Alcohol may have been a contributing factor in a fatal crash Friday night near Gilead.

Danny C. Thiemann, 53, of Hebron, was found dead in his 2008 Ford pickup truck on 709 Road at about 9:30 p.m., Friday night. In a news release from the Jefferson County sheriff's office, Thiemann was driving west when he lost control of the pickup and entered a ditch. When he tried to drive out of the ditch, the truck's front end struck the road and the truck flipped onto its top. The roof caved in on top of Thiemann trapping him inside the vehicle.

The report indicated that the air bags did not deploy and that Thiemann was not wearing a seatbelt.

State Roads to hold workshop concerning projects in Thayer County

The Nebraska Department of Roads will hold an open house workshop Tuesday, Oct. 30, regarding two projects on Nebraska Highway 53 (N-53) through and south of the Village of Alexandria. The open house will be held from 4-6 p.m., at

the Alexandria Community Center, Hwy. 53 and 5th St. in Alexandria.

The proposed projects will be constructed entirely in Thayer County.

The Alexandria South project begins at the junction of U.S. Highway 136 (US-136) and N-53. The project

proceeds north for about seven miles and would end north of the north corporate limits of Alexandria. Proposed improvements include resurfacing of the existing highway and in Alexandria, curb ramp improvements to meet Americans with Disabilities

Act standards.

The Alexandria South Bridges project would include replacing the existing bridges at the Little Blue River and the Big Sandy Creek with

Guidance and direction for these listening sessions and survey is provided through the planning

Fencing on county rights-of-way could lead to fines

Thayer County Department of Roads Supervisor Richard Heinrichs understands the installation of temporary fencing, especially for landowners with livestock. But sometimes the fences encroach on county rights-of-way or get too close to the roadway and that could spell trouble for both the landowner and the county. "Installing temporary fencing on county rights-of-way is a common practice throughout the state," he said and added, "Landowners want to allow their cattle to graze the rights-of-way, but don't realize the liability they are presenting to themselves and the county."

Little Free Libraries come to Hebron

Take a book, read it, return it - or replace with another

A new fad is sweeping the country - little boxes erected in people's yards, along country roads, midtown parks

or busy shopping venues. Are they a new form of yard art? Elaborate mail receptacles? Often themed, the boxes take on an artistic appeal beckoning passers-by to ask the question, "what's that?"

"They're little free libraries," says Clarence Baden, who just finished installing a brightly painted little box in his own front yard in Hebron. Baden said his wife Anne read about the new fad and after visiting a Little Free Library in Hadar, Ne., asked him if he could build her one.

Author Charlotte Endorf, who grew up in Alexandria and frequently returns to visit, has seven boxes gracing her front yard in Hadar.

The boxes hold books collected by or donated to the sponsor of the little library. The books are free for the taking - there's really only one suggestion - replace the one taken or bring it back after it's been read.

"I thought it would be fun to have one," Anne said and added with a shrug, "anything we can do to promote reading..."

The Little Free Library is the creation of Todd Bol and Rick Brooks of Wisconsin. The first was set up in 2009 as a memorial to Bol's mother. It quickly caught on with neighbors, families, retirees and children, so a website was set up to track where in the world new libraries popped up.

Nearly 3,000 in over ten countries as it turns out, including the United

Bauhard is new Thayer County Veterans Service Agent

Meet the new Thayer County Veteran's Service Agent, Dr. Marlin Bauhard. Most will recognize him from his many years of patient care as a family physician at Thayer County Health Services. Dr. Bauhard practiced medicine at the local clinic and hospital from 1985 to 2009.

Beginning Oct. 1, he stepped into the shoes of past service agent Rodney Kirchhoff. Dr. Bauhard, who is also a veteran, says the office is available to help any veterans with submitting claims for compensation, disability issues and questions about their pensions.

"There's been a lot of attention lately on veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts such as post traumatic disorder," he said. "Rehabilitation from severe wounds are also at issue and getting veterans back into the work force is a problem," adding that the unemployment rate for veterans is higher than it is for civilians.

Dr. Bauhard is a Viet Nam veteran having served in the United States Army as an x-ray technician and medic. He spent the final months of his enlistment - August 1969 to December 1969 - in Viet Nam.

The Thayer County Veterans Service Office is open two days a week, Tuesday and Wednesday, from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Davenport VFD assists on major Clay/Fillmore County blaze

The Davenport Volunteer Fire Department was one of 12 departments called in a week ago to assist on a field fire that started on the Clay/Fillmore County line near Sutton. The fire, traveling on 40 mph winds, eventually scorched a 5-mile long by 3/4-mile wide area of land damaging two homes, one abandoned and one unoccupied, seven farm buildings, 20 acres of corn, and 80 acres of soybeans.

The combined forces of wind and drought are making fires exceptionally hazardous right now. Thayer County has seen three in the last ten days including a ditch fire near Davenport on Oct. 9; a bean stubble field four miles west of Hebron on Oct. 11; and a combine fire near the intersection of Highways 4 and 5. Luckily none of the blazes reached emergency levels, but the risk is extremely high for such fires to get out of control right now.

Nebraska has had approximately 333,000 acres burned by wildfires this season.

At the conclusion of her lecture a vote was taken upon the adoption of the pending amendment, a large number voting in favor and only one against, the question of the success of woman suffrage is one of the inevitables and bids fair to carry in Nebraska at the coming election.

At midnight Monday, L. Albert awakened from his slumbers to discover the entire rear end of the Frank Bruning building, occupied by the Wilhelms millinery store, in flames. Mr. Albert immediately awakened manager Klein and Lela Mitchell, night operator at the telephone exchange. Mr. Klein immediately went to hose house No. 2 and was on the ground when the fire boys arrived. The fire had gained great lead way and the building, together with the contents, were a total loss to the owners. The building was one of the oldest frame structures in Bruning and has many a tale to tell of the early history of Bruning.

Most of the old residents of this place will remember a Mr. Heimlich who resided in this place a number of years ago. He owned a hardware store on the corner where Hank Culp is now running a garage. The building burned down several years ago. The officers of the lodge received word of his death.

classroom, it is often hard for rural school districts to afford ever-improving technologies that enhance learning. Thanks to the support of local farmers and America's Farmers Grow Rural EducationSM, Thayer Central Community Schools received a \$10,000 grant to purchase Vernier technology, which is used for data collection and analysis.

America's Farmers Grow Rural Education, sponsored by the Monsanto Fund, gives farmers the opportunity to nominate a public school district in their community to compete for a grant of either \$10,000 or \$25,000 to enhance education in the areas of math and/or science. More than 1,000 nominated school districts submitted applications. The Monsanto Fund will invest \$2.3 million into rural education through this program.

"The impact of this grant will translate into huge gains for our kids in the areas of science and technology," said Drew Harris, Thayer Central Community Schools superintendent. "Thanks to America's Farmers Grow Rural Education and the farmers who nominated us, we are able to offer our students cutting-edge research materials that will complement their personal laptops and raise their levels of excitement for science experiments. The effects of this grant will be seen down the road through improved test scores, additional scholarships and personal success in students' chosen fields."

After being nominated by local farmers, school districts completed an online application, and finalists were chosen by math and science teachers from ineligible school districts. The America's Farmers Grow Rural Education Advisory Council, a group of 26 prominent farmers from across the country, then reviewed the finalists' applications and selected the winners.

"We are extremely grateful to the farmers that not only nominated our district for this grant but are constant supporters of our kids," Harris said. "Farmers, rural schools and Monsanto recognize the importance of science and

new wider bridges. NDOR has evaluated various options to replace these bridges; this meeting will present those options. One of the options would require a one-to two-year detour. Work would also include extension of a box culvert at a tributary to Big Sandy Creek and replacing three timber drainage structures south of the Little Blue River.

New right-of-way and temporary easement acquisitions are anticipated at various locations throughout the project area. The existing N-53 bridge over the Little Blue River is eligible for placement on the National Register of Historic Places. Public input is being sought regarding potential impacts to this historic structure.

The proposed construction is not currently scheduled, but is on the district's five-year program. The projects together would take one to two years to construct.

Personnel from the State Department of Roads will be available to answer questions, receive comments and discuss any aspect of the proposed highway improvement project.

Interment was in the Harmony Cemetery with Farmer and Son Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.


