Tidbits

Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$214,076.92 in sales tax for the month of July 2013 after showing a 24.3 percent increase in net taxable sales over July 2012. For July 2013, the county had \$3,915,692 in net taxable sales - up from \$3,149,832 in 2012.

According to Hebron Clerk Jean Nagey, the City of Hebron collected \$23,730.51 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,918,290 for the month of July. That shows an increase of 10.9 percent in net taxable sales over July 2012. The motor vehicle tax (\$3,134.14) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$20,596.37) goes into the sales tax fund.

The Department of Revenue releases figures approximately three months later than the actual month being profiled. August 2013 figures will be released at the beginning of November.

Four injured in three vehicle accident

A three vehicle accident sent four people to the hospital last Friday morning.

The Chester Volunteer Ambulance and Rescue responded to the accident located at the Highway 81 and Highway 8 junction near Chester. The Hebron Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue were also called to the scene.

According to the accident report, Jessie Payne of Hubbell was eastbound on Highway 8 in a 1976 Chevy pickup while Deyanne and Edward Valencia were northbound on Highway 81 in a 1999 Ford Windstar mini van. Edward stated that Payne didn't stop at the stop sign and continued across the intersection where the Valencia's van struck Payne's pickup. Also stopped at the intersection was a semi and trailer driven by Jessie Fuller. When Payne's pickup was struck by the van it then spun and hit the semi. Payne said that he did not see the van when he entered the intersection.

were transported to Thayer County Health Services for injuries sustained during the accident. Payne was

transported for unknown injuries while both Edward and Deyanne were transported for head injuries.

Jessie Fuller, the driver of the semi, was also transported for a head injury sustained during the accident.

Two individuals sentenced to probation

Davis Weideman appeared for a continuation of sentencing in Thayer County District Court on Oct. 1.

On June 4, Weideman, 21, formerly of Deshler and now living in Carleton, reached a plea agreement with state prosecutors during his pretrial. After the plea agreement, Weideman was charged with one count of third degree sexual assault of a child, a class 3A felony.

There were two pre-sentence evaluations done before sentencing. One was done by the probation office which said that Weideman was at low risk to reoffend. The other evaluation done was a sex offender risk assessment. This assessment

also stated that he was a low risk to reoffend.

After hearing from attorneys from both sides and from Weideman himself, District Judge Vicky Johnson sentenced him to 36 months of supervised probation along with 30 consecutive days in Thayer County Jail. He also must pay a \$1,000 fine and attend a treatment for sex offenders. In addition to that, he must also register as a sex offender for 25 years.

James Coats

James Coats of Hardy was also sentenced on Oct. 1 in Thayer County District Court. After entering a plea agreement

in August, Coats was charged with one count of forgery in the second degree, a class 3 felony.

According to the arrest affidavit, in June of 2012 Coats wrote two checks on someone else's account totaling \$5,435.

The pre-sentence report from the probation office stated that Coats was a low risk to reoffend.

District Judge Vicky Johnson sentenced Coats to 36 months of probation and to pay restitution in the amount of \$5,435. He also must complete a Crime Victim's Impact and Accountability class through the Community Justice Center within 90 days.

City Council discusses city orchard

The Hebron City Council held its regular monthly meeting on October 7.

The meeting began with Issac Nielson speaking with council members about his Eagle Scout project. Nielson hopes to help create a city orchard. The city recently purchased a lot near first and Jefferson street. The lot has a few concrete slabs that would have to be removed in order to move forward with the city orchard. For his project Nielson hopes to remove the concrete to get the orchard started.

Although there was interest from another person in purchasing the lot,

the group decided to keep the entire property for now and see how much land would be needed for the orchard project. Once this is known, the city will then look into what to do if there is extra property not needed for the orchard.

The community center was also a subject for discussion. Three schematics were available for the public to view during two times last weekend. Council member Beth Goldhammer said only eight community members came to look at the schematics and give their input. The steering committee has also met and reviewed the schematics. After doing so, they

recommended one of the plans to the city council.

City council members discussed the spending level and how much of the donated funds should be spent on the building. After much discussion, the city council decided to continue with the current schematics but talk with JEO Consulting about reworking them. There were some changes and issues about the current schematics that were brought up during the meeting including the amount of space needed and the placement of the rooms.

130 Years Ago

Never before in the history of our town has any one period of 24 hours witnessed so many departures "over the river to the other shore."

Thos. E. Hiatt and family, formerly of Carleton, are now on their way back from Indiana, to again become residents of that town.

James Shearer is building a dwelling house on his Dry Creek farm five miles south of Hebron on the road to Chester.

Wm. Klaes has commenced the erection of a prescription drugstore near the Sherman House.

There are about 200 enrolled on the list of scholars in the Hubbell school.

W.L. Thompson has the fastest pacer in the county.

The schoolhouse in the Headley neighborhood, two miles north of Hebron, is finished

The transfer of the stock of B.S. Ferris, in the First National Bank of Hebron to A.G. Collins, late cashier of the People's Bank of Beatrice, was completed and Mr. Ferris has severed his connection with the institution established so largely by his enterprise and capital. A.G. Collins is now president.

Some of the conventionists came homesome what "boozy" last Saturday. This doesn't speak well for Hebron.

Hubbell

Last Sunday morning it was discovered that someone with more malice than the fear of God or man in his heart had entered Eph. Longrin's saloon and bored holes in the barrels and spilled all the drinks on the floor and cellars, and carried away several hundred cigars. Two men were arrested.

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National Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Breast cancer remains the second leading cause of cancer death among women after lung cancer. Annually more than 230,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer and more than 39,000 women die from it. While these figures are alarming, there is still a lot more to be done in the fight against breast cancer, there is also good news.

Advances in early detection and improved treatments have led to a steady decrease in breast cancer-related deaths since the 1990s. The 2.5 million breast cancer survivors in the US serve as proof that more women are beating breast cancer than ever before.

During National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, women are urged to reduce their personal breast cancer risk factors. Being a woman and getting older are the two main, non-modifiable risk factors for breast cancer.

Others factors such as family history, personal history, no pregnancies, first pregnancy later in life, beginning menstrual periods before age 12 or menopause after age 55, obesity, heavy alcohol intake and use of some types of hormone therapy can increase a woman's risk.

There are reasons why doctors tell patients to live a healthy lifestyle. In addition to lowering the risk of breast cancer, it can also have a significant impact on a woman's risk for many cancers and other illnesses.

The American Institute for Cancer Research estimates that almost 40 percent of the breast cancer cases in the US—about 70,000 cases a year—could be prevented if women maintained a healthy weight, exercised, and limited the amount of alcohol they drink.

A new study by the American Cancer Society adds further support to the evidence that physical activity reduces the risk of breast cancer in postmenopausal women. Researchers say moderate recreational activity was associated

with a 14 percent lower risk and high physical activity with a 25 percent lower risk of breast cancer when compared to women who were active at a lowest level.

The results clearly support the association between physical activity and postmenopausal breast cancer. Walking on average at least one hour per day resulted in a lower risk for breast cancer. More strenuous and longer activities lowered the risk even more.

Women need to also take family history into account. Roughly 20 percent of women with breast cancer have close relatives: a sibling, parent, or grandparent who has had the disease. Women with a strong family history should talk to their doctor about other ways to reduce their risk.

The sad fact is that even women who've done everything they can to prevent breast cancer, will still develop the disease. That is why regular mammography screenings are so critical to early detection. Mammograms can detect changes in the breast as small as a pinhead, often one to two years earlier than when a lump can be felt and before the cancer has spread to other parts of the body.

The five-year survival rate for cancer caught at this stage is 98 percent, a compelling reason to get screened. It is recommended that women 40 and older have an annual mammogram. Clinical breast exams performed by a physician are also recommended yearly for women 40 and over and every one to three years among women ages 20-39.

PHSD Working To Educate Public On Importance Of Flu Shots

Protect the ones you love. That is the slogan that Public Health Solutions District Health Department hopes you hear quite often this flu season. They are working hard to educate everyone on the importance of getting an annual flu shot.

Getting immunized not only protects the person getting the shot but also helps protect those who are around them: families and friends. While a healthy child or adult with influenza may only get sick for a couple days, the risk of them spreading the flu to an elderly relative such as grandma or grandpa or a baby is great. Older people and babies are at a higher risk for complications and death as a result of the flu.

Flu shots are available in many community settings. If you need to find a location to get your immunization, Public Health Solutions (PHS) maintains a list of those giving the vaccine on their website www.phsneb.org or you can simply call the Public Health Solutions office, 1-888-310-0565.

In addition, special clinics have again been scheduled in 39 participating schools in Saline, Gage, Fillmore, Jefferson, and Thayer counties. The SKIP Flu Program (School Kids Immunization Program) is in its sixth year of operation

and is a collaborative effort of the PHS Board of Health, the schools, County boards and communities. Immunizations are provided without extra cost to individuals with a Medicaid or health insurance card.

Through the support of the county boards, individuals who have no health coverage and are unable to pay are already covered under the program. Parents are encouraged to find the date of the scheduled clinic at their child's school and complete the parent authorization form in advance of the clinic. Unless the parent or guardian indicates otherwise or unless there are contraindications, all children will receive the flu mist, avoiding the injection.

Through the SKIP Flu program the flu immunization rates among school children is almost three times greater than that in other areas of the state. This year Public Health Solutions is trying to increase this rate through a special promotion program supported by Nebraska Medicaid managed care plans: Arbor Health, Coventry Cares, and United Healthcare Community Plan.

West Nile Virus Risk Still Remains

West Nile Virus cases peak in August and September; consequently there has been a sharp rise in suspect and confirmed cases of West Nile virus in Nebraska in the past two weeks. As of Wednesday there had been 75 positive reports of West Nile Virus among Nebraskans.

Of these, investigations of 26 of the cases are pending. In the Public Health Solutions five county area (Fillmore, Jefferson, Gage, Saline and Thayer) six cases were reported and four cases have been confirmed. The two unconfirmed cases are considered probable. There has been one death. The death underscores the importance of continuing preventive measures until the first frost.

While you cannot totally avoid exposure to mosquitoes, measures such as wearing long sleeves and pants, using deet, and minimizing outdoor

activities at dawn and dusk reduce risk.

While cooler temperatures will signal the end of the surveillance of mosquitoes and birds in the coming week, the presence of mosquitoes will continue albeit at lower levels until the first frost. So, PHS reminds the public to maintain vigilance and avoid mosquito exposure.

The state and local health departments monitor mosquitoes and dead birds to measure the intensity of public risk. There were 163 positive mosquito pools in the state. The first positive pool in the PHS district was at the end of August. The PHS District sample sites are only in Jefferson County.



I also had to talk to different judges about my top and shorts that I sewed, answering questions about what I learned and liked best about the project."

Research has proven that participation in 4-H has a significant positive impact on young people. Recent findings from the Tufts University 4-H Study of Positive Youth Development indicate that, when compared to their peers, young people in 4-H are:

- Nearly 4 times more likely to contribute to their communities,

- Two times more likely to pursue healthy behaviors and

- Two times more likely to engage in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) programs in the out-of-school time.

In Thayer County, more than 250 4-H members and 50 volunteers are involved in 4-H.
