Hebron Rescue responds to motorcycle accident

Hebron Rescue responded to a motorcycle accident on the morning of Friday, September 27.

The accident occurred on 13th Street (or Old Highway 81). According to the accident report, Edward and Roxann Zenobi of Sioux Falls, S.D., were northbound on a 2005 Harley Davidson motorcycle when they entered the curve of the road at a high rate of speed. Edward was driving the motorcycle

He applied the brake and laid the motorcycle on its left side. Following that, the motorcycle left the roadway and entered the ditch. Edward and Roxann were both thrown from the motorcycle.

Both were transported to Thayer County Health Services by EMS. Edward was transported for a head injury and Roxann was transported

for a chest injury. Edward was not wearing a helmet at the time of the accident.

In addition to this motorcycle ac-

cident, the Thayer County Sheriff's Office investigated three other injury accidents during a three day period last week.

City Council holds special meeting

The Hebron City Council had a special meeting on September 30. There were two items on the agenda for the meeting including: updates on purchasing a different bucket truck and discussion of an economic development strategy.

Bids close for the bucket truck on October 2. If no more bids come in, a bucket truck has been located that would be available for purchase. The final vote will come before the city council during the regular monthly meeting on October 7.

Many community members attended the meeting to take part in the discussion about an economic development strategy. The discussion stems from the possibility of applying for the downtown revitalization grant that has been discussed during previous meetings. The main points of discussion included what needed to be done for the community and what does the community actually need. Those topics considered new businesses in the community. Another topic of discussion was possible issues that are currently a problem for businesses already in the city.

After the discussion, the group decided that the following action needs to be taken. They hope to get a focus group started and to provide incentive for the group. The city council also decided that the current web site needs to be updated and maintained since it currently has some old information on it. They also hope to set a plan to get one action started. They hope to have ideas for this action at the November meeting.

City Council will meet again on October 7.

Corn, soybean harvest continue behind schedule

Corn and soybean harvest are underway for many area farmers. Although harvest isn't even half-way done, area elevators are starting to see more and more dry land crop coming in, but still aren't as far along in harvest as they normally would be this time of year.

"I'd say we are well behind schedule," said Chester AGP elevator manager Keith Wilt. "We are about 10 days to two weeks behind what we'd normally see."

Wilt said that as of Monday afternoon, mainly dry land soybeans had come in, and they had yet to see any corn. The yield that they are seeing for the soybeans is ranging anywhere from 35-50 bushels per acre. The average test weight they are getting for soybeans has been around 56 pounds per bushel. He estimated that the soybean harvest is around 15 percent complete.

Janice Wiedel from Cargill in Carleton said they are seeing close to the same results for soybeans. For yield, she said they were getting anywhere from 35-45 bushels per acre. When it came to test weight, she said their average was exactly the same as AGP's which was 56 pounds per bushels. She also specified that what they are getting in is

predominantly dry land crop. As of early this week, she estimated that the soybean harvest for dry land is 12-15 percent complete while the irrigated crop harvest is two percent complete.

Wiedel said Cargill has received some corn crop at their facility. Much like soybeans, they have received predominantly dry land of this crop as well. Their average test weight for corn has been 57.8

pounds per bushel. The average yield has been 110 bushels per acre. She estimates that corn harvest is about seven percent complete for the irrigated crop and 12-15 percent complete for dry land.

The county commissioners at their last session rejected the petition to submit the question of selling the county quarter section of land adjoining Talmadge's addition to Hebron on the north. This matter recalls two events in the early days of the county. In 1872, 17 of the 18 members of the original Hebron Town Company, bought this piece of land for \$900 (a large amount to raise in those days by the poor frontiersmen) and donated it to Thayer County.

The amount paid by each, including expenses was \$55. Among those who paid (we have forgotten a number of names) were C.J. Rhodes, A.C. Ring, G.D. Proctor, J.C. Past, Ed. S. Past, C.A. Elliott, Jacob Hendershot, F.J. Hendershot, L.J. Correll, and E.M. Correll. The second event, several years after, was that the citizens of Hebron occupied a small portion of it as a cemetery. People from all parts of the county were buried there. In order that the cemetery might forever be devoted to that purpose, the question of donating back a small portion to the town was submitted to a vote of the people — and overwhelmingly defeated.



Flu Season

The number of flu cases and hospitalizations are on the rise in Nebraska. The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and possibly death. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year.

People who get the flu often feel some or all of these symptoms: fever, chills, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, headache, fatigue, and some people may have vomiting and diarrhea. People with the flu can spread it to others up to 6 feet away. Most experts think the flu virus is spread mainly by droplets made when you cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land or be inhaled into the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might get the flu by touching a surface or object with the flu virus on it and then touching your own mouth or nose.

To avoid this, people should stay away from sick people and stay home if sick. It is also important to wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub. Linens, eating utensils, and dishes should not be shared without washing thoroughly first. Eating utensils can be washed either in a dishwasher or by hand with water and soap. Frequently touched surfaces should be cleaned and disinfected at home, work and school.

Most healthy adults can infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick. Children may pass the virus for up to 7 days. Symptoms start 1 to 4 days after the virus enters the body. That means you may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you even know you are sick. Sometimes people can be infected with the flu virus without any symptoms.

The single best way to prevent getting the flu is to get a flu vaccination, but good health habits like covering your cough and washing your hands can help stop the spread of germs and prevent respiratory illnesses like the flu. There are also flu antiviral drugs that can be used to treat and prevent the flu.

Tips to prevent getting the flu are:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.
- Stay home when you are sick. If possible don't go to work, school, or run errands.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. This will prevent

those around you from getting sick.

• Clean your hands. Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.

• Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.

• Practice other good health habits. Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at home, work or school, especially when someone is ill. Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food.
