City to discuss electric rate, HVFD sinking fund increases

The Hebron City Council will address two budget items at the November meeting next month including electrical rate and fire department sinking fund adjustments. Both will most likely increase.

At the October meeting, Hebron Volunteer Fire Department chief B.J. Linton said the sinking fund as it stands now will not keep up with projected costs. He asked council members to consider upping the amount of cash the City normally submits to the fund. In fact, the

city leaders may have to double the amount already going in.

"We've been going through the budget and know we're going to be short," Linton said. "The city truck and pumper truck come from the sinking fund, and even though we won't need a new truck for another 10 years, at the rate we're going we won't have enough when the time comes."

Currently the city funds the account with \$1,000 a month, but price tags for new trucks continues to rise. Linton said adding a new truck is projected to cost over \$200,000 in the next decade. "If we keep the

fund the same," councilwoman Beth Goldhammer said, "we'll need an additional \$80,000 to \$90,000 when the time comes."

Council president Larry Fangmeier agreed. "It looks to me we could be adding an additional \$750 to \$1,000 a month to the money we're already putting in the account," he said.

Linton said the department's two ambulances were bought with donations only, while the fuel comes out of the normal fire department budget. The chief will present additional information at the November meeting where city officials will finalize their decision.

In other business, councilman Fangmeier said the city's wholesale cost for electricity was getting hit with a six percent increase. The council has until December to decide, but Fangmeier wanted them to be aware a change needed to be made. "We are looking at an increase," he said, "but we're going to research the peak period to see how much the raise will be. No one likes to see their electricity rates go up, but we won't be able to sustain the wholesale increase without raising the rates."

The council will discuss the rates in more detail at the November meeting.

coffee machines already, so I just opened it up."

The bank is located diagonally across the street from where the cafe sat in downtown Davenport. Voss said several people asked area businesses if there might be a place

to hold the traditional coffee vigil, to no avail, which is when he stepped in. "On Fridays, our bank employees provide rolls or doughnuts for everyone," he added.

People have been making jack-o'-lanterns for centuries; carving vegetables and turning them into protective shells for embers and candles. But the lanterns weren't made out of pumpkins until the first settlers arrived to this continent and found the native fruit.

Irish folklore says the term jack-o'-lantern derives from a thief nicknamed "Stingy Jack" who is said to have tricked the Devil. Although accounts of Jack's trickery vary, all tell a tale of how Jack was able to trap the Devil using a cross, and only after soliciting a promise from the demon that he would not have to go to hell once he died, Jack set the Devil free.

Jack continued his life as a thief safe in the knowledge he wasn't going to hell and, as we all eventually do, Jack died. However, since he led a life of great sin, God would not allow him entry into heaven, and since he was barred from hell, he had nowhere to go and was doomed to walk the earth for eternity. Jack complained he would have no light to find his way, so the Devil mockingly tossed him an ember from the flames of hell. Jack carved a turnip, put the ember inside, and began his eternal journey. He became known as "Jack of the Lantern," or Jack-o'-Lantern.

On All Hallows' Eve, the Irish hollowed out turnips, rutabagas, gourds, potatoes and beets and placed a light in them to ward off evil spirits and keep Stingy Jack away. Today the tradition continues as Jack-o'-Lanterns grace stoops, fence posts and porches during Halloween. The most lit jack-o'-lanterns displayed in one location is 30,128, a record set in Boston, Mass., in 2006. Highwood, Ill., is currently attempting to break this record and as of Oct. 23, thought they had done it with 32,000 lit jack-o'-lanterns. The count has not yet been made official.

All Hallow's Eve is just around the corner - may your coffers be full of sweet treats for the little ones and may your jack-o'-lanterns burn bright enough to keep the demons away.

Halloween Safety

No spells will be cast on young spooks this Halloween with a few sensible tips from the Nebraska Regional Poison Center. Take the following preventive measure to keep children safe this Halloween:

Sponsor a Halloween party as an alternative to wide-range trick-or-treating. Parties at home can substitute or at least shorten those trick-or-treat trips.

Parties can be a lot of fun with decorations and games. You can create a spooky but safe atmosphere for little trick or treaters who come to the party.

Serving punch containing dry ice can help to set the stage. Dry ice is not considered dangerous as long as the ice is not swallowed in its solid form. Small pieces should not be put in individual glasses. Frostbite can occur if dry ice touches the skin or mouth.

If youngsters want to trick or treat, providing them with a full meal before heading out will reduce the temptation for children to eat treats before they return home.

Make sure children are accompanied by an adult and take a flashlight along if it is dark. For children who want to use glow-sticks, realize that glow sticks can cause immediate stinging and a burning sensation if the liquid comes in contact with the mouth or the eyes. Be careful when small children put these in

their mouths.

All children should stay in their own neighborhood and only go in homes of friends and family.

Costumes should be warm, well fitting and non-flammable. Masks should provide adequate vision and should be removed while children are crossing streets. Use inexpensive, nontoxic face paint as an alternative to masks. Consider using reflective tape on costumes worn after dark.

When children trick-or-treat, the goodies they receive should be carefully inspected by adults. Homemade treats or anything out of its original wrapper should be discarded unless parents are positive of the identity of the person from which it came.

Stay away from barking dogs or upset animals.

For those anticipating youngsters coming to your door, consider giving out non-edible treats such as stickers, pencils, erasers, barrettes or other party favors.

Innovative Youth Corn Challenge Contest

Today's agricultural world faces several challenges, one of them being the decline of our most valuable resource, the future workforce. While Nebraska's population under 18 years of age grew between the years of 2000 and 2009, this increase was seen in only ten of the 93 counties. One strategy to keep youth in rural communities and involved in production agriculture is to involve them in projects that encourage active participation and demonstrate the wide array of careers related to production agriculture.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension and the Nebraska Corn Board have teamed up to offer the first Innovative Youth Corn Challenge contest. This contest, open to 4-H members, age ten and older as of Jan. 1, or FFA members (in-school members), will guide youth through all aspects of corn production, as well as the agricultural careers related to corn production.

Youth will be challenged to implement a production practice different than normal to determine if they increased their yield. Economics and sustainability of the practice will also be considered. Yields, cropping history, and production information will be collected in the Corn

Yield Challenge management summary.

Goals of the contest are: achieve new, innovative, and economically feasible crop production methods to improve yields; provide research data for producers to implement in their operations; distribute data to corn producers, researchers, and agri-businesses for decision making purposes; introduce youth to a variety of agronomic professionals, including corn producers.

Youth will work with an adult mentor throughout the process. Mentors can be extension faculty, ag teachers, or other qualified agronomy professionals.

Cash prizes and plaques will be given to the first, second, and third place teams. First place will receive \$1,000, second place will receive \$500, and third place will receive \$250. A data completion and innovation award will also be given.

To participate, youth must complete and return an entry form by March 1 to the Fillmore County Extension Office in Geneva. Forms can be downloaded at cropwatch.unl.edu/youth/activities. For more information, contact Brandy VanDeWalle at bvandewalle2@unl.edu or 402.759.3712.


Frye attended a legislative conference on Oct. 13 by the Nebraska Association of County Officials. It provided county officials specialized information regarding the Nebraska legislative process.



The Moral Equivalent of War



When William James wrote his famous essay "The Moral Equivalent of War" in 1910, the Spanish-American War was still fresh in most Americans' minds, and the Civil War was burned inexorably into every American's conscience. James gave a thumbnail sketch of the history of the war, noting that in ancient times, war was mainly about pillage and plunder, and as a result James makes a strong case for the martial spirit being deeply bred into our moral fiber. We respect the warrior's hardiness and discipline and we all know that there are things worth fighting for.

James does not wish to denigrate the martial virtues, and yet he realized (even prior to the unprecedented carnage of two world wars), that these martial traits were profoundly antithetical to life and civilization. His essay is really a plea for the case of turning the martial instincts and spirit to something more productive than killing our fellow human beings. This sentiment is as timely today as it was a century ago, perhaps even more so, but we seem not to have learned the lesson that James was attempting to teach. We should pray that nations might turn their energies to more life-affirming and productive pursuits than the slaughter, enslavement, or exploitation of their neighbors.

Josiah Burger of Davenport and Dana Dlouhy of Deshler are students being honored as Distinguished Scholars.



Baling Corn Or Milo Stalks For Winter Feed

Your corn is getting combined. Now you are wondering if you should bale some of the stalks. Is it worth it?

What are corn stalk bales worth? One way to look at it is from the cost stand point. Nutrients removed by stalk bales may need to be replaced with extra fertilizer. Using this fall's prices, stalks contain about 12 to 13 dollars worth of nitrogen, phosphate, sulfur, and lime per ton.

Corn stalk removal also can reduce soil organic matter, increase erosion risk, and increase soil water evaporation. Nebraska research shows that dryland corn yield declines about two bushels for each ton of residue removed while irrigation costs increase similarly to maintain corn yield. That's another 12 to 14 dollars per ton.

Labor and equipment costs average 20 to 25 dollars per ton, plus, baling stalks tends to cause more wear and tear on equipment than other baling operations. Totaled together, these costs amount to 50 to 55 dollars per ton of corn stalks removed.

Now, what are corn stalks worth as a feed? One rule of thumb suggests the dollar feeding value is midway between that of straw and prairie

hay. However feed value of stalks varies greatly, and cattle tend to waste more of it. For example, if you bale the entire field you may only have three to four percent protein and less than fifty percent TDN.

Harvest just the tailings in the two or three rows behind the combine and TDN increases to the lower 50's and protein to about five percent. You should test to make sure.

Are baled corn stalks worthwhile? These numbers suggest that it may be a toss-up, depending a lot on local feed supplies and your individual ability to either cut costs or feed efficiently.

Voss said there are two groups who come in on a daily basis; one from 8-9:30 a.m., the second from 9:30-10:30 a.m. Most of the time, they fill the octagon-shaped table capable of seating at least a dozen coffee drinkers.

"When we first started coming here," said one of the regular social sippers Bonnie Dumler, "we were using styrofoam cups. Then one day we arrived and found a pyramid of Frontier Bank coffee mugs in the middle of the table. Jake got them for us."

Each mug was immediately claimed and tattooed with its new owner's name using magic marker. Voss then provided a cupboard to store the mugs when they weren't in use.

Dumler said the group of coffee drinkers decided right away to contribute money to a kitty to offset the cost of the morning ritual. That kitty has grown into a cool \$1,000 since March, Voss said. He added that he uses the money to reimburse his employees for the Friday rolls and purchase some of the other supplies, but, for the most part, the bank buys the coffee. The group says the money is his to do whatever he wants with it.

So, he decided to donate it

to the Davenport Area Community Fund as a means of creating an endowment that will benefit the Davenport community. Voss, who is pres-
