at work on a slightly stucco office building. Many a Bruning man witnesses the passing of this old landmark with a sign of regret as many a legal and political debate has been fought to a final conclusion in this little two by four.

Mrs. E. M. Correll, pioneer lady, died at Hebron after a brief illness. She came to Hebron with her husband before Hebron was surveyed and has made this her home since that time. She had reached the age of 74 years, two months and 18 days. The minutes of the first town meeting in Hebron are in her handwriting. She was associated with her husband in editorial work on the Hebron Journal, was active in organizing the first woman's suffrage association in the state of Nebraska, which was at Hebron, and was the organizing regent of the Oregon Trail Chapter, D.A.R., and was interested in genealogical history, tracing her ancestry to the Bunker's who owned Bunker Hill.

1934

80 Years Ago

Not until one investigates the amount of food required for the CCC camp here, can one imagine the vast amount that 200 boys can absorb in a week's time. In an interview with Capt. R. Garrett, in charge of the camp, interesting figures were revealed. According to the captain, 350 pounds of potatoes are used daily, to say nothing of 120 loaves of bread, 92 pounds of beef, five cases of eggs, 600 pounds of sugar and 200 pounds of flour a week. All the food has been bought locally, amounting to approximately \$2,400 a month.

C. C. Meisner, night marshal at Deshler, was stabbed just after midnight this morning by an intoxicated man who had been arrested for disturbing the peace. He suffered much loss of blood, but is expected to recover.

1944

70 Years Ago

As a member of a group cited for gallantry in the China-Burma-India theatre, T-Sgt. William O. Casebolt, 1390 Quincy Ave., was awarded the Bronze Star Medal at an air base in India.

Nebraskans will be asked to purchase \$94,000,000 in Ward Bonds during the Sixth War Loan, November 20 to December 16, as this state's share of the 14 billion dollar national goal. State Chairman W. Dale Clark of the Nebraska War Finance Committee told members of the Thayer County Committee at a group conference at Hebron.

Duane Decker, 16, Carlton, was instantly killed Saturday by the accidental discharge of his gun while getting out of a car. Duane and Henry Voss, 15, son of Anton Voss, had gone hunting in the Voss car accompanied by Duane's two younger brothers. Apparently the hammer of the gun caught on some part of the car as he climbed out and was discharged.

Aviation Cadet Bill B. Svoboda, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Svoboda of Hebron, has reported at Carlsbad, N.M., Army Air Field, where he will receive advanced flight training in high level bombardiering and dead-reckoning navigation. On graduation he will be awarded silver bombardier's wings and will be ready for active duty as an officer in the Army Air Forces.

A memorial service will be held for Lt. Freeland Dunker in Trinity Lutheran Church in Friedensau on Sunday.

60 Years Ago

A coroner's inquest jury decided that no blame will be placed on either of the drivers who figured in an accident which resulted in the death of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Baker of Alamosa, Colo. The Bakers were former residents of Belvidere, Mr. Baker being the brother of Mrs. Bert Collins of Belvidere and Mrs. Baker being the former Lucia Trumble.


The Legion of Safety, a large safety and rescue unit costing \$65,000 will visit Hebron next Thursday for public inspection.



National Teen Driver Safety Week

This week is National Teen Driver Safety Week. This is an important reminder to promote safe driving among our teens.

In the last decade, the number of teens aged 13-19 years who died in motor vehicle crashes declined by 50 percent, from 5,718 to 2,823.

During this same period, the rate of passenger vehicle drivers aged 16-19 years involved in fatal crashes decreased by 52 percent, from 35.1.

Graduated driver's license laws in some states have been credited with contributing to this decline.

However, despite these encouraging trends, motor vehicle crashes remain the leading cause of death for teens.

Of the teens who died in passenger vehicle crashes in 2012, approximately 60 percent were not wearing a seat belt. Eleven percent of teenage drivers who died in crashes in 2010 were distracted.

Survey results indicate that young drivers are still engaging in behaviors that causes them to take their eyes and minds off the road, creating risks for themselves and others.

It's dangerous to use a cell phone behind the wheel. But many teenagers and other young drivers still play the odds by talking or texting on a handheld cell phone or operating a mobile device while driving. Those are the findings of a recent nationally representative survey of drivers 16 to 21 years old by the Consumer Reports National Research Center.

Almost half of the respondents said they had talked on a handheld phone while driving in the previous 30 days. Close to 30 percent said they had texted in that time. And some had operated smartphone apps (eight percent) or used e-mail or social media (seven percent) while behind the wheel.

Yet almost all of them considered texting, using smartphone apps, or accessing the Internet to be danger-



ous while driving; about 80 percent thought it was very dangerous. Also, 63 percent of those surveyed saw talking on a handheld phone while driving as dangerous.

Moreover, most respondents had seen their peers doing similar things in that time. Eighty-four percent saw other young people talking on a handheld phone, more than 70 percent witnessed texting, and about a third saw peers using apps, e-mail, or social media behind the wheel.

Young drivers were also asked about the driving habits of mom and dad. Forty-eight percent witnessed their parents talking on a handheld phone in the previous 30 days, and 15 percent saw them texting.

Having peers in the car may help curb distracted driving. Almost 50 percent said they were less likely to talk on a handheld cell phone or text when friends were along. One reason may be that many young people are speaking up; almost half said they had asked a driver to stop using a phone in the car because they feared for their safety.

Whether you're a parent, friend, or sibling, set a good example. Parents can be good role models by always wearing their seat belts and insisting that their teen drivers and all of their passengers always buckle up.

They also should stop the car in a safe place if they need to use a cell phone. And if you're riding with a driver using a phone, ask him or her to put it down and stop gambling with your safety. No message, phone call or just wanting to be more comfortable is worth the cost of a life. When any of us driving or a passenger in a vehicle, we should always think safety first.

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




Thayer Central Senior of the Week is Peyton Schmitt. Peyton is the son of Jerry and Kelly Schmitt.

Test for Water Quality

Marlene Faimon, Programs Manager at the Little Blue Natural Resources District (NRD) in Davenport, gave a great presentation to the Leading Locally class to tell the group the duties of the NRD. I learned that Nebraska is the only state that has Natural Resource Districts and that it was mandated by the Legislature.

Marlene shared that the NRD will test water from private wells for nitrates free of charge. Testing private drinking water supplies in Nebraska is not required by federal or state regulation, with some exceptions such as licensed childcare facilities and foster care home water supplies.

The UNL publication "Drinking Water: Test for Quality" states that generally, private water supplies should be tested annually for nitrate and bacterial contamination.

These tests also should be considered after flooding, when there is any noticeable change in taste, color or smell and always after repairs or alterations are made to the well or water system.

Testing for nitrates should occur any time a pregnant woman, woman anticipating pregnancy or infant under six months old becomes a water

user from a private well. The best location to collect a water sample is at the tap used most frequently for drinking and cooking. Take care when sampling for bacterial contaminants because bacteria are commonly carried on dust and dirt particles, so avoid drawing a sample in extremely dirty locations where dust could accidentally enter the sterile sample container.

Clean, indoor locations are best for drawing water for a test. Do not touch the inside of the bottle or lid when taking the sample.

Most laboratories recommend removing the aerator from an interior faucet before collecting a bacteria water sample, and some recommend disinfecting the faucet with heat or chlorine before collection.

It is best if you take your water test during the early part of the week – especially if you mail your water sample. Testing laboratories prefer that the water does not sit in a mail room over the weekend.

You can get water-test bottles at the UNL Extension office. Marlene says that you can bring in a sample to the NRD in a clean/sterilized jar and they will do water testing in the Davenport location.

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
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Governor Visits Deshler Schools on Salute to Manufacturing Tour
