Thayer Central lunch servers, faculty react quickly after plastic is found

On Tuesday, Oct. 16, the Thayer Central lunch servers acted quickly when they noticed something unusual in the food they were serving. A shard of plastic was spotted in meat that the servers were using to prepare Philly sandwiches for students.

"Once they discovered the plastic, we immediately stopped serving the sandwiches," said Thayer Central superintendent Drew Harris.

The plastic found in the meat was a very small piece. Harris estimated that it was roughly a quarter inch long and the thickness of pencil lead. The piece was spotted in the serving tray.

Approximately 120 students had been served before the piece was found. The staff then prepared other

sandwiches to serve to the remaining students.

The precautions didn't stop there. Harris then contacted a local doctor to see what symptoms the staff and parents needed to look for in case a student had swallowed a piece of plastic.

The doctor told Harris that acute stomach pain would be the main symptom to be on the lookout for in the first 48 hours.

There have been no reports of any sort of pain after eating the sandwiches, said Harris.

After the piece was found, the staff at Thayer Central took steps to ensure that parents were notified. Letters were sent to all parents of students who had eaten the sandwiches before the plastic was found.

Teachers also spoke with the older students to see if they had noticed anything crunchy in their food

when they ate the sandwiches.

The beef used in the sandwiches has been recalled according to a recall issued by the U.S. Department of Agricultural Food Safety and Inspection Service.

The release states that Central Valley Meat Company of Hanford, Calif., has recalled approximately 89,720 pounds of ground beef that may contain small pieces of plastic.

The products bear the establishment number "Est. 6063A" inside the USDA Mark of Inspection.

The products were produced on July 23, 2013, and can be further identified by case code "6063A3204A" or "6063A3204B" or "6063A3204C."

The meat was intended for use in the National School Lunch Program and has been shipped to distribution centers in Arkansas, Nebraska and North Carolina.

County Board hears about hospital updates

The Thayer County Board of Commissioners met on Oct. 16 to hear updates concerning many organizations.

The meeting began with county road department updates from road superintendent Richard Heinrichs.

The roads department currently is working on improving county roads. They are also looking into purchasing newer equipment within the next year.

Talk about the new county seal contest continued during the meeting. The group hopes to hold the contest within the next couple of months. Ray Wright, who is helping with the contest, hopes to create a template that will be available on the county website, at local schools and at local businesses. This template will allow anyone who wants to enter the contest easy access to it so they can participate. The group still hopes to have three divisions and award a prize to each division. They will also select an overall winner from the division winners.

During the final portion of the meeting, commissioners met with Thayer County Health Services CEO Michael Burcham and past interim administrator Janel Ali Dinar.

The two spoke about current projects within the hospital and future plans.

"Our goal is to get this hospital to be the number one critical access hospital in the state," Dinar said.

They are looking towards cost efficient yet high quality care to do this. Burcham hopes to begin measuring the efficiency by building reports with the current computer system.

They also spoke about the rural clinics and possible new positions within the hospital. These include a CFO and a physician in the future.

In other business, the commissioners:

- moved to direct the chairman to sign the Certification of Cost Allocation Plan as submitted by Maximus.
- approved salary claims.
- approved monthly reports.

The commissioner's next meeting will be on Oct. 30.

Train depot gets a new home in Belvidere

The train depot that has been sitting in Alexandria for over a century recently took a little trip to a new spot in Thayer County on Oct. 16.

The train watching committee recently came up with the idea to move it to Belvidere. The nine mile trek took the help of Norris Public Power and a house moving company.

"Once we found out that it was the last depot in the county, that made it even more valuable to us," said Linda Hudson.

The depot is over a century old although the exact date that it was built in Alexandria is not known. The train watching committee will work to fix it up. They hope to make it look like it used to, Hudson said.

A dray wagon has also been donated and will sit inside the depot. The dray wagon was used to move items from the train such as luggage or mail.

The depot and dray wagon add to the project put together by the Belvidere Woman's Club. In addition to the train depot, the club has added a train watching station and a rail car to the area.

They hope to add even more benches and a bathroom in the area. Donations from locals have allowed this project to grow and

continue, but the group is also continually raising funds to try and help with the costs of improvements to the area.

The train watching station is located just north of the railroad tracks in Belvidere. It is available

for train watching at any time, but usually gets the most use when the steam locomotive makes a stop in Belvidere.

Hudson said the group hopes to get the steam engine to make a stop again sometime next year.

130 Years Ago

Married at Hebron by Judge Lobingier, Sidney Morford and Miss Lillie McCormick, both of Hubbell.

Attention is called to the card of John Scoville, auctioneer. Scoville informs us he has already cried 59 sales in this county.

Phillip Moll will move into his new store in Carleton in two weeks. His family has moved from Alexandria and joined him at his new location.

Married at the residence of J.Q. Adams, near Carleton by the Rev. J. McDonald, Jno. H. Bailey and Miss Loretta Adams.

Married at the residence of A.C. Ring, Hebron, Dr. J.C. Mosshard of Chester and Miss Annie C. Hess of Hebron.

Prof. D.T. Dusenbery will have an auction sale of his stock, farming implements and household effects, after which he will return to Wahoo where he is teaching.

It has been suggested that unscrupulous efforts will be made to vote the transient railroad workers, who are not citizens of Thayer County, at the polls in this county next election. While the law plainly fixes the qualifications of voters and imposes heavy penalties, illegal voting sometimes occurs, either because no one challenges or because the judges do not do their duty. All good citizens ought to see that only legal votes are polled. If elections become generally corrupt the downfall of the republic is certain.

A company has been organized at this place under the name of The Hebron Proprietary Manufacturing Company, for the purpose of manufacturing and selling Dutcher's Celebrated Hoof Ointment, Dutcher's Lini-ment and Dutcher's Condition Powders.

Now is the time when the unaccommodating stovepipe doth refuse to fit, and the perspiring man doth wipe his face with black and bleeding hands, and doth cry out in much wrath, "jam the pipe to jell."

Harbine on the B&M railroad, in southeastern part of Thayer County, on the state line, was originally laid out about half in Nebraska and half in Kansas. We are informed that the houses built on the Kansas side are being removed to the Nebraska side and that the town will be hereafter wholly in Thayer County.

Mrs. Stevie Payne and Miss Katie Creighton, under the firm name of Payne & Creighton, have opened a millinery and dress-making establishment in the building next to Malowney & Wilson's office.

A.G. Collins, president of the First National Bank of this place, and his family, are now occupying elegant apartments in the rooms above the bank.

The owner of the trotter Jay-Eye-See has refused \$60,000

for him and says nothing less than \$100,000 will buy him. After they read this item, we expect C.B. Coon, W.L. Thompson and J.J. Malowney will advance the price on their horses.

J.M. Bennett has resigned his position as teller of the National Exchange Bank and will soon remove with his family to Hebron, Thayer County, Nebraska, where he will engage in business and take charge of John G. Deshler's interests in that county — Columbus Ohio State Journal.

Died of paralysis at his home near Hardy, Alonzo B. Grannis, aged 55 years.

A continuous rain of five days has thoroughly wet the ground in this portion of the "Great American Desert," of a part of which Capt. J.C. Fremont said 36 years ago, "It never rains in Nebraska."

A gentleman from Illinois, a painter by trade, is in Belvidere with the intention of locating.

Mr. Schwitters is fixing up rooms above his store for rent in Belvidere. There is a great demand of houses.

The livery firm of Crawford & Rasher of Belvidere has changed to Schultzy & Rasher. Henry Schultzy being the new member.

Coal is becoming a very scarce article. Hardly any is to be got but still the demand is as urgent as ever. We shudder to think of the coming winter.

1893

120 Years Ago

The iron work of the new bridge is in position.

It is reported that Mrs. Joseph Klaes is sick with typhoid fever.

Wetherald Brothers have built an apron to their dam and otherwise strengthened the latter structure.

On account of a number of workmen becoming useless from drunkenness, the Rock Island has changed the headquarters of its work train from Hebron to Gilead.

In all the bright lexicon of youth, my son, there is no such word as fail for the Republican ticket in this year of grace 1893.

F.A. Powell informs us that H. Burgess has sold his elevator at Stoddard to Harry Wilson, the consideration being \$2,546.

The World's Fair is announced to close next week. There will be an immense crowd there on Monday.

After a somewhat exciting chase, a sneak thief was captured by Constable Ed Shearer and landed in the Bastille. He was seen taking a box of woman's underwear from a wagon. His trial will take place today.

Much interest has been awakened in the Lichtenwalter school district by the Rev. Hostetter. Last Tuesday afternoon, 17 converts were immersed in the Sickler millpond. The Rev. Hostetter is a member of the Christian Church.

Marshal W.J. Green arrested three of the workmen of the Rock Island repair train. They

had imbibed freely of membrane destroyer and intestine annihilator, and disturbed the serenity of the city. The three offenders were put in the Bastille overnight. In the morning they had sufficiently recovered to be introduced to Police Judge Hendershot. After considering their cases awhile, the judge remarked that it would cost them \$14.50 each to repair the shattered dignity of this city, and that in default of the money they could perform muscular exercise on the streets at the rate of a dollar a day and board at the Hotel de Jail where they could also lodge at nights. Thereupon the marshal conducted them back to the Bastille.

On Tuesday, Arb Scott was arrested for playing ball within the limits of the City of Hebron. He was fined one dollar and costs which he paid.

Judge Hendershot also reports he performed the following marriages: Isaac Magers to Miss Lucinda Dawgthy; Samuel Elliott to Miss Adaline Swaley, and Christ H. Atherns to Miss Temply Callion, all of Thayer County.

G.R. Dill, Belvidere's undertaker, prides himself in having the best there is in his line to such an extent that he purchased a \$900 hearse for this service.

The new building on the west side of main street in Gilead will be occupied by Conrad Kisling as a shoe shop.

The Lutheran Church steeple in Gilead was completed by the addition of a handsome spire.

S.W. Losey of Cambridge, came to Hubbell with a car of emigrant goods.

James Dobyns of Hubbell left for Rulo, where he has been assigned as night operator by the B&M.

1923


90 Years Ago




