## Tidbits

### Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$202,742.38 in sales tax for the month of July 2014 after showing a 5.9 percent decrease in net taxable sales over July 2013. For July 2014, the county had \$3,686,218 in net taxable sales - down from \$3,915,692 in 2013.

According to Hebron Clerk Jean Nagey, the City of Hebron collected \$19,537.28 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,686,784 for the month of July. That shows a decrease of 12.1 percent in net taxable sales over July 2013 which was \$1,918,290. The motor vehicle tax (\$2,300.49) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$17,236.79) goes into the sales tax fund.

The Department of Revenue releases figures approximately three months later than the actual month being profiled. August 2014 figures will be released in November.

## Pheasants Forever chapter reorganizes and prepares for youth hunt

The Pheasants Forever Four Seasons chapter of Thayer County has reorganized and will be hosting a youth mentorship hunt in mid-October.

Pheasants Forever is a national organization dedicated to the conservation of wildlife, particularly pheasants and quail, through habitat improvements and education.

On Oct. 18, ten to twelve youth, all under the age of 16, will meet at the Hebron Municipal Airport before sunrise. Each youth will be paired one-on-one with a hunting mentor.

The program targets youths that don't have connections to hunting and may never have the opportunity to hunt otherwise.

The program will offer a presentation from Game and Parks and a session on game cleaning. However, before any of the participants can go on the hunt, each must pass the hunter safety course.

"Safety is the main goal of the day," said Mark Fangmeier, Pheasants Forever youth chair.

The youths will also receive a free hat and hunting vest. Participants will be chosen and contacted by Pheasants Forever.

Later this month, on Oct. 24, the chapter will host a fundraiser banquet.

## District One Probation team pays it forward in Hebron

A cloud of dust filled the upper level of the Blue Valley Community Action building on Oct. 2 while the District One Probation team worked to clean it out.

The probation team, which covers 11 counties, scrubbed and swept the space as part of "pay it forward" projects they do.

Paying it forward means to perform a good deed to others to inspire future good deeds.

"We volunteer our time to better our communities," said Sarah Rinne, the chief probation officer. "We work in a field where we try to make communities safe."

The projects are officer driven. The officers find places in need of volunteers and pick quarterly projects.

Pay it Forward is also need driven.

"If we get a request from a community and we can make it happen, we'll do it," said Rinne. "The goal is to serve other people."

Blue Valley, their latest project, is a non-profit organization that

covers nine counties. The staff at the Hebron location work with low income families in Thayer County. In the future, they would like to use the space as a shelter.

Ultimately, the probation team

"We're more than just probation officers," said Rinne. "We're members of these communities too."

## Several not guilty pleas heard in district court

### One man is sentenced...

Breana Zoubek, 19, of Belvidere pled "not guilty" in district court on Oct. 2. Zoubek is accused of stealing two transformers belonging to Norris Public Power District. She is being charged with theft, a class III felony. She will go to pre-trial on Dec. 4.

Kyle Wolford, 26, of Hebron also pled not guilty last Thursday. Wolford is already serving a sentence for domestic assault and third degree assault, both misdemeanor I charges. He is now being tried for another assault from Aug. 3 after he

was released on bond and awaiting sentencing. This time the charge is a class II felony.

A second man, Todd Roop, 44, of Hebron was sentenced to serve time in the county jail. Roop was found guilty of one count of strangulation, a class IV felony which occurred in 2012. In April 2013, Roop was sentenced to 36 months of intensive supervised probation which was revoked several months later when he violated it. The Hebron man will serve 180 days with 61 days credit served.

## 1884

### 130 Years Ago

Mrs. Zutter of Spring Creek precinct has purchased four acres of land near town, is building a house thereon, and will soon have a home convenient to our schools where her children can have better advantages for gaining an education.

Ives Marks, one of the pioneer settlers on Rose Creek, the first treasurer of Jefferson County when this county was attached to it, and a United Brethren preacher of many peculiarities and oddities, died at his new home in Indiana.

James A Lathrop of Nora Springs, Iowa, senior member of the firm of Lathrop & Bassore, Millers, Friedensau, has arrived with his furniture and will be a Thayerite for a while.

Messrs. Kleppinger & Hunt of Walnut, Iowa, have opened a large lumber yard at Carleton. Mr. Kleppinger is a brother of Mrs. J.D. Garmire of Hebron.

Henry W. Cornell, for a long time a merchant of Belvidere, has gone to California and Washington territory

The celebration of the completion of J.J. Kern's elegant new residence at Friedensau is reported as a very happy social event. Some 50 or 60 invited guests sat down to a bountiful dinner and supper, and report much enjoyment.

Alex McKinney is building a new store building just across the alley east of the Carleton House. It will be two stories high; the upper to be used for hall purposes, if there is a demand for one.

The cornerstone of the German Lutheran Church at Prairie Star was laid by the Rev. C. Buechler.

## 1894

### 120 Years Ago

Russian thistles are reported quite numerous near Gilead.

O.M. Quigley, wife and child, arrived. Mr. Quigley will take editorial charge of the Register in place of Mr. Jenkins who has gone to Omaha.

Elder W.T. Hacker and family arrived from Salt Lake City, Utah, and will at once commence his duties as pastor of the Christian church in this city.

Hon. E.J. Hainer of Aurora, congressman of this district, addressed a large audience in Hebron.

As an author, W.H. Ellison has achieved a success that many authors fail to win. His story in this issue, titled, "The Delinquent Tax List," will pass through three editions and will have thousands of readers.

Gardener Boyes finds that some sneak thieves have been borrowing sweet potatoes in the night time.

The class of 1895 has elected officers as follows: Ed Prentice, president; Clarence

Cooke, treasurer; Ivy Correll, secretary.

Charles G. Low, editor of the Deshler citizen, has been appointed justice of the peace for that city.

J.H. Lynch has commenced building a residence on his lots, corner of Olive Avenue and Sixth Street. Southwell and Wood are the contractors.

Last night about 9 o'clock, the citizens of Hebron were startled by three pistol shots in succession followed by considerable noise. A few minutes thereafter, Marshal Scoville and an assistant were seen marching a drunk man to the Mansion de Gaol where Landlord de Sheriff incarcerated him in a steel cage. His place of residence was given as Alexandria. He fired off his rusty old 38 revolver, started his horses on a gallop — and thereby hangs a tale that will harrow up thy inmost being. Doubtless, under the inspiration of the tarantula juice he had imbibed, his reflections were, in the style of Victor Hugo, something as follows: "Whoop! I'm a terror from Terrorville! I'm invincible, unconquerable, irresistible! Whoop! I'll defy, I'll insult, I'll alarm the whole city of Hebron! What care I for 2,500 population. Bah! Who's afraid of law and officers? Whoop! Here goes. Bang! Bang! Bang! Now, Arabian steeds, fly! Show your heels while I fling back a laugh of scorn and derision at the sacred inhabitants who wonder at my bravery in firing off a pistol and my skill as a driver! What's this? Oh, —! —! —!" That bright dream was his last. He woke to find his outfit broke, and he in Scoville's clutches fast. Sad ending for his silly joke. He had driven at full speed into the trench where the Lincoln Avenue bridge was being repaired. His poor faithful horses were hurt but had no bones broken. He was thrown out, to be immediately arrested, relieved of his revolver and taken to jail. His trial will take place this afternoon. There will be several charges brought against him.

## 1904

### 110 Years Ago

About 25 ladies enjoyed the hospitality of Mrs. J.L. Ingersoll at her elegant home on East Olive Avenue. At the punch bowl presided Misses Wetherald and Coddington. A pleasant social time was enjoyed and in the guessing of old proverbs two prizes were awarded. Elaborate

refreshments were served by the hostess.

This week we present each Journal reader a fine lithograph portrait of President Roosevelt. Aside from its value as a work of art, it will be valued as the likeness of one of the greatest men of the century. The picture should be framed and will grace any home.

Art High, a man about 50 years of age, met his death at the end of a drunken spree. He drove into Byron about three months ago and had been living in a wagon in Fisher's corn cribs all summer. Some of the people of Byron thought he was boot-legging, and he was warned to get out or quit. He went out to Fritz Lonsmann's, about a half mile, and put up with him. He and Lonsmann came to Byron at the end of a protracted spree, and while in town got into an argument as to who had the fastest horse. Each had a horse hitched together to a two-seated buggy, and in order to prove the merits of their steeds they started out of town on the keen run, with the horses under the whip. As they went down a steep decline just west of town the buggy swerved from the road and tipped over, and in a short time Art High was dead. Lonsmann was badly bruised and is now suffering with a stiff neck and bruised body. The coroner from Scandia, Kan., was summoned and held an inquest with a verdict of accidental death. The body was buried in Washington cemetery.

### 100 Years Ago

Thomas Lahners met the national fish car at Belvidere and secured two barrels of black bass to put into his pond.

Our townsman, I. Selleg of Alexandria was appointed a member of the reception committee to meet Theodore Roosevelt at Falls City and accompanied him to Lincoln.

A.H. Records is still owner of the Majestic Theatre business in Hebron and also the Deshler motion picture business. A report was in circulation to the effect that a transfer had been made, but Mr. Records says that he is a fixture here, with no intention of disposing of his business.


Alexandria will have the Thayer County American Legion celebration on Armistice Day.





## What is Ebola?

### Health News



With the second infected patient arriving at the Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha, Ebola has been in the news a lot lately. But what is Ebola? Ebola is a rare and deadly disease caused by infection with one of the Ebola virus strains.

Ebola can cause disease in humans and nonhuman primates (monkeys, gorillas, and chimpanzees). Ebola viruses are found in several African countries.

Ebola was first discovered in 1976 near the Ebola River in what is now the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Since then, outbreaks have appeared sporadically in Africa.

Symptoms may appear anywhere from two to 21 days after exposure to Ebola, but the average is eight to ten days. Symptoms of Ebola include

- Fever (greater than 101.5°F)
- Severe headache
- Muscle pain and weakness
- Diarrhea, vomiting and/or abdominal (stomach) pain
- Unexplained hemorrhage (bleeding or bruising)

Recovery from Ebola depends on good supportive clinical care and the patient's immune response. People who recover from Ebola infection develop antibodies that last for at least ten years. When an infection does occur in humans, the virus can be spread in several ways to others.

- direct contact (through broken skin or mucous membranes: the eyes, nose, or mouth)
- blood or body fluids (including but not limited to urine, saliva, sweat, vomit, and semen)
- infected animals
- Ebola is not spread through the air or by water, or in general, by food.
- There is no evidence mosquitos or other insects can transmit the Ebola virus. Only mammals (Ex: humans,

bats, monkeys, and apes) are known to spread Ebola.

During outbreaks of Ebola, the disease can spread quickly within healthcare settings (such as a clinic or hospital).

Exposure to Ebola can occur in healthcare settings where hospital staff are not wearing appropriate protective equipment, including masks, gowns, and gloves and eye protection.

Healthcare providers caring for Ebola patients, and the family and friends in close contact with Ebola patients, are at the highest risk of getting sick because they may come in contact with infected blood or body fluids of sick patients. Once someone recovers from Ebola, they can no longer spread the virus

Dedicated medical equipment (preferable disposable) should be used by healthcare staff providing patient care. Proper cleaning and disposal of instruments, such as needles and syringes, is also important. If instruments are not disposable, they must be sterilized before being used again. Without adequate sterilization, virus transmission can continue and amplify an outbreak.

Although there has been a case of someone being diagnosed with Ebola in the U.S., it is important to remember this is not the same as an outbreak. The risk of Ebola spreading in the U.S. is very low. However, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and its partners are still taking the necessary actions to prevent this from happening. To learn more visit their website.

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# Impact of Climate Change in Nebraska

The scientific debate over whether human activities are the principal cause of climate change is over, a new report from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln says. The only debate to be had now is "precisely how these changes will play out and what actions we will need to take to adapt to and mitigate the effects of these changes."

The report, titled Understanding and Assessing Climate Change: Implications for Nebraska, is being released this week. It will be available late Thursday afternoon at <http://snr.unl.edu>.

Don Wilhite, founder of the National Drought Mitigation Center, said the report was prepared by reviewing the scientific literature on the subject and interpreting scientists' current understanding of the science of climate change and its implications for Nebraska.

For all of the ongoing political debate over climate change, the science is clear, and is the subject of "overwhelming consensus" among scientists, the report says in its executive summary.

"The body of scientific evidence confirms with a high degree of certainty that human activities in the form of increased concentrations of greenhouse gases (GHGs) since the beginning of the Industrial Revolution, changes in land use, and other factors are the primary cause for the warming that the planet has experienced, especially in recent decades," the report says.

The report says the projected climate changes are of "vital concern" and calls for strategies to adapt to the climate changes now underway.

The report summarizes scientific research on climate change, noting that changes in climate have occurred throughout the planet's history but more accurate observations since the 1970s documented these changes and the role increasing concentrations of greenhouse gases and aerosols have played in the changes detected.

In its latest assessment report, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change now states with 95 percent confidence that human influence is the main cause of the observed warming in the atmosphere and oceans. It is projected that the continued emissions of GHGs will cause further warming and changes in these components of the climate system.

Changes noted globally are reflected in Nebraska, which has experienced an overall warming of about 1°F since 1895, the report says. When this is separated into daytime highs and nighttime lows, the trend in low temperatures is greater than the trend in high temperatures, both of which show an overall warming.

These trends are consistent with the changes experienced across the Plains states in general, which show a warming that is highest in winter and spring and a greater warming for the nighttime lows than for daytime highs.

By far, the majority of this warming has occurred during the winter months, with minimum temperatures rising 2.0-4.0°F per century and maximum temperature increases of 1.0-2.5°F per century. Summer minimum temperatures have shown an increase of 0.5-1.0°F per century at most locations, but maximum temperature trends generally range from -0.5 to +0.5°F per century.

Unlike temperature, however, there is no discernible trend in mean annual precipitation in Nebraska. Since 1895, the length of the frost-free season has increased by 5 to 25 days across Nebraska, and on average statewide by more than one week. The length of the frost-free season will continue to increase in future decades, the report says.

Projected temperature changes for Nebraska range from an increase of 4-5 degrees F (low emission scenarios) to 8-9 degrees F (high emission scenarios) by the last quarter of the 21st century (2071-2099).

The reason for the projected range in temperature increases is largely due to the uncertainty associated with future emissions of GHGs. If climate change continues on its current path, the changes will likely be in the 8-9 degrees F range.

Whichever scenario plays out, the number of 100-degree-plus days is projected to increase significantly in Nebraska and the Great Plains.

By mid-century, the increase in Nebraska would equate to summer temperatures equivalent to those experienced during the 2012 drought and heat wave. The number of warm nights — those with the temperature remaining above 80 in the southern Plains and above 60 in the northern Plains — will rise dramatically.

In Nebraska, the number of

those warm nights is expected to increase by 20-25 for the low emissions scenario and 25-40 for the high emissions scenario.

As for precipitation, current trends for increases in the northern Plains are likely to become more pronounced, while the southern Plains will continue to become drier.

Little change in precipitation in winter and spring is expected in Nebraska, while any summer and fall increases will be minimal. It is likely that drought frequency and severity would increase in Nebraska, the report says.

Current and continued projected reduction in snow pack in the central and northern Rocky Mountains will continue to affect Nebraska in reduced flows in the Platte and Missouri rivers.

Changes in temperatures in Nebraska as elsewhere will benefit some and harm others, the report says. "However, the changes in climate currently being observed extend well beyond temperature and include changes in precipitation amounts, seasonal distribution, intensity, and form (snow versus rain). Changes in the observed frequency and intensity of extreme events are of serious concern today and for the future because of the economic, social and environmental costs associated with responding to, recovering from, and preparing for these extreme events in the near and longer term."

Wilhite said report authors invited experts from key sectors in Nebraska to prepare commentaries about the implications of current and projected changes in climate on their sectors.

These commentaries — from interests in water resources, energy supply and use, agriculture, forestry, human health, ecosystems, urban systems, infrastructure and rural communities — "raise serious concerns about how the projected changes in climate will impact Nebraska, and they provide a starting point for discussions about the actions that we should take to adapt to the changes in each sector."

These specific sectors all have a role to play in responding to climate change, the report says.

"Early adapters will be better able to cope with changes as they occur. ... Action now is preferable and more cost-effective than reaction later," the executive summary concludes.
